City Fathers Get Bids On Water-Sewer Project From Bondsmen

Tuesday night, the new water plant, water lines, sewer project which has been discussed by the City Council for some months came to a head, when a bid of .02789 was bid on the proposed \$250,000 bonds, and Moss, Moore & Co., Central Investment Co., and Rauscher, Pierce Co., of Dallas were the successful bidders.

The City plans this work without the issuance of Bonds, using the warrant route, and payment will be made by slight increases in water and sewage charges, a 25c increase in the sewer charge and a water charge of from 60c to \$1.50 per month, with an overall average of 90c.

With the new waterlines and sewage disposal, and water plant, a saving to the property holder would be in insurance rates from 7 to 15 percent, which will alone offset the cost of the new systems. An election for approval or disapproval of this move will be held for May 14, and more details will be worked out between now and that date.

Already engineer's estimates have been made, and the projects will be completed as the money is available. The bonds will run 25 years with a 10 year option, and the bondsmen are to pay all incidental expenses except the election costs.

Other bids were .0331, .0303, .0289. The bids were asked Tuesday night, and opened at the same time. Some 15 representatives of bond houses were present.

Nine Coryell County Baseball Clubs will line up, each with a perfect 1,000, which, probably won't be that way long.

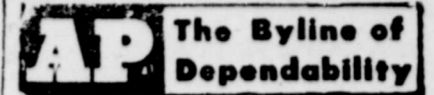
Only Seattle will be idle the first day—it drew a bye in the shuffle at the meeting of the managers and officials Monday evening at the City Hall.

Cover girl Jackie Aimers is 16, and pretty as a triple-threat teenager. She is a student, breadwinner and housekeeper.

Think this man-size routine gets this glamor-girl model jittery? no siree! Jackie thinks all ten-agers should have more responsibility. "They'd prepare for the future and make better parents," she says. Personally, Jackie seems to handle everything with the little finger of her left hand. She goes to school every morning, appears at Harry Conover's model agency every afternoon to pick up modeling assignments, spends the evening ironing, making beds, dishwashing. Before she climbs into bed for the night she does exercises, puts her hair up in pin curls, cold creams her face.

Time-consuming or not, Jackie thrives on the routine. The \$40 to \$60 a week she earns as a model is a necessary supplement to the family income. Mrs. Aimers receives government pensions up to \$120 a month for the family of three, which includes Jackie's twin brother Ronnie. This pension is less whenever Jackie's makes more than \$15 a month (which she usually does). Then her mother must make a refund to the government.

Jackie's brother Ronnie picks up a few dollars at baby sitting, but Jackie doesn't want him to go back to his after-school job, such as dish-washing in a luncheonette, which he held recently. Jackie thinks it is more important for Ronnie to concentrate on his high school training, as "a boy needs an education these days". And she is determined to help out until Ronnie completes his education. Jackie discusses unglamorous subjects such as rent, food, clothing and recreation allowances the way some models discuss false eyelashes.

She is not interested in dates because "I never have a chance to meet anybody." Once in a while her girl friend gets her a date, but then they double-date. When she does have a date she prefers boys who are interested in sports.

Jackie hasn't time for hobbies. Sparetime must be used for homework and household chores. Her mother is partially paralyzed.

In the seven months she has been modeling, Jackie has learned to love it but she has no illusions about being a model for the rest of her life. She says:

"Modeling is fine, but I've got to be sure that I'm going to be able to hold a job; that's why I'm taking the secretarial course. Perhaps I can find a job in one of the photographic studios when my modeling days are over."

Jackie says when she began to model, Mr. Conover advised her that "modeling should be only a stepping stone to a career. Too many girls become disappointed

when their popularity wanes; they become so discouraged they never can do anything else."

Brunette Jackie has made up her mind that will not happen to her. She'll need to supplement the family income even more when she and her twin reach 18, as much of the government pension (Veterans' and Social Security) comes to a halt at that point.

Right now she is doing photographic and fashion show modeling. She wears a size 9, has a 32 bust, 22 waist, 32 hips and is 5' 4" in flats. She makes \$10 per hour when she works.

Any girl with a good figure and good features can model in her spare time, says Jackie. But she must be neat. It is more important to have one well-cut suit or dress which you can make do double duty with accessories than a whole raft of slinky looking

gowns. A good suit is the best bet for any girl, says Jackie.

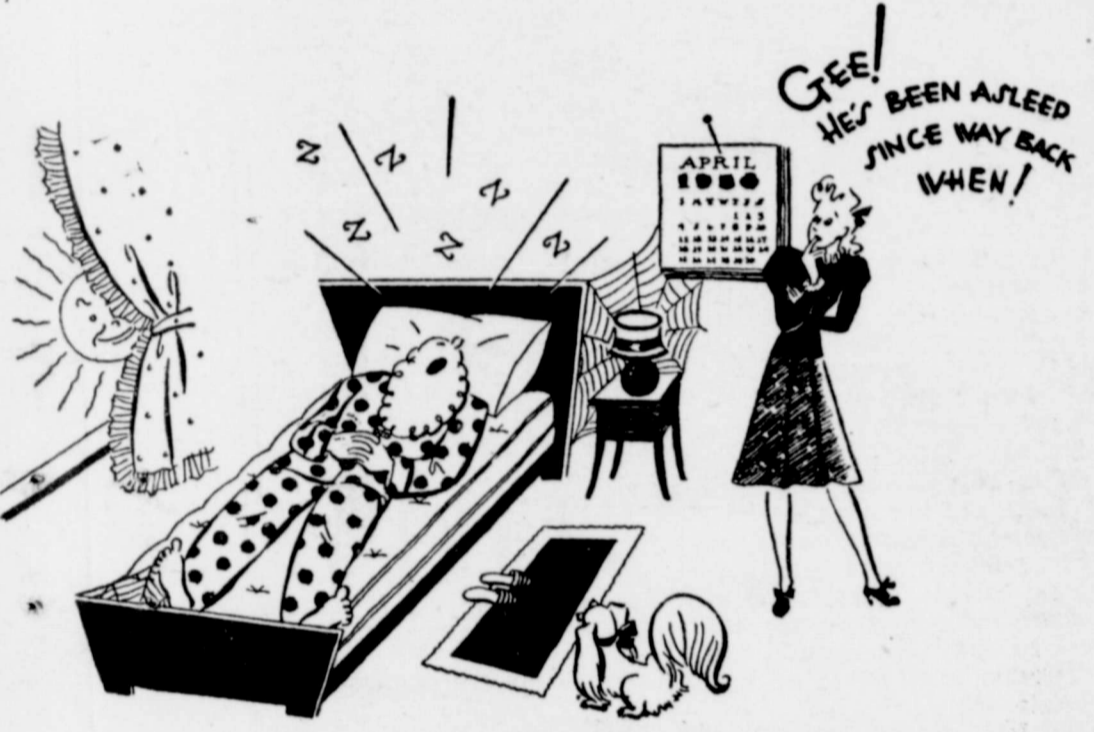

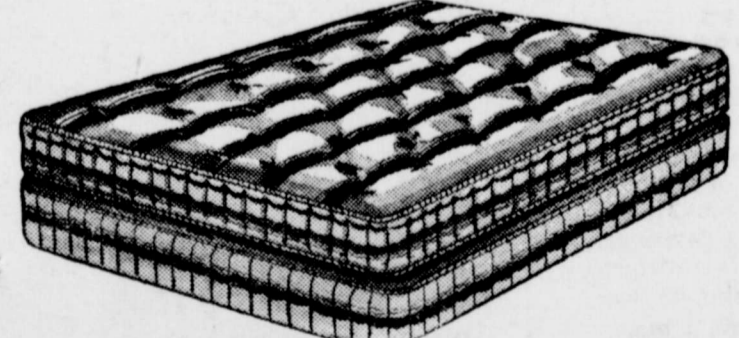

Dear Friends:

The House is now much further along with the regular appropriation bills than it normally is at this time of the year. This week we passed three major appropriations: The E. C. A., commonly called the European Aid Bill; the National Defense appropriation, providing for the Army, Navy and

Air Force; and the Independent Offices appropriation, (including the Veterans Administration.)

These three bills, together with the interest on the public debt account for about three-fourths of the total national expenditure. We must pay about five billion dollars in interest on what we owe. There is no chance to reduce this amount except by paying off the debt. We

are putting a little over five billion dollars into the European recovery program. We consider this necessary, both from the standpoint of national defense (we want the European countries to be able and willing to fight on our side if need be), and from the standpoint of maintaining a solvent world. (We know that this program has added many billions to the prices farmers have received, and millions of jobs for American working men. We expect it to greatly aid in the maintenance of the foreign markets which our farmers, our workers, and our investors all need.) I voted for the bill, although I did support an amendment, which unfortunately failed, to require the use of surplus American products or American-owned commodities before any similar commodities were purchased elsewhere in the world. I have been unable to see why we should not give our own producers every advantage we could so long as our friends received the aid they need.

The Defense appropriation was roughly 15 billion dollars. It included money to activate 58 of the "70 Groups" authorized for the Air Force. This is more than the President and the Department of National Defense requested, but I felt as did the majority of the House, that we simply must maintain the best Air Force in the world. We have by far the world's most powerful Navy, and we hope to keep our Army as well equipped and supplied as any, even though we do not try to keep as large a ground force as Russia. There is no doubt but proper administration would result in substantial savings in the Army, Navy and Air Force, but I think, as Chairman Mahon of the Committee said, that we cannot afford to make a mistake on the side of providing too little for our defenses. Even this tremendous appropriation is not as large as the expenditures of the U. S. S. R. for the same purposes. I voted for the bill.

The Independent Offices Bill includes appropriations for many of the agencies of government, but the overshadowing item is one of more than 5 billion dollars for the Veterans Administration—and this includes nothing for new pensions. It does include the payments we make under existing laws to veterans and their dependents, and the sums we spend on Veterans Hospitals, etc. It certainly could not be cut very much without breaking faith on our outstanding obligations to the veterans. Actually, this item is sure to increase in years to come. I voted for it.

The total of these expenditures are so great that I can see no way of meeting them and maintaining the solvency of our government except by keeping the national income at a level at least twice as high as it was prior to the war. In other words, we must have a national income of from 170 to 200 billion dollars per year. This was the assumption of Secretary Brannan when he said that we must keep our purchasing power up to around 26 billion this coming year. Farm income represents newly created wealth. Normally we can expect every dollar of farm income to turn over so as to generate seven dollars of national income. Thus, with a farm income of 26 billion, we could expect the national income to be about 180 billion. With an income this high we should enjoy substantially full employment, reasonable profits and the ability to pay the taxes necessary to support our needed expenditures. For this reason I feel that we simply can't afford not to support farm prices.

The House will not be in Session next week. I had intended to use the time to catch up with some of the many matters needing attention, but in view of the illness of my mother in Waco I am flying to Texas today (Friday, April 15.) If her condition is satisfactory I shall stay only a day or two.
