

We are making discouragingly slow progress on the farm price support legislation and on the rural telephone bill. This atter bill has been before the Rules Committee for neary three months. I have appeared before them repeatedly. They simply refuse to act. Today Chairman Cooley of the Agi riculture Committee stated that if the Rules Committee does not act by next Wednesday, he will file the required notice that he will call the bill up without regard to the Rules Committee. This he can do not less than 21 days after the filing of the notice. This is considered a very unusual action, but I think it is entirely justified by the delay. The Agriculture Committee continues to work on the price support program, but it is clear that the Senate is not going to accept as far-reaching changes in the Aiken Bill as we feel should be made. 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


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

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
