ACA Issues Permits On Purchase Of Legumes For Planting

The County ACA committee is now issuing prior approvals and purchase orders on winter legume seed to be planted by farmers this fall for payment under the 1947 ACP Program.

A small amount of hairy vetch is now available under purchase order. Farmers desiring some of this vetch should obtain their purchase orders at once as the supply will not last long. Willamette Vetch is also available now under purchase order. Our first shipment of Austrian Winter Peas and Common Ryegrass has all been delivered to farmers; however, we are expecting a new shipment soon.

Farmers having their own seed or purchase the seed without use of a purchase order must secure a prior approval from the county committee if payment for planting the seed is expected from the Government. A sales receipt should be obtained for all cash purchases.

In order to obtain a good growth and a good stand, all winter legume seed should be inoculated. Hubam clover planted by December 1, 1946 will qualify as a winter legume provided it is not killed by cold, and a good stand and a good growth is obtained. Purchase orders cannot be issued on Hubam to be seeded in the fall in Coryell County.

The ACA Office has been advised to discontinue accepting applications for farm building, repairing and remodeling (non-residential and residential, including plumbing fixtures) until new priority application forms and instructions are received.

Rains Do Little Damage To Cotton, General In Benefit

County agent W. T. Graham reports the Coryell county cotton crop suffering little damage from the rainfall of the past week. "The cotton being picked now is, of course, lower grade", said Mr. Graham, "but the crop is so short that this decrease in the value of the staple is hard on the cotton producer." Insect ravages have been heavy in this section, however, it is stated that those farmers who dusted their crops are getting good yields from their cotton acreage.

According to Mr. Graham the peanut crop of Coryell county is splendid in yield of nuts, this season. "The hay has been damaged some by insects, but the nuts are fine and the harvest will bring the raisers good returns in cash", Mr. Graham stated.

Pasture and, late feed crops and gardens are greatly benefited by the break in the long drought. Stock water is replenished to some extent, and broomcorn has made fine yields.

CIO SEAMEN SEEM TO HAVE WON STRIKE

NEW YORK, N. Y. Sept. 19 (AP)—An arbitration award by James Fly in the case of the National Maritime Union (CIO) today places NMU seamen on a parity with AFL Ship personnel and provided what Fly described as an adequate basis for the immediate resumption of shipping activities. The awards provide salary increases chiefly of from \$5 to \$10 a month.

TEXAS COURT REFUSES JURISDICTION

AUSTIN, Sept. 19 (AP)—The Texas Supreme Court today refused to take jurisdiction in J. Carroll McConnell's fight to obtain the Democratic nomination for Associate Justice of the Second Court of Civil Appeals. The Action affirmed the State Democratic Conventions nomination of Earl P. Hall of Henrietta.

GI Bill To End On October 5: It Ends Benefits

The GI Bill, Public Law 190, the famous GI Bill of rights, which provides education, loans and many other privileges to discharged veterans, ends on this date Oct. 5.

Men taken in the army after October 5 will not receive the full GI benefits extended to veterans of World War II.

Each Tuesday night bingo is played for attractive prizes.

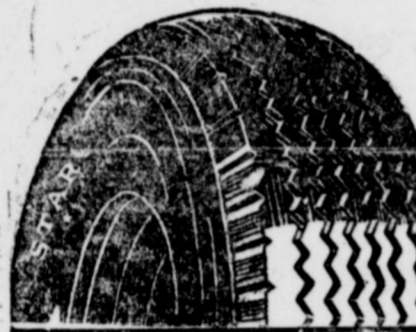
Friday night dancing is to music of the Dee Bees, an orchestra of enlisted men of the 1848 ASU.

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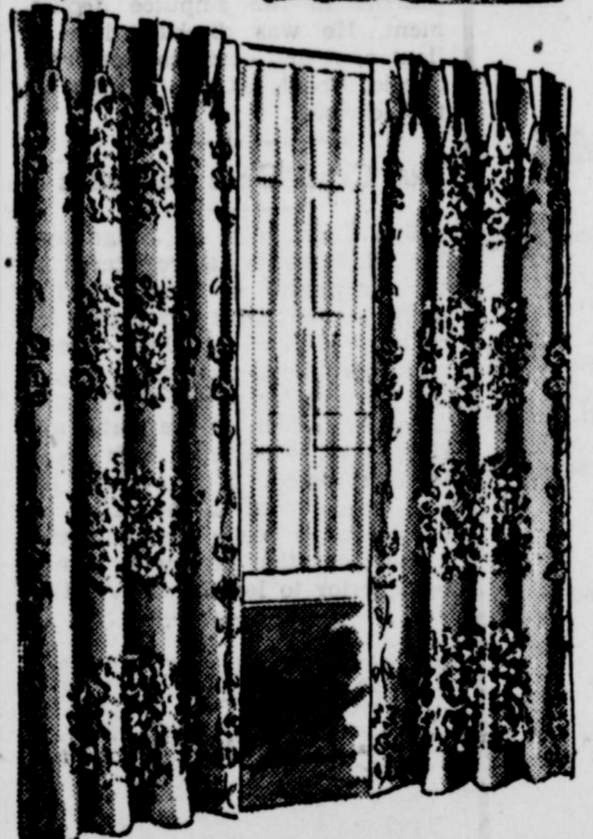
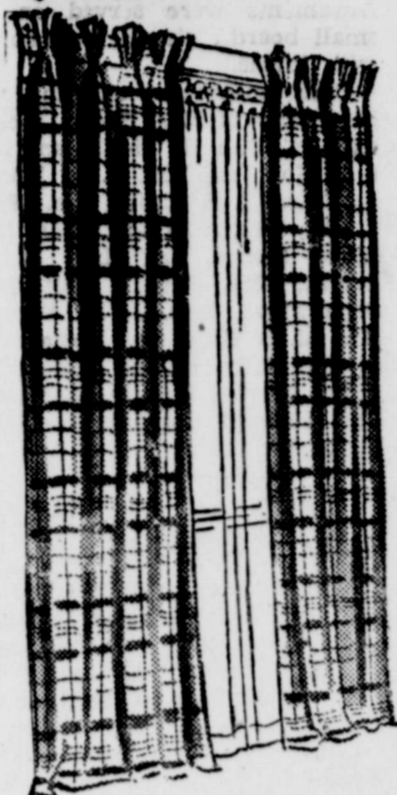
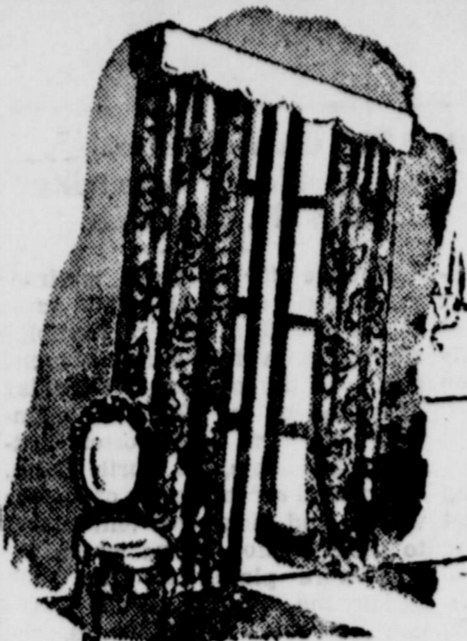

pens, however it was mostly Stocker Cattle, very thin and not too good in grade, not to much Butcher stuff, but enough to make you want it, drove back to town and got lunch, we uster call it dinner, good eating though for the cafe served Round Steak with cream gravy and that's more than I would have got if I had stayed in Gv. and Banana Pudding, got back out to the sale just as our old Cow Boy friend, Malchom Journegan; Cried off the first cow brute, this sale attracts lots of people, sellers, buyers and spectators, is one of the biggest sales in Central Texas, the set up is not near as good as ours, not enough room to accommodate the crwds that attend same, every body had on cow boots but me, and I mean good shop made boots, they trampled me under foot like they would a "Dogey" calf. 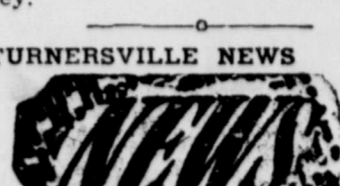

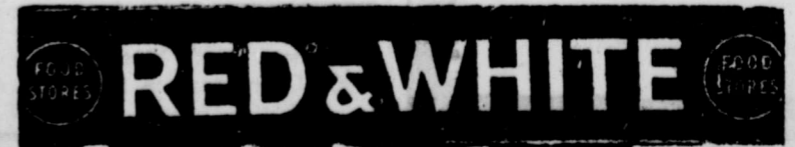
