The Byline of Dependability Red Spy Ring At Work In World Capitals

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 10. (AP)-The Army hinted today that remnants of a Russian spy ring which operated in Japan with perhaps greatest success in history may be at work in world capitals today.

This is the result of a 32,000 word report from General Mc-Arthur. Part of the report was not made public for "security reasons". The report said a spy ring was centered around Richard Sorge, German Communist and master spy. Ozaki Hozumi, is his second in command and a Japanese traitor. Agnes Smedley, an American author is accused of still being a Soviet spy. She denies it.





- 5. To train our youth to become purposeful citizens in a democracy with full knowledge of the responsibilities as well as the privileges of citizenship.


- 6. To cooperate with all duly recognized existing veterans organizations in the furtherance of the aims of World War II veterans.






