Mrs. T. D. Craddock Of Hamilton Reviews The Big Fisherman

When the Morris Federation met Saturday afternoon in the home of Mrs. John Milner, Mrs. T. D. Craddock of Hamilton gave a review of Lloyd C. Douglas' eleventh novel, *The Big Fisherman*, a sequel to *The Robe*.

The story is a modern narrative based on the Jewish-Arab controversy of A.000 years standing and gives a picture of the great city of Palestine and of Galilee, crossroads of a warring world. Also included is a graphic description of the selfish, grasping despair for and a tender compassionate love story. While Jesus is the central character in this realistic story, Simon called Peter, the man who laid down his fishing nets to follow Jesus to Gethsemane, later became the first great leader and teacher of Christianity. The author pictures the immense vitality of Peter as he became a great magnet of the people and a rock of faith on which the church was built.

Mrs. Craddock was introduced by Mrs. Milner as a most charming, capable, and versatile speaker who leads a very busy life as a teacher and churchworker. 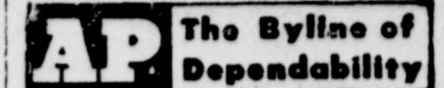

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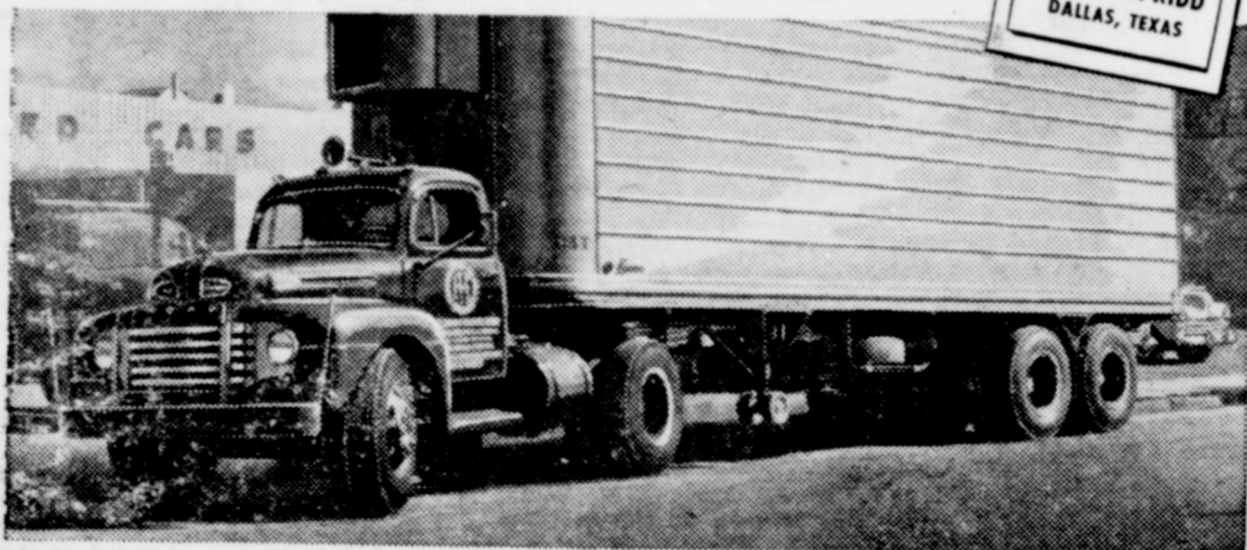

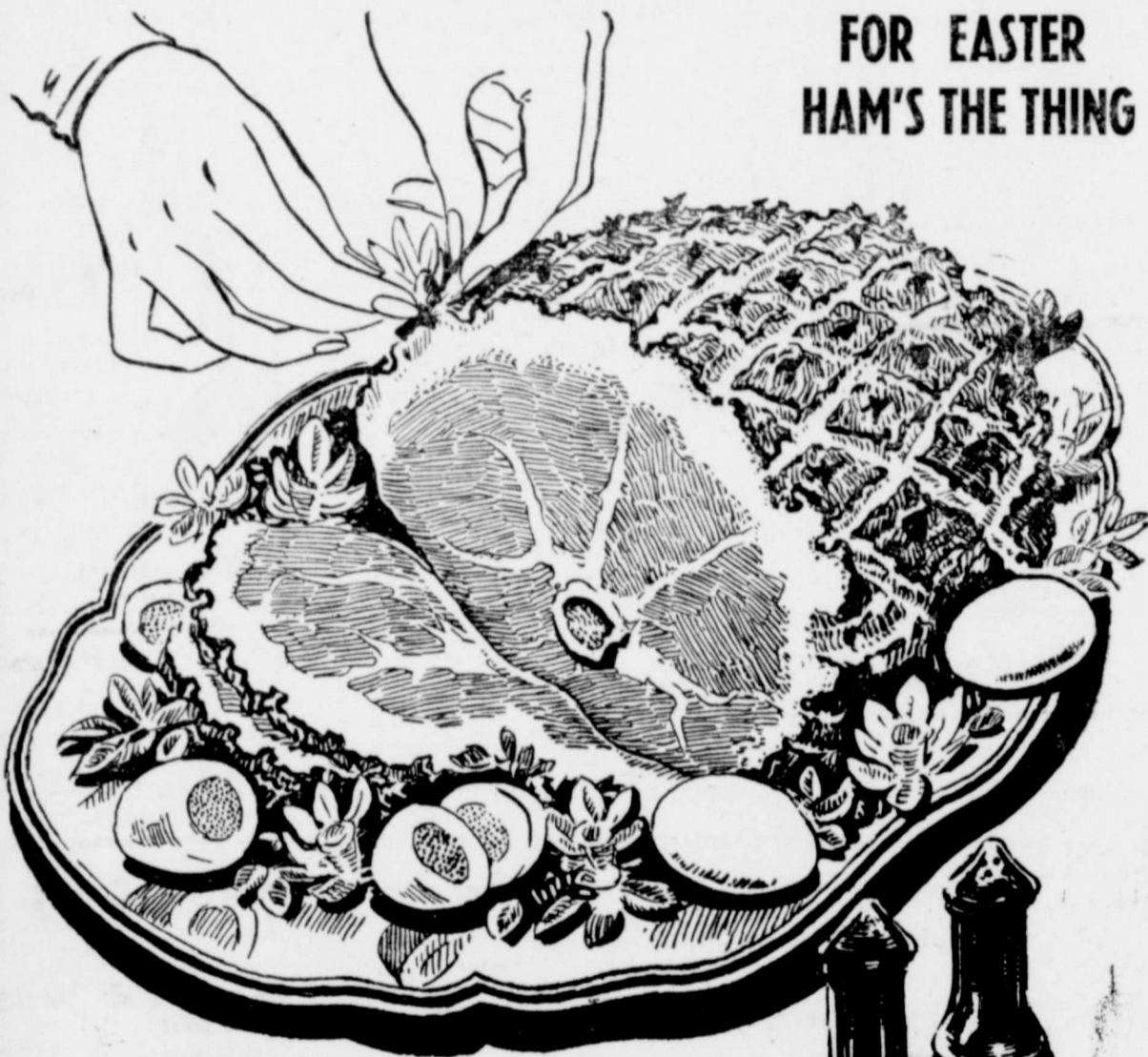

culture. The House is now actually further advanced with its major bills than it normally is at this time of the year.

The most interesting developments have occurred, however, in our Agriculture Committee. The Secretary of Agriculture made his recommendations as to an agricultural program. His suggestions were very long and rather complicated. He is to return Monday for questions. Until such time as we have had an opportunity to further study and clarify them, I do not feel that we should attempt to pass final judgment, but I feel that you will all be interested in knowing just what he recommended:

In the first place, he proposed that instead of taking parity prices as our goal that we work for what might be called a fair income support level. Last year the average per capita income of farm people, including the value of home produced food and income from non-farm sources, was only \$909, as compared with an average per capita income for non-farm people of \$1569.00. He suggests, correctly, I think, that we should try to bring the income of farm people up toward this income of non-farm people. He proposed a new formula instead of our well known "parity". He suggests that we

take the last ten years, which include some of the highest and some of the lowest farm prices, as a base. He proposes to undertake to support farm income at a figure which will assure farmers as much purchasing power as they enjoyed on the average of this ten year period. He then undertakes to calculate the price at which specific commodities would have to be supported in order to achieve this desired income support level.

At the present value of our dollar, and with present estimates of production and sales this coming year, it will require 26 billion dollars to give our farmers as much purchasing power as they enjoyed over the ten year average. (This is true although the average farm income over the period has been only twenty one billion dollars, because the dollar will not buy as much now as formerly). This means that each crop must bring the farmer 1.25 times as much as it did during the base period (the past ten year average). Brought down to specific items this means a support price of approximately 28 cents for cotton as against a present support (90% of parity), of 27 1/2 cents. Corn would be supported at \$1.46 instead of \$1.42 as at present. Wheat would lose seven cents. Most other commodities

ties, especially milk, meat and poultry, would be supported considerably higher levels than at present. Generally speaking, I think it can be fairly said that the plan would result in higher farm prices.

The problem comes in financing the program, The Secretary would support the storable commodities—cotton, wheat, corn, etc.—just about as now, with loans. He would also use our existing acreage control machinery. When it comes to the non-storables, he proposes that the income support standard should be attained by what he calls "production payments". These payments are direct subsidies similar to those used during the war for milk and other products.

I do not want to say I know that we can find some other practical suggestions for the support of the price of perishable commodities, but I did suggest to the Secretary that we try to cover these prices by a form of insurance like unemployment insurance, instead of a direct payment from the Treasury, which has so many earmarks of a "handout".

I don't think our farmers should be asked to depend on a government "dole". A laboring man rightly asks that he receive a fair living wage directly from his employer. The business man asks that he be allowed to make a fair return on his money. The farmer is likewise entitled to a living wage for his labor and a fair return on his investment, and I hope we can assure it to him in the market place. Possibly by the time you read this we may all understand the Secretary's proposals more fully.

Central Texas farmers will have an opportunity to get first hand information, four weeks from today (May 6th) when Secretary Brannan himself will come to Waco and speak at Bluebonnet Experiment Station, near McGregor. You are all invited.
