

## "Dairy Day" Draws Five Hundred Here Wednesday

Five hundred interested people attended the Coryell County Dairy Day Program here Wednesday.

The program started at ten o'clock with a brief outline by the County Agent, W. B. Graham, of the physical setup at the Possum Oak Dairy Farm, acreage, pasture crop land, cows, milk produced, prices received, etc., and made up a brief word picture of Possum. The Agent's word picture was an answer to why this efficient plant was selected for inspection.

Hoot Gibson, Dairy Specialist from A and M brought a practical message on successful and profitable milk production. His talk was followed by Mr. Winne-meyer, Washington representative of the Dairy Industry. Mr. Winne-meyer stressed the place of milk in the national economy and pointed out the financial advantages for the dairy which stayed with business and made it an occupation.

An inspection of the milking rooms and other facilities and the judging contest rounded out the program.

John Henry Weaver, Jonesboro 4-H boy famous as a top hog producer was high junior with 95 out of a possible 100.

Sam Powell, Jr. was the high adult with 82.

Jimmy Anderson, Jonesboro was second high boy with 90.

Dale White and Charles Zeigler were high for Gatesville FFA with 80 each.

Glenn R. Comer was second high adult with 80.

### 63,000 FORD WORKERS STRUCK AT 11 A. M.

DETROIT, Michigan, May 5. (AP)—65,000 Ford workers struck at 11 a. m. (CST). Negotiators broke up the last minute conference.

62,000 workers left the big River Rouge plant. 3,000 left the Lincoln-Mercury plant. The union charged a speed up of assembly lines. The company said within nine days the strike will hit 106,000 production workers.

### RED BERLIN BLOCKADE TO BE LIFTED MAY 12

WASHINGTON, D. C. May 5. (AP)—The Russian blockade of Berlin will be lifted May 12 under a Big Four Agreement announced today. The Western blockade of Soviet Germany zone will be lifted at the same time.

The Council of Foreign Ministers will meet in Paris May 23 "to consider questions relating to Germany and problems arising out of the situation in Berlin, including also the question of currency in Berlin."

Officials indicated the airlift machinery—planes, men and directors—probably will be kept in a stand-by condition in Europe until they are reasonably sure Russia has no plans for another Berlin roadblock.

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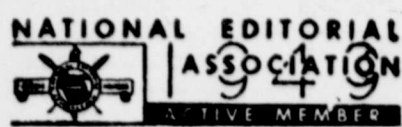

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## NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
CITY OF GATESVILLE  
COUNTY OF CORYELL  
To All Qualified Voters of The City Of Gatesville, Texas, who own Taxable Property in Said City, And Who Have Duly Rendered The Same for Taxation:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Gatesville, Texas, on the 14th day of May, 1949, to determine whether or not the City Council of said City shall be authorized to issue the bonds of said City, in the following amounts and for the following purposes, to-wit:

\$180,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Water System; and

\$ 70,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Sanitary Sewer System;

and which election was duly called and ordered by the order of the City Council of said City, passed on the 25th day of April, 1949, and which ELECTION ORDER is made a part of this Notice, and is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

### ELECTION ORDER

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
CITY OF GATESVILLE  
COUNTY OF CORYELL

ON THIS the 25th day of April, 1949, the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, convened in special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

Dr. K. R. Jones, Mayor,  
R. M. Arnold,  
E. Price Bauman,  
Dr. O. W. Lowrey,  
J. E. McClellan, Aldermen.

and with the following members absent: none, constituting a quorum; at which time the following, among other business, was transacted, to-wit:

It was moved by Alderman J. E. McClellan and seconded by Alderman O. W. Lowrey that there be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Gatesville, Texas, who are property taxpayers therein, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, propositions for the issuance of the bonds of said City, in the following amounts and for the following purposes, to-wit:

\$180,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of construct-

ing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Water System; and

\$ 70,000 revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Sanitary Sewer System.

The above motion carried by the following vote:

AYES: Messrs. Arnold, Bauman, Lowrey and McClellan.  
NOES: None.

Thereupon, Alderman J. E. McClellan introduced an order calling an election for the purpose of submitting the proposition to a vote of the qualified property tax-paying voters of said City, and moved the passage and adoption of such order. The motion was seconded by Alderman O. W. Lowrey.

The motion carrying with it the passage and adoption of the election order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Messrs. Arnold, Bauman, Lowrey and McClellan.  
NOES: None.

The ELECTION ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter stated; therefore  
BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GATESVILLE, TEXAS:

I.  
That an election be held on the 14th day of May, 1949, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1.  
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$180,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Water System, said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (3½%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; such revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenue of the City's combined Water System and Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance

expenses?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2  
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Gatesville, Texas, be authorized to issue SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$70,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Sanitary Sewer System, said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (3½%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; such revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Water System and Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses?"

II.  
In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised, or to be raised, by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised, or to be raised, by taxation."

III.  
The City of Gatesville being divided into two Wards, each of which is officially designated as an election precinct, the polling places in each such precinct, and the Officers to serve thereat in the aforesaid election, shall be as follows:

WARD NUMBER 1  
Polling Place: City Hall  
Presiding Judge: Ed Taylor, Jr.  
Clerk: Y. W. Lee.

WARD NUMBER 2  
Polling Place: Courthouse  
Presiding Judge: D. R. McClellan  
Clerk: Oliver Tatum.

IV.  
That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

V.  
That the ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT  
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF WATER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

AS TO EACH of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions, respectively.

VI.  
That a copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Gatesville, and attested by the City Secretary, shall serve as proper no-

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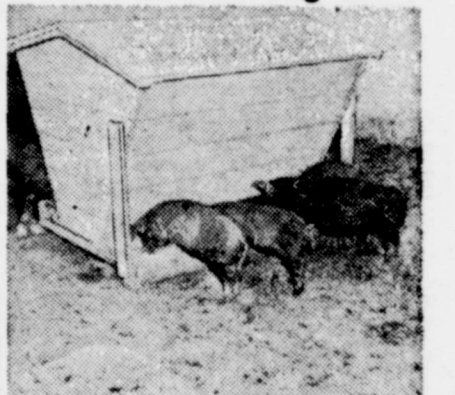

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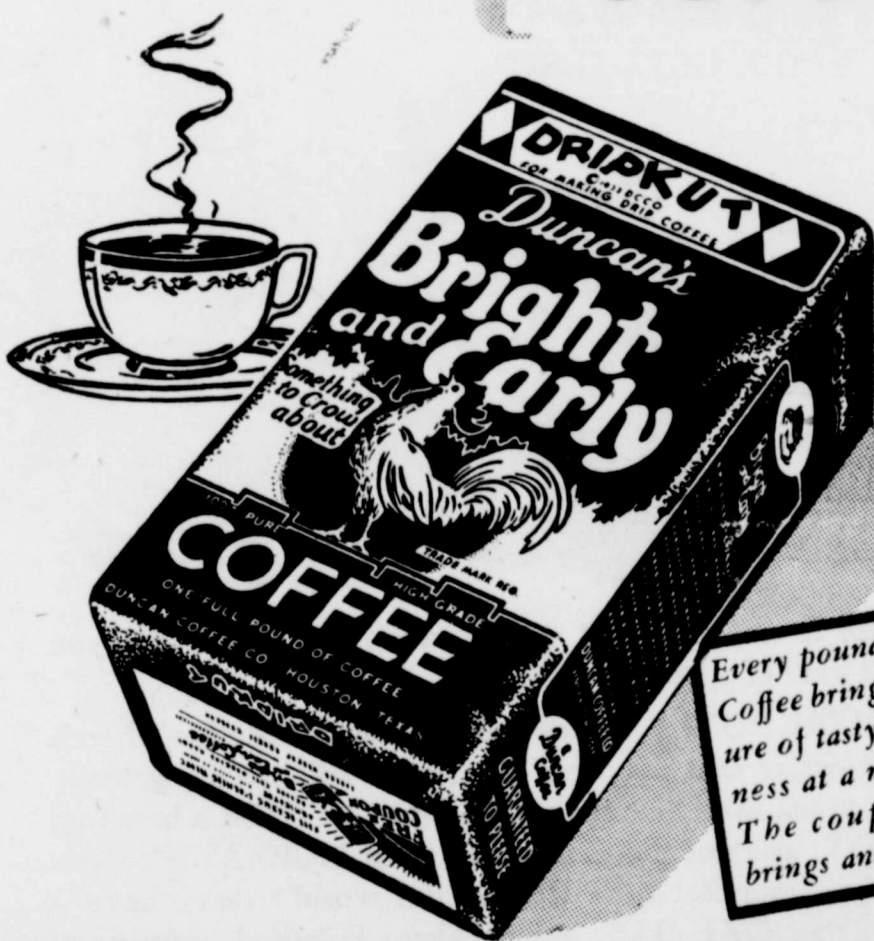
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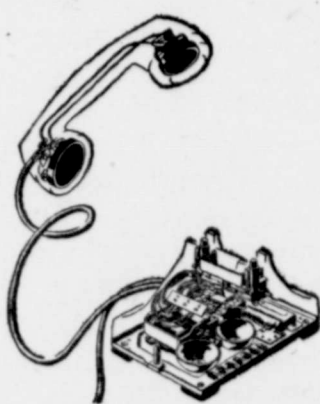

**HISTORY OF CORYELL COUNTY**

(Continued From Last Week)

**FIRST METHODIST CHURCH IN CORYELL COUNTY**

To give a more elaborate picture of the difficulties early church people had to meet, this is an account of the Station Creek Methodist Church which was organized in 1855. I wrote Mrs. O. F. Davenport of Weatherford, who was at that time, 90 years of age, and a charter member of the church, to give a list of the charter members. She gave this information: "The organization was perfected in the home of Charles Karnes by a Reverend Hubert. This home stood on land now owned by R. H. Alexander and the house was built of logs. The congregation having no building, met alternately at the homes of the members until they were able to erect a small building on the hill west of Station Creek, and near the present road. This first Methodist church had for charter members Grandfather Robinson, Josh Robinson and wife, Rev. James H. Collard and wife, Mrs. Laurena Shook, Charles Karnes and wife, Mrs. Frances Hartgraves, John A. Davenport and wife and O. F. Davenport and wife. In 1861, Captain O. F. Davenport assembled a company of volunteers for the Confederate Army and gave them light training on Peugh Branch. Upon breaking preparatory to going to the front, the company went to Station Creek where services were held and Divine blessings invoked for the departing soldiers.

"This church had four home sites: first, in the home of Charles Karnes, second, on the hill west of Station Creek; third, near the east bank of Station Creek; fourth, on the Eagle Springs and McGregor road two miles north of Eagle Springs. The membership was finally absorbed by the Oglesby Methodist church. Two of these sites were enclosed in the Bluebonnet Ordnance Plant area."

**FIRST PRIMITIVE BAPTIST CHURCH**

In the Sugar Loaf Mountain community were a number of "Old Baptists", now called Primitive Baptists. They were without organized church services. On the 4th Sunday in August, 1856, near Sugar Loaf Mountain, Elder Jesse Graham called together the Baptists of that community and organized the Sugar Loaf Church. The church was constituted upon fourteen articles of Faith which all Old Baptists heartily believed. This was the first church of this faith organized in the county. Elder Graham served as pastor until his death. The membership of the church was Martha Graham, James and Nancy Hatley, William and Nancy Kinsley, Joe and S. E. Blackwell. The site of the church is now in the Camp Hood area.

In the opposite edge of the county at Rainey Creek School house on July 12- 1857, was organized the Rainey Creek Old Baptist Church. This organization was by Elder Samuel Miller, Felix K. Miller, Squire Haggara, B. G. Miller, Mathew Miller, Felpa C. Miller, Ann Norman and Ann McCowans.

The ministers who served these early churches usually traveled from church to church in buggies or horseback, often traveling a hundred or more miles to serve a church. There was little monetary remuneration for the service, so many of the ministers were farmers, or had other means of earning a livelihood. How well they laid the spiritual foundations of the county is amply shown in our present highly organized church institutions, so well distributed that anyone who wishes can attend church any week in the year.

**EAGLE SPRINGS' GRETNA GREEN**

About a mile north of the once notable old village of Eagle Springs stands a house that was once the home of the famous Baptist Divine, John McClain. In its time it was a modern, well-built house as compared with other pioneer houses in the same settlement. In the years prior to the Civil War this fine old man settled at this place and started rearing a family.

The little farm spread to the rear of the house, and was coursed by a small stream of clear flowing water which nourished the fields as the old man's spirituality nourished the souls of the pioneer people living around Eagle Springs, for he helped establish more Baptist churches than any other man in the Leon River Baptist Association.

On November 6, Rev. McClain organized the first Baptist church at Eagle Springs. He also became its first pastor. Charter members are: J. H. Estep, Nancy Estep, E. A. Culpepper, Tobitha Culpepper, Wyatt Hall, Naoma Hall, F. M. Grimes, Elmira Grimes, Mary A. Grimes, Daniel Jones, Serepta Hall. In 1882 this church was moved to Comanche Springs, and in 1884 it was moved to McGregor and continues as the First Baptist Church of McGregor.

Next to the founding of churches, the thing that made

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this man most famous was lovelorn youth seeking a minister to speak the words that would make them man and wife. The runaways came horseback, in buggies, rain or shine; in daytime or night. The runaways, however, were a very small minority of the great number for whom the marriage ceremony was performed. It is said that he officiated at more than 1500 weddings.

Jim Pennington of Oglesby relates that in the reconstruction days that followed the Civil War that Rev. McClain was so plain in his denunciation of evil practices that he incurred the wrath of the horse rustling, cow-theiving, plundering element to the extent that his life was sought by those men. He hid out many a day and night to avoid his would be slayers. This condition necessitated that someone supply him with food. Mrs. McClain heroically assumed this responsibility and would steal from their home and meet him on the prairie supplying him with such comforts as were necessary during his hiding.

Church going in those days also had its dangers. Jim Pennington also relates the times when church goers carried their pistols and rifles. The country was infested with thieves and lawless characters, but people were determined to have preaching if they had to guard the church with guns while the preacher dispensed the gospel.

At the meeting in progress on Station Creek, the people tethered their horses to trees and posts near the church. W. M. Oglesby and Captain Davenport were seated near a window with their rifles and when a horseman rode out of the brush and circled the group of horses hitched to the posts and trees, Captain Davenport recognized the man as one of the horse rustlers of the country and quietly reached for his rifle, took aim, and fired. The horseman reeled in the saddle. Captain Bill Oglesby remarked: "Hit 'im by God". The rider was only wounded and escaped to the brush. After the excitement died down, preaching was resumed.

**TURNERSVILLE UNITY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH**

It was on September 10, 1871, that a small group gathered at the North Bosque Schoolhouse, which was a log building about 2 miles southeast of the present site of Turnersville. Rev. Levi Tenny, well-known figure in the Presbyterian Church of Texas in that day was the minister who officiated at the organization of the church and also served in that capacity from April 1, 1876 to April 1, 1878. He was also pastor at Hico, Iredell, Clifton and Dublin and was Clerk of the Central Texas Presbytery for 34 years.

Charter members of the Unity Church are: W. E. Young, John Armstrong, Mrs. P. A. Black, W. J. Miller, Mrs. W. J. Miller, A. M. Armstrong, Mrs. A. M. Armstrong, and Mr. and Mrs. John Hurst. W. E. Young and John Armstrong were elected and ordained as ruling elders of the new church. On October 22, 1871, John Hurst, who had established a settlement at Hurst Springs was elected and ordained an elder.

Services were continued in the log school house until 1877, when a new school house was built, and it became the new meeting place. In 1882, a church house was built, the first place of worship in Turnersville. For a number of years, the Baptist, Methodist, and Presbyterians held services in the same church.

In 1906, the present church was built at a cost of \$4,000, with a membership of 76. During its history, the church has enrolled 520 members and the membership today is about 50.

September 8, 1946, the church celebrated its 75th Anniversary, and Rev. J. H. Freeland of Houston, and Rev. B. K. Tenny of Atlanta, Ga., grandsons of W. E. Young, one of the founders, were present. Also, Rev. E. O. Harrell, then of Cameron, the latest to enter the ministry from the Unity church.

Outstanding figures in the church's history include daughters of W. E. and Mary Jane Caufield Young, who were Mrs. Fred Foote, Sr., Mrs. Elizabeth Freeland, Mrs. Catherine Tenny and Mrs. Josephine Bernholtz, each Sunday School teachers for 20 years or more. Mrs. Elizabeth Freeland was head of the primary department for over 40 years.

Officials of the church who have had long tenures are Fred Foote, Sr., 56 years; W. A. Cooksey, 32; John Hobin, 30; D. W. Freeland, 27; W. E. Young, 26; and A. D. Buchanan, 24.

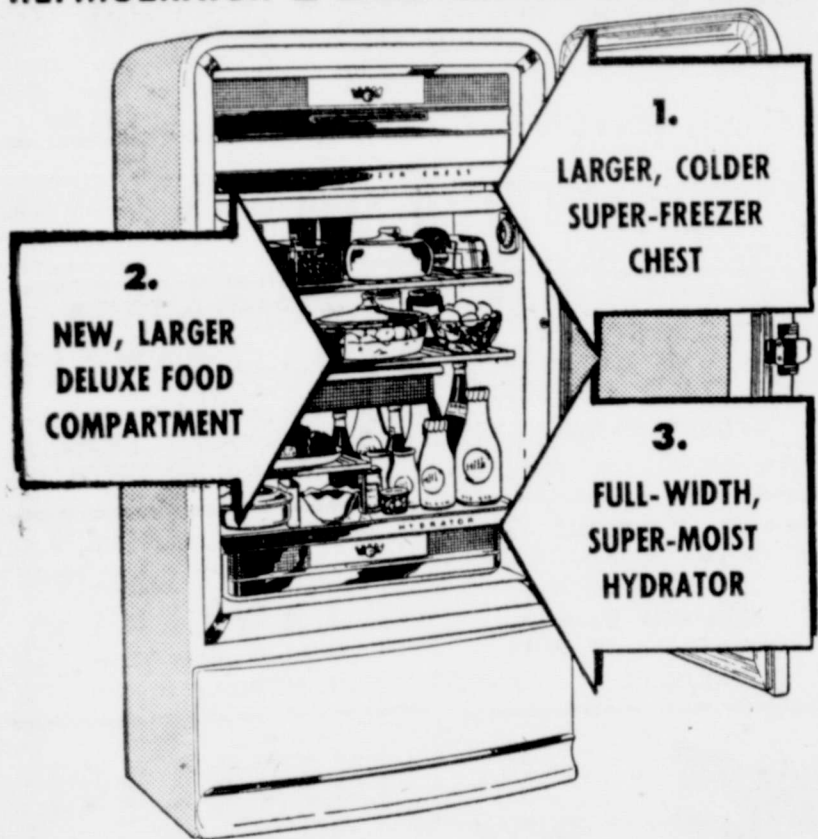

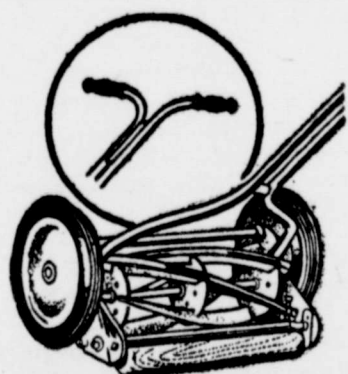

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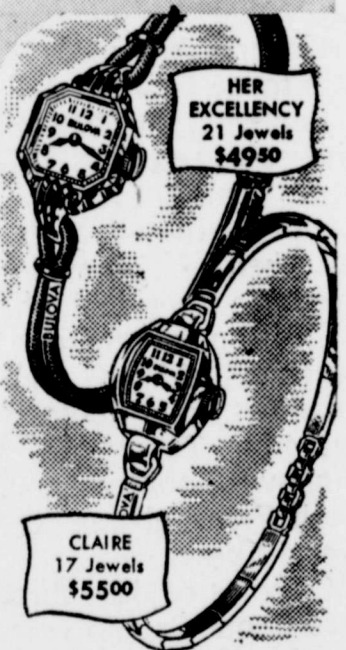

Here is a letter from a girl which shows that some kids do not stop to think about what mother's chief role is—to put her flock on the right path and blow the whistle when necessary.

There doesn't seem to be any reason why you shouldn't be able to discuss this problem with your mother, Marjorie. Why don't you ask mother if you can invite boys to your home? Perhaps if your parents had a chance to know the boys in your class, things would be different.

The first thing to do then is to try to get permission to bring the boy back home. If he is the right sort, mother will be attracted to him. If he is not the right type for you, mother can tell immediately, and perhaps discourage you, which will be to your best interests.

It is Mom's obligation to keep a watchful eye on her young. But if she does give permission to you for an evening out, she should trust you to be home at the appointed time, and not sit at the window or on the porch waiting for you. This would, of course, make you and your date feel stupid.

## HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NOTES

The supervisors of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors had their regular monthly meeting last week April 27th at Gatesville. Those present were Cliff Tinkle, Chairman, Sam Powell, vice-chairman, and Elmo W. Newsom, secretary-treasurer. B. C. Madeley, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service was also present.

The Board of Supervisors are in a position to get a Manure Spreader for the District. If the cooperators want this spreader come to the office and make your wishes known. The supervisors feel that the conservation of water is very important to any farmer. They have purchased one dozen rain gauges which are unbreakable and are for sale to cooperators at \$1.25 each. Come by the office and get yours.

Frederick Green, Jr. and Savoy Lawrence, cooperators of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District, have completed sodding waterways on their farms to burmuda grass. The good rains that have been falling should make these waterways cover completely this year.

H. T. Hall, cooperator of the district program, has sodded the waterway he had constructed last fall to buffalo grass. Mr. Hall is to be complemented as he has done a fine job. Any farmer having trouble controlling erosion on terrace outlets or waterways should do some sodding while there is plenty of moisture in the ground. One of the best times is immediately after a rain.

F. G. Collard, a cooperator of the West Oglesby Group, has planted 28 acres to Madrid clover which is up and looking good. Mr. Collard has also reseeded his waterways to buffalo grass. He is also resting his pasture this spring to allow it to recover from two years of dry weather.

Paul Hinson, an Ames Veteran Vocational Agricultural student, cooperating with the district has a good fertilizer demonstration south of the road. He top dressed his small grain with 100 lbs. ammonium nitrate and failed to completely lap, therefore, the light streaks through his grain.



## It Pays to Fight

Everybody loves a fighter. For that reason, the popularity of Harry S. Truman is running pretty high at this time. All the pollsters, all the misled, have had their say: President Truman was the man who wouldn't be licked! Mr. Truman was apparently the only candidate who really took the opinion polls to heart. While the general public was being lulled to sleep by everybody's opinion as to the outcome of the election, Candidate Truman got in there and fought.

### An American Ideal

Preferences for candidates in the voting on November 2 were not the same as reported by the poll takers before election. What happened? My guess is this: a larger percentage of those who favored a fighting man went out to vote than was the case with those favoring the non-fighter, who thought he would be elected anyhow. In other words, the opinion polls were interpreted by each candidate—by Mr. Truman in a way that helped elect Mr. Truman and by Mr. Dewey in a way that defeated Mr. Dewey.

The important thing is that the fighting man won. This is an old American principle. The man who works the hardest, who never-says-die, is favored in the struggle for success. Our nation has been built by heroes, sung and unsung, who lived by that rule. May I submit that in these critical times, it will not be possible for America to keep her traditional place as the most favored of lands, unless Americans are willing to take up the fight.

### Fight or Die

Why has America more national income than any other six nations you can name? Why do more American youth have a chance to go to high school and college than go in all the rest of the world put together? Why do American workers have the highest wages in all the world? Here are some of the reasons: we have the right to own property, to operate our own businesses and compete with each other, to invest capital in industrial tools.

Moreover, we Americans can work at the job we like, wherever we like, with equal justice for all. If we keep these liberties, preserve constitutional government, and maintain freedom of individual opportunity, it will be possible for us to double our wages and standards of living, as we did during the last generation. If we turn to government management and thus kill our incentives, we can expect wages and living standards to go down 50 per cent below the present level.

### Stakes Are High

Step by step America is being pushed in that direction. A few more steps, and we may find ourselves under such pressure that we cannot avoid socialism, and the communism that follows it. Our people must understand these facts. More important, we must be active in preserving the fundamentals of our American way of life.

The price is still "eternal vigilance." Are we willing to fight valiantly by every means: platform, radio, press, screen, and conversation—to preserve America's freedoms? If so, we can keep our freedoms. Otherwise, they will pass away, as from Greece and Rome. It takes a valiant heart. Those who win are those who fight.
