### GATESVILLE STATE SCHOOL BOY KILLED IN ACCIDENT

### LCRA STRIKE STOPS MILK HERE

AUSTIN, Oct. 1, (AP)—Twenty-four towns and army camps in Central Texas served by the Lower Colorado River Authority are without electric power today following a midnight strike of 140 workers.

The workers closed down four hydro-electric plants, complaining that the state-created agency would not recognize their rights to organize and bargain collectively.

LCRA officials said they could not delegate hiring and firing or other responsibilities to any other agency.

### 5 BILLION DOLLAR TAX REDUCTION PROPOSED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1, (AP)—Five billion dollar tax reduction for individuals and businesses in 1946 was proposed to Congress today by Secretary of the Treasury Fred Vinson. Included would be the repeal of the 3 percent normal tax on individuals.

### TWO CIO STRIKES SETTLED, DETROIT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1, (AP)—Settlement of a CIO oil workers strike affecting two small Detroit plants was announced today by Union president O. A. Knight.

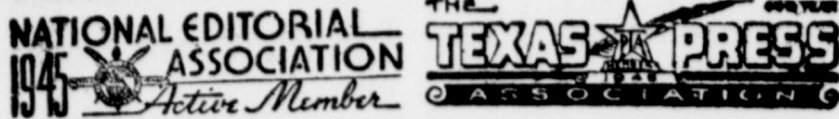

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**Telephone Equipment Still Scarce Even With War Over**

Despite the fact that the war is now over and manufacturers are speedily reconvertng to peacetime production, many items of merchandise will be in the hands of consumers before telephones are

again available to all who desire service, according to Bill Bramburg, local manager for the Gulf States Telephone Company. Until V-J day the armed forces were taking practically the entire output of communications equipment. Since then factories were forced to close down for the purpose of taking inventory. And while new telephones and associated equipment will soon be flowing for the assembly lines, the manpower shortage coupled with practically four years delay in making extensions and enlargement of the local exchange, inside and out, will necessarily mean that such time will be required to provide telephones to serve all those who have waited so patiently for service.

Mr. Bramburg states that the telephone company had made plans for substantial extensions and improvements in the service before the war started and this work will begin as soon as materials can be assembled. Among the items now on order is 11,100 feet (approximately 2 miles) of new cable, a portion of which will be used to extend lines into the Highland Addition that was opened by Robert Brown several years ago. Also many new rural lines will be extended into the trade territory of Gatesville.

"Although Gatesville was not actually located on a military reservation, nevertheless its proximity to North Camp Hood created a demand for service without the benefit of preference rating on communications equipment," Mr. Bramburg stated. "And while every effort was made to maintain the service at the highest possible standard, it was impossible to live up to our pre-war reputation for providing the best of telephone service. To all those who have been wanting a telephone installed,

we want you to know that your patience with us in our efforts to provide service during these trying war years is genuinely appreciated. We are very anxious to install that new telephone for you at the very earliest possible moment", Mr. Bramburg concluded. Mr. Bramburg suggests if you among those who are waiting for

a telephone, but have not signed an application for the service, that you stop by the local office and do so as it will be necessary to

make installations in the order of the dates on which they are received.

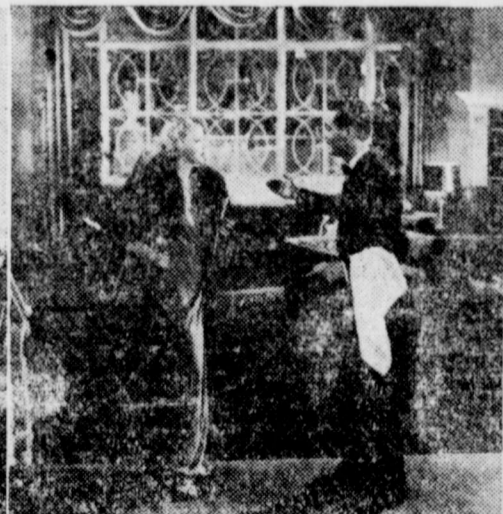

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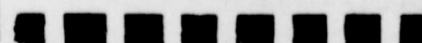


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# THE Army Answers

Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters Insurance, legal problems or other Eighth Service Command, Dallas

Q. Is out-patient treatment available to a veteran for non-service connected disease or injury?

A. No, out-patient service is available only for treatment of service connected disease and injuries.

Q. Will a statement signed by a veteran prior to discharge to the effect that a disability existed prior to enlistment be used in rating a claim for pension?

A. Public law 346 says that no person in the armed forces shall be required to sign a statement of any nature relating to the origin, incurrence or aggravation of any disease or injury he may have and such statement against his own interest signed at any time, shall be null and void and of no force and effect.

Q. In what way did the G. I. bill liberalize eligibility requirements for veteran's benefits administered by the Veterans Administration?

A. Eligibility requirements were liberalized by the G. I. Bill by providing that a discharge other than dishonorable would be prerequisite to entitlement to benefits not only of this bill but to benefits provided by Public Law Number 2 of the 73rd Congress.

Q. May a veteran and his wife who was a WAC both receive a loan guaranty?

A. A WAC who is a member of the Army and is entitled to benefits under the law, consequently both may receive a loan guaranty. If the requirements of the act are met, the guaranty may be used jointly or separately.

Q. Can a man buy a home while he is still in service and receive a loan under the G. I. Bill?

A. No the benefits provided in this bill are for veterans only.

Q. If a veteran served for a short time and was discharged because of an accident in service, is he eligible to go to school under the G. I. Bill?

A. Res, the law provides that any man discharged from the service by reason of an injury or disease incurred in line of duty in service shall be eligible just as though he had served the required 90 days or longer.

Q. Is it true that only veterans who were in business before the war are eligible for a loan guaranty to go into business?

A. No, if a man's experience and training indicate that he has a reasonable chance to make a success of the business, the loan may be made if other conditions for eligibility are met.

Q. Is there any limit on the size farm a veteran must buy to receive a loan guaranty by the Veterans Administration?

A. There is no specific limitation as to the number of acres, as long as the size of the place is adapted to the use for which it is being purchased.

Q. Can a veteran obtain a loan guaranty with which to pay delinquent taxes and interest that have accumulated on his farm while in service?

A. Yes. The loan guaranty is available to pay delinquent taxes, interest and other indebtedness.

Q. Is there any time limit within which a veteran must apply for pension or account of his service connected disability?

A. No, he may apply at any time upon discharge.

Q. If a veteran has a disability that is service incurred but does not appear on his service records, is there any way that he can establish service connection?

A. Yes, service connection may be established by medical or lay evidence; that is affidavits by civilian doctors who have treated him and by comrades in the service who have personal knowledge of the incurrence of the disability.

Q. Are there cases where service connection may be established even though the disability did not appear until after discharge?

A. Yes. There are certain diseases of slow development known as chronic constitutional diseases that may be determined to be service connected if they show up within one year after discharge.

Q. If a veteran is in a hospital for a long period of time and the premiums on his National Service Life Insurance are waived, will the sum of the waived premiums

be deducted from the face of the policy at death?

A. No, if a veteran is totally disabled for a connective period of six months or more the premiums may be waived as long as he is in that condition. All premiums paid during time waiver is in effect will be refunded.

Q. Is it true that points have been added for men in the service since last May?

A. Yes, points for discharge under the adjusted service rating system were first computed as of May 12, 1945. They are now computed as of September 2, 1945.

Q. My son has been awarded a distinguished unit citation. How many points does this count toward his discharge?

A. No discharge points are given for unit citations.

Q. How long after my husband is discharged from the army will I continue to receive my family allowance?

A. The last payment of your family allowance will be for the month during which he is discharged.

Q. May a veteran receive a loan guaranty to buy a house and another to buy a business?

A. Yes, the veteran may receive two or more loan guaranties as long as the aggregate amount of the loans do not exceed \$2,000.00 or 50 per cent of the total amount of the respective loans, considered separately.

They used to say: "Well, the leaves are falling, and there'll begin to be funerals". That's so, but, it's also so, that there's been a mighty lot of funerals the last two years here. Of course, we wish'em a lot of luck. Some were born early in the Camp Hood History and now are three or more years old. A lot of soldier's children have come here with their parents, gone to school, and made a lot of friends here. We think they are going to think about this little town as something like a "home-town" when they go back to the state they came from, if they go back.

And this brings us to something we need right here in Gatesville, and that is that some of these yamdankes stay down here with us "rebels" and help us help them and ourselves make something more out of the County- and our little town.

New blood in any organization or community puts in "vitamins" where some of the vitality and energy is lacking- Gatesville and Coryell county needs a lot of these ex-army folks, and we think you have ideas, etc., etc., that would help us, making the entire thing mutually helpful. Of course, we want you to visit your "ex-home" wherever it was, and come back and live with us. Maybe, when you do visit that "ex-home" you'll realize this isn't such a bad little burg after all, and yet, this statement is no reflection on whatever section of whatever good state you come from. We kind of like Texas, but that most certainly doesn't mean that there are 47 other states in the Union we don't like. We like'em all!

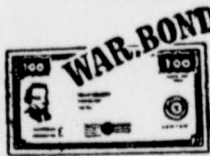

When addressed to points where micro-film equipment is operated, a miniature photographic negative of the message will be made and sent by the most expeditious transportation available for reproduction and delivery. The original message will be destroyed after the reproduction has been delivered. Messages addressed to or from points where micro-film equipment is not operated will be transmitted in their original form by the most expeditious means available.

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- (1) Write the entire message plainly on the other side within the marginal lines.
- (2) PRINT the name and address in the two panels provided. Addresses to members of the Armed Forces should include rank or rating of the addressee, unit to which attached, and APO or Naval address.
- (3) Fold, seal, and deposit in any post office letter drop or street letter box.
- (4) Enclosures must not be placed in this envelope and a separate V-Mail letter must be sent if you desire to write more than one sheet.
- (5) V-Mail letters may be sent free of postage by members of the Armed Forces. When sent by others postage must be prepaid at domestic rates (8c ordinary mail, 6c if air mail is desired).
