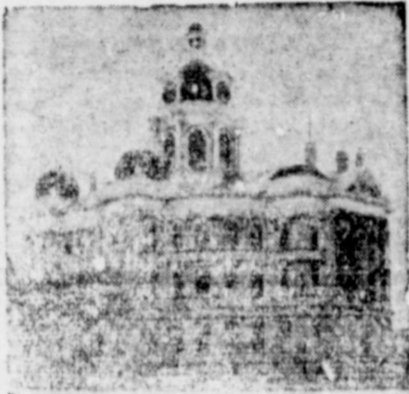

Technician Fifth Grade, James P. Tubbs, who was killed in action at Waterfangen on the Saar River in Germany, December 15, 1944, will be brought back for burial.



Funeral services will be held Sunday, following the arrival of his body on Saturday, at the Osage Baptist church at 3 o'clock, with the Rev. C. A. Morton conducting the services, Lee of McGregor, Funeral Directors, in charge, interment will be in the Crawford cemetery.

He became a member of the church at the age of 15. He was employed at Bluebonnet Ordnance Plant when he volunteered for service, January 26, 1943, and received all his basic training at Camp Swift, near Austin.

He was married to Miss Billie Louise Aycock of Temple, in June 1943 while in training.

He embarked for oversea duty October 22, 1943, and landed in England and crossed the English Channel with General George Patton's Army June 16 as a part of the Third Army.

He is survived by his wife, his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Tubbs of Coryell City, three brothers and five sisters. One brother, Clifford M. Tubbs is a Second Class Yeoman in the U. S. Here's Gist of New Draft Regulations: Begins Aug. 30th

From Draft Board Chairman Roger Miller, we get this information for prospective 'registrees' and 'draftees' who will be required to register, August 30 and later.

Mr. Miller said Tuesday he was trying to arrange with the various postmasters of the county to handle the registration in their part of the county. Registration will be from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. August 30.

Here's the schedule for registration:

Persons born in the year 1929 after August 30, 1922, shall be registered on Monday, the 30th day of August, 1948.

(b) Born in 1923, register Tuesday, August 31, or Wednesday, September 1.

(c) Born in 1924, register, on Thursday, Sept. 2, or Friday, 3d.

(d) Born in 1925, register, Saturday, Sept. 4, or Tuesday, 7th.

(e) Born in 1926, register Wednesday, Sept. 8, or Thursday, 9th.

(f) Born in 1927, register Friday, Sept. 10 or Saturday, 11th.

(g) Born in 1928, register on Monday, Sept. 13th or Tues. 14th.

(h) Born in 1929, register on Wednesday, Sept. 15, or Thurs. 16

(i) Born in 1930, register Friday, Sept. 17, or Saturday, 18th.

(j) Born on or after September 19, 1930, shall be registered on the day they attain the eighteenth anniversary of the day of their birth.

According to the Act, and Proclamation by the Governor of Texas, exceptions are commissioned officers, warrant officers, pay clerks, enlisted men, and aviation cadets of the Regular Army, the Navy, the Air Force, the Marine Corps, the Coast Guard, the Coast and Geodetic Survey, and the Public Health Service; cadets, U. S. Military Academy, midshipmen, U. S. Navy; cadets, U. S. Coast Guard Academy; members of the reserve components of the armed forces, the Coast Guard and the Public Health Service, while on active duty, and foreign diplomatic representatives, technical attaches of foreign embassies and legations, consuls general, consuls, vice consuls and other consular agents of foreign countries and persons in other categories to be specified by the President, residing in the United States, and who have not declared their intention to become citizens of the United States.

Mr. Miller stated he had not yet located a place to open the draft office, and that it would remain open all week, and one clerk be employed to remain in the office at all times.

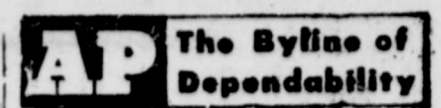

2,000 TUBERCULAR HOSPITAL AT TYLER

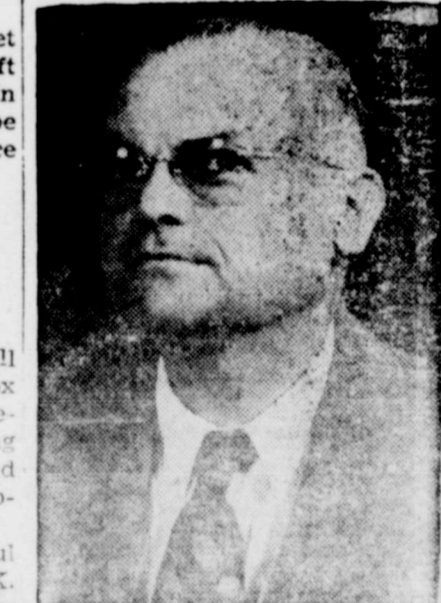



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This Week in History
 AUGUST 15 to 21

On August 15, 1914, the Panama Railroad steamship Ancon left her dock at Cristobal and headed southeast into the biggest ditch ever made by man. Great locks lifted the vessel in to Gatun Lake. It passed the Continental Divide, through Gailard Cut and was lowered through Pedro Miguel and Miraflores locks to sea level once more. Nine hours and forty minutes after leaving Cristobal the Ancon was afloat on the Pacific and the Panama Canal was opened. The historic voyage climaxed more than 400 years of effort to unite the Atlantic and Pacific oceans by ship channel, across the narrow isthmus joining North and South America.

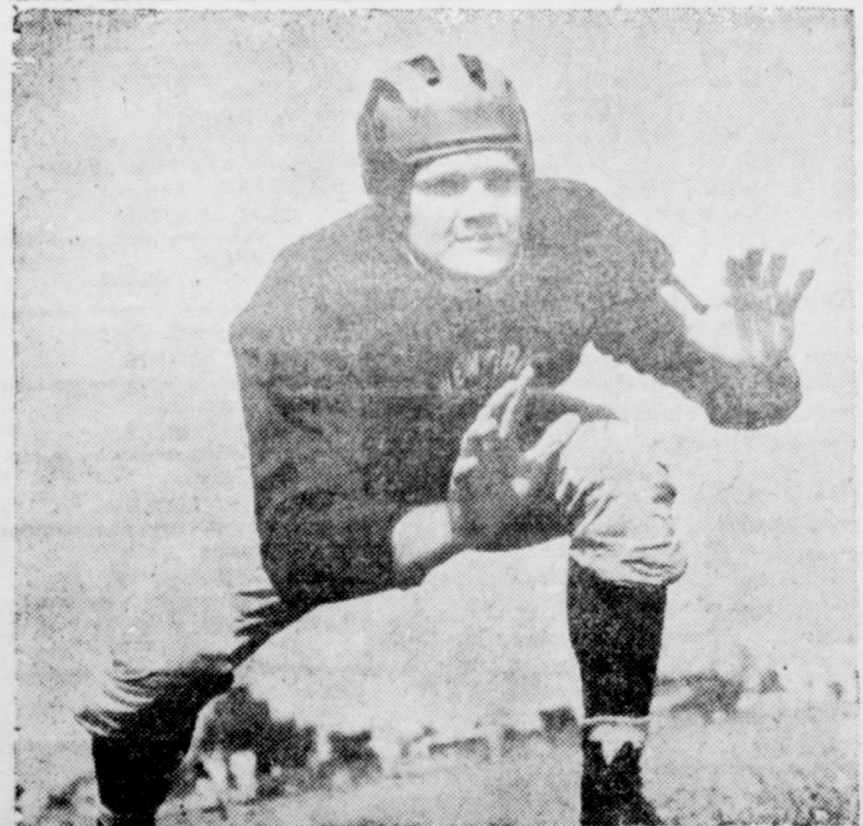
