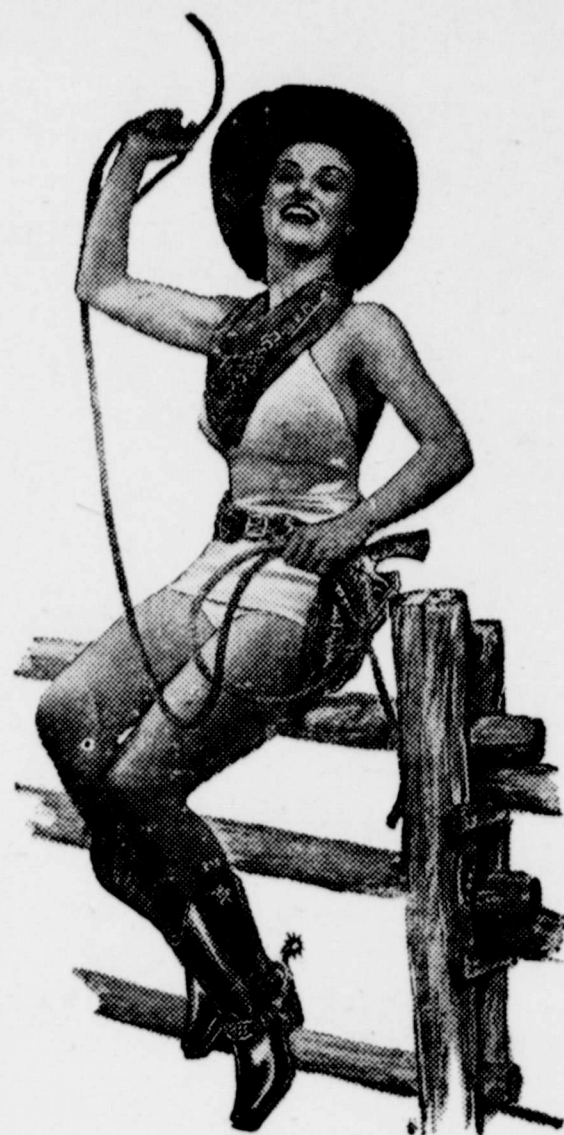

**TNG Starts Trek To NCH For Two Weeks Training Period**

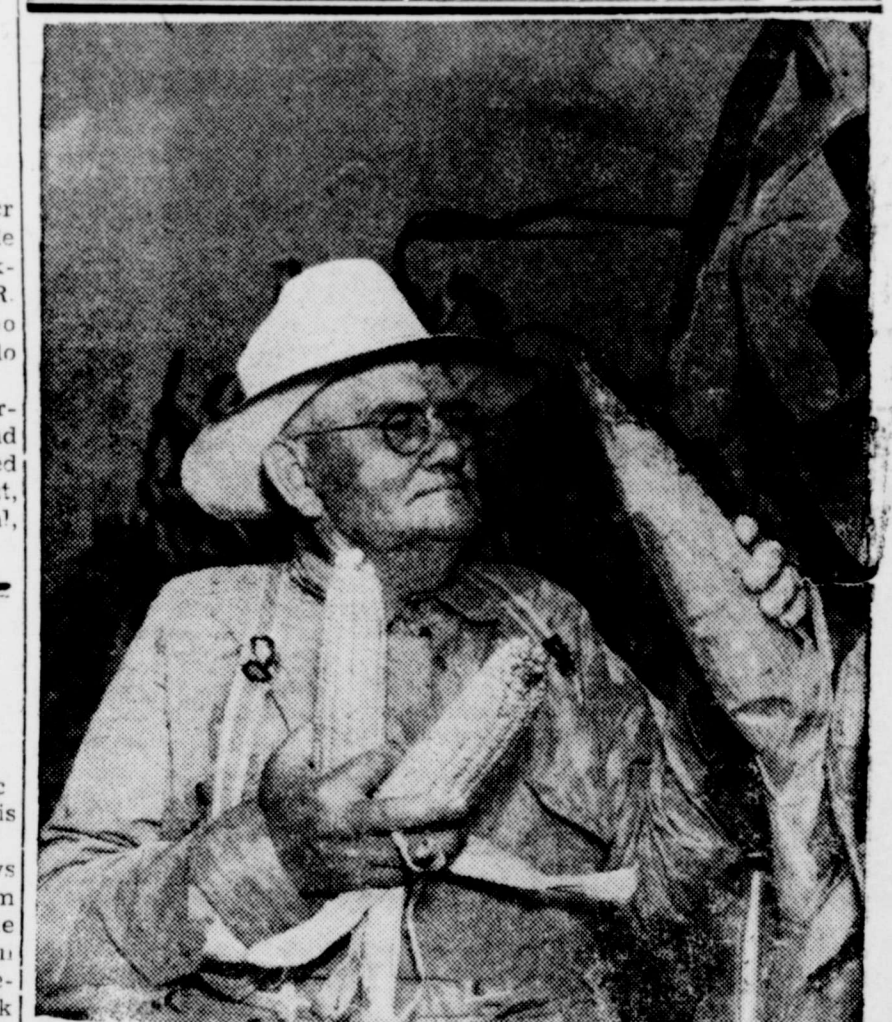

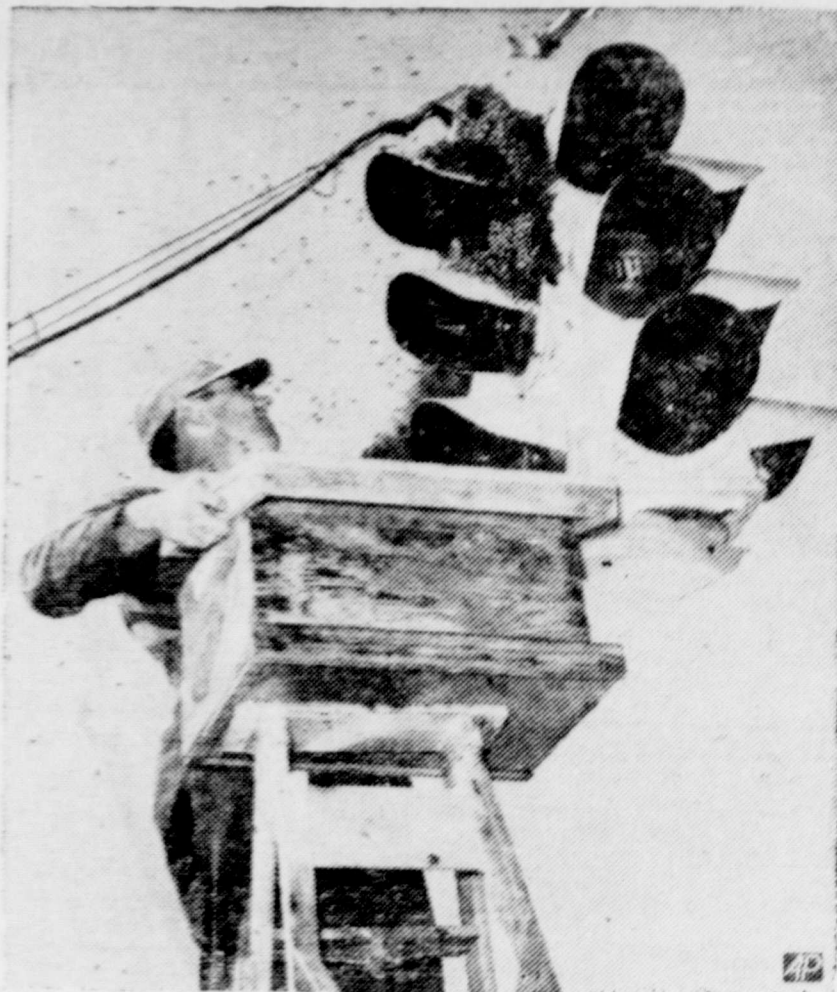

Some of these young people will have already determined upon their field; others will be groping for a field which offers them opportunities best suited to their temperaments, aptitude and training.

To many of these young people, journalism offers a tremendous appeal.

There are so many facets to the publishing field that it affords opportunities to many types of temperaments.

There are the editorial and reportorial side of journalism for those having a flair for and a desire to write.

There is the advertising side for those interested in salesmanship.

There is the mechanical side for those having an aptitude for mechanics. And there is the business side for those wishing to enter the journalistic field but having no particular desire to specialize in either writing, advertising, or mechanics.

With these qualifications, those entering the journalistic field will find that their feet have already started on the first rung of a ladder, the climbing of which may be arduous but attainment at the peak of which brings a singular satisfaction seldom to be found elsewhere.

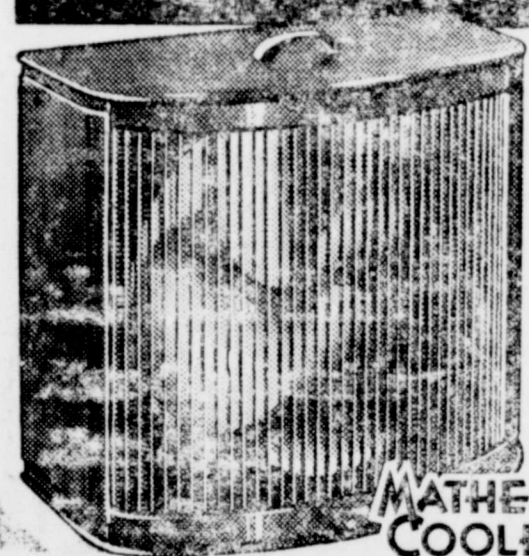
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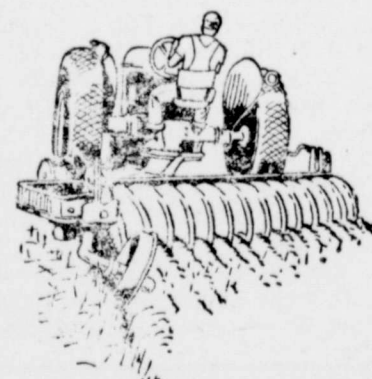

Dear Friends: May 27, 1949.

The House engaged in an exhibit of what might be called self-deception this week. The appropriation for the continuation of the Economic Cooperation program for Europe was before us. The Appropriations Committee had made a cut of approximately 15% in the amount requested by the Budget Bureau and below the amount Mr. Hoffman, the ECA Administrator, said would be needed to keep the program moving successfully. It seems to me that this program has been a great success so far. It has probably given us more military protection than any similar expenditure we have made. It has undoubtedly contributed a great deal to the maintenance of farm prices and to general prosperity and employment in the United States. I think it has thor-

oughly justified itself on purely selfish grounds. In addition, it is a grand exhibit of the willingness of the American people to help their less fortunate neighbors.

The success of the program depends in a large part on making enough aid available promptly. If we reduce our assistance to a point where the economy of the European Nations might collapse, it would be equivalent to irrigating a crop almost to maturity and then reducing the water until the crop burned up. I hope we have learned from our experience in China that if we are not willing to complete the job, we had better not start a recovery program.

What the House finally did was to retain most of the cut that the Committee had made in the appropriation, but at the same time they reduced the time over which the money was to be spent. This does not reduce the burden on the American taxpayer at all, but it does lessen the effectiveness of the program because the European Nations naturally feel less sure of our assistance.

We are making discouragingly slow progress on the farm price support legislation and on the rural telephone bill. This latter bill has been before the Rules Committee for nearly three months. I have appeared before them repeatedly. They simply refuse to act. Today Chairman Cooley of the Agriculture Committee stated that if the Rules Committee does not act by next Wednesday, he will file the required notice that he will call the bill up without regard to the Rules Committee. This he can do not less than 21 days after the filing of the notice. This is considered a very unusual action, but I think it is entirely justified by the delay. The Agriculture Committee continues to work on the price support program, but it is clear that the Senate is not going to accept as far-reaching changes in the Aiken Bill as we feel should be made. I believe, and I am sure most of the House Committee believes, that where the producers agree to acreage control, they should be assured at least 90% of parity price. Of course, where it is impractical to control the production, the support price must be

lower. We all know that we cannot support the price on unlimited production, but the Aiken Bill which will go into effect next year unless we change it this session, will not give us 90% of parity even with acreage control—unless the crop is below normal. The time we need support prices is when we grow a big crop.

I want to again call attention to the fact that we receive many letters without return addresses. Sometimes there are no signatures. Please try to put your name and address on your letter. Many times the return address will be on the envelope only, and the letter and envelope will be separated, making it impossible to get out replies we would like to give. I know many people do not realize that where we receive 50 to 100 letters at a time it is very easy to lose

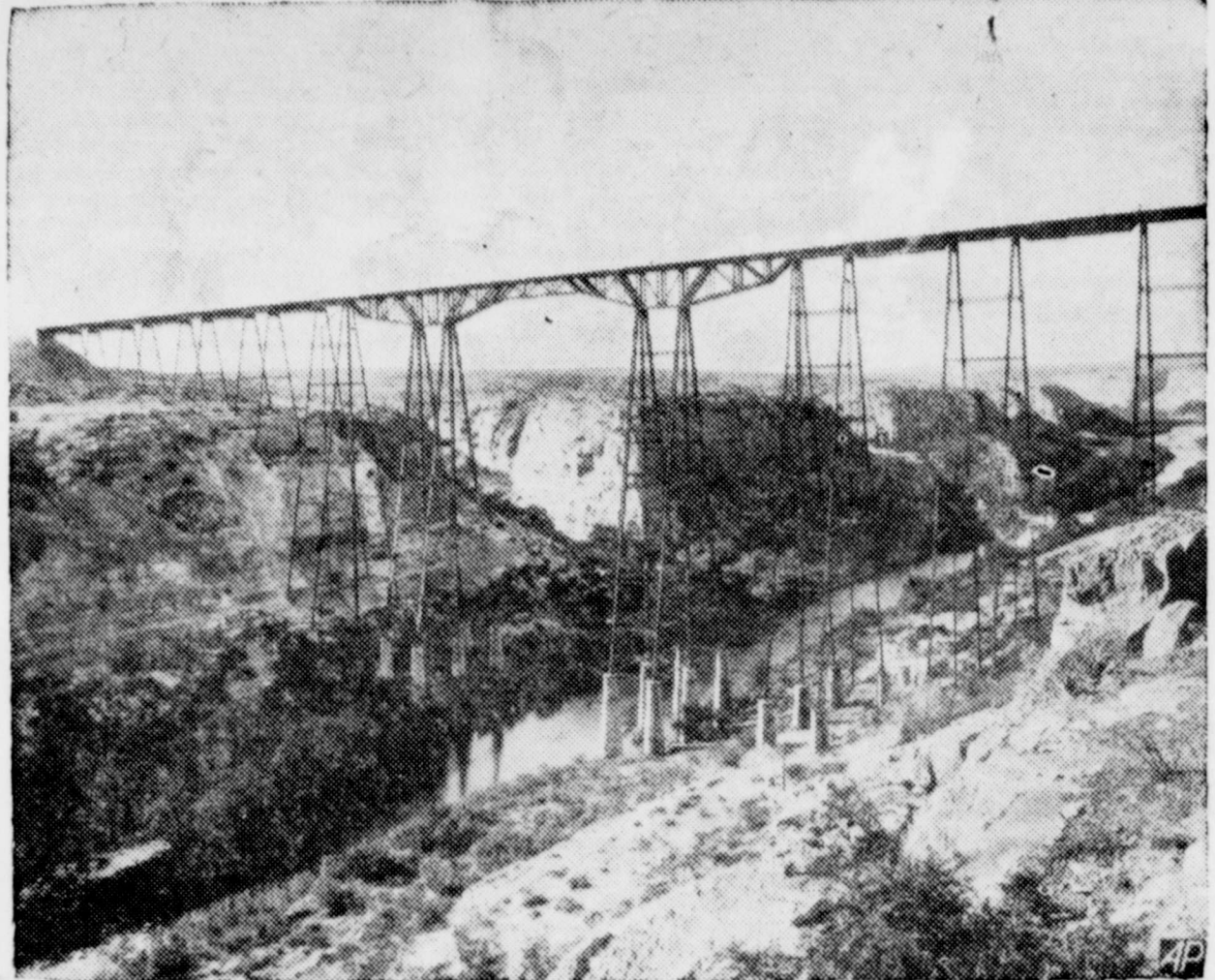
