Hoover Denounces "Propagandists"

WASHINGTON, D. C., February 7. (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover today denounced what he called drives by "Propagandists" to exempt some agencies from government reorganization plans.

Hoover told the Senate Expenditures Committee "propagandists" are inside, and outside the government and that "they (Army Engineers) have mobilized their agency, friends and have prejudiced the case before Congress has had a chance to see the evidence." Earlier, Hoover's governmental reorganization commission sent Congress a report for broad new powers for the president over his official family. The report proposed vast reshuffling squeeze of 65 agencies into a group one-third that size.

"Mysie" Winning Shorthorn Bred At Crews Ranch In Haigler, Nebraska

A young Coryell County rancher's Shorthorn Steer outtops all farmers in Texas at the Houston Fat Stock Show, and wins the Grand Championship Steer of the show, which besides the honor gets a stipend of \$13,500.00. This was Seth Turner of Purlmela, 20-years old, and his Shorthorn won the honors over an expected Hereford winner from Goldthwaite.

We don't have the "history" of this proud piece of cowflesh, and would like to, including the up-keep, etc., until showing time.

"Mysie" according to stories released from Houston was bred by the Crews Ranch at Haigler, Nebraska, and is one of 20 head of registered Shorthorns, but Turner declined to say what he paid for the champion as a calf and did not know what it cost to feed the steer.

Glenn McCarthy, oilman, newspaper publisher and Houston Hotel owner made the high bid when "Mysie" was placed on the auction block along with other prize

winning steers of the 17th annual exposition.

Central Texas has been highly honored by the Houston show, since Melvin Reynolds, 16, of Goldthwaite, had the reserve champion, a Hereford, Maurice Norhem 13, of Belton, had the grand champion barrow which brought \$1,201. 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CHAPTER II

THE SUNKEN MIDDENS OF LEON RIVER

Some very interesting remains, left by antecedent races of men, who occupied this section of Texas in a very ancient time, are found buried under several feet of alluvial deposits in the Leon River Valley. These remains, in our estimation, have not received the attention they deserve from skilled archeologists, and we have called this to the attention of the Central Texas Archeology Society. It is believed that beneath the alluvial deposits of this section of the Leon River Valley are remains that are of great interpretive value, and that when found, will be of great value to science in assisting to establish a proper chronology for man's occupancy of this valley.

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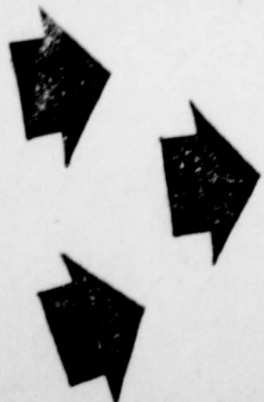
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The ordinary "collector archeologist" would be out of place here; for the few artifacts found, after long and laborious search, would have their chief value as corroborative evidence in connection with other observations from which truly scientific deductions may be drawn. The find, for the mere collector, would not be worth the time spent, but to the student archeologist a few fragments of flint, burned rock, shell or bone, could be of inestimable value.

Here under several feet of rich Leon River soil may be found the genesis from which a fairly accurate chronology may be worked out, or established. However, it will take the combined studies of the sciences of geology and archeology to arrive at proper decisions, and those decisions would necessarily be more, or less, hypothetical. I make the last statement because the element of geology has already been injected into the subject.

One geologist-archeologist has made some valuable observations on these Sunken Middens of the Leon River; Frank Bryan, whose article I frequently quote further. Others may also have commented on these.

One of the important archeological finds was made in 1914 while searching the Leon River in the Round Mountain area, for artifacts left by the Indians, I noticed several feet below the top of the river banks, strata of mussle shells, burned rock, charcoal, and occasional lumps of flint, and some flint chips. These were camp middens that had been occupied by ancient men when the Leon River Valley was several feet lower than at present.

I noticed that these middens were generally on top of a light coarse formation, over them, were several feet of fine dark alluvial soil that had been deposited above the ancient camp since the site was occupied.

In the sloughs, usually back some distance from the river, I noticed that the flood waters had uncovered shell-rock-middens that had long been covered with dark soil. Such a place may be found on the farm of Fred Acree. Most of these are some feet below the level lands beyond the slough channel. Sometimes a well here will enter these, and I have found them at the bottoms of deep post holes.

Since I first noticed these in 1914, I have searched them for stoneage artifacts left by man. At a place on the Lynch farm, in the midden strata, three feet below the top of the bank, I found a scrap of pottery, an extra good mano, several good arrow points, and an excellent flint knife. At another site five feet below the surface, two highly patinized forms of a fine flint blade and two arrow points, and an obsidian chip. I have from the midden strata, some 30 pieces in these long years of search. The strata as usually six inches to one foot thick.

In Frank Bryan's article in the 1935 "Report of the Central Texas Archeology Society", I note "The facts are these: you have 6 known feet of midden material, with an abundance of light charcoal and ash in it, buried beneath fine black silt. The contact between the black silt and the lighter colored, sandy material on the midden level is an uncomfortable contact which extends for miles up and down the Leon in this locality. Some 4 miles on an air line, down stream, the Leon loses its broad bottom and winds a torturous course between high limeston canyon walls. It has experienced great difficulty in cutting its channel thru this thick bed of limestone where it uparched over a low anticlinal fold, some 10 miles west of the west series of the Balcones Fault System.

"The geological explanation, were it not complicated with the age of man, would be this: During the slipping of the Balcones Fault System, this anticlinal arch experienced an uplift of sufficient height to dam the waters of the Leon, causing it, for a considerable length of time, to flood the broad upper bottom and leave deposited over the sandy alluvium, an 11-foot layer of much finer and blacker material. Since this uplift dammed the Leon enough time has elapsed to enable this industrious stream to cut a narrow groove across the crest of the uplift deep enough to now expose its banks nearly the whole of its old sand alluvium, as well as the layer of fine material above. Than this, the writer has heard no other explanation".

"...even tho the bulk of this faulting along the Balcones System took place during the ice age in the middle or late, Pleistocene Time". Mr. Bryan is an eminent Archeologist as well as a Geologist, and to quote him once more will bring us to our point. "The introduction of pottery into Central Texsa was so comparatively recent that pottery makers invariably chose for dwelling places, sites formerly occupied by people who knew the art."

Here, we have the geological element injected into archeological conditions existing along the Leon River by a man versed in both the sciences. Accepting his theory that the Leon was dammed by a buckling, and

The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, February 5.—In the court of public opinion, one of the weakest points in the Gilmer-Aikin committee's school reform plan is the proposal to make the state superintendent appointive instead of elective.

In its latest statewide survey, The Texas Poll finds that two out of every three adults think the superintendent should be elected. Almost as large a majority is also in favor of having the members of the State Board of Education elected.

The Gilmer-Aikin plan, now before the Legislature, has as one of its aims the reorganization of the state education department. Under the plan, members of the Board of Education would be elected by the people, and they in turn would appoint the superintendent. As it is now, Board members are appointed by the governor, and the superintendent is elected by the people.

Gov. Beauford Jester has endorsed the Gilmer-Aikin plan, earmarking the bills that would put it into effect as emergency measures and thus giving them priority in the Legislature.

In previous studies, The Texas Poll has found overwhelming public support for the Gilmer-Aikin proposals to raise teachers' salaries and otherwise increase money

outlays for the school system. The latest survey detects the first major point wherein the committee's proposals do not jibe with public opinion.

The survey discloses that less than one half of the adult public is familiar with the fact that the superintendent is now elected. Those familiar with this fact tend to be more in favor of an elective superintendent than the uninformed.

Public opinion on the Board of Education setup is about the same. However, even among those who

In another recent survey, The Texas Poll asked: "If you were a member of the Texas Legislature, would you vote for or against spending more money for the public school system?" 82 per cent said they would vote for spending. Earlier, the poll found substantial support also for the Gilmer-Aikin committee's recommendation to raise the minimum for school teachers' salaries from \$2,000 to \$2,400 a year.

In each survey, a comparable cross section of the adult population is interviewed by trained reporters located in all parts of the state. The cross section is controlled so that it represents correct proportions of the population by sex, age, race, socio-economic level, and place of residence.

Medical Prices Will Increase

Shortages always raise prices. The Texas Medical Association, by restricting enrollment in Texas medical schools to barely enough to replace deaths and retirements has cut down our supply of doctors, especially in our rural areas, thereby causing a shortage and higher fees for services, while 3,000 pre-med students find the gates barred against them.

This same medical association now plans to get control of the supply of all competitive healing professions, so they can cut off replacements in these healing professions, and make the shortage even more acute and thus raise the prices higher than today.

The Basic Science Bill (SB 63) is designed to give Medical Association complete control of all branches of the healing art and it is being pushed by unlimited funds and a high-priced lobby. folding, of the earth's crust, we have the question of the age of the Sunken Middens along the Leon, thrust before us to be pondered, and to be solved by expert opinion.

Working on the assumption that Mr. Bryan is correct, we here have covered under several feet of silt, the remains of a culture that was approaching, or was in, the Neolithic stage when the travails of geology were buckling and folding the crust of that section of Texas known as the Edwards Lime. Here at that ancient date lived a people who had contacted the people of the far Rocky Mountains, or Mesico; or had long before migrated from those regions, for here we found a scrap of obsidian, or volcanic glass, that must have had its origin in those volcanic wastes of these far mountain regions.

The data at hand presents a problem which calls for the most profound scrutiny, of the most capable minds,

in the fields of geology and archeology, if a proper chronology of man's first appearance in the Leon Valley is to be established.

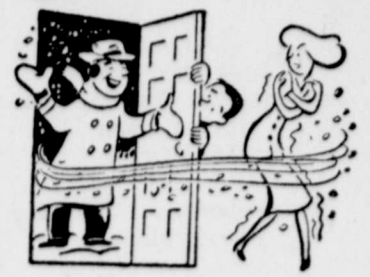

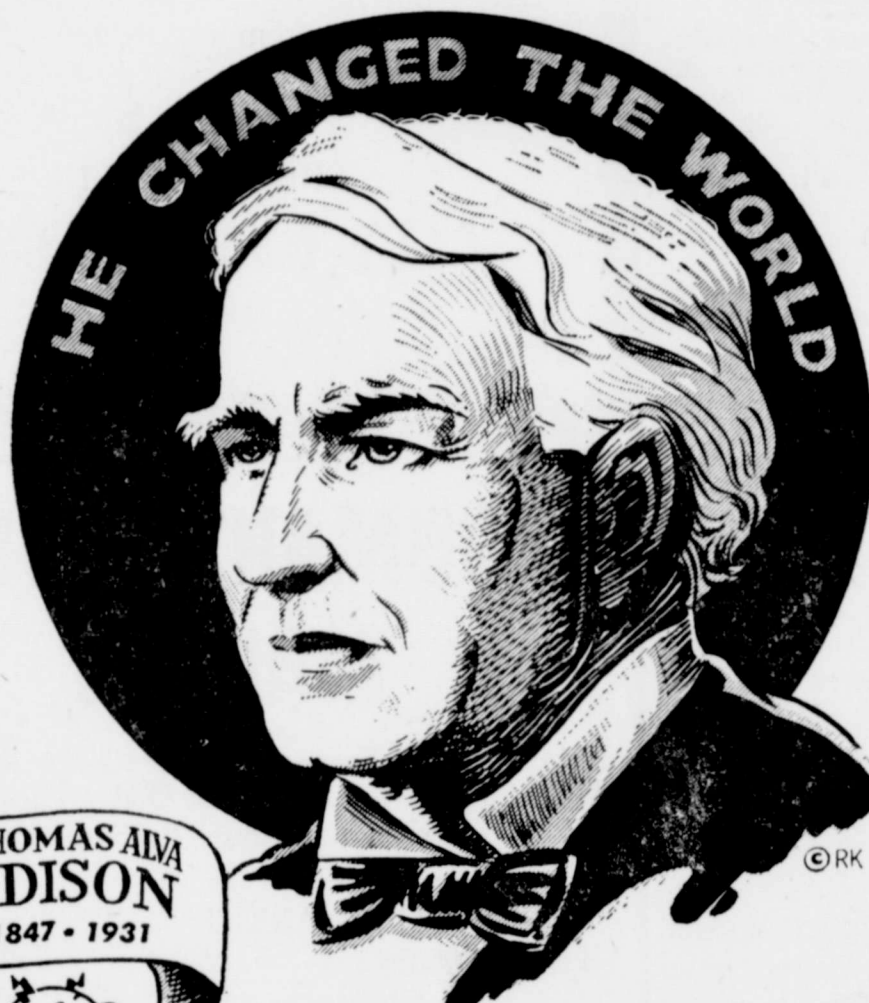

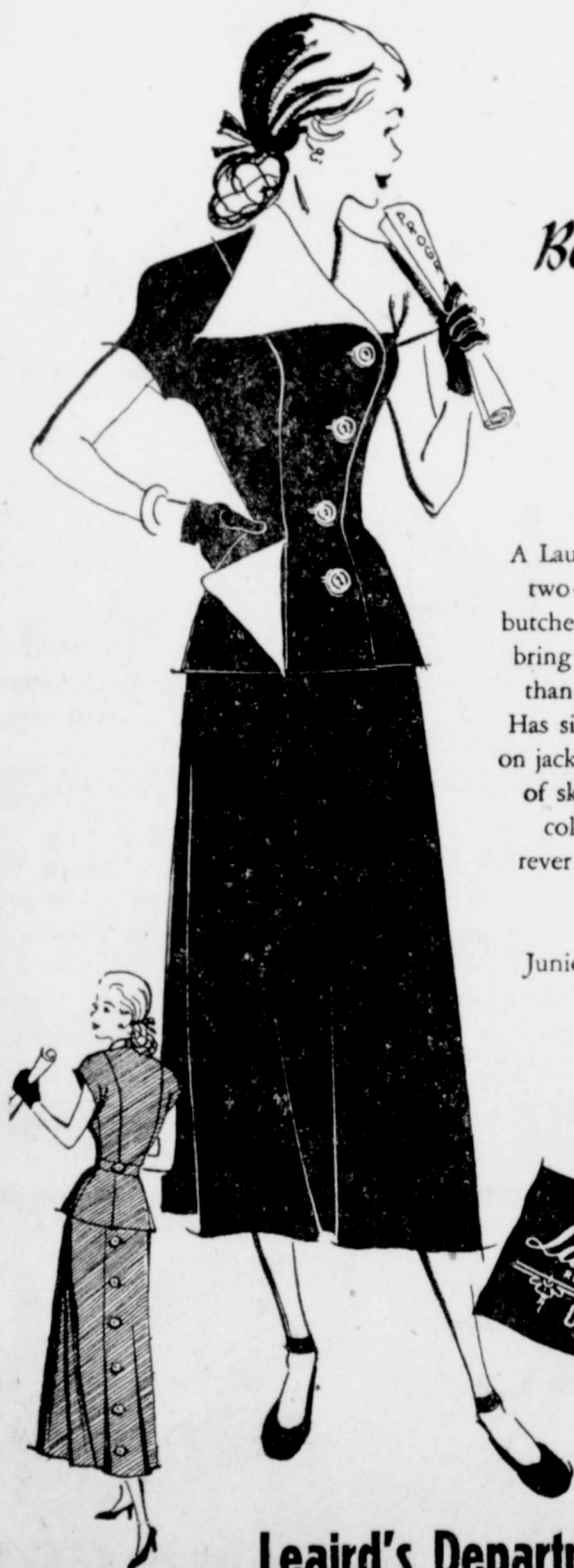
