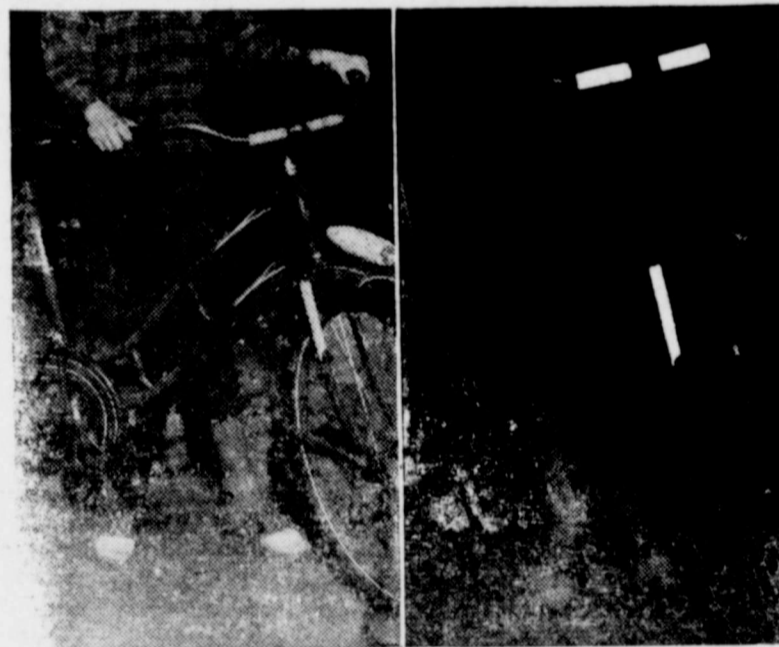

SPANISH HAIL FRANCO AS COUNTRY'S SAVIOR FROM RUSS

MADRID, Spain—This is the other side of the question. And there are two sides, Winchell, PM, Wallace, Gromyko, and other shouters to the contrary notwithstanding.

America knows, and accurately so, that Franco is a pompous, arrogant dictator, who rules Spain with an iron hand and uses ruthless methods to defeat Communist forces. But few Americans know that Franco started as a republican general and marched under the Republican flag until he realized that the Republican forces had been taken over by Moscow-trained officers and were being directed by the Russian ambassador to Spain.

It was then that Franco, a devout Catholic, broke with the Communists and led a successful fight to free his country from the menaces of Soviet dictatorship. To be sure, he set up his own dictatorship, but he did save Spain from Soviet domination and there by also saved France and Gibraltar from falling into the laps of the Reds.

This is no brief for France. It is rather a story based on facts and documents which I investigated and which are available to anybody who goes to Spain with an open mind. It is a story the American people should know as our government begins to implement its program for liberty and self-determination for the minority nations of the world.

Spain has made two attempts to function as a nation under a republican form of government. "Both attempts was a great unsuccess," to quote a Spanish editor and one of the most intelligent newspapermen I have met in Europe. "Today it is so sad," he said, "that Spanish people regard the word 'Republican' as synonymous of terror, bloodshed and ruthless tyranny."

The last attempt at republican government ended in 1936 in a cruel civil war.

The King had been overthrown and a republican form of government set up in 1931. Immediately the Russians moved in and sent Moscow trained Spaniards into Madrid to get control of the labor unions.

An anti-church crusade was launched. Nuns and priests were humiliated; some arrested and tortured. The Socialists who are anti-Communist but opposed to the close tie-up that exists between church and state in Spain were treated as traitors.

The people who had rejoiced in the establishment of a republic began to realize that they had traded a monarchy for a Soviet dictatorship.

The elections to be fraudulent. They in compromise, kept ten of the portfolios in government and gave the opposition three. Finally this offer was accepted and a coalition government was formed.

It was a makeshift government, beset with strife and bitterness. In midsummer Calvo Sotelo, president of the Cortes (parliament), was kidnapped on the night before he was to have made an important speech to the Cortes.

He was seized at his home by Communist soldiers and later assassinated. This as an act of brutal suppression unheard of even in Spain. It blew the lid off and civil war broke out. The Communists were still in control of the police and the army. They

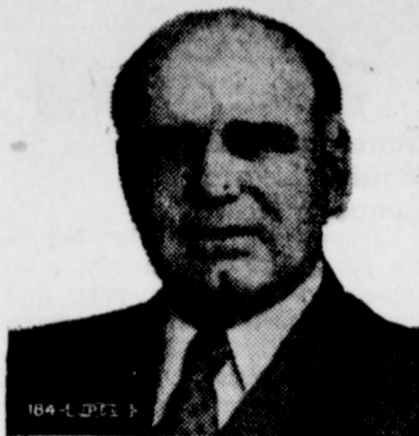

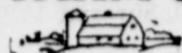

Cotton Insects

Resent rains will probably make insects more abundant in the cotton fields. Ample moisture will cause the cotton to put on fruit and will help develop the fruit, but a lot of the squares may be stung by boll weevils.

I am listing three cotton insect control measures, either of which will control the boll weevil and thrips.

1. 20% Texephene dust.
2. 5½ DDT and 3% Gama BHC
3. Chlordane dust containing 5% DDT, 40% sulphur and 10% Chlordane.

The third insecticide has been used on thrips and gave good control. It is available in Gatesville, and already mixed to apply at the rate of 10 lbs per acre.

Farmers should keep in mind that the three most effective insecticides of cotton are Toxephene, Benzene Hexachloride or BHC, and Chlordane. Any cotton dust containing one of these three used in the proper amount should be effective.

Winter Pastures

Farmers are urged to give attention to the planting of early winter pastures. In planning a winter pasture give attention to the following:

1. Preparation of the soil.
2. Fertilizer.
3. Kind of Grain and legumes.

The preparation of the soil should start early in the summer and grain should be planted on a firm seed bed, and as early after the first of September as possible. Plant grain that can withstand the severe winters. This means barley, rye or wheat. Vetch and winter peas withstand the winter freeze better than hubam clover. Thirty pounds of rye and ten lbs. of vetch will be the correct seeding of this grain and legume. Fertilize the grain with 200 pounds of superphosphate and 50 pounds of 32% ammonium nitrate. Since ammonium nitrate is hard to find you might have to use 16-20-0. 150 pounds of this fertilizer will give good results. Remember in a winter pasture you want quick growth and heavy growth. Fertilizer helps to give both.

Goes To Fort Worth

The County Agent will go to Fort Worth Friday with a livestock judging team composed of Melvin Hempel of Copperas Cove, Irvin Curt Apel of Plainview, and Clarence Smith of Arnett. Dr. Harris of the Harrisdale Hereford Farm will furnish the livestock for the judging, and serve the boys a barbecue lunch. These boys will compete with other boys in 25 different counties in North Texas. The results of the judging will be in next week's issue of this paper.

County Agricultural Agent Graham, and 9 4-H Club boys are leaving next Thursday for Lake Brownwood for the annual encampment of the 4-H Club boys in District 8. This district includes 18 counties, from Falls County on the south to Palo Pinto County on the north. Around 200 boys are supposed to be registered at this encampment.

Farm News Superphosphate For Winter Legumes: Requests Now

Farmers who are planning to use superphosphate on winter legumes (vetch, winter peas and clovers) seeded this fall may make requests for prior approvals on the phosphate at the local ACA office now, according to Clois D. Stone, administrative officer. The County Committee will begin issuing prior approvals and purchase orders on the phosphate within the next few days, Stone said, but that the ACA had not yet received any information as to the cost or the ACA payment rates on the winter legumes.

Marketing quotas on the 1948 crop of peanuts was suspended, Stone also advises. However, the Department of Agriculture is requiring that all acreages be measured so that accurate records will be available if quotas are in effect on peanuts in future years. Any farmer having peanuts and who has not notified the ACA of fice should do so immediately as the measurement work is about completed.

Prior approvals issued on Hubam Clover this spring are to be turned back in as soon as a good growth has been obtained says Stone. He also reminds the farmers that the clover seed may be harvested by combine, but all the growth is to be left on the land or turned under, and is not to be grazed off or baled for hay.

The Coryell County grain sorghum loan rate under the Support Price Program has been set at \$2.38 per 100 pounds on sorghums grading No. 2 or better, according to a telegram received by the ACA office this week.

Farmers desiring to obtain a loan on their grain sorghum should contact the ACA office for details.
