Elven (Babe) Hasty, charged with burglary, on a plea of guilt was given two years.

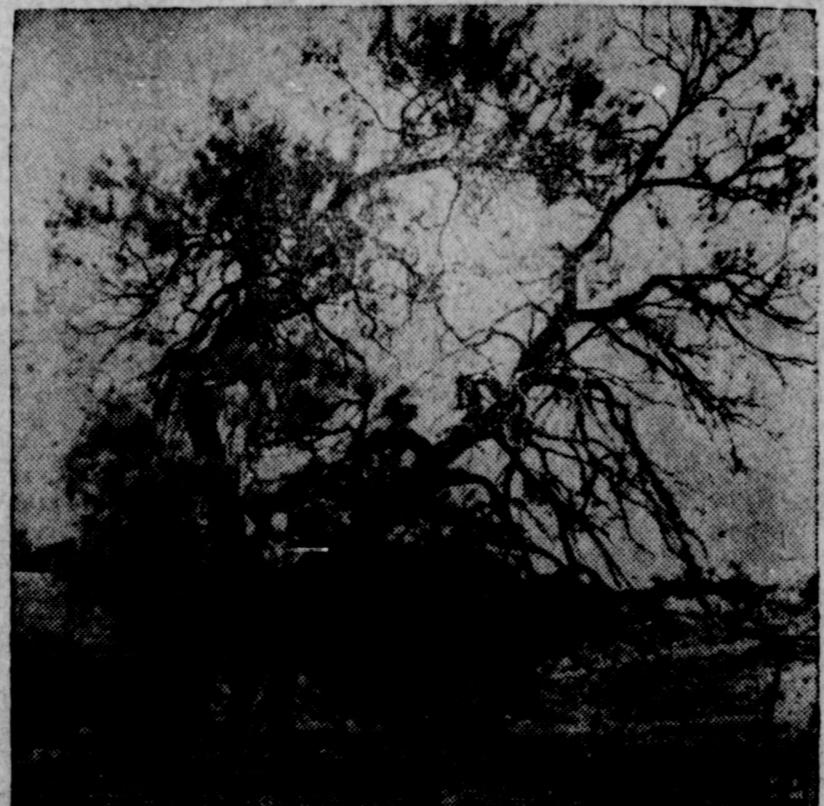
In the case, The State of Texas vs Trent Millsap, charged with car theft, the jury was still out.

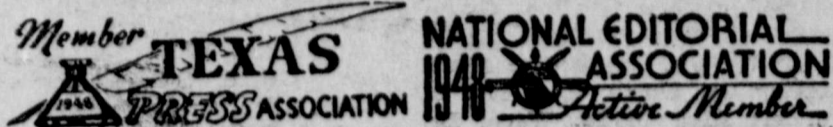

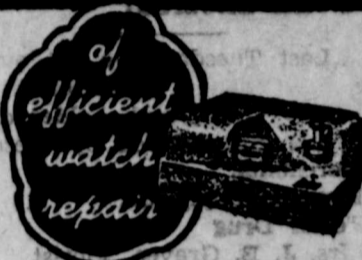

pick up the pitch. Here are excerpts of the dope straight from the kids' hen coop: Speaking on "How We Look" Mary Burdell of New York says:

"...Blue Jeans are used now only while painting furniture or climbing mountains. We are trying to forget the days of constant slanguage and brother's clothes. On dates we want pretty clothes... bouffant formals, bare shoulders and arms...."

"For sports we dress as simply as possible. White tennis dresses, plain shorts, tailored bathing suits

"Our hair is usually worn shoulder length, softly curled, not cluttered with unnecessary pins... sometimes we put it up for very special dates. Our makeup is simple—lipstick and powder.

"I should say that all this isn't

what the teen-aged girl likes to wear, but what the teen-aged boy wants the teen-aged girl to wear!" Jane MacLaughlin, of Kensington, Conn., explaining "How You Look To Us" (meaning adults), sounded off, saying:

"Responsibility and experience are the highest barriers between those of my age group and those of yours. Perhaps most of us do not have tragedy slap us in the face, but each teen-ager, to some degree, knows something of an adult's thoughts and fears...."

"Every student in my school is disgruntled with adults because they are not willing to spend money where it is needed. Our new high school still is only a blueprint... teen-agers are angry with the adult community which arguer against an increased educational budget."

And "How Do We Behave?" Let Florence Stoneman tell you.

"...We are noisy. Parties are popular, We dance, talk, eat sandwiches, cookies and potato chips, and we drink cokes and ginger ale Oh, yes, and we sing ballads like "Frankie and Johnny" and old favorites like "There's A Tavern in the Town". We are all interested in music. A surprising number of us prefer classic to jazz.

"I must admit that we very often do things that seem frivolous. Doesn't every generation? But we are certainly not all juvenile delinquents. We have our own code of ethics that controls our manners and morals. Heavy drinking and heavy petting are pretty much out."

"The World We're Getting—And What We Want" doesn't suit Diane Rosen, who says:

"Tomorrow perhaps the entire world, diseased and polluted, will be thrown into our laps, like a

sick baby....and young people with her brother, Hollis Fisher all over the world are aware of their responsibility towards it.

"...We want to understand each other and help each other. When people get old enough to become senators they pretty often lose their perspective.

"I do not believe... however... that the entire teen-age population should rise up and dictate to the Congress and parliament and ministries of the world."

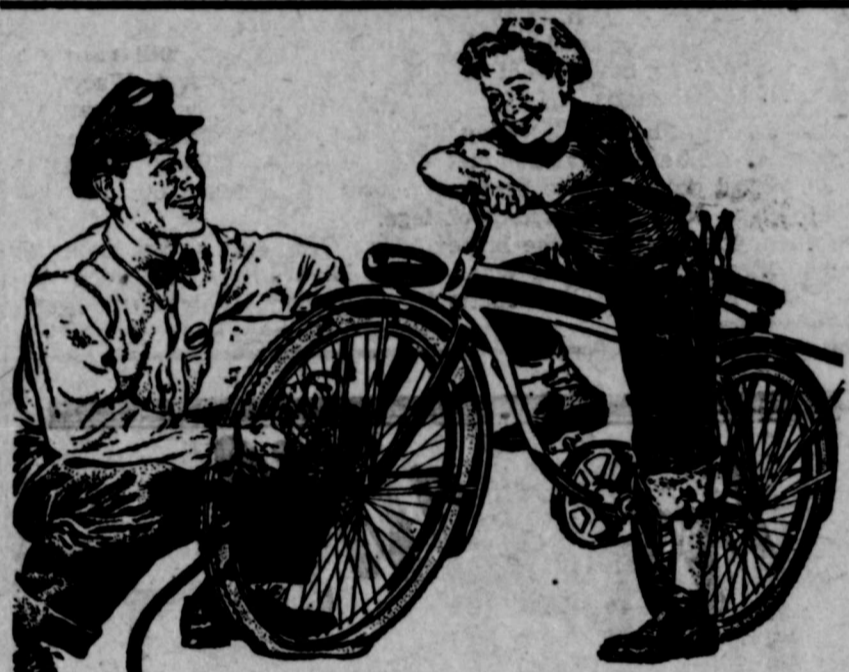


This Week in History

June 20 to June 26

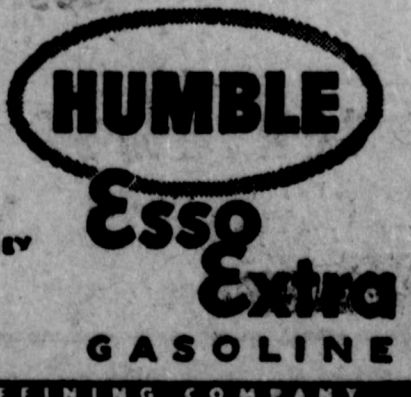
The first explorer whose landing on the mainland of North America had lasting consequences was John Cabot who touched the coast of Labrador on June 24, 1497. Previously, the Norse vikings had established North American colonies, but they were relatively unimportant. Cabot, an Italian, had been commissioned by King Henry VII of England, who wished to have a share in the New World discovered by the Spanish and Portuguese, to find a northwest passage to Asia which did not conflict with the claims of Spain and Portugal. On his voyages along the Atlantic Coast from Nova Scotia to the Carolinas, the British based their claim to North America—a claim that later was responsible for the formation of British colonies and, ultimately, the United States.

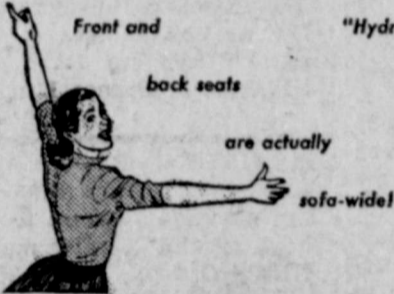

Dear Friends:

In the rush toward adjournment we have passed some legislation that will mean much to our older people. One bill increased the payments under the Railroad Retirement Act by approximately 20%. Another increased the contribution of the Federal Government to the States for old age pensions by Five Dollars per pension per month. The actual increases to the individual will depend on what each State does, but this will authorize the Federal Government to pay 3/4 of the first \$20 per month and 1/2 of all over \$20. It will greatly aid the poorer States to increase aid to our old people. I voted for both these bills.

We are just now about to take up the extension of agriculture price supports. I consider this bill to be of utmost importance not only to farmers but to the whole nation. Our Committee had hoped to be able to agree on a long-time agricultural program. I feel that this was the best opportunity we may ever have, but

the Committee could never agree (just as the farmers who appeared before us could not agree on any program). Finally the Republican leadership decided they would only give us a chance to pass a temporary extension bill. The bill now coming up extends price supports till July 1, 1950. Cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco, rice, peanuts, hogs, chickens, eggs and dairy products are to be supported at 90% of parity. Wool is supported as at present, and all other farm products which are now supported will be supported at from 60 to 90% of parity with an opportunity for the Secretary of Agriculture to put the support up if the commodity is scarce, and down if it is overproduced. We understand that Mr. Dirksen of Illinois is going to try to strike out peanuts from the list of supported commodities. I shall oppose this because I know it is only an effort of the candy manufacturer to cut the price at the expense of the farmer. If this amendment is adopted, I fear it may break down our whole support system.

The House has just passed by a vote of 287 to 91 a bill to admit 200,000 displaced persons. I voted against the bill. I feel our first duty is to America. I don't know where we would house these people. It could only be done by displacing the same number of Americans. I don't know what these people would do. We are told they would work on farms, in factories and in mines. The truth is the European countries have gone over these people time and time again, and have taken practically all of those who can or would work in these industries. We are told we should set an example for other nations. Actually we have paid most of the expense of upporting these people since the war stopped, and still are doing so. We have NOT "walked down the other side of the road", but the very organization that now asks us to take 200,000 of them refused to let 50,000 of them go to Guatemala where they are needed, jut because Guatemala very reasonably insisted that the people who come there should be of their (Catholic) religion.

I want to see these people settled in permanent homes, but I believe in letting them go where they are needed. I believe that if the United States is going to take a large number of them we should have some assurance that the other nations will take the rest of them, so we can CLOSE the "camps". I voted for an amendment to make uch an international agreement a condition for our action. It was voted down. The final result seems to be simply to substitute 200,000 displaced persons in the immedi-

ate future for the same number of regular immigrants over a period of years. This will make it impossible for relatives who have waited for years to reach America to do so. I believe that it is better to let these people who have tried so long to join their people in the United State to do so than to make the proposed substitution. Your friend,

Farm News

E. W. Blum, Coryell City, Coryell County, was notified last Saturday, June 12, that he was the State winner in the Tno-litter contest sponsored by the Texas Swine Breeders Association.

J. C. Taylor, Cedar Point Farm, on Coryell Creek, placed third in the contest.

Both these demonstrations were under the supervision of County Agricultural Agent, W. P. Graham.

Mr. Blum claimed no secret formula for putting pounds on these pigs. He was very fortunate in having a good sow that saved 12 out of 14 pigs. This sow is Poland China, and was bred to a registered Duroc Jersey boar. These 12 pigs weighed 3,262 lbs. at 175 days of age. The sow nursed these pigs thirteen weeks; then they were put on around a pint of milk per pig per day. In addition to this milk the pigs were on a self-feeder containing protein supplement and yellow corn. The self-feeder was adequate to allow feeder space for all pigs—one compartment of protein supplement for every two pigs, and one compartment of yellow corn for each pig.

His lot is about 40x50 feet with shed space that protected the hogs in bad weather. There was no running water in this lot, but diligence on the part of Mr. Blum saw that the pigs received 25 gallons of slop and water per day. Common salt was provided free choice as well as Moorman's Swine mineral.

Mr. Blum stated that if he had decided earlier to enter the contest he would have provided a self-feeder for the pigs earlier.

Mr. Taylor had a very uniform litter of 10 Hampshire pigs. He gave his pigs the run of the pasture in connection with the self-feeder. He had an oat pasture during part of the 175 days, but the freeze in January killed the oats down.

Both these men should be congratulated on the excellent record they have made, and for the honor they have brought to Coryell County.

Mr. Graham, County Agent for Coryell County states that James Westley of the Texas Employment Commission in Waco was in Gatesville on June 15, 1948, in the interest of serving farmers of this county, and will be back periodically as the farm season progresses.

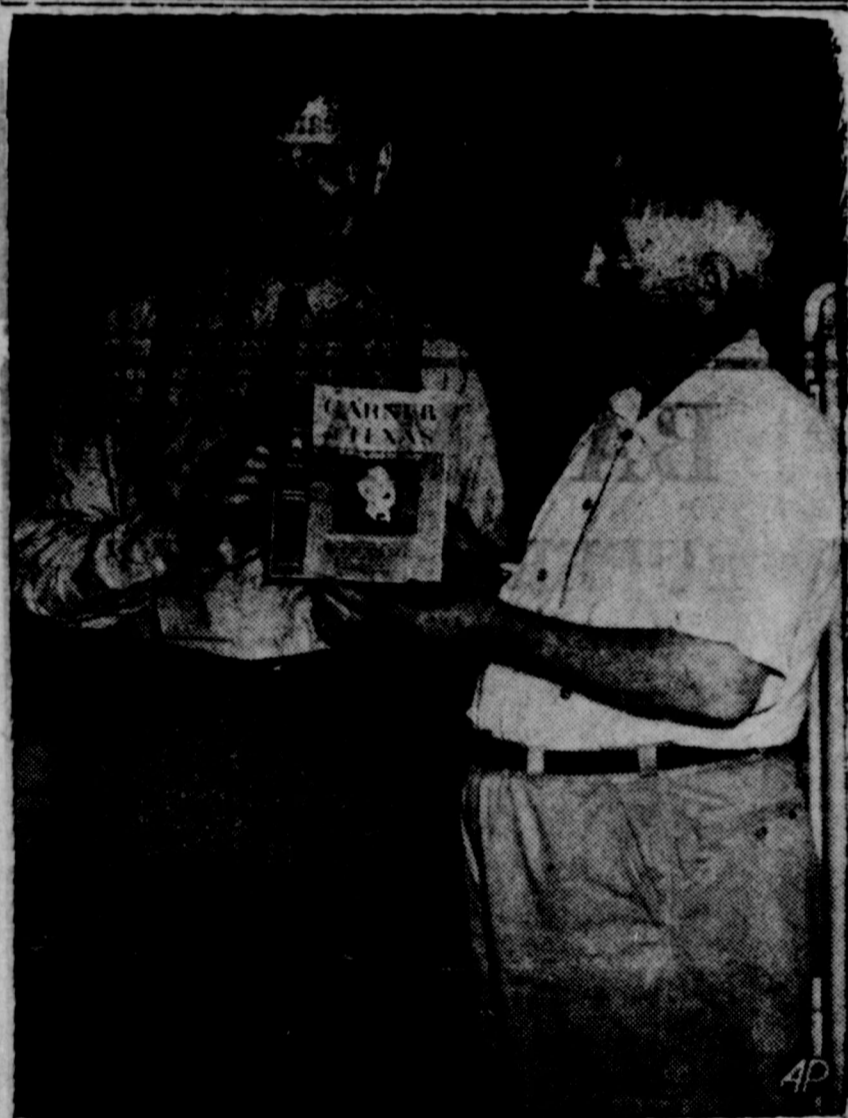
