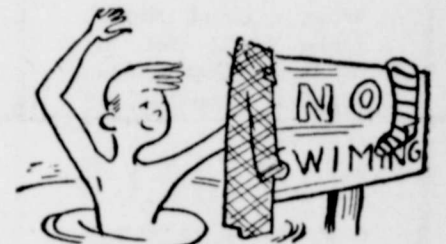

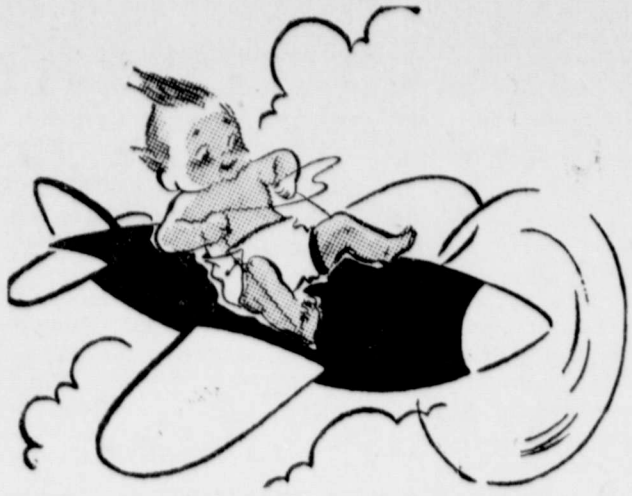

Wainwright Defends General King

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 30. (AP)—General Wainwright, retired war hero, today defended Lt. Gen. Edward King, one of his wartime subordinates, against charges that King surrendered Bataan against Wainwright's orders.

Last night, Army historian Louis Morton said in Seattle, King disobeyed orders to continue to defend Bataan. Also he reported fist fights among high ranking officers.

Wainwright said King had already "sent an officer with a white flag before he got direct orders from me to hold Bataan. He absolutely did not disobey me."

William E. Davis Jr., executive secretary, Tax Research Association of Houston and Harris County, Houston, pointed out some of the hidden taxes due to this overlapping of taxing powers.

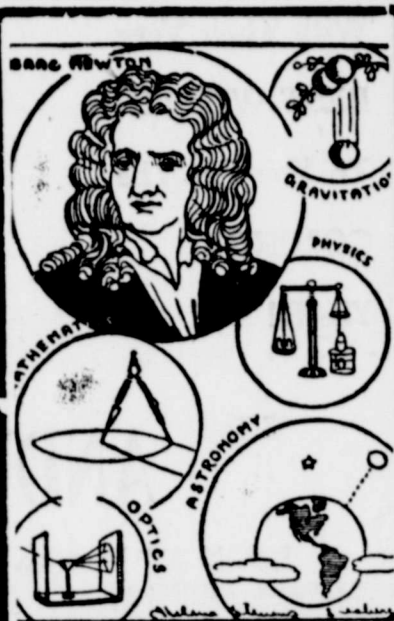
A bar of soap, he asserted, had 154 different taxes; woman's dress 125, shoes 126 and that a 20 cent package of cigarets included 10 cents in taxes.

Davis pointed out that 31 cents of each dollar went for taxes in 1947, compared to 28 cents in 1927 and eight cents in 1907.

More than 25 per cent of tax money is spent by the government the speaker declared.

Complexity of the taxing situation, Davis said, is indicated by 7,000 governmental units in the state of Texas alone.
