Della Dianne Scott Is Killed When Struck by Pick-up

Della Dianne Scott, 5, was killed almost instantly about 4:30 Wednesday afternoon near Hartwick's Grocery on North Lutterloh on Highway 36, near the north edge of Gatesville, when hit by a pick-up truck driven by Boone Patterson, of near Gatesville.

Witnesses of the accident, said the child's grandmother, Mrs. E. A. Bradford, and an older daughter, Donna Lu Scott had been to Hartwick's Grocery, and were walking across the highway toward the Bradford home. Both Mrs. Bradford and Donna Lu managed to get clear the truck, but Della Dianne, was struck head-on by the truck, and thrown some distance south, landing off the pavement about ten feet. She had been eating candy, and the candy wrappers were scattered along the highway.

Mr. Wendeborn, of the Gulf Service Station nearby, said he called the ambulance, and by the time he got back to the child she was breathing her last. It was reported that the pickup was going rather fast, it, going south and the others walking northwest toward the Bradford home.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Scott's Funeral Home, with Rev. C. A. Morton conducting the services, interment was in the Masonic Cemetery. Morton Scott & Son, Funeral Directors, in charge.

THE GALLOU POLL: OHIO STAYS WITH DEWEY AND BOOSTS HIS MARGIN

PRINCETON, N. J., Sept. 18.—Ohio, a state which Gov. Thomas E. Dewey carried in the 1944 presidential election by a fraction of one per cent, is today in the Republican column by a fairly wide margin.

Interviewers throughout Ohio have put the following question to a cross-section of the state's voting population:

"If the presidential election were being held today how would you vote—for Truman, for Dewey or for Wallace?"

Ohio is the seventh state to be reported in the institute's series of reports on political sentiment in the individual states. The series has brought out the following facts so far:

1. Governor Dewey is leading today in five of the seven states—New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, California and Ohio. President Truman leads in one, Missouri, and Gov. J. Strom Thurmond, States' Rights party candidate, in one, South Carolina.

2. Except for New York, Henry A. Wallace, Progressive party candidate, polls a comparatively low

Its sole aim is to save \$700,000,000 worth of property and the more than 10,000 lives that fire now consumes each year. Its goal, therefore, is to make this a safer, happier and richer country.

vote in all the states thus far reported. His strength varies from less than 1 percent in South Carolina and 3 per cent in Ohio, Pennsylvania and New Jersey, to 14 per cent in New York. In New York his candidacy, by splitting the Democratic vote, throws the state to Gov. Dewey today. In the other states, if Wallace were to drop out and if all his votes were to go to Mr. Truman, Dewey's lead in those states would still not be overcome.

3. The Thurmond threat to the Democrats in the South can be seen by the large popular vote majority for Governor Thurmond in his home state of South Carolina, where he outpolls President Truman today 2 to 1.

4. Although election day is less than two months off, approximately one voter in ten continues to be undecided about his choice of candidate. Some of these undecided did not vote in the last presidential election, but among those who did vote last time the majority voted democratic. If they do the same this year when they make up their minds it will be a factor favorable to Mr. Truman.

Today's poll percentages on Ohio would, with the undecided vote eliminated, read Dewey 54 per cent, Truman 42 per cent, and Wallace 4 per cent. This compares with a vote in the 1944 presidential election in Ohio of 50.2 per cent for Dewey and 49.8 per cent for Franklin D. Roosevelt.

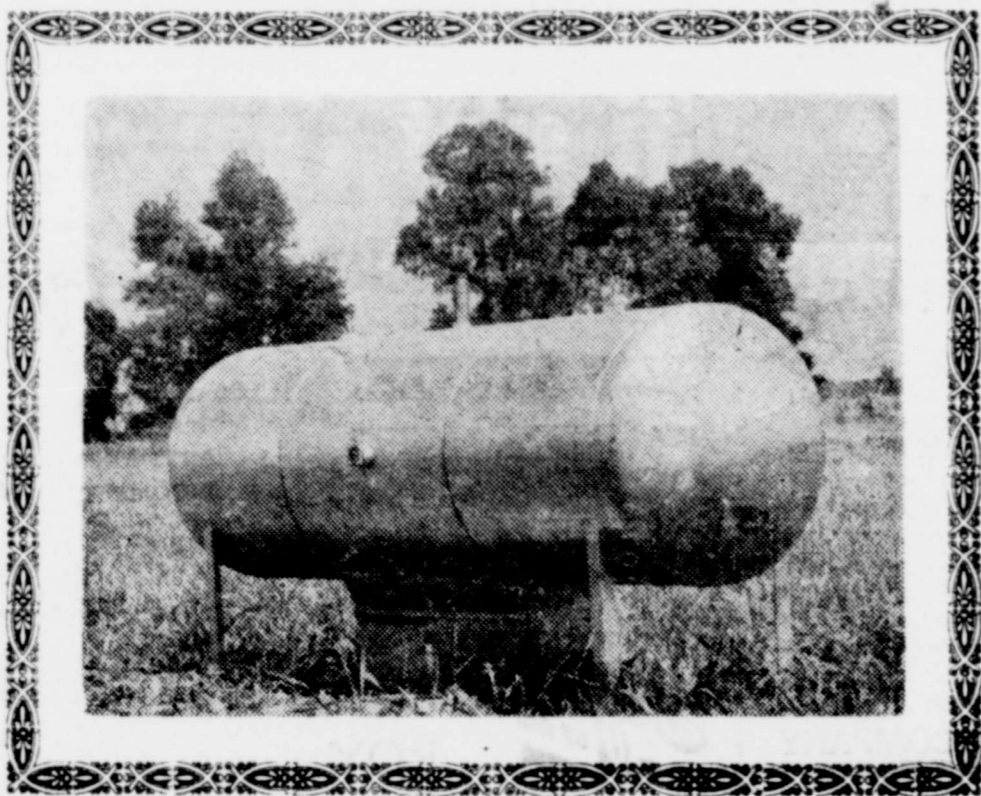

EX-CORYELLITE, 80 YEARS OLD TO HOP FIRST PLANE FOR SANTA FE

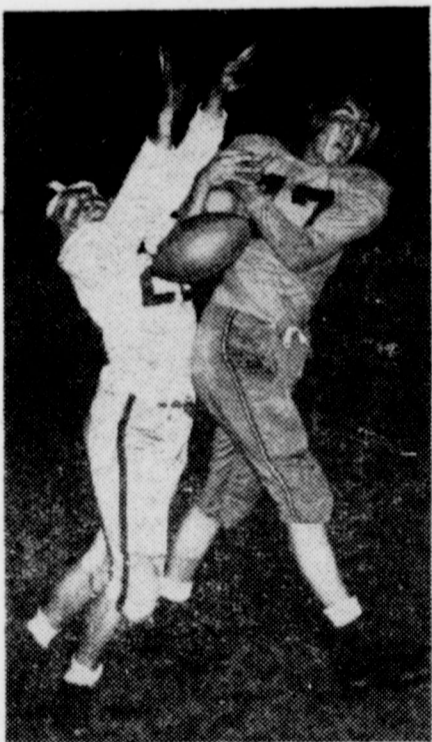
