JUDGE ZEIGLER TO ATTEND TWO ROAD MEETINGS THIS WEEK

Judge Floyd Zeigler Saturday goes to Dallas for a meeting of people from seven counties on the N-S highway, which will meet with the Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, Hon. John R. Redditt.

A discussion on procedure will be made regarding the proposed bridge at Kimball Bend, which will be much longer, due to the backwaters of the proposed Whitney Dam near Hillsboro. They will try to figure out some way to get Uncle Simoleon to give additional money to supplement that already earmarked by the Commission, on account of the backwater from the proposed dam.

Judge Zeigler's other meeting will be with delegations at Burnet on the south end of this north bound highway, and included in those meeting will be Briggs, Copperas Cove, Lampasas, San Antonio and Gatesville.

Considerable interest is being shown on the proposed dam near Belton, and it is expected a large delegation will attend this hearing Monday November 19, headed by Robert W. Brown.

TOO LENIENT PAROLES RAPPED BY BOYCE HOUSE, OFFICERS

The Texas system of pardons and paroles is too lenient, Boyce House, author and radio personality, told the south side Lions Club of Ft. Worth.

He said the number of inmates of the penitentiary has declined from 7000 to 3000 in the past few years and that crime is up 25 per cent as compared to a year ago.

He says there should be a change in the law so that a man given a 2-year sentence could not be turned loose after serving only four and one half months.

FORTY NAZIS ON TRIAL AT DACHAU

DACHAU, GERMANY, Nov. 15 (AP)The U. S. Military Court starts today trial for forty Germans charged with torture and killing of prisoners. Prominent among the defendants is Martin Weiss, an SS Officer.

TWO KILLED: SEVERAL WOUNDED, JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, Nov. 15 (AP)—Two were killed and several were wounded in Tel-Aviv as large scale street demonstrations broke out anew. British paratroops were on duty in the city to enforce new curfew laws being defied by thousands of persons in the streets.

IKE PLEADS FOR MILITARY TRAINING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—General Dwight D. Eisenhower today made a personal plea to Congress for adoption of a postwar universal military training program. In defense of the training bill, Eisenhower states: "The greatest single motivating force for world peace today is the organized military potential of the United States."

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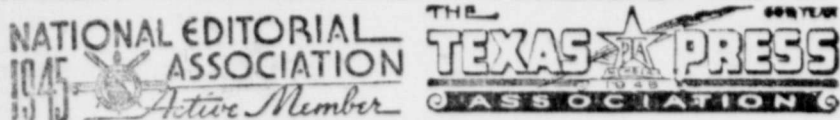

TO THE PEOPLE OF CORYELL COUNTY

In an opinion of the Attorney General of Texas has ruled that persons who were exempt from the payment of a poll tax from physical disabilities such as being blind, deaf or dumb, those who have lost a hand or foot, those permanently disabled, and all disabled veterans of foreign wars, where such disability is 40 per cent or more must pay one dollar constitutional poll tax before they are qualified to vote.

This in no way effects the soldiers right to vote without a poll tax unless he has been out of service 18 months. In other words a man discharged before May 5, 1945 must have a poll tax receipt before he is qualified to vote in the General Election which will be held November 5, 1946.

According to this opinion then every person between the ages of 21 and 60 must have a poll tax receipt to be able to vote in next years elections, unless he has been in the service of the United States Army, Navy, United States Merchant Marines, since May 5, 1945.

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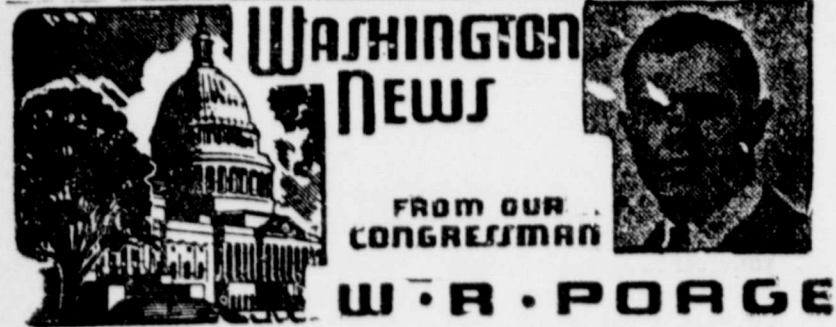
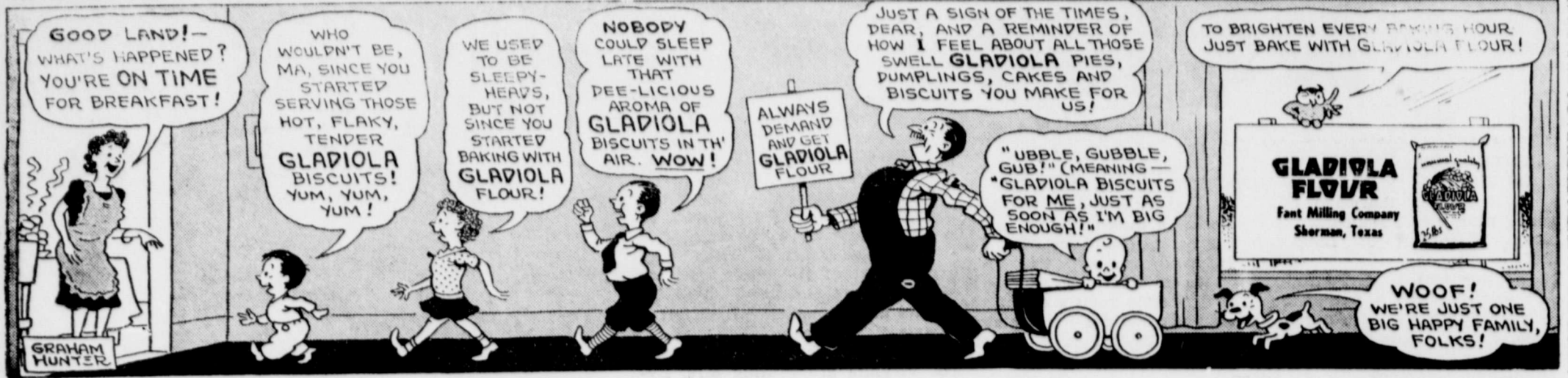

Dear Friends,
Washington has been "enjoying" a streetcar and bus strike. In a great city like this any stoppage of public transportation is a very serious matter. This strike was called without notice at five o'clock in the morning and thousands of people stood on the street corners waiting for a bus or streetcar that

never came. Within a few hours it had brought so many cars out of storage or elsewhere that there were severe traffic jams all over town, but even so, many thousands failed entirely to get to their places of employment. The strike was called in direct violation of the plain terms of the contract between the Union and the Transit Company, which contract expressly provided that in any case of any kind of dispute that there should be no interruption of work. So long as unions can make contracts of this kind and then walk off without regard to their written agreement with them. The employer is always bound to carry out his part of the contract. If he does not, the employees can sue and get and collect a judgment against him, but when the unions break their contracts there is nothing the employer can do about it. I don't think this condition can continue. I believe both parties should be required to keep their agreements.

I have finished a two hour visit with one of the men high in the "Manhattan Project". This is the atomic bomb project. I went to school with this man many years ago. I found this visit most interesting. He feels that it will be five to twenty years before we are in a position to use atomic energy for commercial purposes, but he thinks that in all probability in less time other nations will have a weapon similar to the bomb we now pos-

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sess. He sees no reason to hand our work over to other nations and neither do I, but we agreed that it would be much better if we could simply go on with our work without continually repeating to all the rest of the world that we would not let them in on the secret. He also pointed out that we were going to have to continue to spend large sums on this work if we are to retain our leadership in this field. It seems perfectly clear that in the next war science will play a decisive part.

The elections in Hungary were most encouraging. They show, first, that the people of Europe are still unwilling to turn to communism as a cure of their economic ills and, second, that the Russians are willing to allow some real free elections.

There is much pressure for higher wages for industrial workers, higher salaries for government and postal workers, higher Congressional salaries, and other increases of all kinds. Doubtless some of these efforts will succeed. Doubtless all wages and salaries will go up, and of course just as surely as wages go up, prices will go up, regardless of what the C. I. O. says. Four and four still make eight and not five as they try to tell us.

Industrial wages have already increased twice as much as farm prices since the base period (1909-1914). If farmers are to remain solvent in this period of raising costs they must get more for their products. Our committee has again favorably reported the Pace Bill to include farm wages in the calculation of parity. I am doing all I can to get this passed. It is fair and just. If wages go down, wage earners should be able to buy food cheaper and this bill would in that event reduce parity, but if wages go up, farmers should get more, and that is all this bill provides. Of course, those who believe

that you can raise all costs of production without raising the selling price of the article will fight this bill, but I think most of the people whether farmers or consumers, can see the essential justice of this proposal.

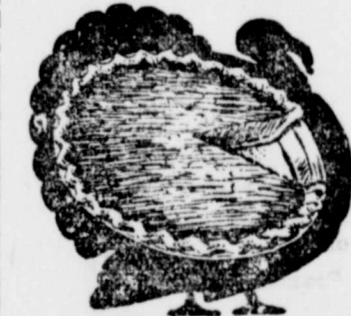
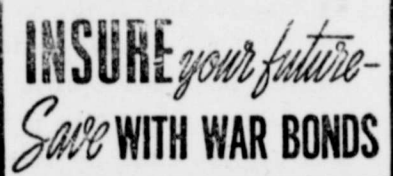


EMERGENCY CROP LOANS NOW AVAILABLE TO FARMERS

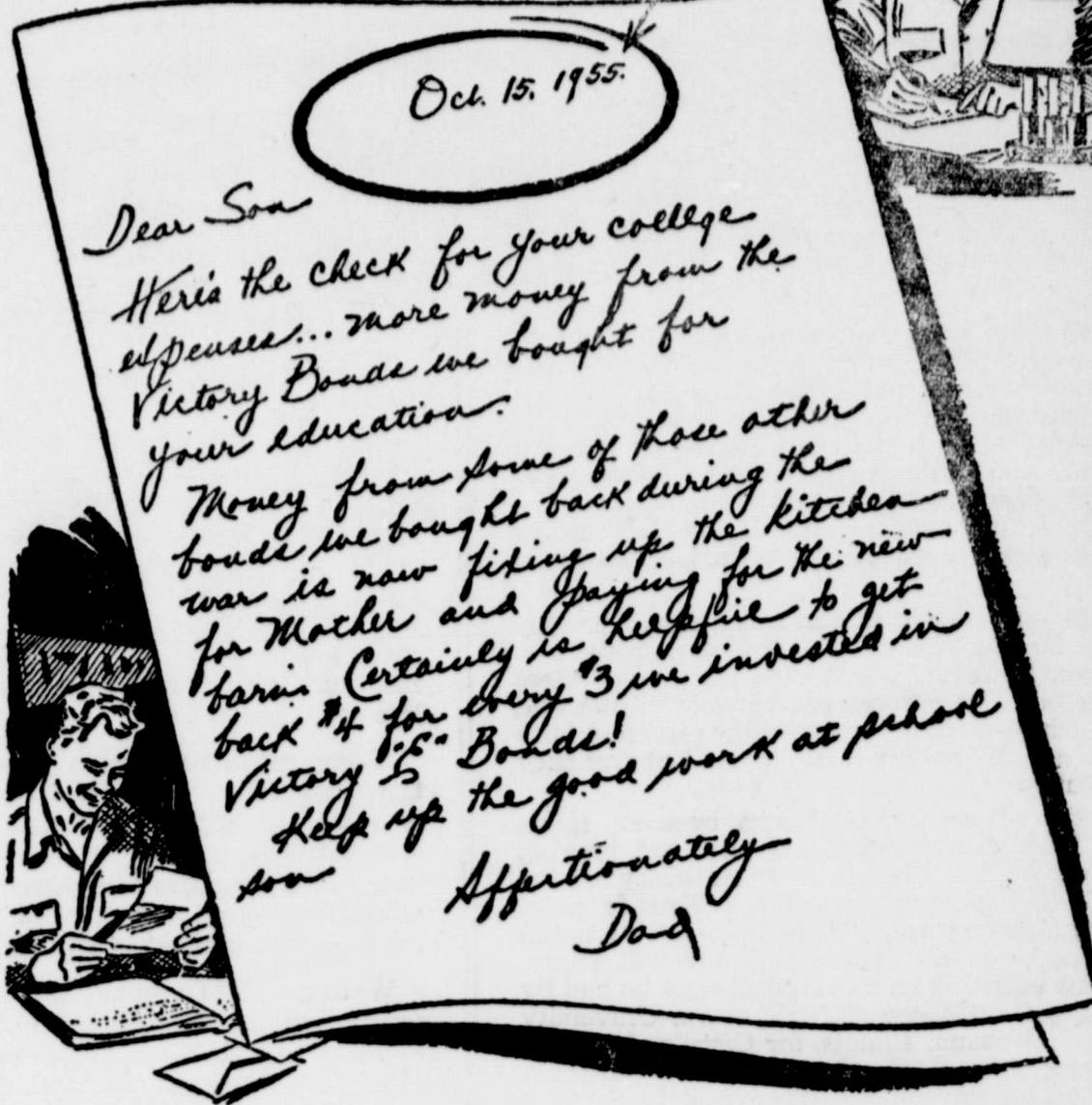

PHENOTHIAZINE FOR FARM FLOCKS

By RICHARD C. MILLER
Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station

All sheep in farm flocks—ewes, rams and lambs—should be dosed late this fall or early winter with phenothiazine and again in the spring after lambing time. From at least May 1, through September, the one-to-nine phenothiazine-salt mixture should be accessible in a covered feeder that protects it from the weather.

In Kentucky tests during the past three years, involving 30,000 breeding ewes, this program (in connection with generally recognized good farm flock practices, such as pasture rotation), eliminated the dosing of any lambs in more than 90 percent of the flocks, and made possible the growing out of even the latest lambs to good market weights and finish. The average increase in weight per lamb was nearly 12 pounds above normal pre-phenothiazine was less than 30 cents per ewe.

Farmers and ranchers in doubt as to time and frequency of treatment best suited to their conditions and purposes should consult their state agricultural college.
