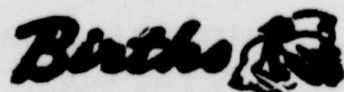

Monroe Blankenship Awarded Plaque In SCS Contest

Monroe Blankenship of Gatesville was awarded a plaque as the outstanding farmer of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District, in a contest sponsored by the Ft. Worth Press, at a banquet held in Ft. Worth Saturday.

Charles F. Brannan, assistant U. S. Secretary of Agriculture made the award, which was contributed by the Ft. Worth Lions Club.

Mr. Blankenship owns three farms of 60' acres with planned SCS. He has 2710 feet of diversion terraces, 26 miles of field terraces, 499 acres of contour cultivation, 489 acres of conservation crop rotation which includes as often as one year in 3 or 4, and development of 52 acres of pasture on retired land to a Bermuda and Buffalo grass cover.

Other Coryell County cooperators recognized at the banquet were Albert Jacobs, Mrs. Litt C. Meharg, Edwin Reuter, Hugo Haase, N. E. Foster, Eldor Loesch, Dr. Leslie Sadler and Herbert Gholke. Certificates of award were issued to each, all having completed their planned conservation practices.

The dinner marked the conclusion of a SCS Program sponsored by the Press and the \$3,000 prize money was donated by Ft. Worth concerns. The Upper Leon Soil Conservation District was awarded \$1,000 for having completed the highest percentage of conservation work and the Comyn Conservation group received a similar amount for the same reason as a single group. Tom C. Hefner of Ivan, Young County, received \$500 for making the greatest unselfish contribution to soil improving. This is a first of a series of contests.

YOUR CITY, AND MINE

ENLISTED AND OFFICE RESERVE CORPS

The war department, in response to numerous questions from veterans and industrialists, today as-

mmmm sured employers that activity in the Enlisted and Office Reserve Corps is entirely voluntary, and that the Government has no intention to force workers to leave their jobs for periods of military training.

The decision as to whether a man will take time off from his job to undergo "summer camp" or other military training rests entirely with the man himself, the War Department pointed out. An Enlisted Reservist normally signs up for a definite term in the reserves, and during that time may, if he desires, take advantage of military training and special schooling which the army plans to offer, but he will not be forced to undergo this training. He has the option, at the end of his reserve "hitch", of reenlisting or of severing his connection with the Reserve. The same conditions apply to Reserve Officers, except that their commissions are limited to five-year terms.

The purpose of periodic military training will be, in addition to furthering a man's military, mental and physical skills, to qualify him for promotion in the Reserve. If he does not choose to undergo this training, he will relinquish his right to advancement.

A reservist is not required to notify his draft board when he leaves active service, nor is he any more readily subject to call to active duty in the present emergency than any other American citizen of military age who has served in the armed forces. There exists machinery for the mobilization of all personnel in future emergency periods.

However, the War Department stresses that it does not contemplate calling up reserves during the emergency which still exists and will continue to exist until Presidential or Congressional action is taken to terminate it.

The only reservists whose call to active duty is contemplated prior to the termination of the

current National emergency are those who upon the termination of the Medical Army Specialized Training Program were transferred to the Enlisted Reserve Corps and released from active military service for the purpose of continuing their medical studies as civilians. If they abandon the study of medicine or fail to make satisfactory progress in medical school, they will be subject to recall to active duty. They will then be eligible for discharge under the then-existing criteria.

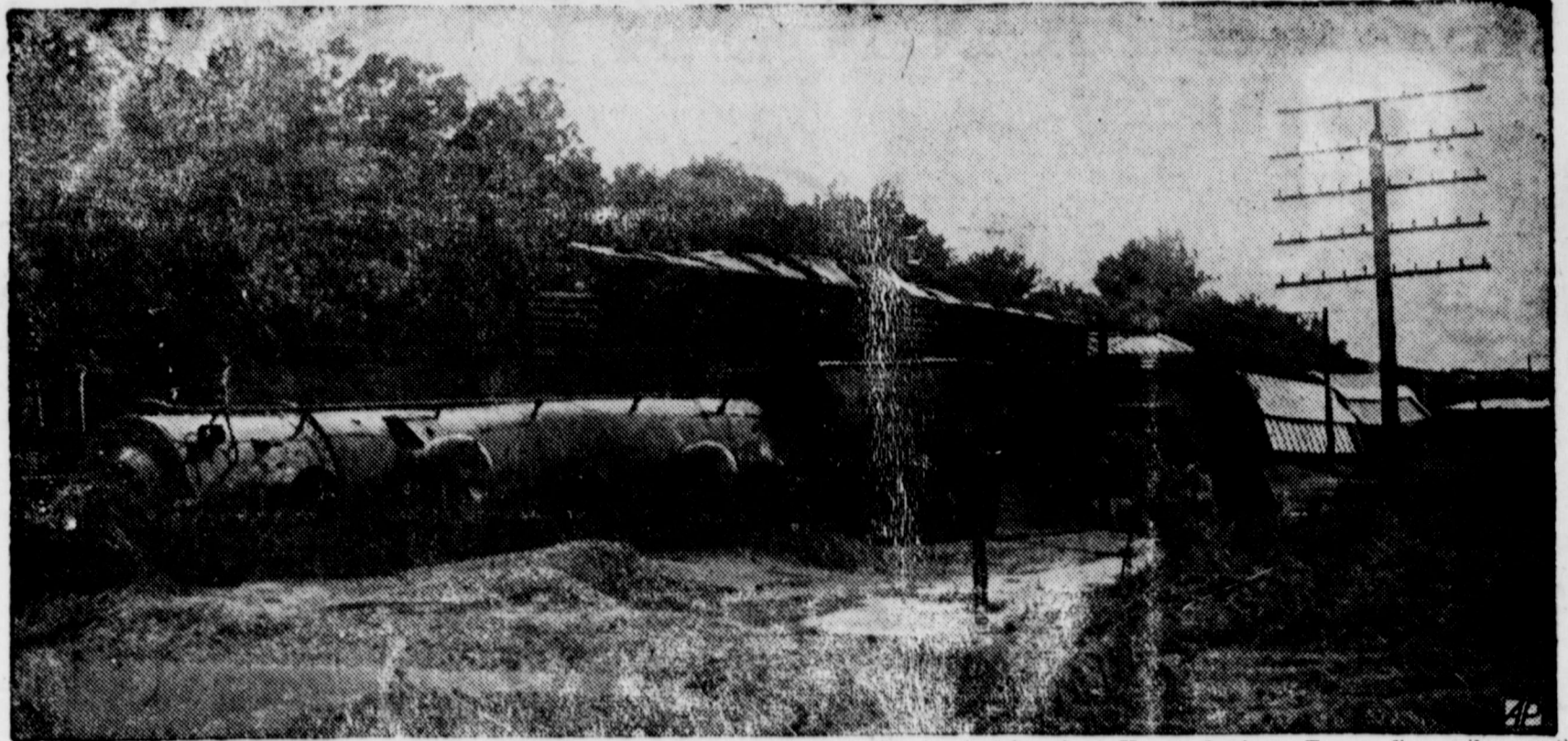
