DAIRY RATION WITH PASTURE

Recent inquiries about a good feed for the milk cow can be answered by feeding a ration composed of: 100 lbs. ground corn; 100 pounds ground oats; 100 pounds wheat bran; 50 pounds cottonseed meal; 4 pounds bone meal or lime flour; and 4 pounds of salt. With pasture this is a good feed. A well fed cow gives milk because she is compelled to not because she wants to.

GRASSHOPPER POISON

Grasshoppers may soon start their destruction and the best way to control them is through poisoning. Use 100 pounds bran; 5 pounds Paris Green or white arsenic; 4 ounces amyl acetate; 2 gallons cheap molasses, all mixed in 8 gallons of water. This formula is good for cut worms also.

AJAX, NEW FEED AND HEAVY PRODUCER

A new feed produced by crossing feterita and kafir known as Ajax is making a most favorable impression with farmer needing roughage as well as grain. One farmer on the tight land reported he made 8,050 pounds of heads and 1,700 bundles of fodder from 3 1-2 acres last season with practically no rain. Virgil F. Jones of Baird tried a patch last year and reports it a very fine feed also. Mr. Leo Tyler of near Baird. They ordered the seed through the county agent last year. They were ordered from the Chillicothe Experiment Station, Roy Quinby Supt. Orders may be sent direct to him or through the county agent. The cost is 5 cents per pound plus the transportation.

The leaves are flat and wide and very close together, cattle consume practically the entire stalk.

The National income for 1934 was 47 billion six hundred million (47,600,000,000) compared to an income of 41 billion eight hundred million for 1933. All time record in 1929 was 83 billion (83,000,000,000).

WHY LESS NEED FOR COTTON AND WHEAT

There are a great multitude of people who have studied little about conditions that exist outside their immediate community or state. For that reason it is hard for them to understand why the government has been compelled to enter the field controlled production of agricultural commodities. However, be as it may, the farmers of the United States have been agitating the control of certain crops for more than 30 years and this most vital subject finally received its attention when congress convened in 1933. It was not a new thing and something done on the spur of the moment but a piece of legislation that had been needed many years, and many believe if such measures had been in force during the years in which the burdensome surpluses were being piled up, that there would have been no de-

pression. When the World War started in Europe there soon were millions of productive acres that became idle and made into battle fields. The great plains and sodded areas of our west were induced into wheat growing. There was an ever ready demand for all production during the war and until the idle acres were put back into cultivation after the war. The U. S. A. had increased her acreage from 290 million acres to 340 million from 1913 to 1931. Canada had increased her acreage from 99 million to 140 million in the same period. Europe, including Russia, had increased from 532 million to 584 million acres. There had been an increase of 141 million acres of land mostly suited to the growing of wheat (about 25 million acres were put to cotton in U. S. A. Any one can see that such great areas put to the growing of wheat would soon overstock the world. That is exactly what happened. The normal crop for the United States became 825 million bushels per year. Since the other nations have become growers of their own wheat, we have a very limited export trade and will never gain it back. All nations are living at home."

In about 1890 the per capita consumption of wheat was about 226 pounds per year. Now it is about 176 pounds and is likely to grow some less. This is due to the substitution of other foods more relished. Since refrigeration has become available everywhere, more vegetables are consumed than in the days of our fathers and grandfathers. Therefore there simply is not the need for as much wheat as formerly. The same thing in that case is to curtail production. Cheap wheat doesn't mean greater consumption as statistics shows but a very slight change in per capita consumption of total foods. There is a wide fluctuation in substitutes due to price changes. We need about 55 million acres of wheat in the U. S. A. We formerly raised 66 million acres.

The same situation exists in the cotton industry. Any person who makes any study of current affairs knows that the Rayon industry has curtailed the production needs of cotton to a very serious extent. The German people have a synthetic fiber they call Vistra and the Italians have their Sniaccio, which is about the same thing as Rayon as we know it. These fabrics are not as durable as cotton or silk goods but they are cheaper and probably no tonly one woman out of 50 but who uses much of these cotton substitutes. The other nations have been increasing their cotton acreage for the past 50 years and pay little or no atten-

tion to the maneuvers of the U. S. A. notwithstanding the big fuss set off by the cotton textile mill owners and handlers. When the war needs were filled the demand for cotton has gradually fallen off until in '33 the cotton farmer and all dependent upon him were ruined. Factories had turned off millions of their employees, farmers had introduced sleds and picking machines and began pulling off cotton that threw many thousands out of employment, and will continue regardless of what kind of national policy is maintained. Five cent cotton and twenty five cent wheat saw the greatest bread lines and the most naked people in the history of the world. Cheap wheat and cheap cotton doesn't prevent a starving and naked bread line.

To those who wish to criticize the government in its attempt to equalize buying conditions the writer would like to ask that if uncontrolled production of wheat and cotton will be the cure all and the end of the present condition, why did the industrialist and processors permit such chaotic conditions to develop during the years when no control was in effect. The American Federation of Labor reported about 12 million unemployed in 1932. That was before a stalk of cotton was plowed up, before a grain of wheat was withheld from the planting before a single pig was slaughtered and before a drouth cow was shot or made into chili. Why were hundreds of farmers losing their farms and hundreds of banks going broke and thousands of business houses going into bankruptcy, prior to the enactment of the Agricultural Adjustment Act if the old slogan of "Let a man do as he pleases and raise all he can raise was the best method?" Reasonable men know that something had to be done and the A A A was the answer. Today you never read of a bank failure, new businesses are springing up, more new automobiles have been sold than any year since 1929. New farms are being bought and others are being paid out. These are living examples of why a National Policy of Production Control was needed. If mere man can produce a burdensome surplus and throw his fellow man out of employment doesn't it behoove the same agency to correct the evil?

Change Made In Relief To Farm Families

Austin, Texas—Effective immediately, county relief administrators no longer will be permitted to extend any form of relief from general relief funds to any employable farm family, it was announced by Adam R. Johnson, state director of the Texas Relief Commission.

"A Farm Family," Mr. Johnson explained, "is one residing outside the limits of incorporated or unincorporated towns, villages and cities and who depend upon farming operations for the major portion of their income. It is not intended to include in this group families who live on small plots of land which are sufficient only to produce part of their sustenance requirements and upon which they can produce a commercial crop."

"Farm Families," henceforth, may receive aid only in the form of advances through the rural rehabilitation corporation. County administrators were instructed to recall any work cards issued to rural families for work relief in May and to make advances, secured by notes and mortgages, instead.

All families affected by this change immediately will become rural rehabilitation families, Mr. Johnson said, and will receive aid in the future from rural subsistence funds in accordance with their needs as established by case workers.

At the same time administrators will contact all landlords at the earliest possible date to obtain waivers on the landlord's interest in the tenant's share of the crop. This procedure was adopted in order to secure advances which the rural corporation will make to the tenant.

"If a client transferred under these regulations receives subsistence advances, executing notes for them, and later it develops that a waiver form can not be obtained from the landlord or other creditors, then the case will be dropped completely from our records," Mr. Johnson declared. "In such instances, the notes taken will be written off as a loss, but the client will receive no further advances after the date on which creditors refuse to execute waivers. Creditors will be notified when these cases are dropped from the records."

Explaining the new regulation, Mr. Johnson said it is in line with the long established method of furnishing share croppers. "This is what bankers and other creditors always have done," he said. "Our former practice of furnishing the tenant with subsistence needs as an outright grant just encouraged creditors to allow the relief administration to finance the making of their crops. This new regulation will help to correct that situation and dignify the aid extended farmers by eliminating the outright relief grant."

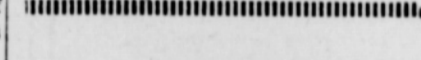

Charming Print Jacket Costumes

FANCY a two-piece suit or a jacket-and-frock costume made exactly as if tailored of cloth, only instead of being of tweed or broadcloth or serge or a novelty woolen, it is fashioned of a gay print, either crepe or taffeta. It's news we are telling you, for the print jacket suit is fashion's big headline feature this spring.

Perhaps you have already acquired one of these attractive and wearable print suits. If not, why not, and if you haven't, hurry up and take a look at the charming types which the shops are showing.

The print may not be expensive. In fact, some of the most successful models are of simple, unpretentious patternings and weaves. Small figures on dark backgrounds are favored for practical daytime wear. The skirts are either gored or cut straight and slim with a slit hemline or, if you take delight in being very ultra, choose one of the new circular flare skirts with its widened hemline such as Paris designers announce as the newest silhouette. The jacket that is smartest is tailored along classic lines, is fitted in slightly at the waist and buttons up the front and is only hiplength. However, any style is in good form from swagger to cape-jacket style.

If you want to simulate a jacket effect, that is wear a one-piece dress that has a jacket and skirt "look," the charming model to the left in the picture is the answer. This soft taffeta frock has intriguing little style touches adapted from the utterly feminine regency period. Bows and belt of scarlet velvet ribbon pick up one of the colors in the print. The hat is of onyx skin straw with a choux of velvet ribbons at the front.

This idea of employing little velvet bows instead of buttons is a note worth keeping in mind when you plan your new frocks and blouses. It is an important this-season fashion gesture. It is not unusual for these sprightly wee bows to travel up and down the front of a one-piece dress (perhaps cut in the new princess lines) from neckline to hemline. Then, again, they may even fasten a bodice up the back or pose in little groups on one's blouse. In fact, whenever a decorative touch is needed, just scatter a flock of little velvet bows over your costume for effect and up-to-the-moment chic.

Printed chiffon suits for dressy daytime wear are making fashion history. They are really the most flattering costumes one can wear at an afternoon social gathering. 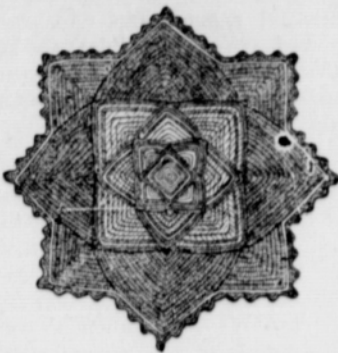

Unique "Primrose" Rug to Crochet

This rug measures 42 inches and requires about three pounds of material to finish. It appears to be made of six squares each of a different size, with the horizontal positions alternating. Work is started with the center square about 5 inches in diameter. Triangles are then crocheted on the four sides of inner square forming the second square. Continue same way for third, fourth and fifth squares. The sixth square is the same size as fifth square and therefore requires smaller triangles on sides than the others. Colors should be so arranged that center is in light shades of yellow, while outer triangles represent the petals of flowers, and may be shaded in color desired. This can be made into a very attractive and unique rug, depending very much on the color scheme used.

Printing Blocks Made in China Centuries Ago

The oldest printing blocks in existence are on exhibition in a collection of bamboo, root and wood carvings from China at Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History.

The blocks are engraved with floral designs and must have been made before the year 1108 A. D. They were found in the ancient city of Chu-lu, in the southern part of the province of Chi-li. This city, excavated by archeologists in recent years, was submerged by a flood in 1108.

The Chinese are the inventors of block-printing, and, in fact, of all the essentials for printing—paper, writing brush, ink and ink-pallet or inkstone. They invented and perfected these entirely from their own resources, unaided by any other nation. Paper was invented and manufactured in China as early as 105 A. D.
