Grasshopper Control

dane, 1 pint per 5 gallons water, meeting. was distributed over each acre. The killing requirement for Grasshoppers is 1 pound of technical Chlordane per acre. This pint of Chlordane is diluted with either 5, 10 or more gallons of water. The main point is to not use less than one pound or one pint per acre. In case you are using a small sprayer use one tablespoonful of Chlordane per gallon of water, and cover vegetation thoroughly.

Farmers may expect trouble from grasshoppers and should begin now to spray or dust turnrows, ditches, fence rows. No free bait will be available this year. This will make it necessary for farmers to use the more effective agents such as Chlordane or Toxophane.




