CZECHSLOVAKIA WON'T JOIN CONFERENCE

PRAGUE, Czechslovakia, July 10. —(AP)—Sources
close to the government said today, Czechslovakia, by
Moscow request, would withdraw acceptance of the in-
vitation to the European Economic Conference in Paris.

If so, it would virtually complete the boycott of the
talks on the Marshall Plan by Russia and the states in
her orbit.

Hungary today joined Bulgaria, Romania, Yugoslavia
and Poland in rejecting the invitation.

TRUMAN WILL VETO TAX CUT BILL

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—President Truman told
a press conference today he would veto the new Repub-
lican-backed bill to cut income taxes four billion annually
effective January 1.

The President said also a special session of Congress
will be called this fall if necessary to carry out the Mar-
shall Plan for European recovery, but sees no need at
present for such a session.

TRUMAN NOT WORRIED ABOUT "SCANDAL"

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 10. (AP)—President Tru-
man told his press conference today that in view of the
source, he isn't worried about the statement of former
Missouri Representative Roger Slaughter that "Scandal
Threatens" the office of the President.

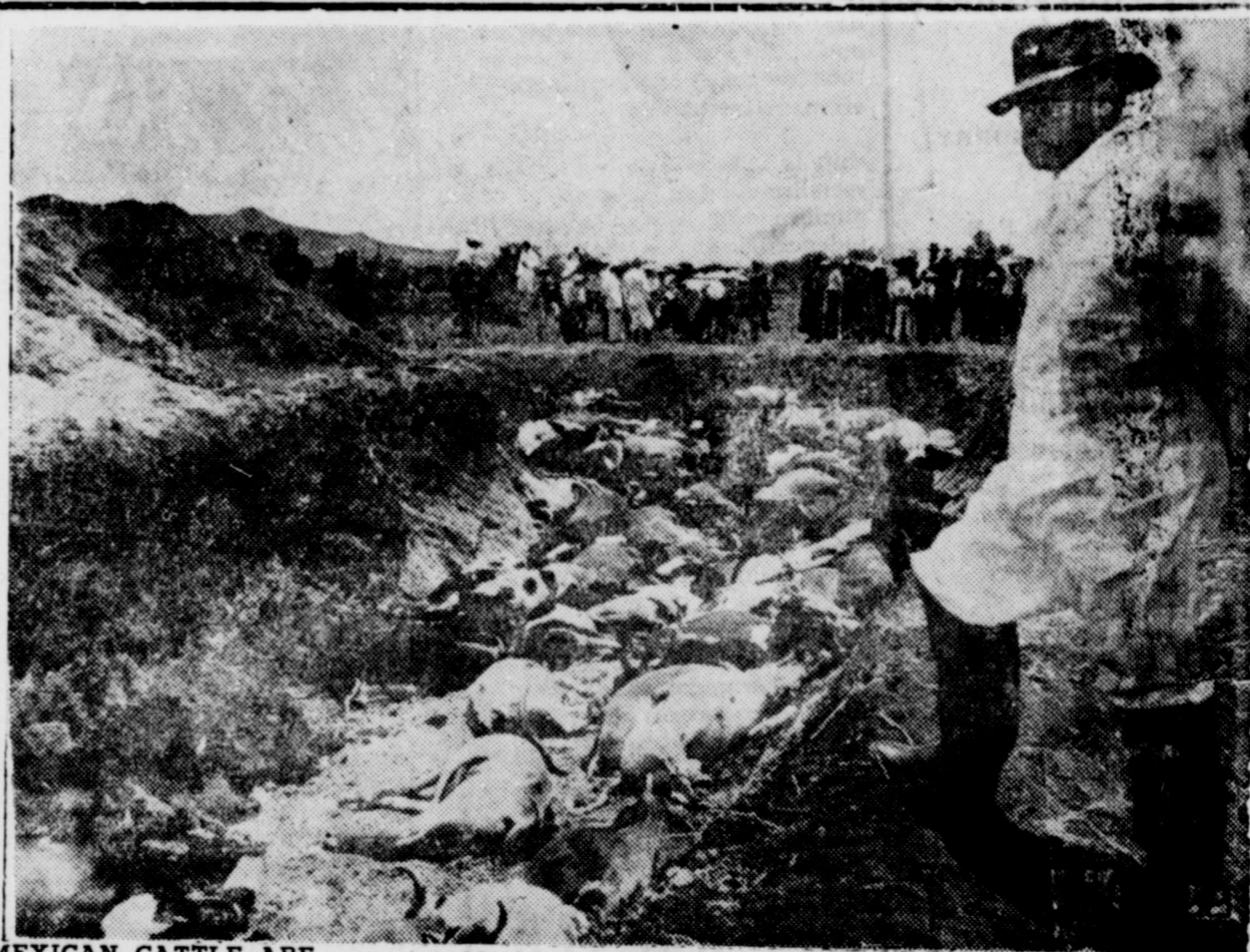
Atlas Cementers Take 4-3 Decision From Coryell City; 13 Frames

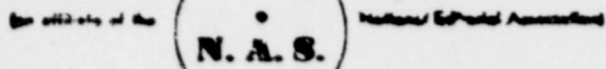

Dear Friends:
This letter is written earlier than usual as I am leaving this afternoon (July 3) to fly to Texas for the celebration of Independence Day at West and at Belton. We properly celebrate our political

independence but we must none the less be on guard to maintain our economic independence. Should we fail in this, I would see little hops of long maintaining our political independence.

As I see it the greatest threat to our economic independence is the trend toward monopoly in business, industry, labor and even in agriculture. Too often the monopolistic will insist that he is practicing "free enterprise". I believe in free enterprise, but there is no freedom where there is monopoly. We must have competition if we are to maintain free enterprise. When competition is destroyed, we have monopoly and I am convinced that if the American people are forced to live under the power of economic monopoly, they will at least make it their own monopoly through government ownership.

Of course, government ownership is monopolistic and leads to socialism and ultimately to communism and loss of all political independence, but on the other hand, private monopoly leads to the fascist form of tyranny. I want neither communism nor fascism; therefore, we should do all in our power to prevent the development of monopoly and the destruction of competition.

In recent weeks I have been repeatedly disappointed at the action of our courts. The Supreme Court of the United States handed down a purely legislative opinion in the case of the California tidal oil lands. The court did not trace the legal title. It simply said Federal Government should own the lands; therefore, it does. I think that decisions as too governmental

policy are for legislative, not the judicial branch.

On the other extreme is the example of our Texas court of Criminal Appeals which sticks with its ridiculous decision that a man was not sufficiently advised of the nature of the charges against him by an indictment which stated that he killed a woman by "kicking and stomping" her. I think that it is clear that this indictment gave the accused every opportunity to prepare his defense without requiring, as the Court did, that it be explained that the kicking was done "with the feet". To hold that man accused of brutal crimes are not to be tried because of such fine spun technicalities is but to invite mob law and to a break-down of respect for all courts and all laws. If our Court feels that it does not have the power to extradite itself from its own technicalities, it should call on the Legislature for new laws that would enable it to mete out a more efficient brand of justice.

In view of these decisions it was refreshing to find the United States District Court of the District of Columbia standing firm on its sentence of former Governor, former Congressman and present Mayor of Boston, James Curley. Curley had been convicted on a mail fraud case. He was brought into court in a wheelchair (incidentally, he was pictured as walking out). Much pressure was applied to the court to suspend his sentence, but Judge Proctor said, "It is a paramount concern that public confidence be maintained in the fair and impartial administration of justice to all alike, to the high and the low, to the rich and the poor". Justice in America cannot be bought, and this is of more importance than whether the decision of a court in a particular case was not in keeping with my views or your views.

Yesterday the House finally passed the "Flood Control Appropriation Bill". The largest Texas item in the bill was the appropriation of \$4,825,000 for further work on the Whitney Dam. I am, of course, iratified to know that this great project is progressing, but I am very much concerned with the Miller Springs Dam which is so desperately needed to control the floods of the Little River. I spoke on the need for this structure, but in aid of the economy program we all realized that there was very little chance of starting this new structure this year.

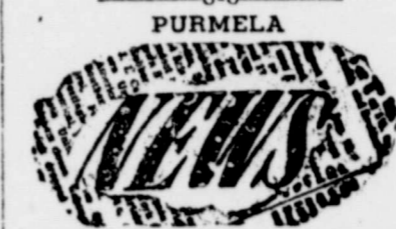

Gatesville to Get Monthly Visits On Social Security

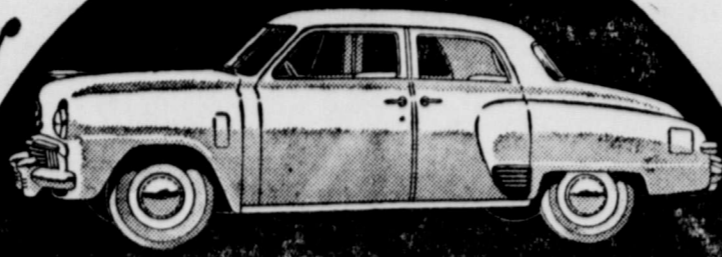

**BERYL IN WHIRLS
AROUND BROADWAY
HEARS HOT HORNS**

NEW YORK—Newest British entertainment import who seems to be headed briskly for success is

attractive, shapely Beryl Davis, from London's stage, screen and radio, just arrived here a short bit and already a most popular young lady with the large lads of Broadway.

She's been on Bob Hope's program four times, the Hit Parade a similar number and has sung on other other programs including the Victor Borge-Benny Goodman show. Beryl's not entirely a strang-

er to American ears, having entertained AAF lads during some 500 performances in England, where she was put in an American entertainer's uniform and received warbling orders from Gen. Jimmy Doolittle.

"I literally was born in a dressing room," said Beryl, emphasizing her natural theatrical heritage, adding that her dad was Harry Davis, a well known British bandleader and her Mon a prominent vaudeville artist. . . . She went on stage to sing at the venerable age of three and attempted "Constantinople" in a dubious treble which delighted her audience more on grounds of generally sympathetic acceptance of youngsters than of a real admiration.

NOW, however, at 22, she is a polished performer and is attempting to rid herself of the British title she liked across the pond but which is professionally embarrassing now that she's here: "The Dinah Shore of England"

She's a hot jazz fan, sang with the famous Quintet of the Hot Club of France in its recent British engagements. . . . On her arrival in New York, Beryl was taken in hand by the usual platoon of professionally solicitous press agents who rushed her dervishly to the Stork, the Colony and Twenty-one, where she was suitably flattered by headwaiters and surrounding reguar clientele which recognized all the signs of visiting celebrity. But when she appeared slightly bemused by glittering surroundings, her dotting escorts asked in amose a capella fashion what she'd like to do next.

"I'D LIKE to see 52nd Street", was Beryl's abruptly delighted answer. There's a hot trumpet player there who pays that new be-bop style and I'd like to see him."

The publicity squadron, more normally attuned to young ladies who dream of movieland ideas of sophistication and the solicitede of saloon keepers in the fancier deadfalls, promptly surrounded Beryl and rushed her to the Club Downbeat, where she was shown all the intricacies of the newest noisy swing design caled "be-bop" and went home to her fancy suite completely contented

"That," she said, "finally was what I dreamed America would be like"

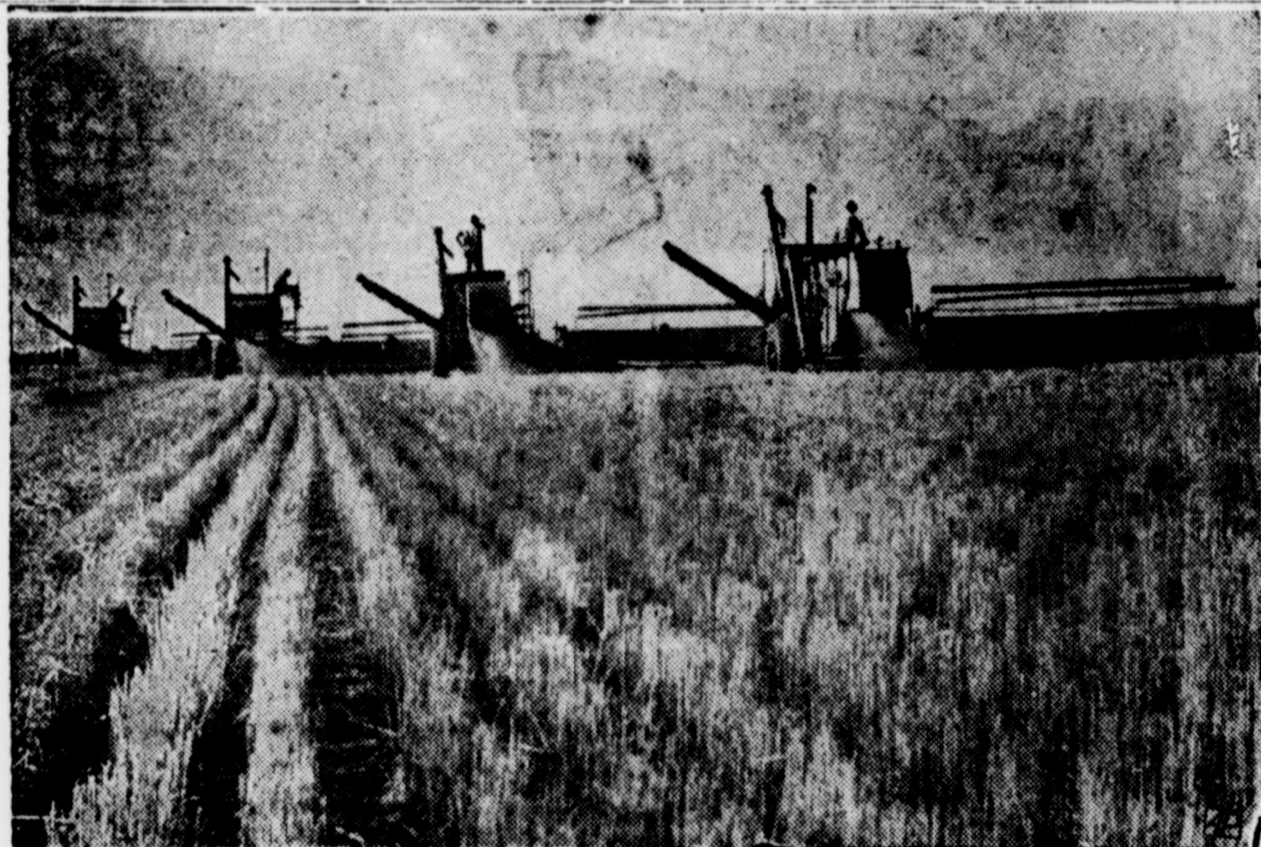

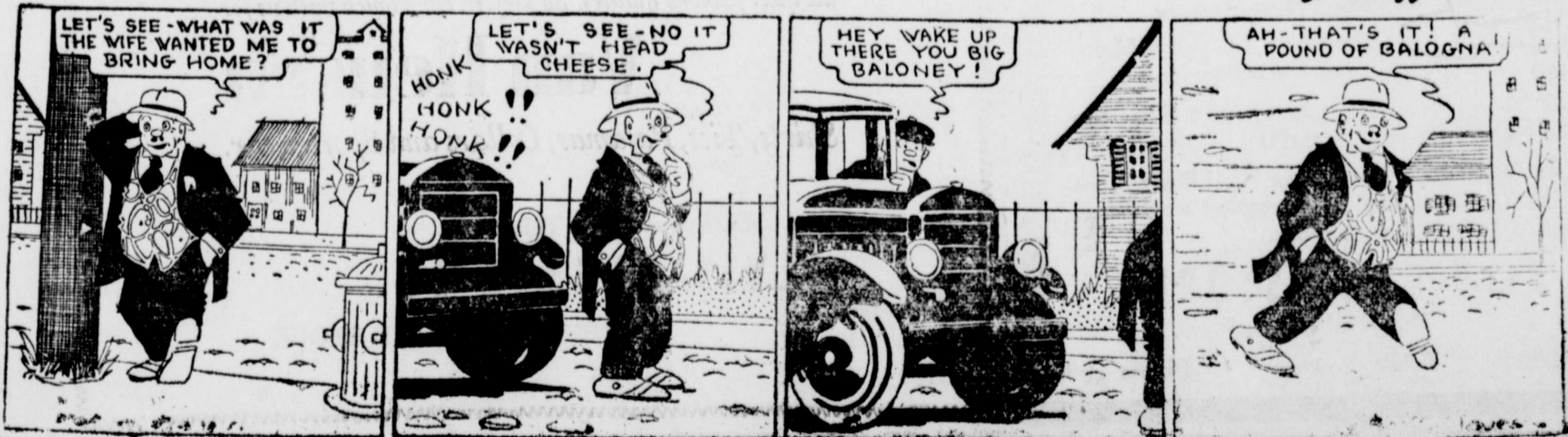
