HORACE JACKSON, CHOSEN GRAND MASTER GRAND LODGE OF TEXAS, A. F. & A. M.

History was made yesterday for the little town of
Gatesville, when one of its citizens, Horace Kellard Jack-
son was named at the 112th Grand Communication of
the Grand Lodge of Texas, A. F. & A. M. as the Grand
Master of the organization.

This is certainly a distinct hon-
or for a citizen of any town, more
especially, for a small town like
Gatesville, and both Gatesville
and Coryell County should justly
be proud of this honor which will
be shared jointly by both Mr.
Jackson, and us folks at home.

Under Mr. Jackson's leadership
actual construction of the Grand
Lodge Memorial Temple, at a cost
of \$1,716,000 on a site facing Col-
mbus Avenue between Seventh
and Eighth Streets, Waco, will
be started.

OPENS OFFICE HERE

Already, Mr. Jackson will have
an office opened over the Na-
tional Bank of Gatesville where
for the ensuing year, he will con-
tact many high in Masonic cir-
cles and will transact much of the
business of the Grand Lodge of
Texas thru this office.

Mr. Jackson's life as filed with
the Associated Press is briefly as
follows: Born, September 2, 1889
at Sunset, and was a son of King
Soloman Jackson and the former
Miss Eliza Wilson. He spent his
boyhood on a farm in Montague
county. There were six boys and
five girls in the family. His pa-
rents were Scotch-Irish descent
and Tennesseians. After 3 years
attending country schools he
entered Burkburnett high school
from which he was graduated in
1917. He then entered Baylor
University, and was graduated
there in 1921 with an AB degree,
after time out for World War I
service in the U. S. Army.

He then entered the Insurance
business in Seymour, and twelve
years later came to Gatesville,
also entering the insurance busi-

ness.
He has been President of the
Municipal Utilities League of
Texas, President of the Gates-
ville Chamber of Commerce, May-
or, City of Gatesville, Trustee of
Baylor University; trustee of Hill-
crest Hospital, Waco; member and
deacon First Baptist church of
Gatesville; director, Guaranty
Bank & Trust Company, Gates-
ville; Commander American Leg-
ion Post, Seymour; became a
Master Mason, Mineral Wells
Lodge, No. 611 A. F. & A. M., in
1922; was Worshipful Master of
Seymour Lodge No. 604, 1936;
Commander Seymour Commandry
1930; High Priest, Seymour Chap-
ter, 1929; Member, Committee on
Work, Grand Lodge of Texas for
four years, and Committee Chair-
man; member Gatesville Lodge,
No. 197 A. F. & A. M., in 1936;
Member Waco Chapter and Coun-

cil Waco Commandry, 1944; Mem-
ber Saint Timothy Conclave No.
65, Order of the Red Cross of
Constantine, 1946; Member Aus-
tin Consistory, Austin, 1945;
Member Karem Temple, Waco,
1943; named Deputy Grand Mas-
ter, Grand Lodge of Texas 1946.

Besides these honors, he has
been a member of the Athletic
Committee and the Financial
Committee, Baylor University.

While in Baylor University, he
lettered four years in track, in
'18, '19, '20 and '21, and football
in '19, and soccer in '18.

He is also president of the Hi-
way 36 Association which pro-
moted and developed Texas High-
way 36 from Freeport on the
Gulf to Abilene.

He was married February 8,
1922 to Miss Bessie Earl Glider,
daughter of Dr. O. G. Glider and
the late Mrs. Hallie Chrisman
Glider. They have two children,
Horace K. Jackson, Jr., of Gates-
ville, who is associated with him
in the insurance business here;
and a daughter, Miss Hallie Jo
Jackson, who is a Junior in Bay-
lor University.

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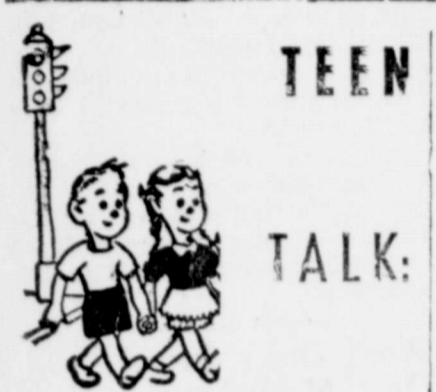
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TEEN TALK

DEAR JUDY:
THIS is hayride time for the kids who can locate a bale of hay and a wagon. City pigeons should have enough of a yen for the country to organize a week-end hayride party out of town.

One enterprising group in New York advertised in a newspaper appealing to farmers for a hay-filled wagon that they could hire for the day. They did and it proved loads of fun—the farmer supplied the hay, wagon, horses and even some food for a small sum.

Some Maryland teen-agers had an old-fashioned straw ride, each boy and girl chipping in 25 cents for their food and cost of the wagon. They took hot dogs to roast, a basket of apple and a driver who could carry a tune.

Group singing while the ride is in progress peps up the party. Usually school songs are first, popular songs and then some old favorites such as "Sweet Adeline" and "Harvest Moon."

Of course you'll want to have a campfire—and be sure when you pick a site for it that it is free from litter, rubbish, rotten wood, leaf mold and dry grass, suggest the Camp Fire Girls. Clear away all inflammable material within a radius of three to five feet. In national forests, make it at least ten feet.

When you select a site, remember that the best cooking fire is a small one. Cooking is done over the coals, not over a bonfire that blazes several feet high.

Soft woods usually produce quick, hot flames that soon die down; hard wood burns steadily and slowly and produce lasting coals. For kindling use dry soft woods.

Don't make the mistake of carting along too many different kinds of food which require cooking. It is best to take gobs and gobs of two things and preferably something that has been pre-cooked, than to fuss around waiting for a chance to cook it. A good combination is hot dogs and beans. You can cook the beans beforehand and have them all ready to heat. Another combination is hamburger and spaghetti—the spaghetti also can be cooked before you arrive at the camp fire site.

Long knitted gloves or mitts of angora are being needed together by college girls for fall wearing. Many of the kids are making 'em with matching scarfs and socks. Some are trimming their mittens with sequins for after-dark wear.

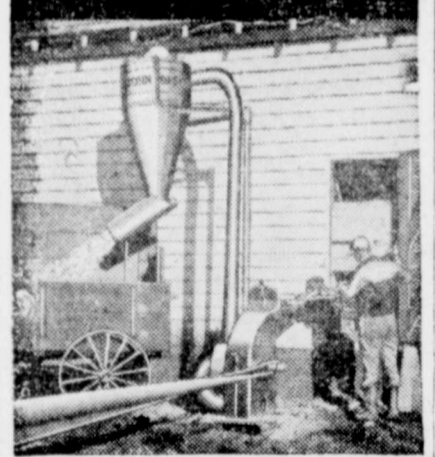
U. S. ARMY TENTS MAKE GERMAN MAIL BAGS

keting quotas on peanuts for 1-48, 1949 and 1950. Marketing quotas assure each farmer his share of the markets, consumers plenty of peanuts, and farmers stabilized prices. Frank Blair, Chairman of the Coryell County ACA Committee, made it clear that all persons engaged in the production of more than one acre of peonuts in 1947 are eligible to vote. The referendum will be held in Coryell County at the ACA office between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m.

Farmers To Vote On Quotas For Year On December 12

Every farmer in Coryell County who is eligible to vote in the farm program elections to be held in the county on December 12 should vote, advises John D. Wright, vice-chairman of the county agricultural conservation committee. Elections will be held in Oglesby, Gatesville, Turnersville, Purlmela, Copperas Cove and Flat. The chairman advises that all persons participating in the 1947 Agricultural Conservation Program, or who had a Federal Crop Insurance contract in 1947 are eligible to vote, whether owners, operators, tenants or sharecroppers.

"These annual elections give farmers an opportunity to make their voice heard in the development and administration of farm programs," Mr. Wright said. "And since every farmer has an interest in seeing that the national program fits local needs, he should use this opportunity to select the men to administer the program who will best carry out this responsibility."

With continued demand for food, and corresponding heavy drain on the soil, farmer committeemen will be confronted with many decisions affecting current and future problems of production, the vice-chairman said. "Farmers will be called upon to do all they can to produce the abundance of food and fiber needed for consumers in this county and to share with the hungry of other countries. As the demand for food and fiber increases, the conservation of soil and water becomes more important."

"All of these, together with a need for a better understanding of the farm program and what it is accomplishing for the benefit of the consumer as well as the farmer, are reasons why every eligible farmer in Coryell county should vote in the coming election."

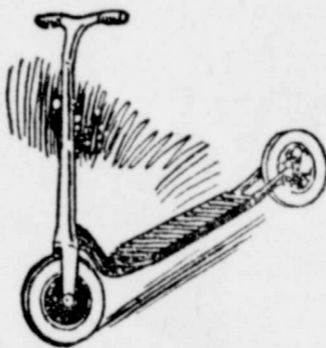

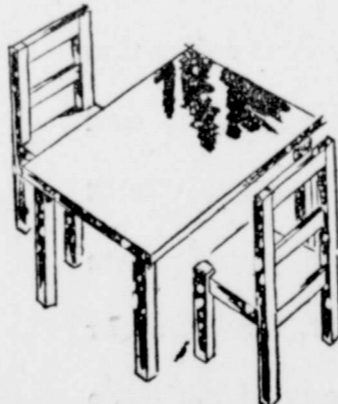
