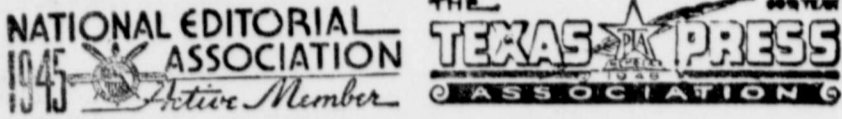

\$22,796.04 VICTORY BONDS AT CAMP HOOD SO FAR

The victory loan drive now in progress at Camp Hood has swelled the total of the United States Treasury by \$22,796.04 it was announced Monday by Capt. L. Denison Jr., Camp War Bond officer. These figures include only a report from up through November 12.

The quota set for civilian employees of Camp Hood during the Victory Drive is \$143,537.66. Of this amount north camp employees have been asked to buy \$20,870.91 in bonds, while the quota for the civilian personnel of south camp was set at 122,666.75. No quota was

set for the military personnel. Total sales made by the civilian employees alone are not available at present.

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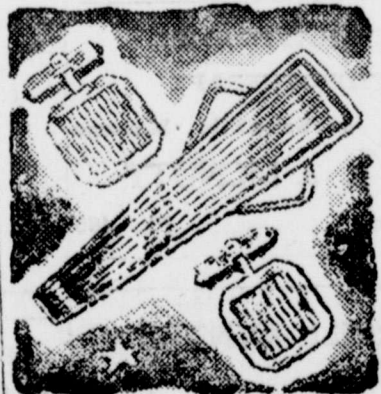

TO THE PEOPLE OF CORYELL COUNTY

In an opinion of the Attorney General of Texas has ruled that persons who were exempt from the payment of a poll tax from physical disabilities such as being blind, deaf or dumb, those who have lost a hand or foot, those permanently disabled, and all disabled veterans of foreign wars, where such disability is 40 per cent or more must pay one dollar constitutional poll tax before they are qualified to vote.

This in no way effects the soldiers right to vote without a poll tax unless he has been out of service 18 months. In other words a man discharged before May 5, 1945 must have a poll tax receipt before he is qualified to vote in the General Election which will be held November 5, 1946.

According to this opinion then every person between the ages of 21 and 60 must have a poll tax receipt to be able to vote in next years elections, unless he has been in the service of the United States Army, Navy, United States Merchant Marines, since May 5, 1945.

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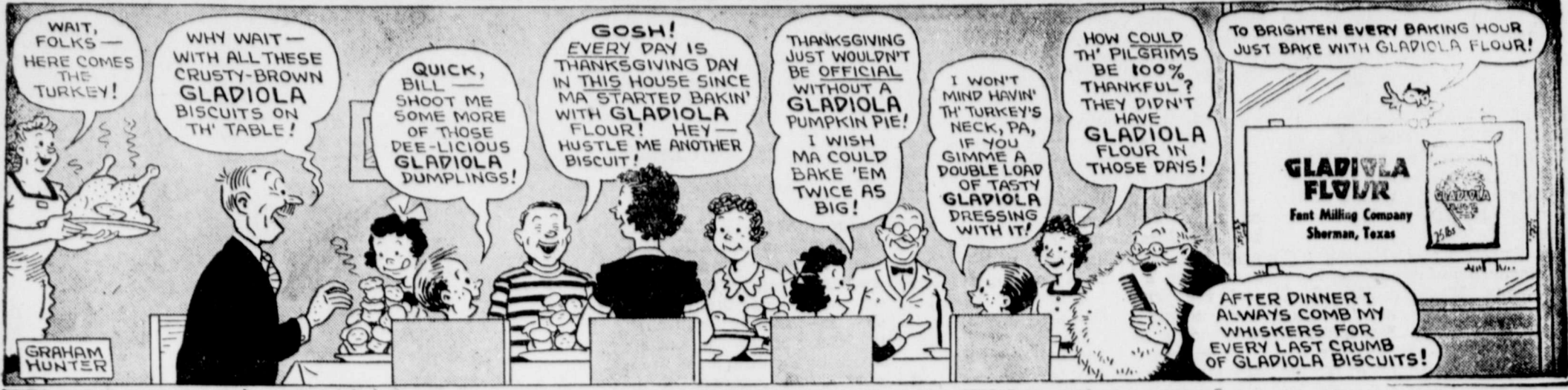

Dear Friends:
Washington celebrated Thanksgiving Day yesterday, (November 22) since this was the fourth Thursday. Texas will celebrate the last Thursday. It seems strange how difficult it is to get back to the old established customs once they are broken.

The sessions of the House have been extremely short every day for the past three weeks. While we keep very busy with the large volume of mail that we are receiving. I think that it would be better for the nation if we could be spending this time at home seeing local conditions first hand. I have often repeated—"In order to represent the people of a great district, it is just as necessary that the representative spend time at home taking in ideas as it is for him to stay in Washington putting out ideas." If this balance is upset for too long a time, the congressman is sure to cease to truly represent the views of the district. Members who live in big cities of the East find it very easy to go home each time we have two or three dull days. Most of them can be home overnight. This is not true with those of us who live as far as we do.

President Truman is reported to have asked the "Leadership" not to allow anything to come on the floor during the Labor-Management Conference that might involve wages, prices, controls, etc. I wish the Labor-Management Conference well, but I fear that we are letting many important problems get completely out of hand while that conference avoids a discussion of the vital issue. Recognizing this. The Military Affairs Committee has reported a bill which attempts to compel unions to carry out their contracts.

The crying need for responsibility in labor relations has been brought into sharp relief again here in Washington by a second street-car and bus strike within two weeks. Not only were both strikes in direct violation of the plain provisions of the contract between the union and the Company, but the second strike was called during and before the expiration of the period of negotiations which had been agreed on by both parties. Such irresponsibility is utterly inexcusable and will in time do the unions themselves grievous harm. The President finally used powers granted him under the Smith-Conna'ly act and took over the operation of the lines.

The Pearl Harbor investigating committee seems to have settled down and is apparently doing a better job than when I reported last week.

The committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce has reported a bill to exempt the railroads and other carriers from many of the provisions of the anti-trust laws. They attempt to justify this on the ground that they anticipate that sooner or later the courts will hold that the present method of making railroad rates is in restraint of trade. While I realize

that the carriers need to publish joint rates, I doubt very much that the courts will hold this practice a violation of the law. If they do, we can handle that problem when we get to it. In the meantime I do not know that this legislation would make more difficult, if not hopeless, our long fight to equalize freight rates between the various sections of the country. The railroads ask us to rely on the Interstate Commerce Commission to protect us, but this very Commission allowed the railroads of the Southeast to charge 167 percent more on many classes of freight than it allowed the railroads of the East to charge. I am always suspicious of monopoly. I believe that competition is far

more effective than any regulation that we can ever get. I cannot see why we should extend any special exemptions to the railroads from our anti-trust laws.

The same committee has had my R. E. A. "Full Coverage" Bill and my Rural Telephone Bill before it for months. It has not even considered the Rural Telephone Bill and it still has the R. E. A. Bill before a sub-committee. It is unfortunate that these measures so vital to farm people cannot go to the Agriculture Committee.

Miss Wicker is a junior student, and is majoring in Business Administration.



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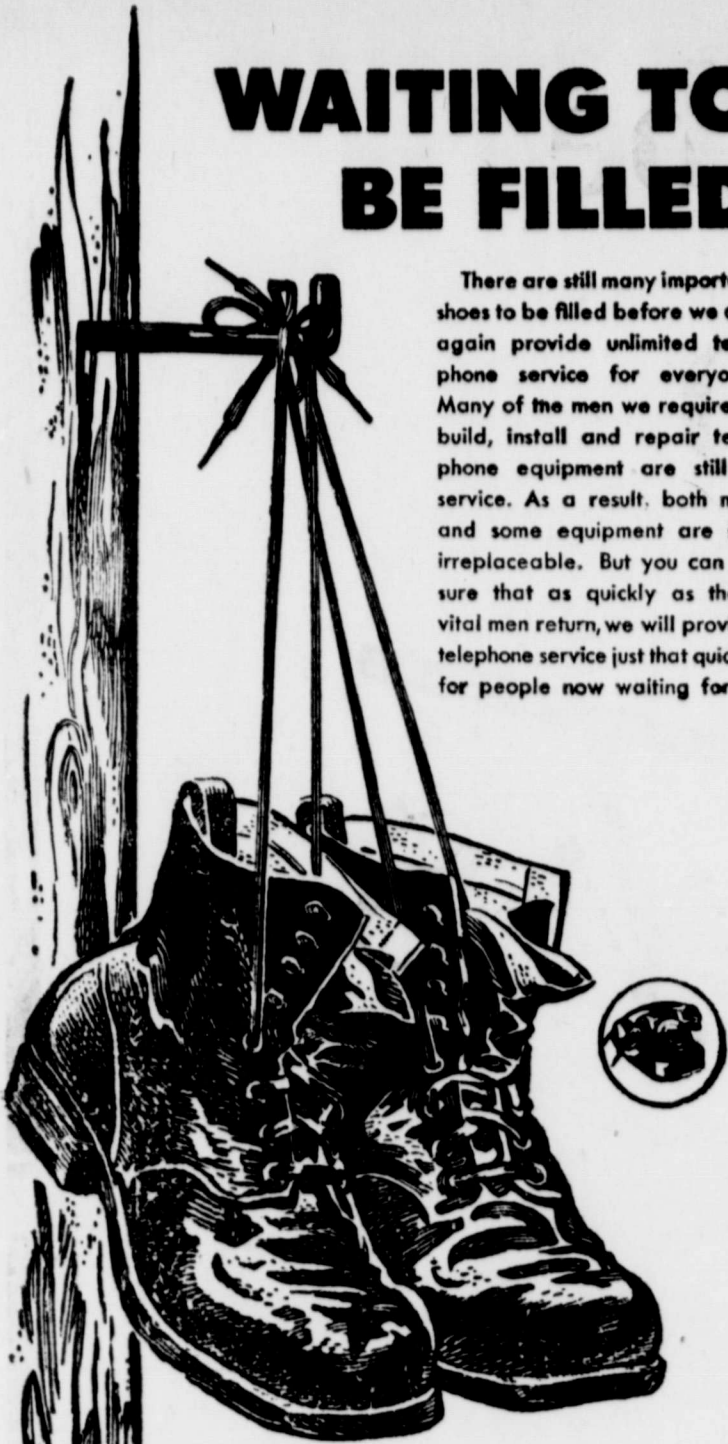
