SHANGHAI, China, May 26. (AP) Shanghai's defenders in the northern part of the city ran up the white flag today and Communist troops swept into this fourth largest city in the world.
 Unconfirmed reports said 15,000 Nationalist troops were captured at Woosung. Woosung is the escape hatch for the Shanghai garrisons.

Air Lift Back on Job: Semi-Berlin Blockade

BERLIN, Germany, May 26. (AP) Once again the airlift was the city's main supply source as the striking anti-communist railway workers effectively clamped a semi blockade on Berlin.

The 12,000 workers want to be paid in high valued Western marks. Unofficial reports were that the three Western Commandants might order the strikers to handle incoming trains.

Texas Senate Asks New Boss For GSSB And Other Schools

Austin, May 25. (AP)—The Waco State Orphans Home, the Gatesville school for boys, and the orphans home at Corsicana were among five State schools which would get a new boss under a Senate amendment passed today.

In approving a plan which puts Texas in the business of preventing and curing juvenile delinquency, a Senate amendment would remove five correctional schools from administration of the State Board of Control and place them under a proposed State Youth Development Council.

The amendment was added to a bill which has already been passed by the House. It now goes back to the House for approval.

Under the bill, delinquent children would be committed to the council rather than directly to an institution. Qualified psychiatrists and medical authorities would examine the child and prescribe cor-

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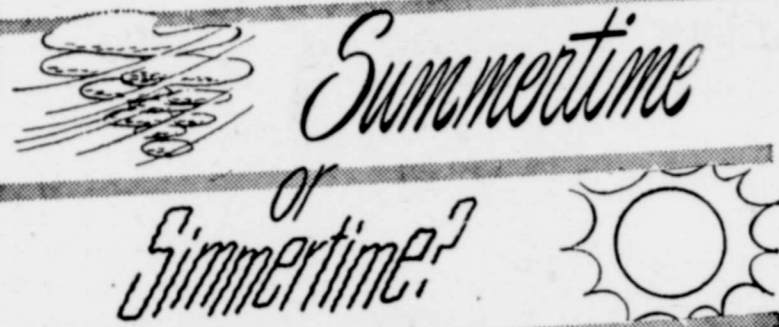

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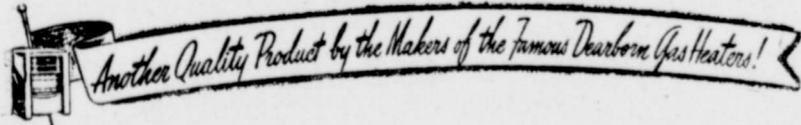

Sheep Show and Sale

The 1949 Sheep Show and Sale was a success from every angle—the quality of sheep entered, the penning, handling and exhibition. Prices received were fair. The only disappointment was the few sheep purchased by local sheep raisers. With ewes and lambs selling for \$20 and above and wool bringing 70c per pound \$100 is cheap for a stud ram. A formula for sheep and cattle justifies paying five times the value of the average cow or ewe; for bull or buck. If a cattle raiser has a group of cows with an average value of \$200 then his bull should be worth \$1,000. You don't buy \$1,000 bulls for \$150, and if you get your bull for \$150 that is all he is worth and may be not that much. You might be better off to give somebody \$150 to haul him to the nearest slaughter barn.

Beef Cattle

Speaking of good cattle, I can tell you where to find them. It will be worth your time to see them. Go out to J. C. Taylor's farm on Coryell Creek to see a small herd of Angus. Cows are good, calves are good and the bull is a good range bull. These are not show type cattle, but are cattle with lots of pounds and can be put on in a hurry.

Pasture Necessary

This herd had excellent pasture—not many acres but much grass. Under brush along creek has been cleared. This pasture has clover, black medic, wild rye, rescue, wild millet, bermuda, and buffalo.

Roscoe Coward up on the Leon River has a small herd of Hereford. This herd is comparable in quality to the Taylor herd. These are good type Hereford.

Luke Walker, Hereford Breeder, sold last week to Len Porter of Pine Bluff, Arkansas, ten yearling heifers at \$250 each. These are registered Hereford heifers.

Grasshoppers Under Control
Arthur Schloeman reports effective control of grasshoppers with Green Light Chlordane. Pasture was sprayed in strips. Spraying one strip and leaving one unsprayed. Grasshoppers migrate into sprayed strips and are killed.

Again let us remind farmers the time to kill grasshoppers is while they are small and still in breeding beds. When they start flying it's too late to bar the gate, because they will fly over it.

Gatesville District now has a \$1.00 rate (Collecting .95 this year.) The building program will raise the PRESENT TAX RATE .25.

Valuations:

Since the consolidations the Gatesville District has a valuation of approximately \$6,000,000.

Reasons For Delay:

1. Due to consolidations a lot of "red tape" had to be cleared with the Attorney General's Department.
2. Attempting to locate a suitable site.
3. Waiting on the new school laws pending now in the Legislature. These new laws under the proposed foundation program could have some effect on the tax rate division.
4. Plans and figures are being re-worked in an attempt to save as much money as possible.

Size of Building:

It is necessary to build a building to house 600 students. At 25 students per room it will take 24 class rooms.

1 Play Room (for bad weather) 1 Library 1 Music Room
1 Nurses' Room and Clinic 1 Teachers' Work Room
1 Set of Offices

The building will cover approximately 57,000 square feet.

Size of District:

Since consolidations the Gatesville District will contain approximately 170 square miles. The new bonds will cover this area. There will be no old outstanding bonds.

It will take around 12 months to construct this building. It is very necessary that the building is started as soon as possible. 600 students are in make-shift school rooms with bad lighting and very bad ventilation.
