From Draft Board Chairman Roger Miller, we get this information for prospective 'registrees' and 'draftees' who will be required to register, August 30 and later.



On August 15, 1914, the Panama Railroad steamship Ancon left her dock at Cristobal and headed southeast into the biggest ditch ever made by man. Great locks lifted the vessel in to Gatun Lake. It passed the Continental Divide, through Gail ard Cut and was lowered through Pedro Miguel and Milaflores locks to sea level once more. Nine hours and forty minutes after leaving Cristobal the Ancon was afloat on the Pacific and the Panama Canal was opened. The historic voyage climaxed more than 400 years of effort to unite the Atlantic and Pacific oceans by ship channel, across the narrow isthmus joining North and South America.


