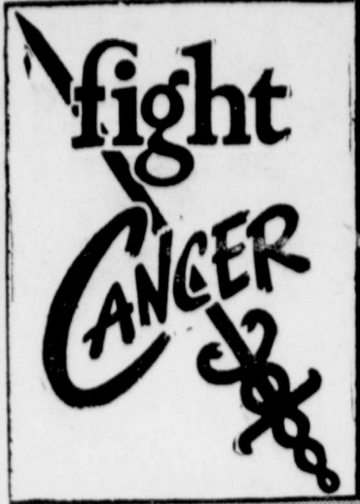

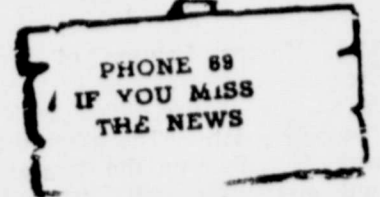

**FRANCE—
French Communists
Outsmart Themselves**

PARIS, France—The most serious mistake the Russian Foreign Office has made in Europe this year was its approval of the Communist party's withdrawal from the French government. Evidently the Russians thought they were as strong in France as they were in the Balkan states, but they overplayed their hand. Instead of bringing about the fall of the French government it strengthened Bidault's position materially.

The Communists are out of the government and there is great rejoicing throughout France. The Communists won't get back into the government short of a civil war or an invasion of France by Russian troops, which isn't likely for some time at least.

This does not mean the Communists are weak in France. On the contrary, they are strong, aggressive and determined. But whereas six months ago they had France by the throat, their strength now lies in their ability to tie up French industry and pretty effectively immobilize France in event of armed hostilities in Europe.

The great bulk of the Communist party strength lies in its control of the big labor unions, especially those of transport, communications and civil service. More than 30 percent of the police force of Paris are members of the Communist Party.

Practically all of the mechanical ground forces and many of the administrative personnel of the army air forces are Communists. The pilots who fly the planes, however, refuse to have any part of the Communist movement. In a showdown, they would be loyal

to the present government and line up against Russia.

The Communists won their big victories in the last election by exploiting national patriotism and claiming to have done all the heroic work of the underground forces during the war. When liberation came hundreds of Communists moved into key positions in state and local government. In a few months, still parading under the banner of French patriotism, they succeeded in getting control of a majority of the rationing boards, the distribution bureaus and the local police jobs.

Then when the elections came they turned on the heat. Workers were told if they wanted jobs and better ration allowances they would have to vote Communist. A farmer who wanted a new plow or repairs for his wagon could get an order from the distribution board only if he pledged himself and his family to vote Communist. An important Paris shopkeeper told me his supply of blouses, suits, and lingerie was cut off without notice.

He learned the Communists had been told he was working for one of the other parties. He made his peace with the Commies and kept his shop open. But he didn't like it. The farmers especially were

angry. With a membership of about 400,000 members of the Communist party polled in excess of 5,000,000 votes thru pressure tactics of this sort.

Now that they are out of government, Bidault's men are weeding the Commies out of government jobs. They are still strong in the local positions, but the French people, always quick to resent coercion in politics, are resorting to the traditional tactics of cynical evasions.

"Russia can be stopped cold in France if we get enough coal and wheat to see us thru the next two or three years," a man high in the French government told me. "The Communists are pretending to be the great national party of France. They take advantage of every excuse to paint the Americans as imperialistic invaders. But our people won't be fooled again. Secretary Royall's unfortunate statement about the Ruhr gave the Communists a field day, but it lasted for only a day. This country is predominantly Catholic and outside a few spots in Paris and other industrial centers the God-fearing loyal Catholics are beginning to understand that Russia is the great enemy not only of France but the Catholic church. Just give us a

supply of coal and wheat and we will save France from the Communists."

An American who has lived many years in France has another analysis of the weakness of Russia in France. He believes Russia could be more effective in France if the stakes were high enough.

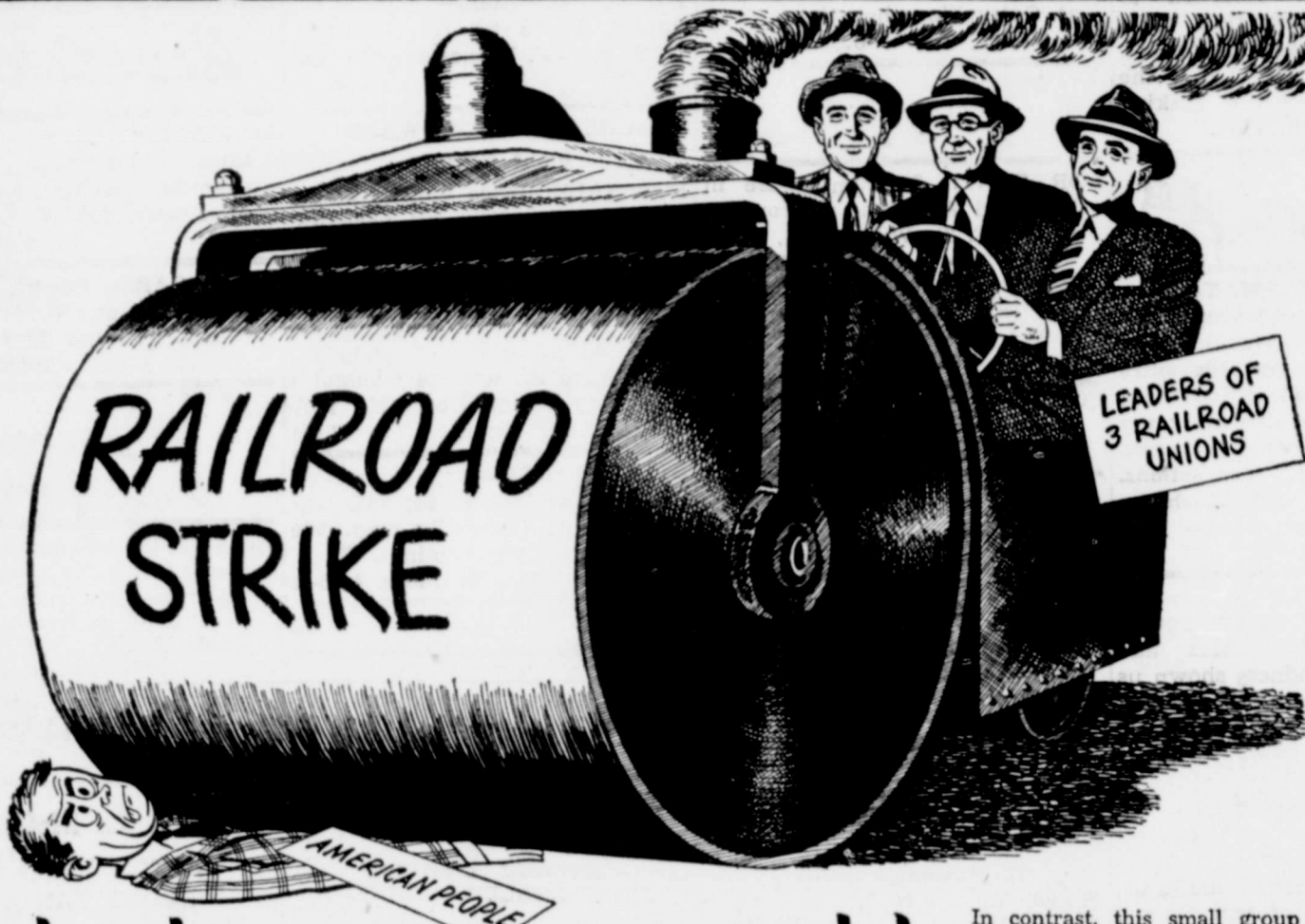
"I happen to know that Stalin thinks very poorly of the French," he said. "He knows that the radical element in France always will be against the government. If the Communists should gain control of France it would be only for a few months until the great mass of small leaders in the party would be conspiring to overthrow the very party they helped to put in office. Furor in France, but they are dead set on gaining control of Germany, all of it. They realize they made a mistake in trying to move industrial plants from eastern Germany into Russia. The plan was a complete failure. Now they are reviving industry in the Russian zone and will be forcing their way into control of industry in other parts of Germany. They simply cannot afford to have the Americans and British build up standards of living in Western Germany that will reveal the Soviet way of life to be the slavery that it is everywhere the Soviets rule."

French fear of a revitalized Germany is waning in the light of the new threat from Russia. Six months ago the French would have made a terrific fight in opposition to any revival of heavy German industry. They will make protests at the Paris Conference, but they do not intend to make a real issue of it.

Also they will support the American position that this is no time to undertake a nationalization program in the Ruhr. The British are insisting on this, but I have been told by the leaders of both Labor government and the Tory opposition that the British will be satisfied with an agreement to refer the nationalization scheme to a conference at some future date.

The one question uppermost in the minds of all French government leaders is, "How far will America go in helping us and when?" The answer to that question will decide whether France is to continue as a free and independent republic or eventually succumb to Soviet domination.

"If your people could only realize our situation," an ex-premier of France pleaded. "More than 85 percent of the people in Western Europe are either Catholics or Protestants and are necessarily anti-Russian. But no matter what our religion or beliefs or even how great our courage, we cannot withstand for long against the machine guns of Russian soldiers and the methods of their secret police unless we know the Americans are in earnest and will see us through."



Look who gets squeezed!

Union leaders representing less than one-tenth of railroad employes reject recommendations of President's Emergency board—refuse to negotiate except on their own terms—threaten to paralyze nation by strike!

THE LEADERS of three railroad unions, representing less than one-tenth of all railroad employes, have called a railroad strike that would paralyze the nation.

These leaders refuse to accept a 15½ cents an hour wage increase retroactive to November 1, 1947. This increase was recommended by an impartial Emergency Board appointed by President Truman.

This increase of 15½ cents already has been accepted by the 19 other railroad unions. But the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Switchmen's Union of North America won't accept what more than 90% of all railroad employes have accepted. They have called a strike to get more!

Unions refuse rules discussion

Certain rules changes demanded by these union leaders—which would increase wages still further—were recommended by the Board. But the union leaders want more—they demand that the railroads put into effect ALL the changes they asked for, including those the Board felt should be denied.

On top of this, they insist that certain rules changes proposed by the railroads be withdrawn—in spite of the fact that the Board recommended them! These union leaders have refused to negotiate except upon these arbitrary terms.

Greater wage increase not justified

Engineers and firemen are among the highest paid of all employes in America, as figures in the box show. This strike threat doesn't justify giving a greater increase than other railroad workers received.

Emergency Boards are a means provided by the Railway Labor Act in the public interest to avoid strikes. The President's Board,

after hearing evidence for 33 days, made recommendations based on all the facts in the case. The railroads have accepted these recommendations.

Who's to blame?

Although they deplored so large an extra cost burden, the railroads accepted the report of the Board because they felt it was in the public interest to uphold the spirit and intent of the Railway Labor Act.

In contrast, this small group of railroad union leaders are attempting to flout the intent and spirit of the Railway Labor Act, and dictate their own terms.

They have dictated a paralyzing railroad strike.

You will be the victim!

How long will the American public stand for the undemocratic, arbitrary, and abusive use of the right to strike and the disregard of the obligation to provide transportation? How long can the American people permit a few dictatorial union leaders to defy the processes provided for peaceful settlement of disputes?

Force seldom produces settlements that are either fair or lasting. Moreover, a point is often reached when personal interests must be held subordinate to the greater public welfare. That is why the railroads have accepted the Emergency Board recommendations. That is also why the leaders of these three unions should reconsider their decision to call a paralyzing strike.

Compare these wages with what you make!

Here is a comparison of average annual earnings of engineers and fireman for 1939 (pre-war) and 1947. Also shown is what 1947 earnings would have been if the 15½ cents per hour increase, offered by the railroads and rejected by the union leaders, had been in effect throughout the entire year 1947.

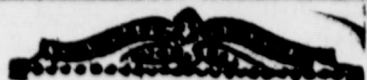

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This Week in History

May 2 to May 8

Millions of American nature lovers owe a debt of gratitude to the remarkable naturalist, Jno. James Audubon, born 163 years ago this week. A native of Haiti, Audubon devoted his life to painting the birds of a new continent and its infant republic. His Birds of America, a magnificent collection of color plates, was published in 1826. The book, still a classic, sold at that time for \$1,000.00 a set and was the crowning point of a life of hardship and self denial. In tribute to his work, the National Audubon Society, an organization which works tirelessly for the preservation and appreciation of bird life, bears his name.

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
