ACA Committeemen To Be Elected Friday, December 10

Coryell County farmers will elect eligible farmers as their representatives under the 1949 PMA Farm Program, on Friday, December 10, 1948, advises Clois D. Stone, Administrative Officer.

Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. until 5:00 p. m. on Friday, December 10th, at the following places: Dalton's Garage in Oglesby; County Court Room in Gatesville; Masonic Hall in Turnersville; Travis Laxson's Store at Purlmela; Newton's Store in Pidcoke; and Tippit's Store in Flat. Ballots are being mailed out by the ACA office. These may be returned to the ACA office, by fail or in person, so long as they are received by the morning of December 9th, or they may be carried to the polling place on December 10th. Farmers who fail to receive a ballot may receive one at the ACA office or at the polling place.

In addition to electing community committeemen, each of the six ACA communities will elect a delegate to a county convention where a three-man county committee will be elected to serve during 1949. Committeemen and delegates must be selected from the list of farmers who have carried out a soil-building or soil-conserving practice under the 1949 program. However, every owner, operator, tenant and sharecropper and his wife may vote. Two names appear on the ballot for each office to be filled, along with blank space for a write-in. The nominees appearing on the ballots were selected by a nominating committee from each community. The farmer is to vote in the community in which his farm is located.

TOWN TO GET PURE WATER—IN 1950

AIGLE, Switzerland (AP)—The citizens of this little market town in the Rhone Valley are finally going to have drinking water free of tubercular germs.

For more than 30 years, the town of Aigle has protested against infected water released from the great tuberculosis sanatorium at Leysin, in the mountains above Aigle. A government analysis of drinking water drawn from springs at a lower level showed as long as 1915 that tubercular germs were present in the water.

At regular intervals for over 30 years, the Aigle town council has demanded that the Leysin authorities install a purification plant at the sanatorium. The work was never undertaken because of its prohibitive cost. The Leysin authorities have finally agreed to begin the erection of a purification plant by 1950.

Cooperator Cecil Dixon of the Ames Veteran group, purchased 300 pounds of native grass seed. The fixture contained about equal amounts of little bluestem,

big bluestem and Indian grass. This seed will be used to overseed range land cleared of cedar during the last year. Large amounts of native grass seed was harvested in Oklahoma this year. Some of the seed is available to cooperators of the district through local seed dealers. If you have been waiting for bluestem and Indian grass seed, take

advantage of seed now available. Keith Brooks of the Evant group had good success overseeding bulldozed range land 2 years ago and has made arrangements to seed additional acreage this winter. J. O. Brown of the Gatesville group plans to overseed 25 acres of buffalo grass to the higher producing bluestem and Indian grass. Marshall Joe Hanna has purchased 370 pounds of native bluestem mixture to be used in re-

seediny retired land. Henry Schroeder cooperator of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District, has recently completed approximately 1 1/4 m. of small channel type terraces. These terraces were constructed with heavy equipment belonginy to O. Y. Sullivan of Crawford. The terrace outlets will be sodded to bermuda grass to prevent erosion. The farm owned by Glenn Her-

man in the Pearl community and farmed by a Pearl veteran agricultural student has had approximately 2 1/2 miles of large ridge terraces constructed. These terraces were constructed by John Scott. The Pearl Veteran Class under the supervision of Curtis Maynard will sod the individual outlets to bermuda grass.

Floyd Elam cooperator of the district and in the Evant Veteran Class has had approximately 2 miles of small channel type terraces constructed. 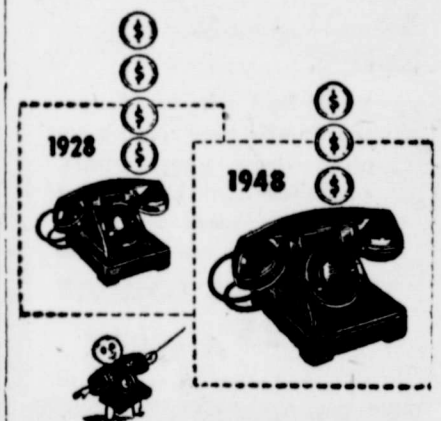
