With no sign of relief in sight, Texas taxpayers kept feeding The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Total federal internal revenue collections for the State from July 1 through September 30 reached \$241,309.020 to exceed last year's itake for the same period by 5 per cent.

Income taxes slid 4 per cent loower than during the threemonth period in the 1946-47 fiscal year, but all other kinds of taxes shoveled more money into government coffers. Employment taxes brought in 22 per cent more revenue withholding taxes were up 19 per cent, and miscellaneous taxes advanced 7 per cent.
