## Coryell County Turkeys To Bring Producers an Estimated \$300,000.00

With the Thanksgiving turkey  
market due to open around Novem-  
ber 5, turkey raisers of Coryell  
county report their birds in fine  
condition, and feeding up ready  
for the sale. There have been in-  
numerable insects, especially  
grasshoppers during the late sum-  
mer and the mild fall days to  
supplement corn and other feed-  
stuff, both commercial and home  
raised, by producers to bring their  
flocks up to the weightiest birds  
offered in several years.

County Agent W. P. Graham  
states that a recent casual survey  
of the turkey flocks of the county  
reveal a crop of some 25,000 birds,  
which is not so outstanding in  
number as in quality and weight.  
"At the present prospective price"  
said Mr. Graham, last Saturday,  
"The 1946 turkey crop of Coryell  
county will bring producers \$300,-  
000. And, added to this sum flow-  
into coffers of turkey raisers will  
be the money paid by the dressing  
plant and buyers and shippers, for  
labor, and those handling the birds  
on the market."

Mr. Graham says he figures that  
some 90 per cent of the turkeys  
produced in the county will be  
ready and will be sold on the  
Thanksgiving market.

Among the largest producers of  
the county are listed as the Cope-  
land Turkey Farm with a flock of  
marketable birds numbering some  
2,500; Stewart Williams of Pur-  
mela; Mrs. E. J. Timmons and M.  
D. Martin. The predominant breed  
is the Baby Beef type of turkey.  
Though the white turkey is popu-  
lar with raisers and consumers.

### CIO MARITIME ENGINEERS OK AGREEMENT

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.(AP)—Members of the Marine  
Engineers Beneficial Association (CIO) here today voted  
1,549 to 93 to accept an agreement reached between the  
union and companies and agents of the Atlantic and Gulf  
Coasts as a basis of settlement of the strike which began  
October 1.

### TRUMAN WON'T SAY, 'BOUT SPEECHES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.(AP)—President Truman de-  
clined today to say whether he will make any campaign  
speeches. At the press conference he said the threat of a  
new nation-wide soft coal strike was up to Secretary of the  
Interior Krug.

### J. M. DEL CURTO INDICTED

AUSTIN, Oct. 24.(AP)—The Travis county grand jury  
today returned 15 indictments against J. M. Del Curto,  
former employee of the Texas State Department of Agri-  
culture, charging theft from the state on 11 county for-  
gery on four counts. Theft charges were dated from De-  
cember 31 1942 to August 1, 1944. They ranged from  
\$130.40 to \$145.10 each. Forgeries charged on promiss-  
sory notes. Assignment of State Warrants in amounts  
ranging from \$49.00 to \$140.80.

### CLASH DEVELOPING AT UN, US-SOVIETS

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.(AP)—A clash appeared develop-  
ing today between the USA and Russia over the right of  
the UN. General Assembly to discuss small nation pro-  
posals for ending the power veto in the security council.

The American Delegation decided it would insist upon  
full right of assembly to discuss this and other issues list-  
ed on the provisional agenda now before the Assembly's  
Steering Committee.

### Grass Worms Damaging Pastures and Small Grain In Coryell County

Farmers are claiming consider-  
able damage is being done by  
grass worms, small worms attack-

ing oats as well as grasses. This  
worm can be controlled by using  
10 pounds cryolite per acre. Re-  
ports from College Station say  
this poison is not dangerous to  
liestock. "It should be applied in  
the form of a dust, using some  
kind of good dusting equipment  
in making the application," said  
County Agent W. T. Graham.

### Cotton Report Shows Few Bales Ginned Prior to October 1

One thousand-sixty-six bales is

Coryell County, up to October 1,

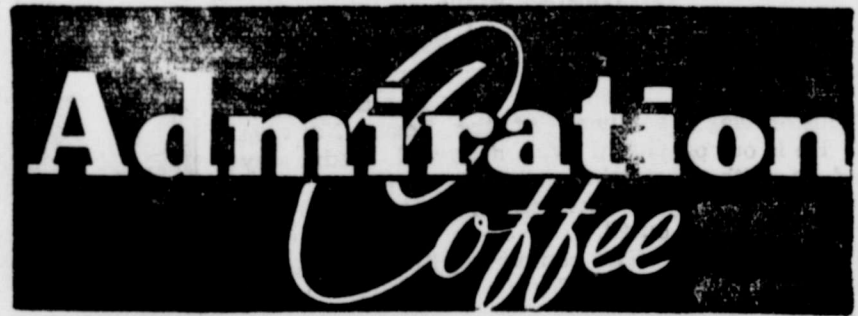

Received sad news today and never thought of hearing such a thing as I did today, and hope this never happens again. Cannot understand why I never heard sooner because the Red Cross 'phoned yesterday and told me to come down to their office in Nurnberg this morning, but would not tell me over the 'phone, and I thought it might be about Mary's mother and Mr. Honeycutt. The Red Cross Field Director here in Nurnberg is a good friend of mine and he hated to tell me, but this is one of his jobs.

I have three pictures here with me, and now that is all the way I can ever see Curtis again, and it really hurts me to think about him and Olene, and cannot imagine how he must have suffered, and hope he did not suffer too much.

How's Olene and Grandma? I know they are having a hard time. I wonder why Mary did not let me know sooner, because it takes only about five days by air mail to reach me.

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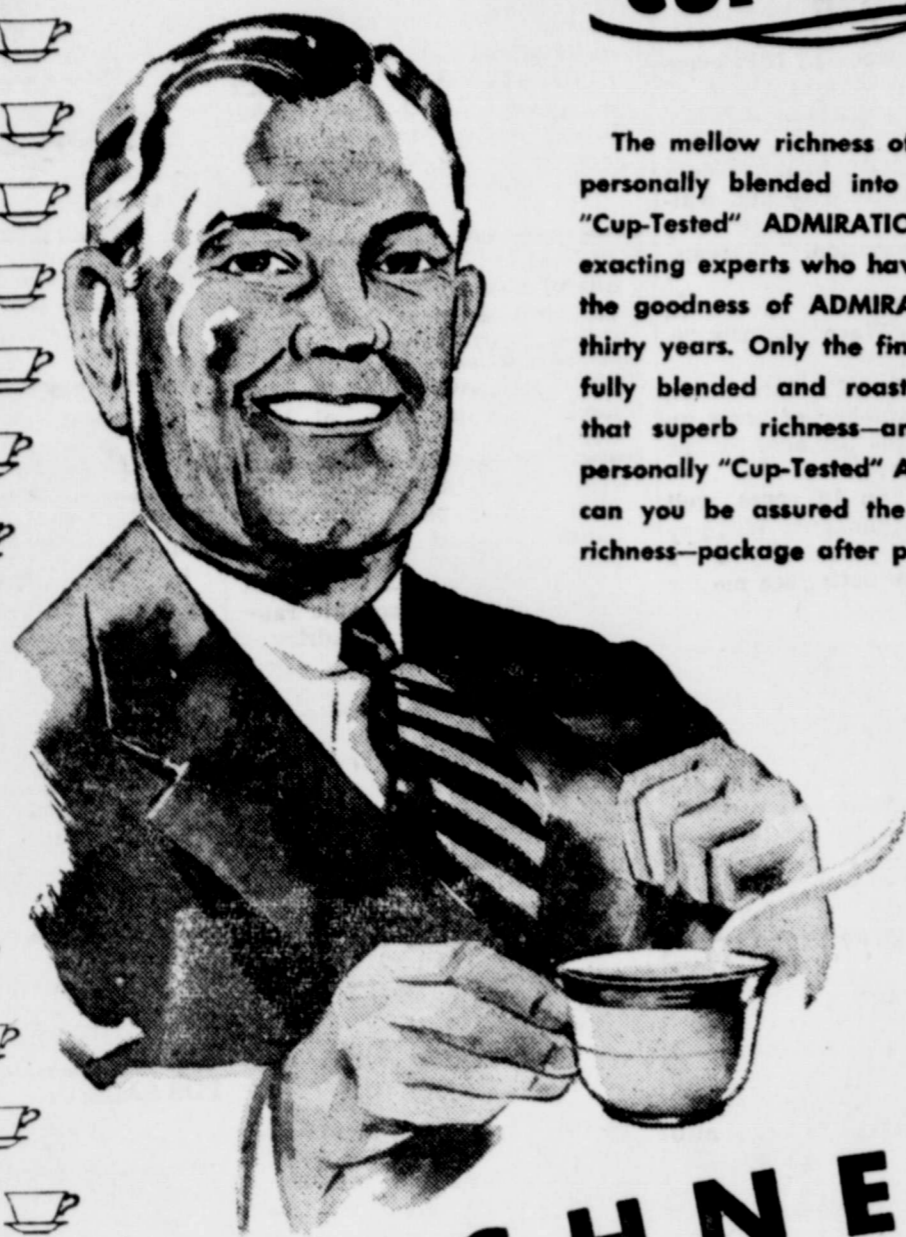

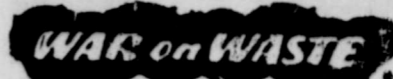
