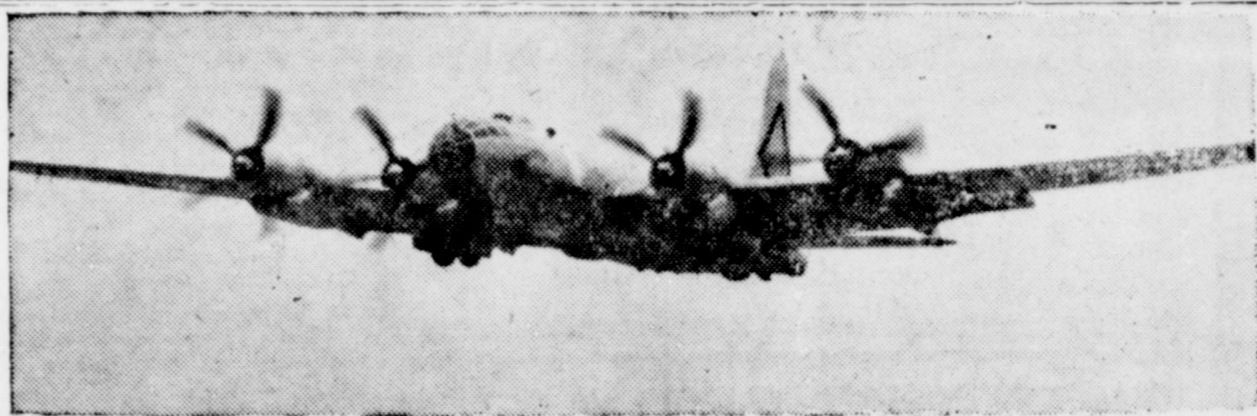
The events will be held here this year, June 8-9-10-11, the sec- ond week in June, as usual.

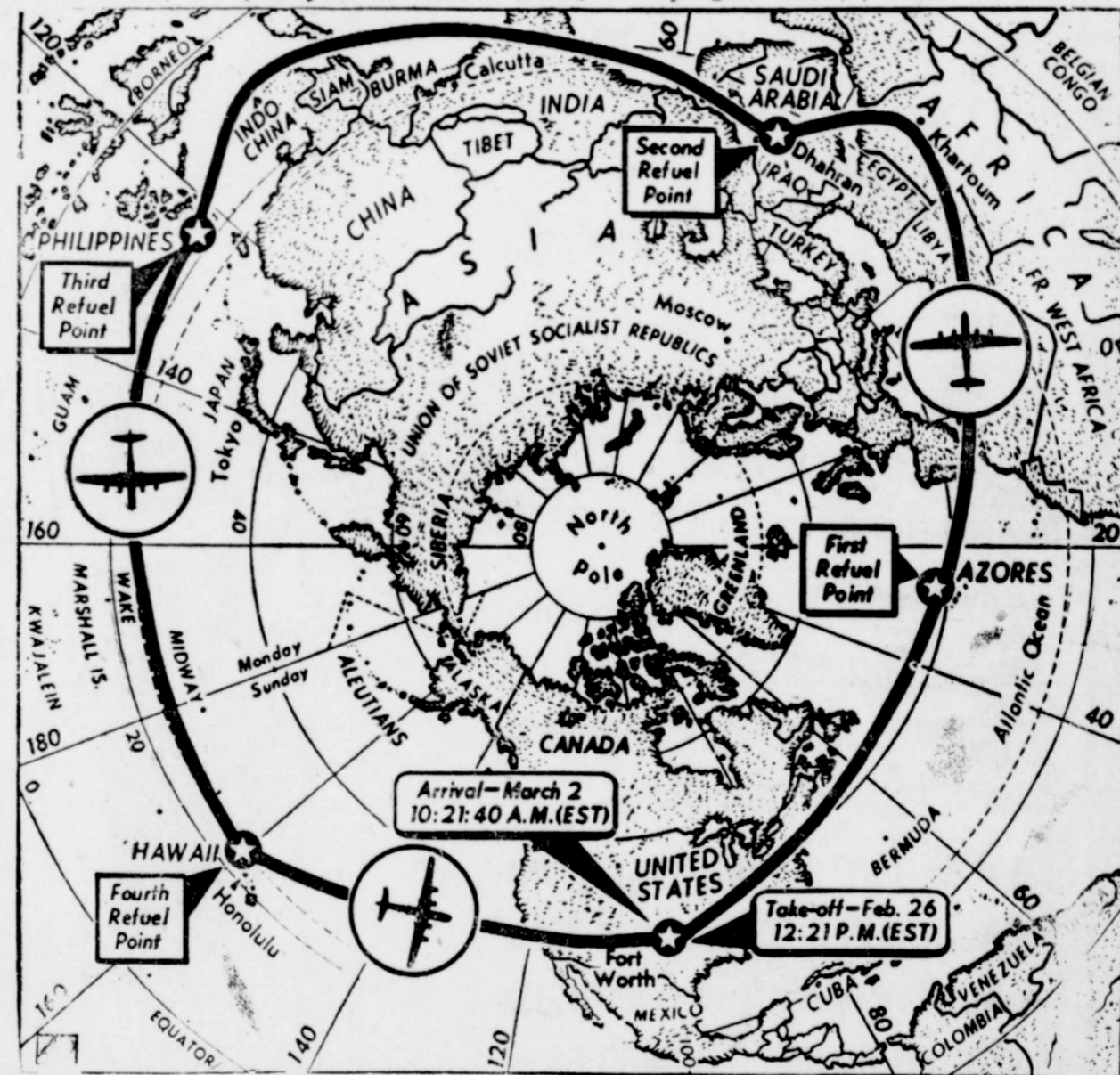

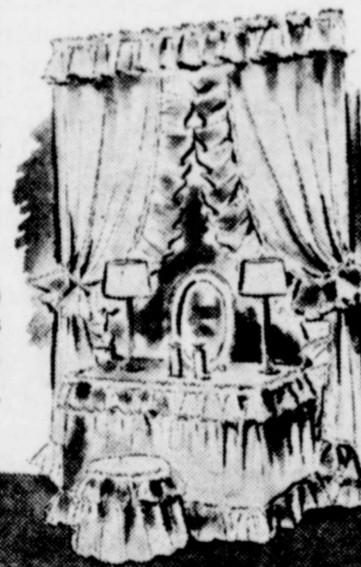

Divide and Conquer
The patrons of the rural schools of Coryell County seem to be disturbed and upset over the future of the educational program of this county. There are many rumors being passed along as truth, concerning the number of schools that will operate. Let us consider for a moment, at the present time there has been no law passed changing the educational set up in this or any other county. The Gilmer-Aiken proposal has not been enacted into law and it is my opinion that as it now stands, it will not be.

Our rural schools are now doing a fine piece of work. In a survey made last summer for this county's report to the Gilmer-Aiken Committee it was found that every school in Coryell County was either a standard or Accredited school except the "State Training School for Boys". Our schools can be improved, but believe me, the only thing the rural schools have lacked in the past has been proper financial support.

Gatesville has a building problem, I sympathize with them in that, but it concerns only Gatesville and the rural school districts which send their pupils to Gatesville, and in which Gatesville furnishes transportation.

There has been no suggestion, as far as I know, to re-district Coryell County. No present bill before the legislature, that I have seen, has mentioned such changes. We all know the present difficulties of getting our children to school without making larger districts and larger bus routes.

Remember, no one has the authority, now, to say how many schools this county will have in the future. We at Jonesboro believe that our patrons want to continue to maintain a Four-Year Affiliated School here and we intend to continue to do so. There are many fine things to be had in your smaller high schools. The class work is just as thorough, the teaching staff as well trained as those of the city schools. There are more opportunities for the child to participate in extracurricular activities in the rural school because of the smaller number involved. What is said here behalf of the rural high school applies not to Jonesboro alone, but to Pearl, Flat, Evant, Copperas Cove, Turnersville and Oglesby. All of these are fine schools and doing an excellent job of educating boys and girls in this county.

I have no personal axe to grind in writing this my only purpose is to put an end to rumors that this county has already been divided among three or four schools. It isn't the Gilmer-Aiken Bill that can hurt us but the use that some would make of it to frighten people into foolish steps.

Our effort should be aimed at defeating the present Senate Bill No. 115, which would set up an elective board of nine (9) members and let this Board appoint the State Superintendent. This takes away the democratic right of the people to choose a state official and is a step toward dictatorship. Let's let our lawmakers know we are opposed to that.

I believe in Rural Education. Fortunate indeed is the rural child today who attends a good Rural High School. Let's demand that our Rural High Schools be supported in order that they may continue their good work. **YOU CAN'T HAVE MASS PRODUCTION IN THE EDUCATION OF CHILDREN.**

Jonesboro High School plans to continue next year and the next and the next with an enriched program for the class room and with a continued policy of a well rounded experience for the child. Yours for better support for our Rural High Schools.

Of course, this is only in the talking stage, but is the way all good things start. Now that we have the start, let us do more talking.

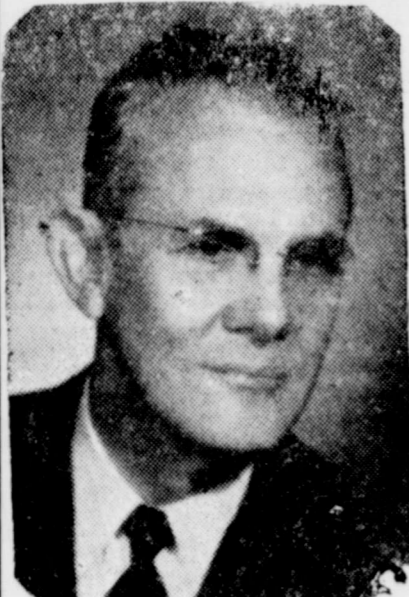

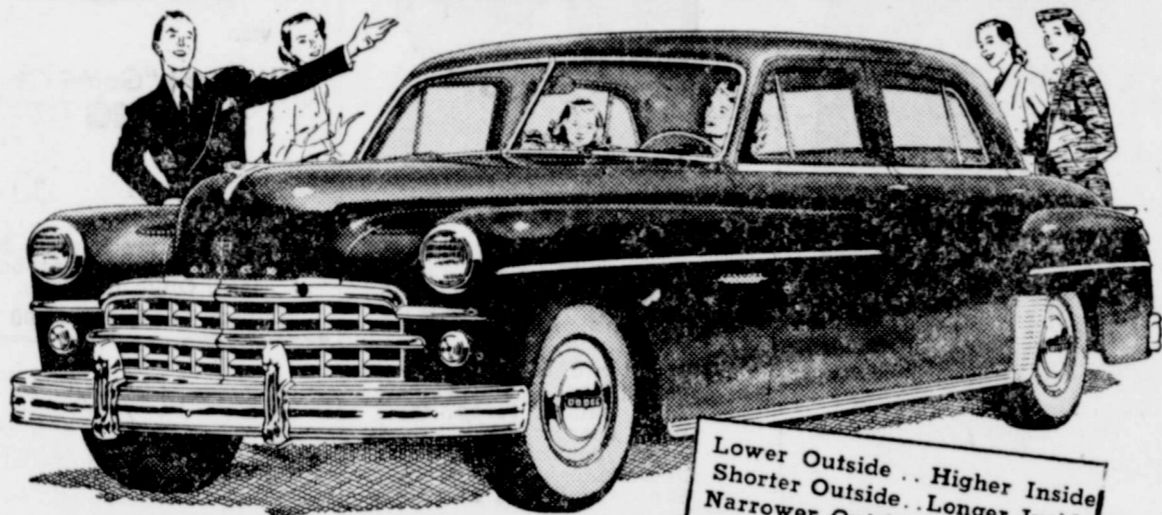

Three men from Hafilton were present to sponsor the meeting.

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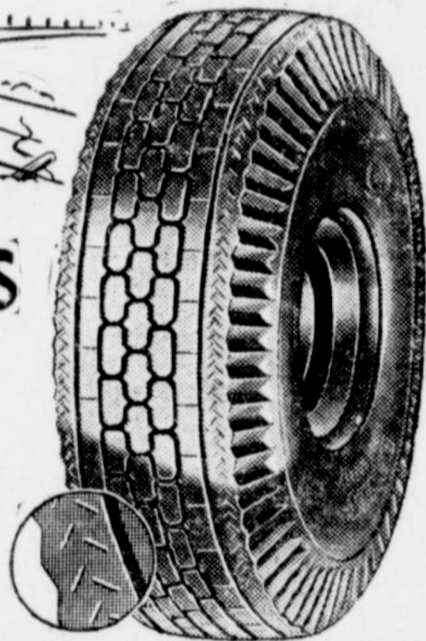
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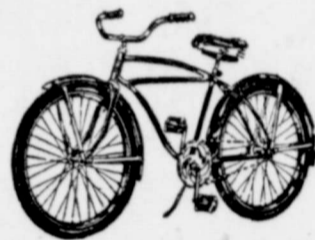
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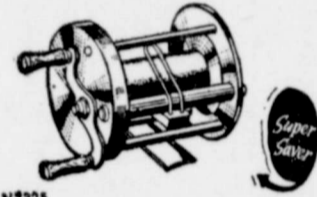
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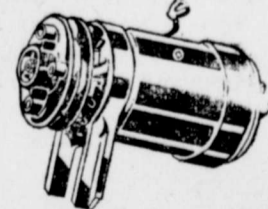
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
