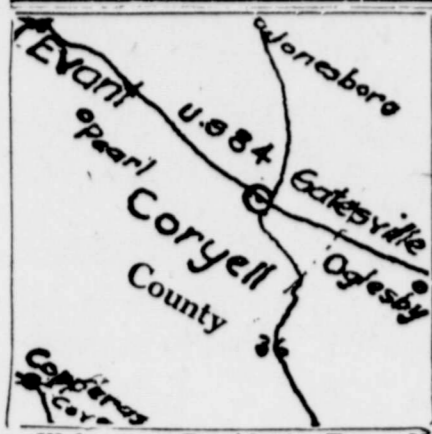


Central Texas Fox Hunters "WELCOME" 17th-20th Here!

Poultry Show Is Set For December 1 to 4: Is Recognized Show

Gatesville is getting set for a Poultry Show, which will be held somewhere in Gatesville, December 1, 2, 3, and 4.

This was outlined Thursday morning of last week when the Agricultural Committee of the Chamber of Commerce met with President W. Dawson Cooper at the Chamber of Commerce Office in the City Hall.

Those on the Committee were Otha Johnson, Eddie Winfield, J. J. Bates, Tom Freeman and W. P. Graham.

As yet, the judge for the show has not been named, as he must be a member of the American Poultry Council.

Pens have been secured from Temple, and entry blanks have been mailed to 250 poultry raisers all over Central Texas.

The 38 sets of chickens given to FFA boys will be brought back, and judged, and the boys and girls turn back to the Chamber of Commerce which furnished the chicks, one rooster and four pullets to be auctioned at the show, which will help finance it, and the next year's show. There were fifty chicks given to 38 different individuals.

The committee, so far, is at a loss as to where to hold the show, but it will be in a central location, convenient to poultry raisers all over the country.

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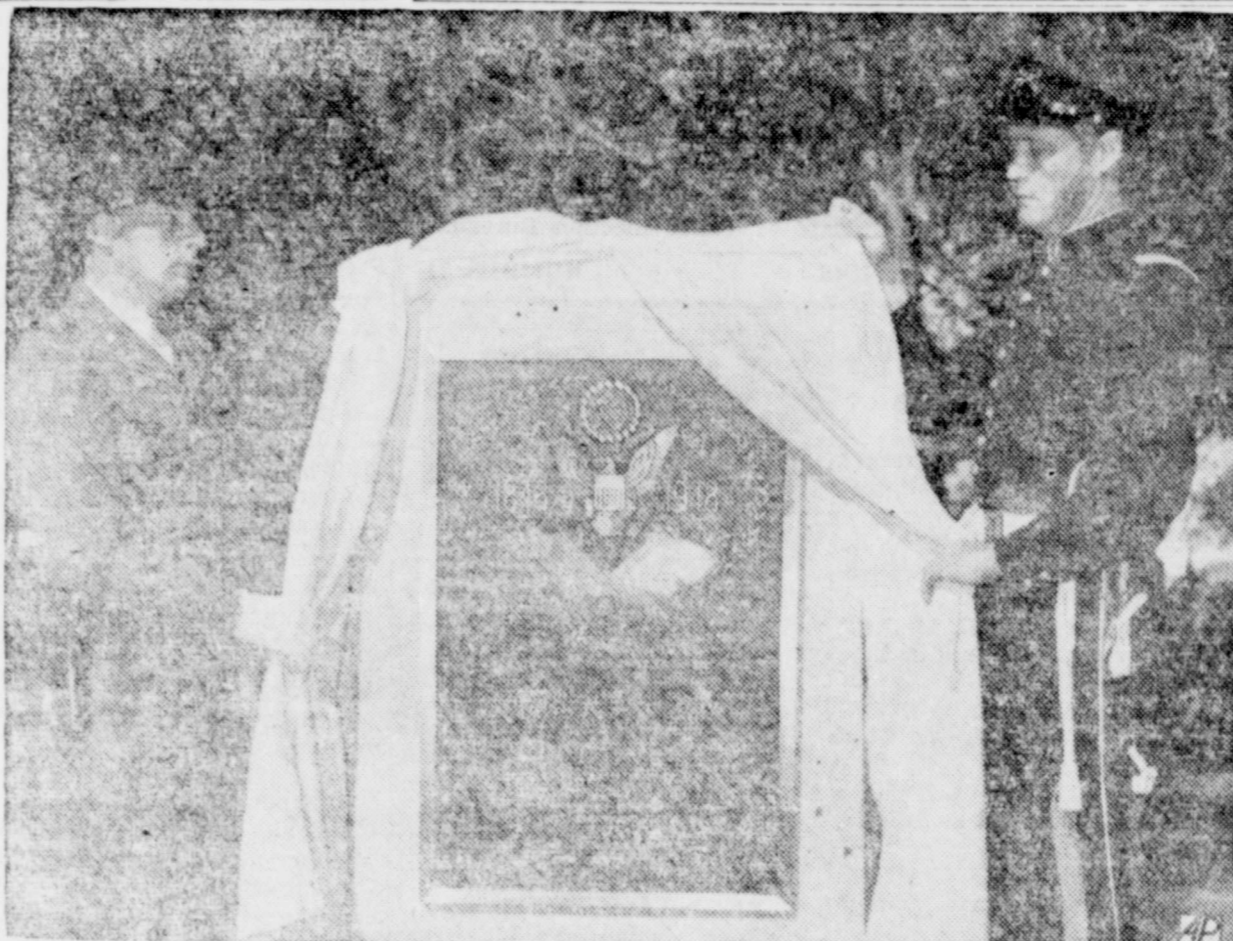
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UNVEIL TABLET AT FORT BLISS

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Hornets "Fritter Away" Game: Cow Bell Comes Home -- Tie

SOME CRIPPLES, SOME, TOO MANY HOLIDAYS, SOME, SOMETHING ELSE

This game didn't rate much space. Maybe, they were stale, but no, they hadn't played in over a week. Maybe, they were "overrested" maybe, not. Something was the matter, and even tho the Cow Bell came back home, we couldn't see too much in the annual Armistice Day football game between Hamilton and Gatesville to be particularly proud of, if anything.

'Tis true, Davidson made a couple of sashays for long touchdowns only to step out of bounds on the first, and a clipping penalty by a teammate queered the other marker. But, overlooking this, there was not much football played on the black and gold side of scrimmage, but those Hamilton Bulldogs did a nice job, and only a gracious tie, an "immoral victory" gave Gatesville fans any satisfaction.

Just about the first play after the kickoff, Davidson scampered 83 yards for a marker, but in so doing, stepped out on the 45, so it was brought back. Then, with all the backfield carrying, they carried it down to the 13, where Davidson fumbled and Leeth recovered for Hamilton.

McCollum, from there, quick-kicked across the goal, 60 yards, and it was the Hornets on their own 20. And Davidson punted out on the Hamilton 37.

McCollum, mixing passes, Leeth and his own running carries the ball right down into Hornet territory, and following a 1st D. on

the Hornet 6, McCollum passes over center shortly after the second period started for 6. and Wilson's kick is good.

And it's seesaw until middle of the 2nd period, until Davidson carries at left, and drops ball after picking up 12, and Leeth pounces on it on the Hamilton 46, then, he puts it on the Hornet 43, then McCollum on the 3d down, makes it 1st D., the Hornets lose 5 on a penalty, and then Leeth carries at left end for touchdown for another marker, and Roberts blocks Wilson's kick for extra. Wow! It's Hamilton 13, Gatesville 0.— That was the scoring for the first half.

In the 3rd quarter, after the Hornets had received and were forced to kick, then, Leeth carried, fumbled, and Davidson recovered on the Hamilton 47. He then puts it on the Hamilton 26, Daniels spins 8 yards to the 16, Painter gets 1, and Davidson goes to 6, Painter makes 1, Daniels makes 3 for 1st D. and then the touchdown by Daniels.

There was a high and wide wind from the South, and with Hamilton leading 13-0, the quarterbacking chose to try for the extra, of all things, with a kick, which missed. It was then, Hamilton 13, Hornets 6. They HAD to convert on the next, if one, to even tie.

Hornets kick short, and Painter recovers on the Hamilton 43, they are stopped and Davidson kicks out, 29 yds. on the 10, and Freeman quickkicks to Davidson on the 50, returns to Hamilton 40, and they can't go, and Davidson punts to Leeth on the 5, stopped by Collins and Brookshire on the 10, and the ball is in their possession on the 30, as the third quarter ends.

In the 4th, Hamilton loses 5, too much time, Freeman fakes 5. Painter stops, McCollum runs instead of kicking and the ball goes over on the 27. Daniels pitches to Davidson for 2, Davidson passes, incomplete, Daniels laterals to Davidson, losing 2. Spread. Davidson runs, stopped finally by Arbuckle on the 2 yd stripe, then, Daniels goes over for 6, and adds the extra at guard. The wind was at their BACK on this one.

Hornets kick to Williams on 45, trying for short kick again, Painter, breaks up interference and stops Rost for 3 yd loss, and then McCollum kicks to Davidson on 35, and he returns down sideline for touchdown. From about where he started, some Hornet clipped, and it cost 'em the touchdown and 15 more yards.

The rest of it didn't matter, except that they got on our 25, before Davidson recovered a fumble, and that's the ball game.

This Week in History

NOVEMBER 14 to NOVEMBER 20

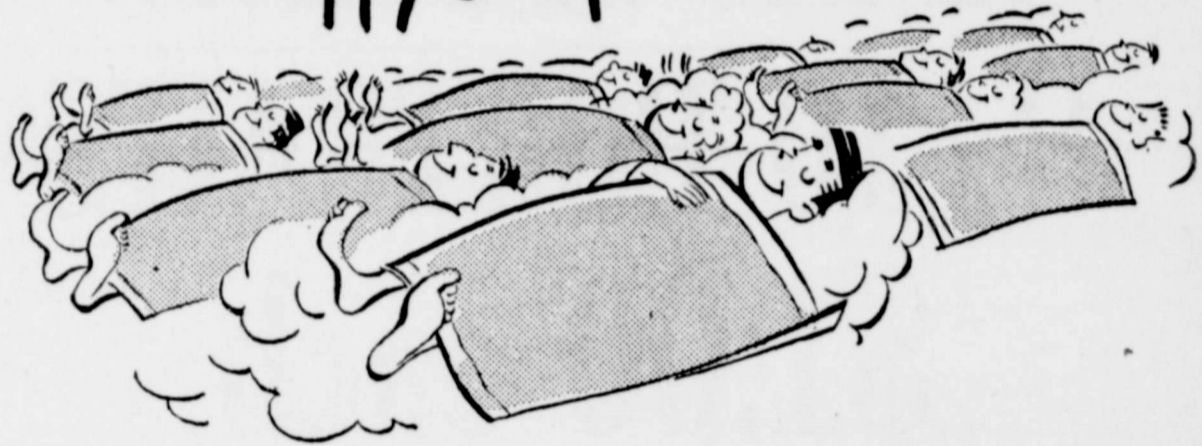
167 years ago this week on November 18, 1781, Louis Daguerre, a French painter and physicist, was born in Cormeilles, France. To him, goes much of the credit for the development of photography. Several men before Daguerre had produced photographic silhouettes of objects but unless kept from the light, they darkened and isappeared. Daguerre found that a silver plate exposed to vapor of iodine became sensitive to light and that he could develop his exposed silver plate by treating them with mercury and "fix" the image with sodium thiosulfate. The result was the daguerreotype, forerunner of the modern photograph.

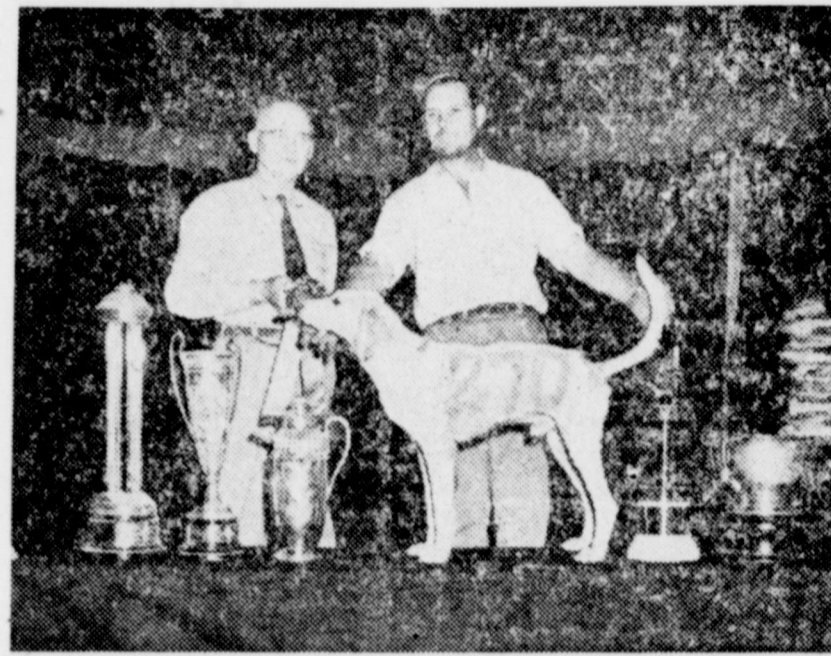

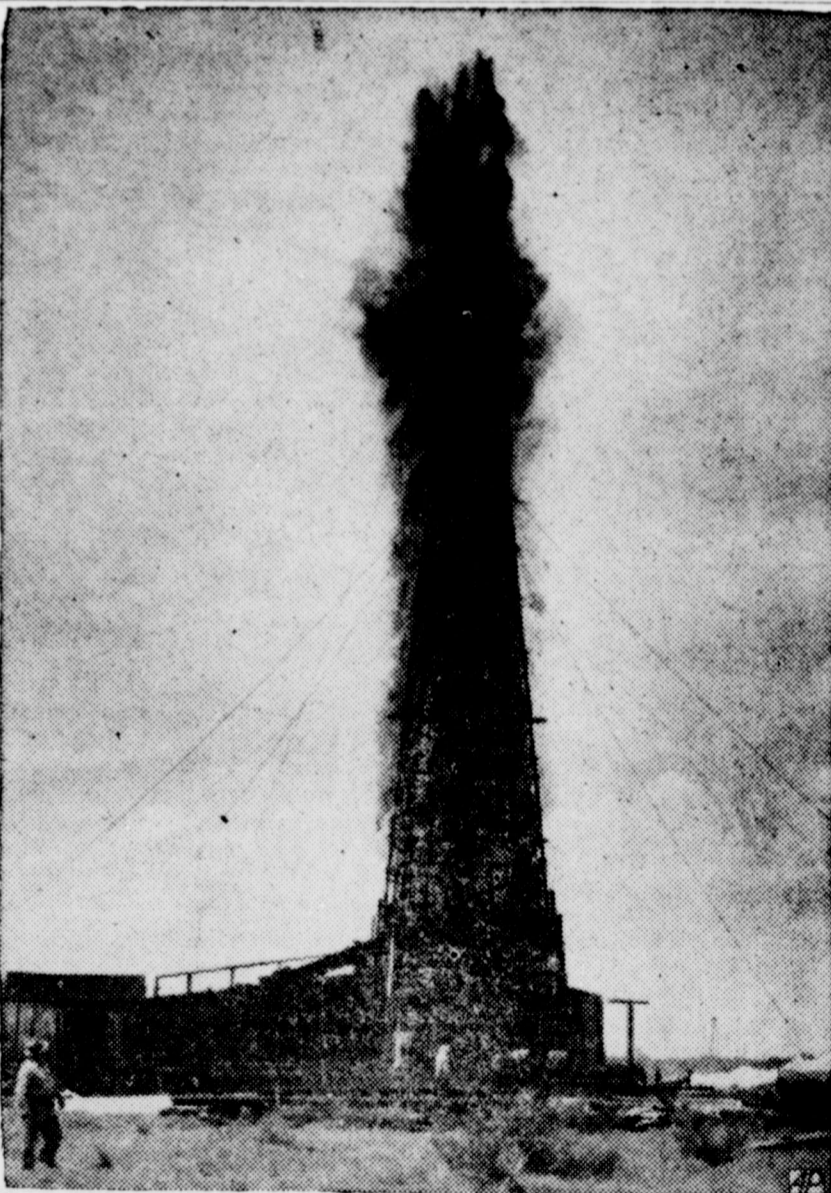

It's All In The Stuffig, Sayn Taxidermist

DENVER, Colo.—A large rather foolish looking lion is thinking about a very happy date with that little buff-colored flirt who lives just across the veldt.

A big game hunter balooms away from behind a tree and a .375 Magnum slug tears into the lion's dreams. He never knows what hit him.

Several months later Coloman Jonas, a taxidermist here for the past 40 years, receives a lumpy package. It contains a lion's skin and skeleton and body measurements. And according to Jonas, there is also enclosed a note from the sportsman, which reads: "This is my first lion and I am very proud of the kill. Please mount him crouched and ready to spring, with teeth bared. And for Pete's sake wipe that silly smirk off his face."



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HORSEBACK PREACHER

Every weekend for 54 years Benjamin Johnson Forbes has traveled by horse or buggy to fill guest preaching assignments in Parker or neighboring counties.

Jonas figures he's learned as much about people as he has about the other animals in the past four decades.

"All hunters of big game want me to put unpleasant expressions on the faces of animals they kill," he says. "I guess its because if the animal looks tough it makes the hunter feel even tougher."

The Jonas brothers (there are four besides Coloman, the eldest) have filled orders for Indian Maharajas, movie stars and statesmen. And they've done the same for delivery boys and filling station attendants. A steady customer of yesteryear was William S. Hart, old-time cinema cowpoke.

The brothers mounted a ten-ton elephant for the American Museum of Natural History in New York.

They mounted a one-ounce humming bird for a school girl.

A good lifelike job on an elephant can be had for \$10,000. The hummingbird comes considerably cheaper.

Kodiak bears are mounted for about \$1,000, a fact which possibly accounts for there being any number of leftover Kodiak bears in Alaska.

One of the trickiest angles in preparing animals with that look-I'm-breathing appearance is the coloring of the glass eyes. The eyes have to be right. Coloman illustrates this by holding Moore's eyes against the eye-sockets of a leopard. The leopard looks completely insane. The Jonases buy the clear glass orbs and have their coloring done here by secret process. Aside from meeting their own needs they've sold as many as 20,000 deer eyes alone to other taxidermists in a single year.

Lion's eyes are the toughest. The iris isa light delicately streaked yellow. There are odd rusty flecks in the iris and the pupil, to look sho nuff, must have a blue glint. Lions have round pupils, as do all the larger cats. Only the bobcat and domestic housecat have vertically-slitted pupils.

The North American deer views the world through strange oval-shaped pupils. Despite the poets, he doestn't own especially lovely eyes. To the contrary, they appear slightly goofy and unfocused.

the matron who staggers into the establishment with a dead dog asks that it be mounted.

Coloman explains: "They come in and cry over everything. They tell me how old the dog was and what cute tricks it used to do and what kind of food it liked best. Then they leave it with me.

"I measure it carefully, I weigh it. I feel sorry for the woman. I make a soft clay model of plastolene. I make a plaster cast from this model. Using the hard cast I press layer after layer of moist paper against it and around it. When finally it hardens I have a papie mache dog of the exact proportions of the dead pet. With great pains I skin the dog. Then I tan his hide and pull the hide over the papier mache form. Two days of painstaking work.

"The woman falls in love with a new dog that can shake hands and count to one. I never see the womann again. I never get my money. For security I'm holding a mounted mongrel which I don't even like the looks of."

The Jonas brothers also take a cloudy view of snakes.

Coloman tells of a colleague who once skinned a six-foot diamond-backed rattler with the help of an assistant. They ceased work at noon and sat down at a work bench to eat. About two sandwiches later the assistant loosed a howl that pinned ehe boss to his seat in a cold sweat. When the boss looked around he saw the skinless snake wriggling across the floor.

Two medical students some ten years ago offered the Jonas brothers the odd job to end all such.

They had a hide they wanted tanned. Not mounted, just tanned. They were rather vexed when the brothers declined. They left in a huff, saying they would take their business elsewhere.

"Like I told them," Coloman said, "we draw the line somewhere."

The hide was of a human.

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

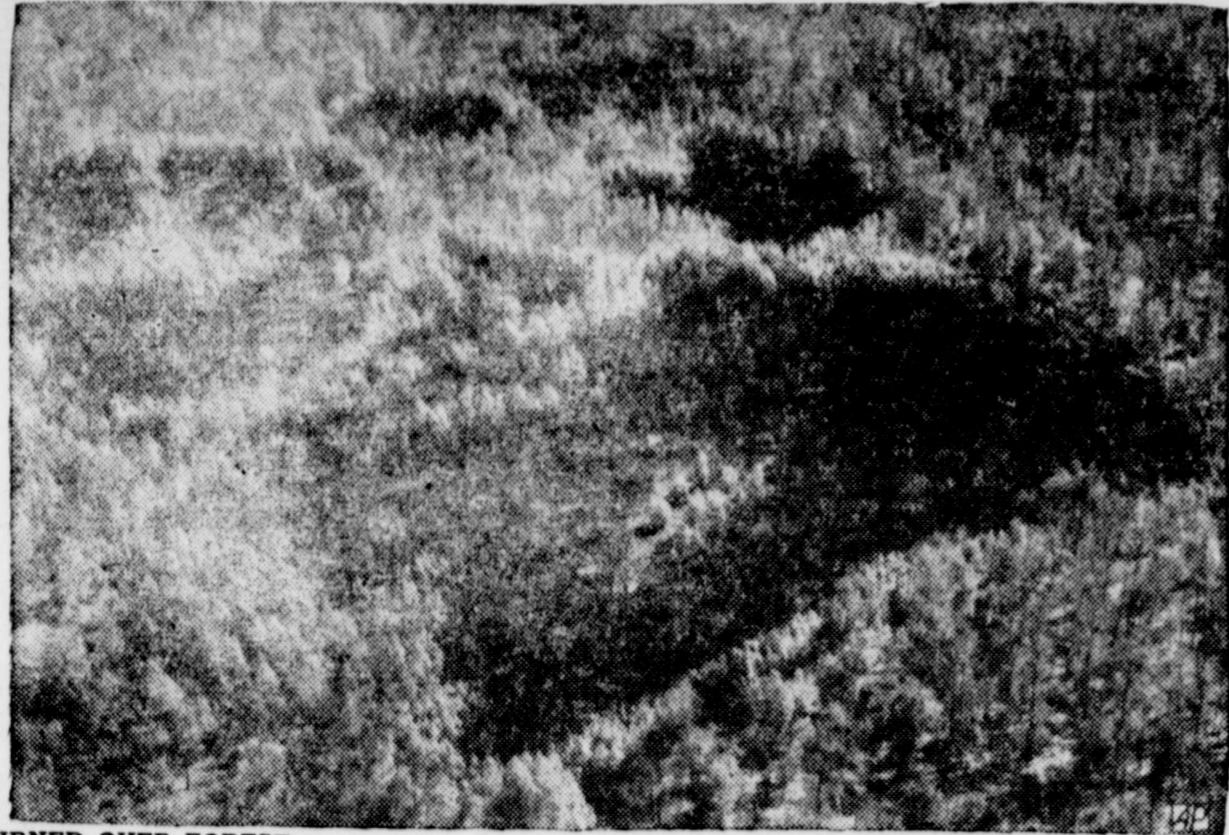

AUSTIN, Texas, November 13. A large majority of Texas adults think the United States should be ready to declare war immediately if the Russian army invades western Europe. Movement of the United States toward a military alliance with the Western European Union thus finds widespread support in this state's public opinion.

In its latest statewide survey, The Texas Poll finds only two out of every ten adults think it would be better to try to help Europe without going to war ourselves.

This is a complete reversal in the climate of opinion since the days before Pearl Harbor.

In October, 1941, three out of every four believed it was better not to declare war but to stay out and merely supply the countries fighting Germany. At that time, Hitler's armies had been on a rampage in Europe for more than a year.

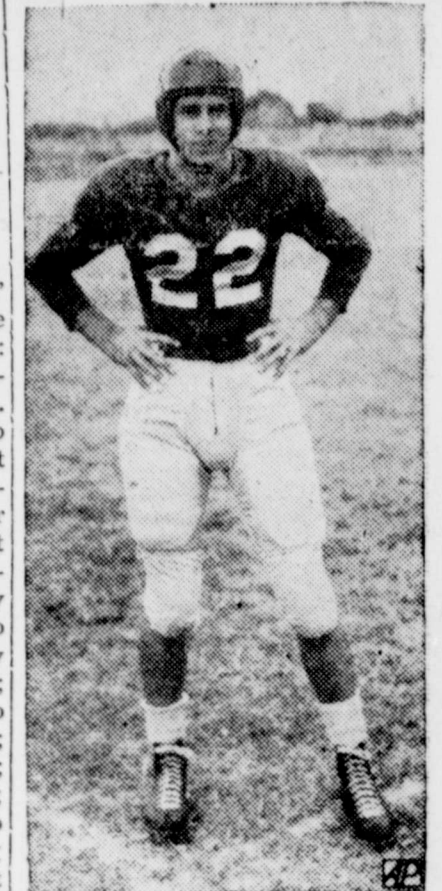
