





An Enlisted Reservist normally signs up for a definite term in the reserves, and during that time may, if he desires, take advantage of military training and special schooling which the army plans to offer, but he will not be forced to undergo this training. He has the option, at the end of his reserve "hitch", of reinlisting or of severing his connection with the Reserve. The same conditions apply to Reserve Officers, except that their commissions are limited to five-year terms.

The purpose of periodic military training will be, in addition to furthering a man's military, mental and physical skills, to qualify him for promotion in the Reserve. If he does not choose to undergo this training, he will relinquish his right to advancement.


