#### Chicken Fanciers To Show Chickens In Brownwood Show Today

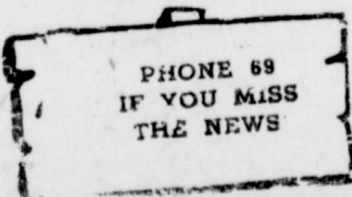

#### Jester Asks Dough For Small Town Schools

AUSTIN, January 17. (AP)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester today asked the Legislature for \$9,000,000 emergency appropriation for rural and small town schools.

Speedy passage of the first big money bill is predicted.

The Governor said enactment of this bill was a matter of first importance. He noted that funds would enable schools to "meet their full obligations for financing teachers' salaries". The Senate added 16 bills to its stockpile, including \$40,000,000 appropriation for rural roads.

A joint session of the Legislature counted votes declaring Jester, and Lieutenant Governor Allan Shivers reelected to office, prior to their formal inauguration tomorrow.

(Note: Maybe the Governor heard that the "walls of Jerusalem" were about to fall in Gatesville.)

#### Rent, Export Controls To Be On, Barkley

WASHINGTON, D. C. Jan. 17. (AP)—Vice-President-elect Alben Barkley said today after a conference with the President that Congress will act soon to extend rent and export controls.

Meanwhile, the President asked Congress for permanent authority to reorganize the Government.

#### Decision For \$1,000 Temporary Repairs Is Discarded: School Out

School is out for all the occupants of Gatesville Elementary School, at least, all those who occupied this-called "Elementary Building".

This was decided Monday morning, after another of the number of inspections by various engineers, school men, and technicians, covering a period of 5 years or more.

Friday, or late last week, some brick, mortar, etc., fell out of the building, and an inspector was called up from Austin, and, after inspection, an engineer was called out of Waco.

The Waco engineer said that for \$1,000 or more, the building could be "propped up" so that it was usable, but was not enthusiastic in his recommendations that it be used, or not used.

A decision was then reached by the school board, headed by Chairman O. N. Hix, and Superintendent L. C. McKamie, that school should be turned out for this week, and that the building be abandoned as dangerous to the lives of any and all occupants. More brick and mortar fell Monday morning.

Arrangements will be made to "farm out" the students (who, on the side) are going to enjoy this week's respite from school) in other buildings that may be obtained at various places in Gatesville.

So far, no definite announcement of these has reached the News, but Saturday morning, Superintendent McKamie contacted Rev. C. A. Morton of the First Baptist Church as to using the Church School Annex, and maybe other parts of the church plant.

It is possible a part of the First Methodist Church may be used, the City Hall and other available buildings.

What and when something will be done about a new building, since this one has been abandoned, was not stated, but the Board of Trustees have been called for a meeting Wednesday evening, and Superintendent McKamie mentioned a proposed "breakfast" Friday morning at the Junior High School cafeteria and then, a "tour" of the building to show the laymen of the town the condition of the school.

The building, built about 1906, would make the building approximately 43 years old, and that is rather ancient for a school building.

Noy, it seems, the school board has done what MUST be done, and, now, it's up to the patrons!

## Soil Conservation Chief Sights Permanent Agriculture Goal

H. H. Bennett, Chief of the Soil Conservation Service, said the margin between land deterioration and land conservation in the United States has been so narrowed that the goal of a permanent agriculture is in sight "if we but speed up our efforts".

Contributing to progress of the work he reviewed the past 15 years, and 1948 was still another record year of farm and range land conservation. That was 21 1/2 million acres on which soil conservation measures were applied or about 7 % more than the record year of 1947.

During the 15 years of Soil Conservation Service, more conservation work was done per employee than during the preceding year.

Increased experience on the part of Soil technicians, and increased experience and efficiency of the soil conservation districts and cooperating farmers, made it possible to increase the work load per man each year without sacrificing quality or thoroughness of the work done.

The 1948 accomplishments with a staff 17 percent less per soil conservation district than in 1947 brought to 571,163 the number of active conservation plans made in the districts since August, 1937, covering 157,751,642 acres. 1948's 109,673 plans covered 31,484,947 acres. The 21,576,654 acres treated last year brought the total acreage treated to 82,824,431.

There were 2,033 conservation districts in the 48 states, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands June 30, comprising 1,114,003,200 acres, and including about three-fourths of all the farms and two-thirds of the farmlands in the country.

Soil Conservation is now carried on in 49 foreign countries pattern-

ed after that of the SCS, and with 378 scientists or officials of 67 countries having come to the U. S. since 1942 to study SCS methods. By increasing present conservation operations the United States can overcome and control erosion within 20 to 30 years. He advanced seven recommendations for getting the conservation job done on time:

1. Set up a timetable for the establishment of those basic measures needed for the conservation of our soil and water resources, according to capability of the land and availability and need of water.
2. Adjust research in conservation to specific problems encountered in field work and intensify research on those problems.
3. Encourage and promote a comprehensive program of conservation education through all available educational agencies and institutions.
4. Complete land capability surveys of the country and analyze the information to provide land facts needed for future farm planning and action.
5. Recognize and use land capabilities in making production adjustments and in developing other agricultural programs.
6. Encourage continued organization of soil conservation districts, in order to develop conser-

vation programs with local leadership and direction.

7. Improve the conservation credit structure.

**SCS Says \$62,500 In Soil Work To Be Done In County In 1949**

Soil Conservation practices which Coryell County farmers can complete in 1949, will bring in \$62,500, and these have been approved this past week by the County ACA Committee.

The original soil-building allotment was \$79,500, but the committee has already approved \$17,000 to go to the farmers who seeded winter legumes and rye grass last fall as part of the 1949 program.

Here are the usual practices that draw compensation: a. Construction of terraces with proper outlets and waterways. b. Construction of diversion ditches. c. Construction or enlarging drainage ditches for draining cropland pasture. d. Elimination of cedar on non-crop pasture land or range land. e. Establishing or improving permanent pastures by seeding pasture grasses or legumes. f. Leaving on land or turning under a good stand and growth of Summer legumes seeded or cultivated land. g. Applying superphosphate to Summer legumes and legumes seeded this fall. h. Establishing a satisfactory cover of adapted biennial sweet clover.

Applications are being taken at the ACA office of these practices and Clois Stone, Administrative Officer emphasizes a farmer must secure an approval from the coun-

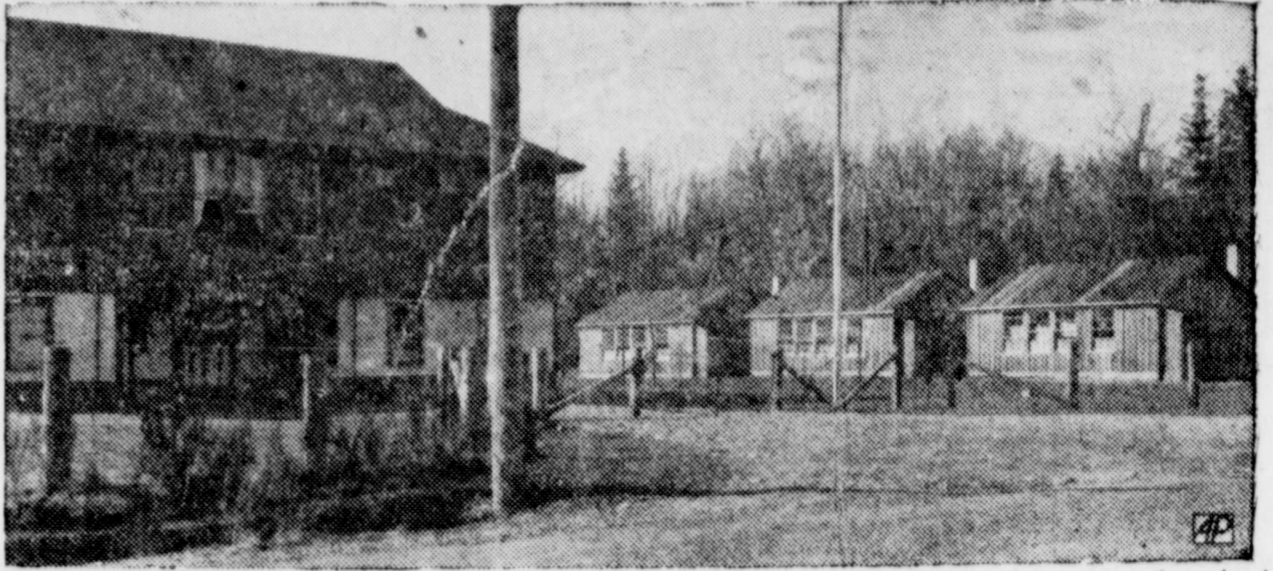

## The Texas Poll The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, January 15.—  
The question now who is going to  
run for governor next year is al-

ready being discussed by political  
observers. At least three high-  
state officials are represented by  
their friends as almost sure to be  
in the race.

Barring unforeseen circumstan-  
ces, Lieutenant Governor Allen  
Shivers, Attorney General Price  
Daniel, and Railroad Commission-  
er Olin Culberson are said to be  
certain candidates.

What are their relative chances  
of being elected? The answer to  
that question will depend upon  
how well they become known be-  
fore the election and how well  
they are regarded by the voting  
public. Intense campaigns no  
doubt will be waged by the can-  
didates to sell themselves to the  
public.

Now, one year before the cam-  
paign begins, Shivers, Daniel, and  
Culberson can bank on the fact

that less than half of the public  
can identify them. A statewide  
survey shows Shivers with a slight  
edge, but all three have almost an  
equally big job of telling the pub-  
lic the mere facts of who they  
are and what they do.

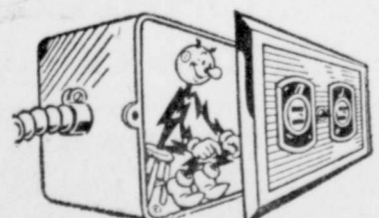
The Texas Poll discovered this  
situation by putting the names of  
the three men before a statewide  
cross section of 1,000 adults and  
asking this question:  
"Can you tell me what each of

these men does, or 'who he is?'"

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**Chooses Rodeo As Her Life Career**

So you'd like to be a rodeo queen? Well, take a tip from 19-year-old Audrey Ashby, it's mighty hard work. Audrey, who happens to be pretty and brown-eyed besides being a beautiful rider, was recently picked as Eastern Rodeo Queen.

The prime requisite for a rodeo career is to like horses, says Audrey. She started riding when she was three, could ride bareback at the age of five. It helps if your family likes horses, too, she says. Her father rode bucking horses and was a pick-up man (helped get other men off their bucking horses). Her mother used to do the square dance on horseback in shows.

Audrey for the last 7 years has been in shows, east and west, though intermittently.

"Horses are in my blood and rodeo is going to be my career. I've given up the idea of being an airline hostess, the only other career that ever appealed to me."

In the show at the Garden, she was a Roman rider (she uses two horses, rides with a foot placed

on each).

The horses must be good reigning horses—gentle so you can drop around them without being kicked, she explains.

At present she is using a three-year-old colt and a six-year-old horse for her act and while they are the same height and have the same gait (which is essential) they are not twins.

This year Audrey and her family are foving from their Elizaville, N. Y., ranch to one in Arizona. There she is training a pair of twin colts.

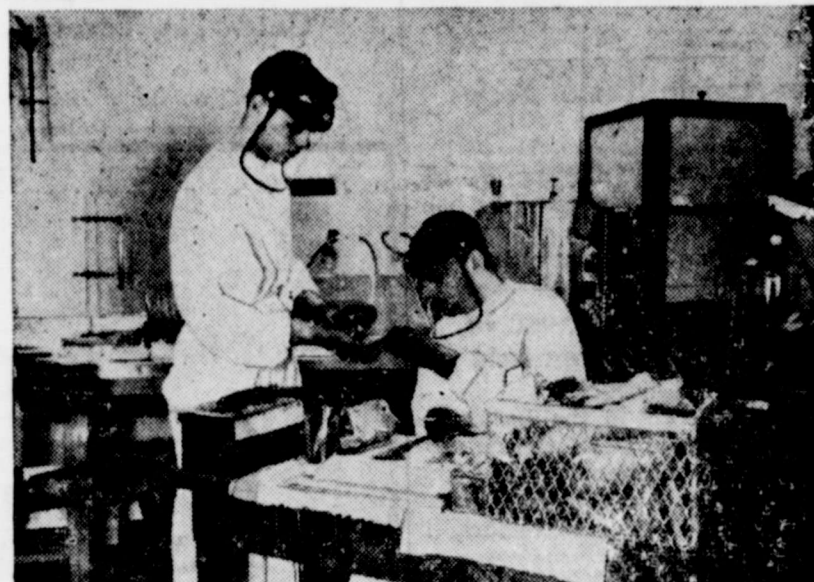
This is not as easy as it sounds. In the first place you must know something about selecting the horses. Tennessee walking horses, she says, have three gaits—flat walk, running walk and canter. The five-gaited English type horse is a show horse. But it is Western stock horses that Audrey will train for the job.

She will train them on calf-roping and bull-dogging (steer wrestling). The calf roping is more important to teach the horse control, she says.

Horses are like people, Audrey says. You must learn to understand their personalities. No two are exactly alike.
