They will decide whether they want marketing quotas for the next three marketing years, 1948, 1949 and 1950. If you shared in the proceeds of more than one acre of peanuts picked and threshed this year, don't fail to vote. Your county agricultural conservation committeeman can give you the complete details. Don't fail to vote today, December 9th. Even if the Secretary of Agriculture should suspend quotas after the referendum, provided it carries, there will be no price support unless quotas carry by two-thirds of the voters.

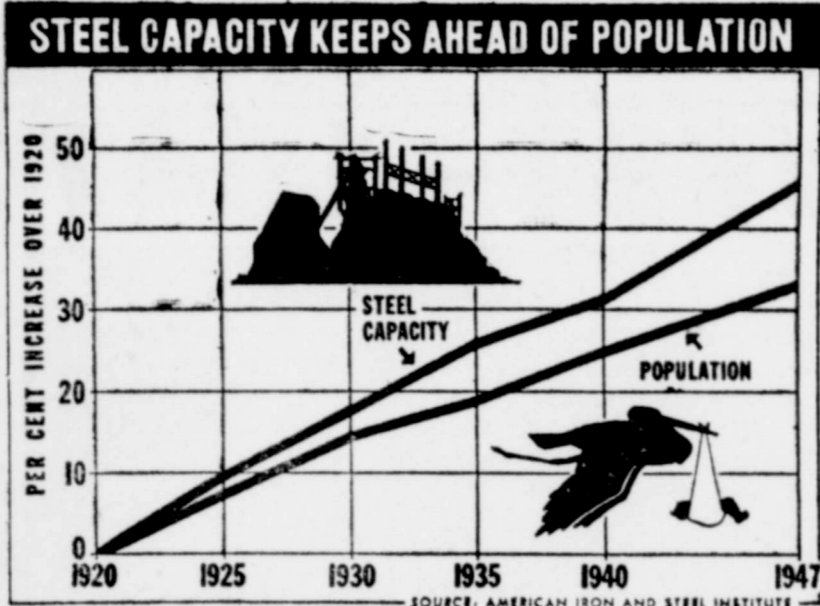
## OBITUARY

## Steel Spends A Billion Dollars For Expansion and Improvements

Record peacetime shipments of steel, plus record breaking expenditures during 1947 and 1948 on improvements and expansion of the steel industry's facilities will go far toward bringing about a balance between demand and supply of steel, according to American Iron and Steel Institute.

Postwar expansion and improvement plans of the steel industry, which will involve an expenditure of more than one billion dollars by the end of 1948, mean more steel than ever before for the manufacturers of sorely needed farm equipment. It means more machinery, fencing wire, steel for silos, barbed wire, bale ties, and roofing, added to an already record total for shipments of finished steel products during the first half of 1947.

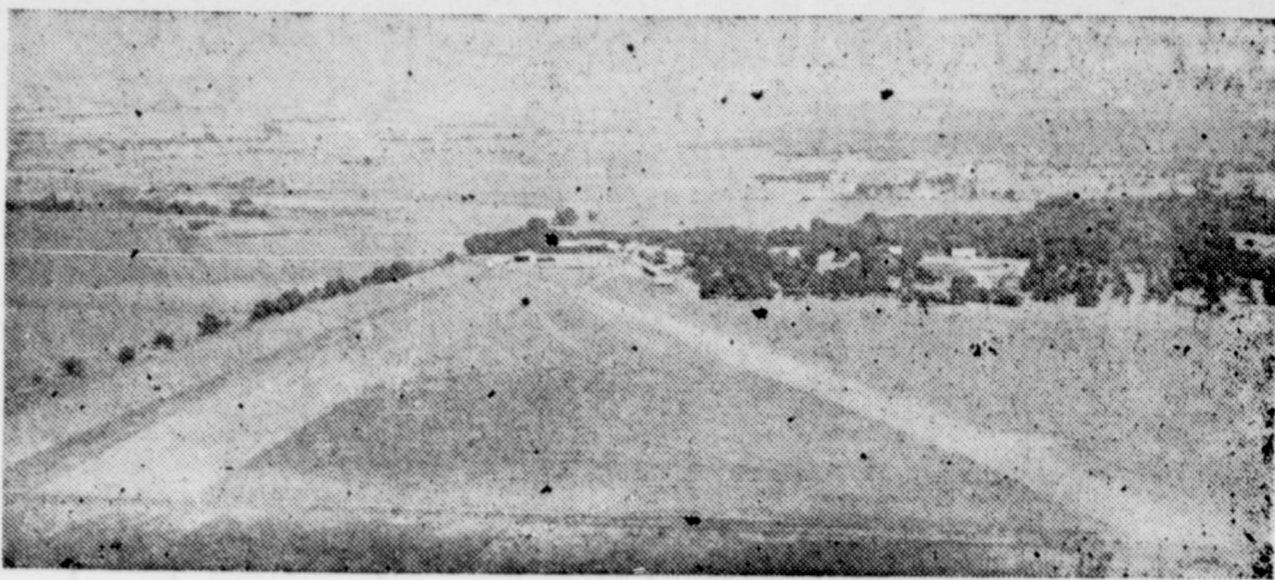
During the first six months of this year the industry exceeded any previous peacetime production pace with a total of more than 42,000,000 net tons of steel ingots and steel for castings. In that period, users of steel received two-thirds as much finished steel as in the entire year of 1940.

In 1940 a total of 919,500 net tons of finished steel was shipped to manufacturers making agricultural implements and machinery and to other farm outlets. During the first four months of 1947, over 405,000 net tons went to the same steel consumers. The indicated total for

this year, if shipments continue at the same high rate for the balance of 1947, is in excess of 1,200,000 net tons of steel products for the ultimate use of farmers throughout the country. Such a total would be an increase of roughly one-third over 1940, reflecting the record breaking pace of steel production so far this year.

Expansion and improvements of the steel industry's equipment will involve the following additions: 2,500,000 net tons of ingot capacity; 3,000,000 tons of added sheet and strip capacity and substantial additions to facilities for finished steel products other than sheet and strip.

Steel's program for 1947 alone, which in large part involves completion of schedules that were undertaken as long as two years ago, will mean the expenditure of \$450,000,000. By the end of 1948 the postwar total will have reached the sum of \$1,000,000,000, an all-time record. The latter amount is more than the earnings of the entire steel industry during the four war years. In addition, the industry plans further improvements that will add several hundred million dollars to that total. The steel industry believes that record production plus record plans for expansion and improvement will insure a steady supply of steel to meet the unprecedented demand built up during the war years.

**IN OUR**



I was born in Bell county, April 1, more than seventy years ago, a natural born fool as the above date will show. In the now extinct little village of Sugar Loaf, which at that time was very rough, but few are left today to testify with me that it was wild and tough. There at the foot of

old Sugar Loaf mountain, along its slope and slant, I heard, figuratively speaking, the owls hoot and I saw the elephant!

A few weeks ago while passing through Coryell County, and the pretty little city of Gatesville, my mind raced back down the aisle of time into the realms of childhood, for as stated above, this is the county which gave me birth.

As I viewed the old peak, Sugar Loaf Mountain, as she stood majestically in the distance, the feeling about my heart was of the pathetic at the immenseness of years gone by since first I viewed it as a toddling, with the certain feeling it would some day prove an active volcano.

Sugar Loaf at that time had little to recommend it. No great railroad was about to enter, no oil discovery eminent, and thoughts of its ever playing a prominent part in the strategy of a World War was remote indeed!

Yet there was excitement a plenty thereabouts, in fact, it was so lavish I can not forget, though life was just beginning for me as a child of some 5-years of age. As I drove along through the community the thought came that if some of those old pioneers sleeping in nearby cemeteries for more than half a century could have suddenly awakened while recent military target practice was under way, perhaps their reaction would have been, "Old

Sugar Loaf has not changed a lot since our long departure".

As I remember it the little community seemed to have reserved the right to judge the "law and evidence", and the fellow who was subject to mistakes had to be careful careful! about leading away the wrong horse, for this error was similar to that of fooling with electricity—made only once. I recall just now seeing a victim of this kind as he sat at his last noonday meal. His spirit took its flight ere the morning sun had kissed the Coryell County hills.

The little town boasted of a general store, photograph gallery, saw mill, a place where liquor was sold, and a doctor. I remember having been at the store one day where men were talking excitedly, as the news of the death of President Garfield was being discussed. That was in July, '81.

At that time there was no bridge between Sugar Loaf and Gatesville, that is to say at Potter's Crossing on the Cow House. Our family was being transported by wagon to Gatesville, where father was to go on trial in the district court. The banks of Cow House were violent and slippery, the horses would fall to their knees, whereupon the wagon would backtrack, creating a dangerous situation and one in which I have never been scared so badly since, unless it be at some time when I was listening in on the radio to the rantings of one Adolph Hitler. This was in the summer of 1882. Two attorneys retained by father I clearly recall—a man by the name of Vardiman and Parker White. Jim Lanham was the youthful and handsome sheriff, whom I also remember distinctly. Speaking of Lanham it now occurs to me he was followed by John Hammock, who fell heir to the execution of Ed Powell and a man by the name of Leeper. I was near Gatesville at the time of the execution, but as I always wanted to see people live a long time and do well, I did not attend, though it was public. Let me add, however, I am not opposed to the supreme penalty—let the punishment fit the crime!

Our family was in Gatesville for on eweek where it domiciled at the Brinkman hotel, which name had gotten away from me until the late Dr. Cranfill referred to it in some of his last writings. He published a paper in Gatesville at one time. The last time I saw him here in Dallas he was a ponderous man, a physical giant!

The drive from Waco to Gatesville is of striking beauty, the woodlands, streams, hills and valleys, as one nets Gatesville, makes a landscape of splendor beyond description, as well as captivating and thrilling.

Gatesville will ever be of interest to me, for in the county state house there will appear on sacred statutes record of my lowly birth throughout the coming ages. Besides I have some life-long friends there and in Coryell county proper. Dolphus Young, who died in October, was born in about one-half mile of where I was born.
