Clois D. Stone, Administrative Officer says this week the ACA is completing the 4th week of the Farm Acreage Report sign up. To speed the work, Rufus McCauley, Ray Alford and I. F. Elam are being sent to the field to contact farmers on the farm.

1400 farmers have reported their acreage, and those who haven't should contact ACA immediately if you are farming and have not received a notice to report your crops.

Unless a farm has properly executed these reports it will be impossible to give any allotments on corn, oats, maize, wheat, cotton or peanuts, if allotments are deemed necessary and are set up for these crops in the next year or so. So, if you plan to plant any of these it is necessary that a farm acreage report be filed with ACA immediately.

Dear Friends:

This is being written one day early (Thursday, May 5th) as I shall be in Texas tomorrow with the Secretary of Agriculture. In addition to the Secretary, we are bringing a number of the heads of the branches of the Department of Agriculture, Members of Congress and several other distinguished guests. I think that it is always helpful to Texas to get those in authority to see and know our problems and our possibilities. We have every reason to anticipate that the time will come when it may mean much to us to have these contacts.

In addition, I feel that our people have much to gain by a better understanding of the programs of the various agencies of government. I hope that Secretary Brannan will give our people a clear understanding of his far-reaching proposals for the support of farm prices and farmers' income. Surely there can be little disagreement with his contention that we must maintain a substantial farm income or all segments of our economy will collapse. I have repeatedly pointed out that I disagree primarily with the Secretary's proposal to pay direct subsidies. I prefer a program where the farmer pays at least something

for his own price insurance and where the constitution of the program will not depend on annual appropriations by Congress.

This week has witnessed the end of Act 1 in the labor-management drama. On Tuesday the House passed to "third reading", a substitute for the Taft-Hartley Act known as the "Wood Bill". This bill has been substituted for the "Lesinski Bill" which the Committee had reported. The Lesinski Bill would repeal the Taft-Hartley Act and re-instate, with minor changes, the old Wagner Act. Passage of this particular bill was urged by many labor proponents on the ground that this was the only way to carry out the Democratic platform. Congressman Marcantonio of New York contended that the platform called for an outright repeal with no additional provisions. He offered an amendment to this effect. It only received 37 votes. Practically all of those who had criticized "Southern Democrats" voted against this direct repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act.

The Wood Bill retains many features of the Taft-Hartley Act, but it had been amended in a number of respects to more nearly meet the critics of that measure. I had supported most of these amendments. I feel that the Taft-Hartley Act can be greatly improved, but I definitely do not believe that we should go back to the old days when John L. Lewis could tie up the industry of the entire Nation. I believe that both parties to a labor contract must accept responsibility on that contract. I think that both sides should have the right of free speech. The Wood Bill guarantees these things. I, therefore, voted for the Wood Bill on Tuesday when it carried by a vote of 217 to 203, and again on Wednesday I voted not to recommit (that is kill) the same bill. A few Members did change their vote over night, and the Wood Bill was recommitment by a vote of 212 to 209.

I fear that this action will only result in intensifying the bitterness that has already developed. I fear that there will be further threats like the unfortunate statements of the President and further misrepresentations like the unwarranted broadcasts of Mr. Fulton Lewis and others. If this results, we will probably find ourselves farther from a fair solution than ever.

I hope that both sides will recognize that neither can or should write a bill which is completely to their own liking and that they will be willing to make reasonable concessions which will recognize the rights of the several States as well as the rights of labor and industry. Nothing can be accomplished simply by name calling. For instance, I have received dozens of communications referring to the Wood Bill as a "Dixiecrat" measure. Mr. Wood supported President Truman and the Democratic Party while I am advised Congressman Simms of South Carolina made speeches against Mr. Truman in favor of Mr. Thurmond, the Dixiecrat candidate. The very people who condemned the authorship of the Wood Bill supported the Simms Bill.

I don't think the authorship of either measure should be the test. The only question should be what is fair and right.

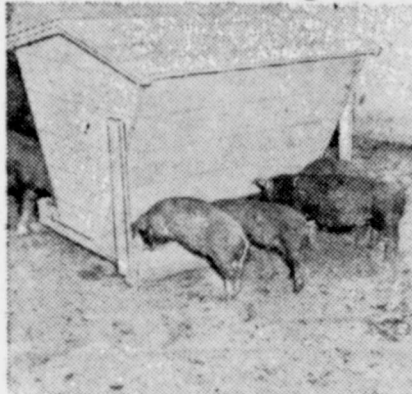
