## Lt. Jack Hestilow Gets Second Air Medal In U. S. Navy

Lt. Jack N. Hestilow, USNR, husband of Mrs. Lois Marie Hestilow of Gatesville, has been awarded the Gold Star in lieu of his second Air Medal by Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal for the President.

Lt. Hestilow earned the award while piloting a dive bomber during attacks on enemy-held Palau. As a section leader, he was largely responsible for the group's success in destroying Japanese shipping and shore installations.

Text of the citation is as follows:

"For meritorious achievement in aerial flight as a pilot and leader of a section of Navy dive bombers in Bombing Squadron Five, during attacks on enemy Japanese shipping and ground installations at Palau, March 30 and 31, 1944. Leading his section during bombing attacks, Lt. (then Lt. jg.) Hestilow accounted for the final destruction of at least one enemy merchantman and the damaging of another, and contributed greatly to the success of the assigned mission. His skilled airmanship, courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

### 60 DAY TRUCE, COAL STRIKE DUE

WASHINGTON, D. C. Nov. 14. (AP)—The Government reported it was seeking a 60-day "truce" in the nation's strike-threatened soft coal fields while John L. Lewis, and the mine owners negotiated a contract. The Secretary of the Interior, Krug, Planned to meet Lewis again today after two highly secret conferences yesterday. Lewis may serve notice he intends to terminate the present contract tomorrow.

### SIX KILLED IN GAS EXPLOSION

COLUMBIA, S. C. Nov. 14 (AP)—Six persons were reported killed, and about three others injured after a gas explosion wrecked a wholesale building here. The explosion was heard for blocks and shattered window panes, shook building foundations over a wide area. Firemen said the blast originated in a wholesale produce building, where a gas appliance was being used to ripen bananas.

And here we go, for the 2nd conference (first at home) game of the season. Dysinger kicks, Franks holds, from 40 and ball goes to Humphries, fumbles, recovers on 10 and returns to the 24, stopped by Davidson. Canuteson tries right for 2, stopped by Gartman, Franks and Ashby. Canuteson gets through for 6, stopped by Davidson and Patterson. Jorgenson carries left, stopped by Franks and Dysinger, and it's 1st down. Dysinger out Gilmer in. Canuteson hits right, stopped by Davis, 4 yds. Ball on 39. Elder passes to Humphries, makes 4 yds. Canuteson is

stopped by Gartman dropping for 6 yds loss. Alfe for Bush, tackles Elder kicks out on Clifton 34.

Flentge leaves interference and is topped by Wallace and Busch, 3 yds. Pass Davidson to Bone, makes 1st down, stopped by Seljos. Canuteson stops Flentge after he makes 1. Bone carries for 3, stopped by Jackson and Wallace. Davidson passes too far over Bone Bone kicks nicely to the 3, taken by Elder and returned to 12, is stopped by Patterson.

Humphries handed ball, stopped by Ashby and Bone, no gain. Cubs lose 5 yds. backfield in motion. Elder kicks to Flentge on the 36, stopped by Jorgenson and Whitley.

Flentge cuts over right guard for 5, stopped by Seljos and Alfie. Wallace and Jackson stop Flentge after 3 at end. Bone over right tackle, is stopped by Seljos and Wallace, and it's 1st down. Bone paws, and is stopped by Wallace, but there's a penalty, off side, 5 yards. Davidson passes too long to Daves in the SE corner. C. Davis for Whitt. Bronstadt for Jackson, Cubs. Gartman from Davidson, and he's smothered by Seljos, Humphries, etc. Jackson for Bronstadt. They throw it everywhere, but where Bone went down it's call d down, and it's the Cubs. Canuteson carries, stopped by Flentge and Gartman, after 7 yds. Canuteson is thrown for a loss on the 29, and it's our'n again.

Whitt for Davis. Canuteson stops Flentge after he makes 4. Bone goes off tackle, stopped by Jorgenson, Bass, Canuteson and its 1st down. Davidson goes wide 7 yds, stopped by Humphries, as the quarter ends.

#### 2nd Quarter

Flentge is smothered, dropping 3 yds. Seljos. Bush in, Alfie out. Bone carries, stopped by Wallace, Canuteson, etc. They measure. 12 inches. Bone carries, and it's 1st down. Ball on 6. Bone is stopped dead by Bush, Canuteson, Jorgenson and Wallace. Durnit, they gang us. Bone to Davidson, and he is stopped by Whitley, ran into an official. 3 yds to go. Bone goes over, 3yds off right tackle. Bone adds extra at center. Gatesville 7, Clifton 0.

Elder to Jorgenson hits left side topped by Bone, 2 yds. Elder passes to Jorgenson and he runs 6 yds. for the touchdown. Beckner in for Jorgenson. Beckner holds, Busch kicks, and it's good. Gatesville 14, Cubs 7.

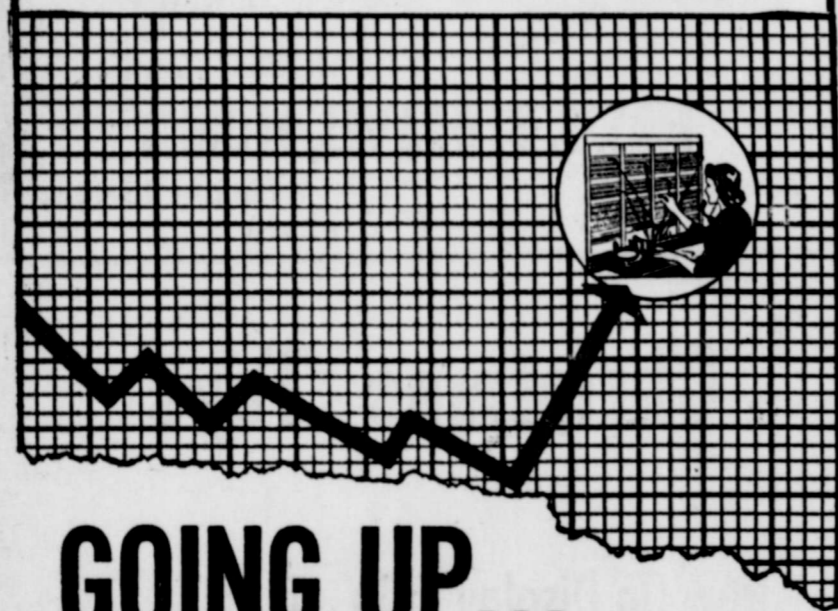

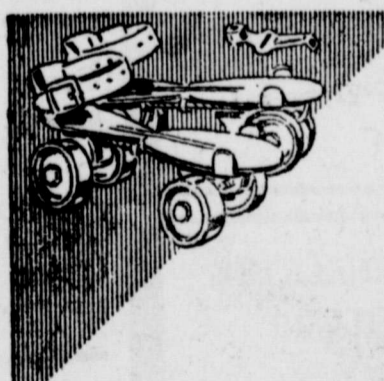
