### PRESIDENT TRUMAN AT BAYLOR U. DEC. 5.

WACO, Oct. 25 (AP)—President Harry S. Truman will be at Baylor University December 5 to accept an honorary doctor of laws degree, President Pat M. Neff announced today.

The President is also expected to address the annual session of the Texas Masonic Grand Lodge here.

### JAPS ORDERED TO SEVER RELATIONS

TOKYO, Oct. 25, (AP)—General MacArthur today ordered Japan to sever relations with all foreign governments and turn over its diplomatic properties and papers throughout the world to Allied Powers.

The order told the Japs to recall "immediately" their diplomatic representatives home from neutral countries.

The purpose of the order, other than the apparent one of revealing to the allies all of Japan's diplomatic secrets was not disclosed.

### AMERICAN SHIP AGROUND OFF ST. NAZAIRE

LONDON, Oct 25 (AP)—Gales battered the coasts of the British Isles and western Europe for the third straight day today, driving the American Liberty Ship Charles Glover aground off St. Nazaire, France.

Extensive floods have caused destruction in Britain.

### DE GAULLE COMMUTES DENTZ'S DEATH SENTENCE

PARIS, Oct. 25 (AP)—Gen. De Gaulle today commuted the death sentence of Gen. Henry Dentz, former French High Commissioner of Syria to life imprisonment at hard labor. He was convicted of treason because he commanded French resistance to the British in 1941.

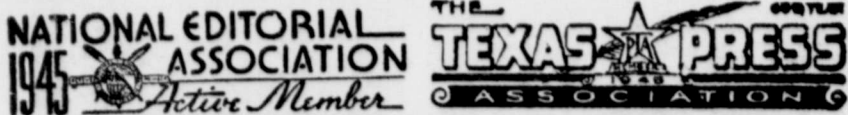

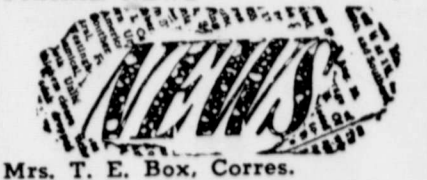

## TO ALL OF YOU WHO ASSISTED

On the last day of June 1943, the Ice Plant in Gatesville was purchased by the present owners. The plant then had a capacity of 15 tons built to serve Gatesville and vicinity in normal times with a normal population. In order to meet the increased need and demand for ice caused by Army and Civilian personnel, we immediately began construction of additional ice manufacturing facilities to double the production of ice. In making this improvement it was impossible to obtain all new equipment and some used machinery had to be installed. This used machinery naturally caused trouble when used 24 hours daily and contributed greatly to an ice shortage this summer. When it became evident that there was going to be an ice shortage and that we could not purchase ice elsewhere to meet the demand we immediately began rationing ice. The ice rationing system was adopted to divide the ice equally and fairly among all of our customers in Gatesville and adjacent territory. The great majority of you responded splendidly and understood that the Gatesville Ice Company had tried every way possible to obtain new machinery so that you could be furnished all the ice desired. Again we say our sincere thanks to you.

Since the war has been brought to a successful conclusion by the allies, we have been able to purchase some modern machinery and feel confident that hereafter ice will be plentiful.

We do not know how soon it will be possible to reconvert to peace time service. However, in the meantime an ice card placed in your window early in the morning will bring you daily delivery of ice within the city limits. Ice routes are being planned for a daily delivery service for the consumers of ice that live in rural territory.

We now have a few 75 lbs. Ice Refrigerators that may be seen at our plant. We are daily accepting orders for more. A liberal allowance will be made for your old ice box. As soon as possible, we intend to have a complete stock of Ice Refrigerators and other ice equipment that will be a Modern Economical Food Saver for you.

While they last we have a few ice picks.

Glen writes us another. Glen Hendrixson, of course. No one else could write quite like this. We quote most of it, at least.

Pt. Arthur, Texas  
Sunday 8th, 1945.

Dear Mat:

Just arrived in Pt. Arthur after a 2-day visit in Gatesville. and enjoyed my trip home very much.

Don't feel bad about this, but while there so many people told me they enjoyed my letters that were published in your paper, and for that reason they subscribed for the Coryell county News. Now if I can help your business with my writing your paper it will be very much in demand as . . . is today.

Really, I think most writers don't explain themselves enough and too, they don't tell the truth, and they carry on too much nonsense. Business people don't care nothing about that—they want straight facts and for that reason I never write nothing but good common horse sense.

Now, I have a cousin, Dr. Clyde Bailey. He's a great writer, but he writes for another paper, there-

fore his writing is seldom ever read. I hear where my cousin Clyde is writing a county history and wants all events that has happened from people of 50 years old or older. Right there is where Clyde is wrong. He should be getting history from the young ones. Take me. I am 40, and between the ages of 17 to 36, I made more history than any old timer in Coryell county. Some of it was right under Clyde's office, in the alley, on the banks of the Leon, but there is a paper shortage and I won't give Clyde my past history. and for my own protection, I couldn't afford to. If I did, Judge Cross would have me performing at the Rodeo at Huntsville.

While in Gatesville, I heard one of the big-wigs of the city say that Morton Scott called him over to show him a chair that the rats had gnawed and built a nest in. It was a \$50.00 chair (retail price). Mat, I don't see how the city could be held responsible for that, do you. From outside appearance, his store didn't look so rat-like. Do you think so?

I believe I have the answer to that question. You know, rats like cheese. Maybe Morton got gyped when he bought the chairs. Such a shortage in materials, he would have gotten chairs with cheese-cloth upholstery and bottoms, but I guess I am wrong. He says they are \$50 chairs and \$50 chairs are not made out of cheese-cloth.

Mat, I have been working for the Gulf Refining Co. They are on strike (were). I started to go thru the picket line to work. A man said don't do it. If you do you will get your head knocked off. So after thinking it over, I didn't. I was just back from one war, and didn't get hurt, so I didn't want none of this one. Anyway, I was telling John Gilmer about me being on a strike. We were just talking about old times. and then I said: "John, I want to get a few hard to get items." John looked at me and said: "You say you are striking", and before I could say anything else he began telling me how much better his business was since he went on a cash basis. He stopped me so quick I never did

get to finish my talk I had stored up, so well rehearsed. That boy is a mind-reader—to make a long story short—I paid cash for the groceries.

Mat, after I got my mustering out pay of \$300, I took that and went in debt another \$300. Got me a car. Salesman said he knew the people who owned it. It was perfect, always had the best of treatment, nothing but best of oil was ever used. On my trip home, I spent \$14 for oil (15c a qt.) \$9 for gasoline, tires all blew out. I needed new tires, looked up Mr. Nesbitt. He said he believed I could make it on one. I was told I was lucky in getting one. Anyway, coming back through the piney woods of east Texas, I ran over a herd of hogs (razorbacks) broke a wheel down, saw what I thought was a light. I thought maybe it was a house. After walking a mile to what I thought was a light it turned out to be a sign. It read: "Watch out for livestock". After spending most of the night in that piney-wood bottom I was lucky enough to get a man to pull me about 7 miles to a garage. He only charged me \$15. He was such a nice man he bought me a cold drink after I paid him. I honestly believe that salesman told me a lie about that car. My next trip to home will be by rail or bus.

While in Gatesville I noticed Bill Wiegand standing down the street from me. Someone told me he had lost his barn by fire. I was feeling sorry for him, so I wanted to cheer him up. I walked up, shook hands with him. I said to Bill: "Sorry to hear of your misfortune of your recent disaster". Bill said: "You mean about my barn burning up". Bayne Allen spoke up and said: "You see that new suit and hat he is wearing". "Well he didn't have that until after the fire; he settled with the insurance company." Bill smiled, so it left the impression with me that it wasn't such a bad disaster after all.

Good-bye, will see you on my next trip to Gatesville.

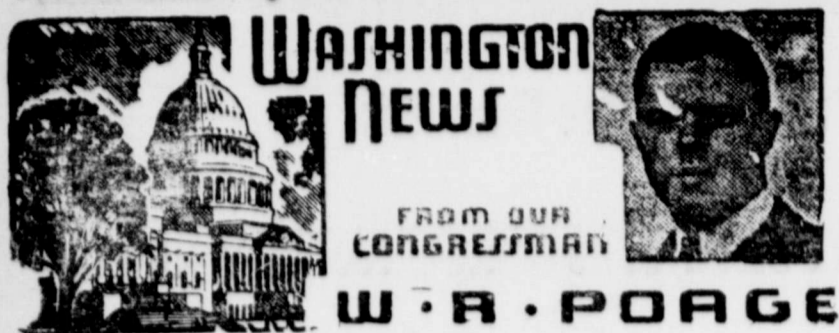

but it is interesting to know that a start has been made. It is estimated that the bill as passed by the House would give a reduction of something more than five billion dollars on next years tax bill. Ten to twelve million people will be relieved of paying any income tax. Among other items that will be eliminated is the annoying automobile use tax. The excess profits tax will be reduced to 60 per cent and repealed outright in 1947.

The bill was designed to give maximum relief to the small taxpayer. There are some people who do not believe that we should release any one from all income tax liability, but it was felt that we should not tax those who were not earning enough to maintain a fair living standard. It is also argued that we should not remove the excess profits tax, but the Treasurer pointed out that this tax was enacted only as a war measure, and if it is retained it will unquestionably very materially retard development of new industry. Doubtless we need the new industry more now than the war is over than we need the taxes. New businesses will in the long run mean new jobs, new profits, and more new tax receipts. Only a few members voted against the Bill. I voted for it. I trust it will receive favorable action in the Senate.

Everyone of the 453 Representatives and each of the 96 Senators are being called upon to in some way retain the various war in his district. Of course, it is utterly impossible to disband the Army and Navy, get the boys home, reduce expenses and cut taxes and at the same time maintain all our air fields, army camps hospitals, shipyards, factories, etc. that our government has established. I know of little that can be done except try to see to it that the proper officials know all of the facts. For instance, we know that some of the establishments in Central Texas have been especially well constructed, and are especially well located. I have tried to see to it that these facts were kept before those who must decide which establishments were to be kept and which were to be closed. I do not want the government to keep any boy in the service just to keep some establishment open, but when it comes to selecting which establishments are to stay open, I want our institutions to get thorough consideration. I have tried to be helpful in this respect.

Incidentally, one of the national columnists has recently indicated that many congressmen are sending all letters about discharges, etc. to the army for replies. I think this was an unfair implication. It is undoubtedly true that some congressmen do this, but this office has never asked anyone to reply to our mail—particularly mail in regard to service men. It is true that there is often very little we can do to help, but we are always glad to try, and while we may find it necessary to refer a letter to some department in order to be able to properly answer it, every letter over my signature is written in this office, not by the War Department. To do this, I must get down early and stay late, and so must my assistants. We rarely close 'till between 6 and 7 P. M. and we work six days per week. We are glad to do it, and want to help in every way we can. Unfortunately there is little we can do in most cases, but I want my friends to know that I have never turned their letters over to some agency for answer.

Today Senator Connally and I called on President Truman and invited him to come to Waco and Temple on December 5. While it may be some days before he can say definitely, I feel very much encouraged to believe that the President will come and receive a degree from Baylor in the morn-

ing, visit McCloskey Hospital in the afternoon and speak to the Grand Lodge of Texas that night. With best wishes, I am

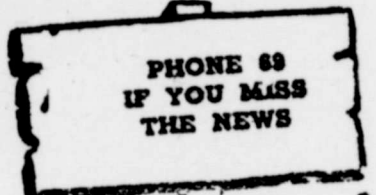
