JESTER, "No-New-Tax Man" Still! Hooray!

AUSTIN, February 17. (AP)—Governor Beauford Jester, in his biennial budget message today, told the Legislature to make state expenses fit state income, saying he is still "No-new-tax-man."

He suggested a study of tax structure might unearth new revenue sources without increasing taxes. He said requests for funds exceed estimated income by 49 million.

At the same time, he recited failures of the State to provide many services.

Paul Brown Named To State Fire Ins. Commish

AUSTIN, Feb. 17. (AP)—Governor Beauford Jester today appointed Paul H. Brown of Harlingen, former Secretary of State to be State Fire Insurance Commissioner. Opposition has already shaped up.

Senator Gus Strauss, Hallettsville, Chairman of the Nominations Committee, said Brown's appointment was already "tagged", meaning a Senator has asked and will be granted a hearing on a nomination before action is taken. If Brown is confirmed, he will succeed Marvin Hall, who Jester said didn't want reappointment.

Some two hundred local citizens, visitors, insurance men attended the finale of Texas' First "Town Inspection" in the Firemen's Recreation Rooms in the City Hall Thursday noon, at which time C. H. Kelley, President, Resident Secretary, Home Insurance Co., of New York, with his headquarters in Dallas, as the principal speaker.

Highlighting Mr. Kelley's speech he said "FIRE—this relentless foe knows no surrender, armistice, or terms of peace. Constant attack and continual vigilance are the only known methods for checking his advance or forcing him to retreat...."

"...In excess of 10,000 persons lost their lives in fires last year, and the money loss was \$711,114,000.00,—in fact, the '48 loss is 122% higher than 1942...3 persons are injured every 10 seconds in the USA, 24,205 in a day. 11 killed each hour, 264 each day, 96,000 each year."

He said that the "home comes first", then, the school, and quoted figures on recent school tragedies, including New London, where 294 children were victims.

America leads in every conceivable field of human activity, and to her lasting shame "burning" her resources.

He told of the Underwriters Laboratories, which tested materials, fixtures, electrical supplies, fire equipment etc., which has saved millions of dollars and thousands of lives.

In closing he took the portion of "The American Creed", as follows: "I, therefore, believe it is my duty to my country to love it; to support its constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag; and to defend it against all enemies." That enemy of fire is still prevalent and you can do your part by accepting the responsibility to do your part in defeating this menace.

Scoutmaster J. M. Witcher gave the invocation, and B. L. McClellan was toastmaster, the Garden Club handled ticket sales; Camp Fire girls delivered forms to childless homes; Mrs. J. B. Graves, Florist, allowed use of her window for "display"; Mayor K. R. Jones was thanked for proclamation; and Boy Scouts for being the best "inspectors".

Chamber of Commerce President Dawson Cooper was introduced, and in turn introduced Mr. Kelley, whose talk followed that of State Fire Marshall Eugene Sanders, who told of the State's and his department in fire prevention, and associated subjects. Also, Judd Stiff, Chairman of the School inspectors complemented the school on their speed in fire drill, with 40 seconds for the Junior High School and 1 minute and 15 seconds for the High school. Fifty-three recommendations were made to the school officials regarding 9 buildings and they are now being remedied.

Finally, R. D. Foster, Chairman of the Gatesville Fire Safety Council, said we're going to have to put into effect what has been done and that it'll mean exactly nothing if it's not done, and thanked the members of the Council and others for the work, which was "rubberstamped" by him.

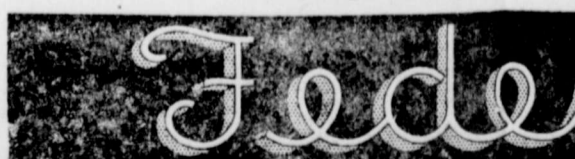

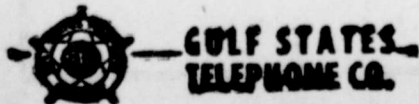
Late Thursday it was not known who the Hornets would meet in their next contest toward the State Finals, but teams mentioned are Marlin, Van and another Sast Texas team.
