**Midwest Storms Kill 46, Millions Damage**

A series of tornadoes and storms in the midwest killed 46 and caused millions of dollars damage over the week end. Hardest hit was Missouri, Illinois and Indiana. Tornado winds struck Abilene, injuring at least four and flattening half a dozen homes. Thunderstorms hit scattered Texas towns and cities.

**15 Per cent Cut On Marshall Plan, Etc.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 23. (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee voted to cut Marshall Plan spending by 15 per cent today as well as trimming Administration requests for relief in occupied areas and other foreign aid.

**Ministers Meet To Solve German Problems**

PARIS, France, May 23. (AP)—Foreign Ministers of the United States, France, Britain and Russia met here today to try to solve the thorny German problem spotlighted by the bloody rioting of strikers in Berlin. Almost at the same moment of handshakes between representatives of the East and West, the West German Government was put in effect as delegates of the 11 states in the three West Zones signed the Bonn Constitution.

**Flowers Can Now Go Overseas For Dead of World War II**

American families having World War II dead in any of the 17 new permanent U. S. Military Cemeteries overseas, may decorate individual graves this Memorial day, Mrs. J. B. Graves, Gatesville Florist announced last week.

Any family that has received a letter from the Department of the Army advising grave location in a permanent U. S. Military Overseas cemetery can make available for direct flowers-by-wire service in both Atlantic and Pacific areas, thru the bonded network of the Florists Telegraph and Delivery Association, of which the local florist is a member.

These cemeteries are in Europe, Africa, Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico, and Canal Zone. WWI cemeteries are in Belgium, England and France.

For guaranteed delivery by Memorial Day, cable orders should be placed by May 25.

**First Construction Work On Leon Dam Will Start June 14th**

The initial contract on the Leon Dam, for part of the earth embankment, will be awarded when bids are opened on June 14th. Col. B. F. Robinson of Galvston, acting division engineer, U. S. Army stated Monday.

The first contract, including dirt work and construction of a small office building for supervising personnel, will be covered by funds remaining from the \$500,000 appropriated last year by congress.

A second appropriation of \$1,488,000 is expected to be finally approved in congress within the next week or two, and one or more additional construction contracts will be awarded when those funds become available.

Col. Robinson, who will have direct supervision of the project, said that it probably could be completed within three years, if enough funds were appropriated. Estimated total cost of the dam and its power equipment is \$22,500,000.

When completed, the dam, located on the Leon three miles north of Belton and seven miles south-

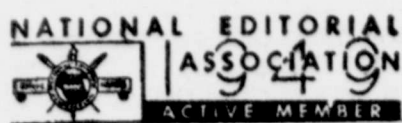

# The Texas Poll

## The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, May 21.—If the Texas Legislature winds up its session without new taxes, after having approved more spending than ever before, some members may loon upon this as a feat of financial wizardry. But not "the folks back home." They expect it.

For here is what a statewide survey just completed by The Texas Poll shows:

1. Six out of every ten adults believe present taxes bring in enough money to pay for everything that is needed.

2. At the same time, six out of every ten say there is need for spending more money—for schools, roads, old-age pensions, hospitals for the insane, health, and a number of other things.

3. As for saving money, only a small minority can advise state officials how to do that.

Thanks to a surplus of funds that has been built up in recent years, the Legislature may be able to

satisfy most public demands without levying new taxes. At least that seems to be the goal of leaders in the legislative saddle. The next few days may tell whether or not they succeed.

But what if more money becomes necessary to keep the budget balanced? How should it be raised? On this issue, public opinion is widely divided. The Texas Poll finds more people are inclined to favor natural resources taxes than any other type, with liquor, luxury, and sales taxes next in line.

The poll's findings are based on these questions which were put to a cross section of the adult population:

1. "Do you know of anything that our state government spends money for that should be reduced or cut out?"

Suggested ways for state to save money.....14%  
Don't know of anything that should be reduced or cut out.....86

100%

2. "Is there anything our state government should spend more money for than it is now spending?"

Suggested ways to spend more money.....60%  
Don't know of anything State should spend more money for.....40

100%

3. "Do you think present taxes bring in enough money for the state government to pay for everything that is needed, or not?"

Yes, enough.....62%

4. "Suppose you were a member of the Legislature and you found it necessary to raise more money for the government. What types of taxes would you be inclined to vote for?"

The top economy suggestion, made by 3 per cent of the adults questioned, is to reduce personnel. These people said too many persons are on the government payroll who don't earn their salaries. Another two per cent felt that old-age pensions and other welfare expenses could be reduced. Other suggestions, each offered by at least one per cent of the persons interviewed, were "cut out or reduce overlapping boards and bureaus", "cut out waste", "get rid of old-age pension investigators", "reduce business regulations", and "stop spending so much on roads and parks".

In answer to the second question, 29 per cent said more money should be spent on education. 18 percent said more should be spent on roads. More on old-age pensions, 7 per cent; hospitals for insane, 4 per cent; health, 3 per cent; relief to the poor and the handicapped, 3 per cent; veterans bonus, 2 per cent; housing, 1 per cent; and miscellaneous other things, 6 per cent.

If it becomes necessary to raise more money, the taxes on natural resources should be increased, said 16 per cent of the adults interviewed. Other taxes favored were liquor, beer and wine, by 9 per cent; luxuries and amusements, by 7 per cent; sales tax, by 7 percent, corporation tax, by 4 percent; gasoline tax, by 3 per cent; cigarette tax, by 3 per cent; and income tax by 3 per cent.

Miscellaneous other types of taxes were proposed by 8 per cent. A number of these said various forms of gambling, especially betting on horse races, should be legalized and taxed. Most Texans, however, would probably disapprove of this. In a recent survey, 58 per cent of a cross section of adults said they would vote against a bill making it legal to bet on horse races.

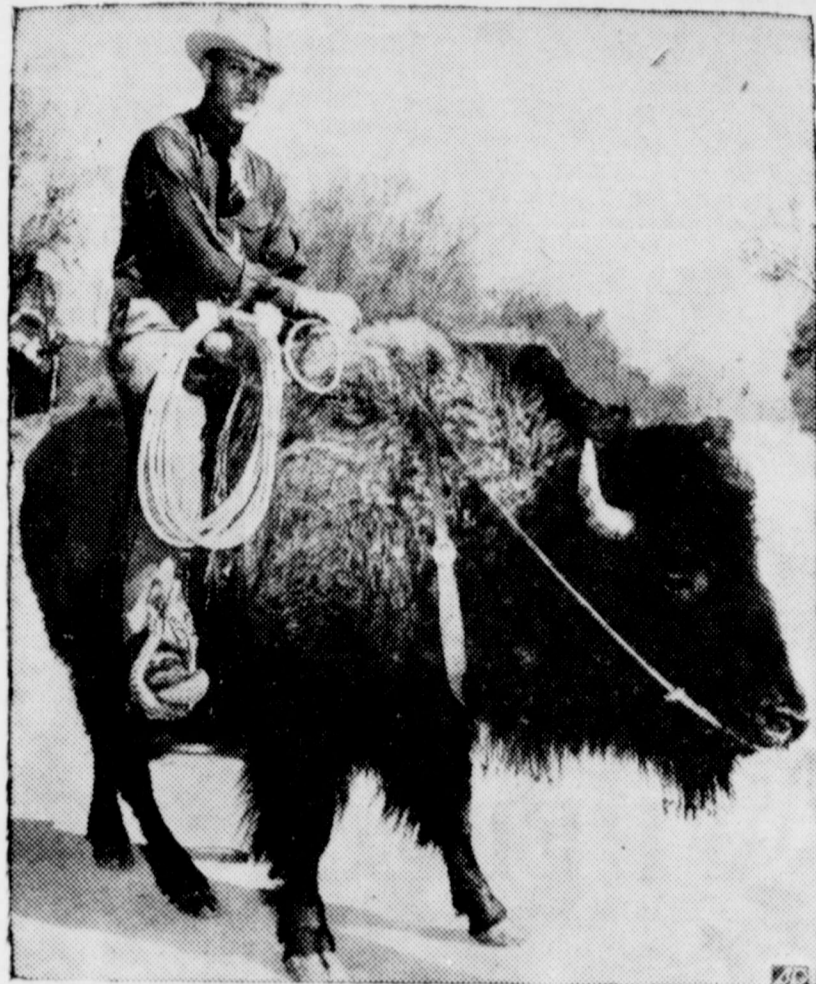

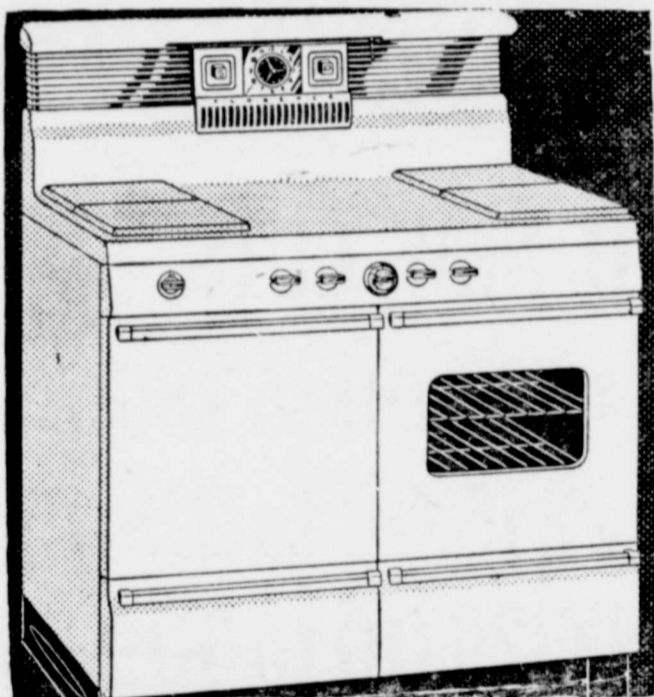



Even the County Agent who missed his supper arranging for this party, admits that cookies and lemonade (in quantity) make a good substitute for a meal.

Melvin Hempel, Clarence Smith, Mike Taylor and Benny Smith were the foursome who inspired the younger members to greater efforts to master such swing game as "Pop Goes the Weasel".

Mrs. Nell Robinson, young and peppy Home Demonstration Agent, believes that a well rounded club program provides for proper recreation for the youngsters.

**Grasshopper Control**

A Grasshopper Control Demonstration was held last Friday at the Arthur Schloeman farm. Chlordane, 1 pint per 5 gallons water, was distributed over each acre. The killing requirement for Grasshoppers is 1 pound of technical Chlordane per acre. This pint of Chlordane is diluted with either 5, 10 or more gallons of water. The main point is to not use less than one pound or one pint per acre. In case you are using a small sprayer use one tablespoonful of Chlordane per gallon of water, and cover vegetation thoroughly.

Farmers may expect trouble from grasshoppers and should begin now to spray or dust turnrows, ditches, fence rows. No free bait will be available this year. This will make it necessary for farmers to use the more effective agents such as Chlordane or Toxophane.

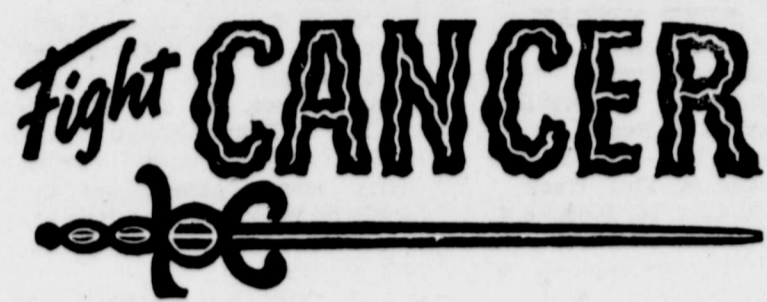

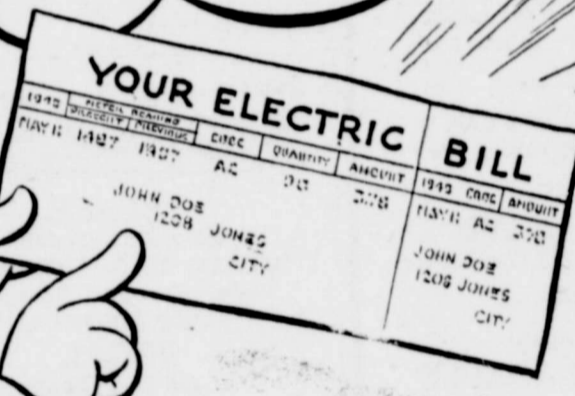

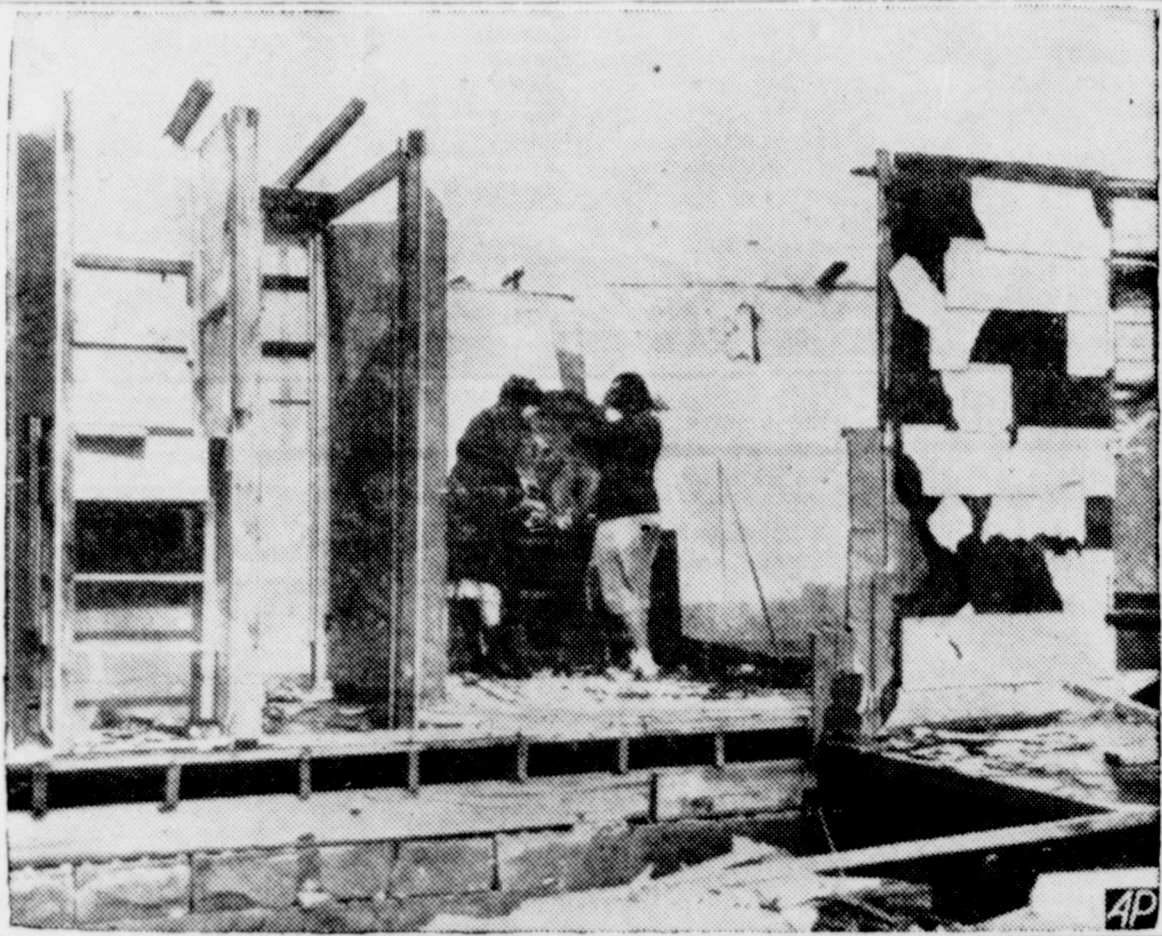
