

**36th Division Units Get Battle Honors: Jester Reviews**

NORTH CAMP HOOD, (AP) — National Guardsmen of the Texas 36th Division Saturday saw belated battle honors awarded to units of the division and heard others cited for outstanding peacetime emergency service.

Also, in a surprise ceremony during a colorful two-hour review the guardsmen saw Gov. Jester pin the stars of a major general on Col. Isaac S. Ashburn.

Gen. Ashburn, former commandant of Texas A&M College and present general manager of the Texas Good Roads Association, was assigned a deputy commander of the Texas National Guard.

A large crowd jammed the bleachers to view the ceremonies and see the huge parade of 5,300 troops and 66,000 vehicles—from jeeps to tanks—that passed in review.

Earlier, standing erect in a jeep with the flag of Texas flying, Gov. Jester had trooped the line past the division drawn up in information. Col. James Taylor, chief of staff, had read the citations of battle honors for the 2nd Battalion 143rd Infantry, for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy in December, 1944 near Mount de Sigolsheim and Fme Boux, France, and the 3rd Battalion, 143rd Infantry and attached units, formerly cannon company of the same regiment, and Co. C, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion, for outstanding performance of duty in combat at Ribeauffille, France, in Dec. 1944.

**Any Emergency**  
In citing units of the division for peacetime service, Gov. Jester paid tribute to the guard as always prepared to meet any emergency.

"Such outstanding examples of civic service as these units performed during these emergencies fully demonstrated to our people that the National Guard is ever prepared to lend a willing and efficient hand in any kind of emergency, be it peace or war," he said.

The reviewing stand was jammed with top brass of the National Guard and high Army officers as governor and Maj. Gen. H. Miller Ainsworth of Luling, division commander, reviewed the troops.

**Dignitaries Present**  
Included among the dignitaries were Lt. Gen. Preston A. Weathered, Dallas; Gen. Ashburn, Lt. Gen. Ernest O. Thompson, commanding general of the Texas National Guard, and Mrs. Thompson. Brig. Gen. John H. Collier and Brig. Gen. R. R. Starr of the 2nd Armored Division; Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, adjutant general of Texas; Brig. Gen. Dallas Mathews, former adjutant general; Brig. Gen. John H. O'Riley, Brig. Gen. Raymond Phelps, former division artillery commander of the 36th; Brig. Gen. C. L. Phinney of Dallas, assistant division commander and Brig. Gen. A. B. Crowther of San Antonio, division artillery commander.

An honor guest of Gen. Ainsworth was Maj. Gen. Jim Dan Hill commanding general of the 32nd Infantry Division, Wisconsin National Guard.

Gen. Ainsworth was host at a reception during the afternoon and at a dance Saturday night.

## Rabies Campaigns Bring Good Results — And a Warning

New victories are being chalked up in the nationwide effort to curb the rabies toll in man and animals the American Veterinary Medical Association has reported.

An Ohio county which had over 200 cases of canine rabies three years ago was able to wipe out the disease by a voluntary program involving the vaccination of pets and rounding up stray dogs. These measures also were effective in reducing the rabies toll to zero in a Missouri county that formerly had 200 to 400 cases annually.

Numerous other alert counties and even entire states are getting similar results in their fight on rabies, the veterinary medical organization said, but added this warning note:

"Areas which have brought rabies under control should not let their programs expire—or they may be right back where they started".

The AVMA emphasized that this disease is no respecter of state or county boundaries and that it takes only one rabid pet or wild animal to start a fresh outbreak where control measures are neglected.

That advise was offered this week by the American Veterinary Medical Association in a new warning that rabies is ore prevalent in wild animals than scientists used to think.

Normal, healthy foxes are retiring and always try to avoid people, an AVMA spokesman explained. But rabid foxes are aggressive, and their boldness may take the form of friendliness. The same goes for squirrels, skunks, and other wild animals. Like dogs, they transmit rabies by biting.

Dear Friends:

This afternoon I made my fifth appearance before the Rules Committee in an effort to get the Rural Telephone Bill before the House. This bill was reported unanimously by the Agriculture Committee on March 9. Since that date the telephone interests who have opposed the measure, have worked every angle to defeat it. They have taken advantage of the fact that certain Members of the House have not agreed with my position and the position of most of the Representatives from farming areas on labor legislation, and other measures in which they were interested. The telephone people have appealed to the prejudice against the South, and against the rural areas. On the other hand, they have gone to the ultra conservative Members and told them that this bill is "socialism". They have not stopped there. When they saw an opportunity to object on the ground that the bill allows the existing telephone operators the first opportunity to borrow money to improve and enlarge their systems, they got some of the Members of the Rules Committee to protest on the ground that the government should not lend money to private business. They conveniently forgot that the RFC has loaned billions to private business.

I can see nothing wrong in lending money to small telephone companies who want to improve rural service. When the banks and the railroads needed money they borrowed plenty from the government. I think the representatives of the independent telephone companies were clearly working against the interest of their own clients when they insisted on a higher rate of interest for these phone loans than we now charge for REA electric loans. After all, the little rural phone operator has most to gain by cheap money for improvements. The truth is that the whole telephone industry should be interested in devising some practical program for the improvement of this service if they want to avoid the threat of government ownership. I want to avoid it, myself. As long as private industry gives good service at reasonable rates the American people are not going to take it over. When private industry fails to give good service at reasonable rates the people are going to make such changes as are necessary to get the service. This bill would help rural people get that kind of service, and, therefore, is the best insurance against socialism. I do not, at this writing, know what the Rules Committee will do. I do hope that by the time you read this, we will have the bill on the Floor of the House.

Yesterday President Dutra of Brazil spoke (in Portuguese) to a joint session of the House and Senate. Of course, we had an English translation of his speech. His visit is important from the standpoint of cooperation between the United States and the other nations of the Western Hemisphere. We are Brazil's best customer, and Brazil buys a great deal from us. As a result, there has always been a firm friendship between our nations. This is particularly important at this time when it seems so impossible to enjoy the close relations which we would like with Argentina because of the Peron dictatorship in that country.

The Communists move slowly forward in China. Many people have already accepted defeat, and seem ready to turn all of Asia over to the Reds. I think this is a great mistake. I would support

an anti-Communist government even if it were confined to the Western Provinces and to Formosa. If we do not, we are going to find that we have not only turned over a great part of the world's population to the Communists, but we will be forced to share control of the United Nations. We must not forget that "China" has a permanent seat on the Council of the United Nations along with Russia, Great Britain, France and the United States. I fear that before long we will see our support of the anti-Communist forces in the Far East was too little and too late.

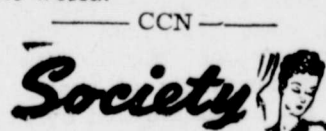

The well will be drilled 900 feet Barrow property just west of the Borden milk plant in East Gatesville.

The well will be drilled 900 feet deep and place the well casing. Cost of the well depends on where the water is found, either before, or after 900 feet, and work will start around July 1.

Other bids were J. L. Myers & Son, Dallas, \$12,950; Layne Texas Co., \$12,989; Texas Water Wells Co., Houston \$17,714.

**Water Well For LRD**

River Dam. Under the initial contract a portion of the earth embankment will be built about 1,500 feet long 60 feet high, and containing about 500,000 cubic yards of fill. The dam, when completed, will be approximately, 5,100 feet long and will rise 190 feet above the stream bed.

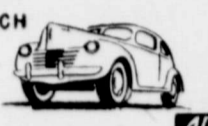

"Probably more time has been consumed by Grand Juries of this county in recent years in investigating felony offenses committed by escapees from this institution than from any other source.

"We have confidence in the ability and integrity of Superintendent R. E. Blair and believe him to be a high class gentleman with the best interest of this institution and his community at heart. It seems his hands are tied by rules and regulations from the governing board. As long as those who make the rules for the governing of this school fail to recognize that bad boys must be disciplined, it is our opinion that these escapes and resulting raids will continue.

"We urge all our citizens and those in authority in the State and at the institution give this problem their best thought to be end that this intolerable situation be remedied.

"We want to call attention to the hazards that are created by these long, heavy oil trucks that

pass thru Gatesville upon the streets at such excessive speed. We recommend that this matter be vigilantly watched and handled.

"We want to go on record as pooping the encroachment of any "isms" that might now or hereafter attempt to destroy any of the freedoms that we as American Citizens have been privileged to enjoy as provided us by our Constitution.

"We want to thank your honor for the able charge and assistance given us during our service and we also thank the honorable District Attorney and County Attorney for the assistance that they rendered us in our work. 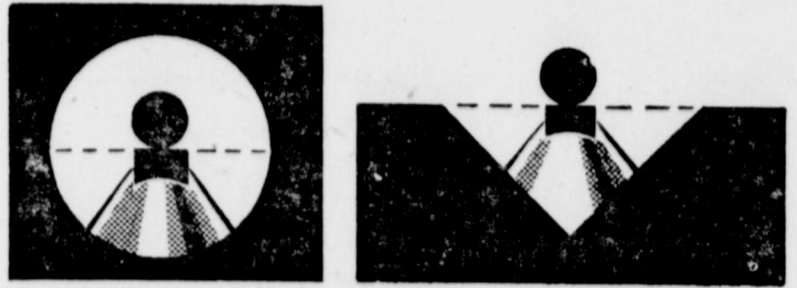

# HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE

By ARTHUR E. COOK  
National and Olympic Rifle Champion



## Sighting



Gun sights are used to point the rifle at the target and it is important to learn to sight perfectly. An error of 1/10 inch in sight alignment will place the bullet two inches from the center of a target only 50 feet away—a bad miss.

If you have the rear peep and front post sight combination on your rifle, aim as shown at top left, centering the top of the post in the peep hole. With an open rear sight (right above) center the top of the post on a level with the top of the rear sight before directing the aim on the target. Notice that when shooting at bulls-eye tar-

gets you aim at the bottom of the bull rather than at the center. That is because you are likely to lose sight of the black post within the black bulls-eye.

Aiming and shooting at bulls-eye targets is not only a great sport with many thousands of adherents throughout the world, but it is also the finest training for any kind of shooting. If you can't hit a bulls-eye that is standing still how can you expect to hit a live target that is moving?

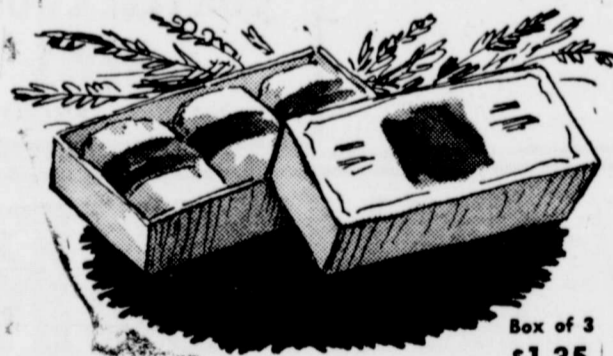

### The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, June 11.—Whether the cost of living is rising or dropping, apparently about four out of every ten Texas adults live in fear of harder times.

Two years ago, when economists were warning that high prices might be driving business to ruin, The Texas Poll put this question to a statewide cross section of adults:

"Six months from now, do you think it is going to be harder to make both ends meet, easier, or about the same as now?"

The same question has now put to a comparable cross section of adults at a time when experts are worrying that declining prices may bring a recession.

In spite of changed conditions, both surveys produced very similar results. Here are the public's answers:

May 1947:  
Harder ..... 41%  
Same ..... 40  
Easier ..... 13  
No opinion ..... 6  
100%

May 1949:  
Harder ..... 38%  
Same ..... 42  
Easier ..... 15  
No opinion ..... 5  
100%

The latest poll shows that adults in the lower economic levels are more likely to feel that they face harder times. But the difference in opinion between the lower and the upper classes is relatively small, as seen from the following table:

"Six months from now, do you think it is going to be harder to make both ends meet, easier, or about the same as now?"

Upper Class:  
Harder ..... 35%  
Same ..... 46  
Easier ..... 16  
No opinion ..... 3  
100%

Lower Class:  
Harder ..... 40 1/2%  
Same ..... 39  
Easier ..... 7  
No opinion ..... 7  
100%

In this poll, the "upper class" is represented by persons of average means.

A survey by The Texas Poll last March disclosed that while the public sensed a leveling off in living costs, a large majority felt their incomes would remain stable and saw no immediate danger of a depression. This would seem to indicate that the results of the latest poll measures mere fear of of harder times rather than rational opinion.

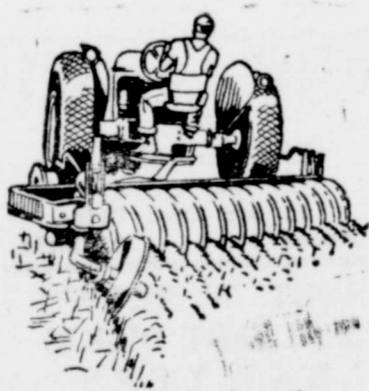

a combine and got approximately 100 lbs. of very good quality seed. In case moisture conditions are favorable there is a possibility that he will be able to harvest two more crops. All cooperaters and farmers who are panning to plant KR bluestem next spring should make arrangements to secure seed as it becomes available. It will be almost impossible to get it at seeding time because of its scarcity. Let's plant all the seed produced in this part of the district next spring.

Charles Powell, a cooperater of the district, has also harvested approximately 400 bs. of KR seed off his farm near Purmela. This is also very good seed and is Johnson grass free. So here is another chance for you to get some of this KR bluestem seed. This grass is palatable to livestock, is a prolific seeder and very good to control erosion on your farm.

Don Rhodes, a GI Vocational Agricultural student and a cooperater of the district program has completed 4.1 miles of terraces on his farm. These terraces were built by cooperater Dan Murrah with a whirlwind terracer and are the large ridge type. This completes the majority of Don's terracing system. He now will contour in his soil, which in turn will help prevent erosion and increase crop production.

Pt Pancake, cooperater of the district and an Ames Veteran student has had a waterway constructed during the past week. This waterway was constructed with heavy equipment belonging to the County and under the supervision of Commissioner Cleo Carroll.

E. M. Sharp, Deputy Sheriff and cooperater of the district program has had a waterway constructed in his farm which will be established to permanent grass. This waterway was constructed with heavy equipment under the jurisdiction of Commissioner Cleo Carroll.

Beach sitting is the newest wrinkle for monitors of the diaper and lollipop set. It's the simplest way to make money yet, says one teen-ager who adds "all you do is keep an eye on the children while you embroider—perhaps for your hope chest."

Besides the possibilities of having a thriving beach business, if you've been baby sitting all year, you can take your flock to the park or lake or beach instead of chasing them around a hot apartment or keeping them penned up on porches or in back yards. And will their mothers love you for it.

The plan isn't exactly new—some girls tried it out successfully last summer. One group so encouraged by the fun and easy money that they organized a Sorority of Beach Sitters at Atlantic City.

Their sorority is open to girls over 15, with previous baby sitting experience. They will wear white shirts with their organization name stencilled across the front, and will work only at beaches where written permission has been granted them by authorities.

One important thing the girls stress is that you can relax more if you equip yourself with props that will keep the youngsters amused and anchored at times during the day. These girls already have pried their resources to obtain a traveling crib which folds up into a suitcase (also can be used as a baby play pen), identification tags for recording the baby's name, address and information regarding food, feeding time, rest period; safety pins, time clock, spare bottles.

When a mother deposits a child with the beach sitter all pertinent information is written on the tag, which is placed securely on the child's sun or bathing suit until checking out time.

Standard rates are 50c for the first hour and 35c for every additional hour. This includes an occasional ice cream cone or lollipop, but if the child really has a sweet tooth with mother's permission, then mother must pay for extras.

It is not easy to care for too many children, particularly at a beach, so limit yourself to the number you can safely handle. 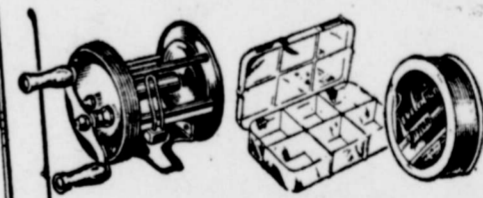

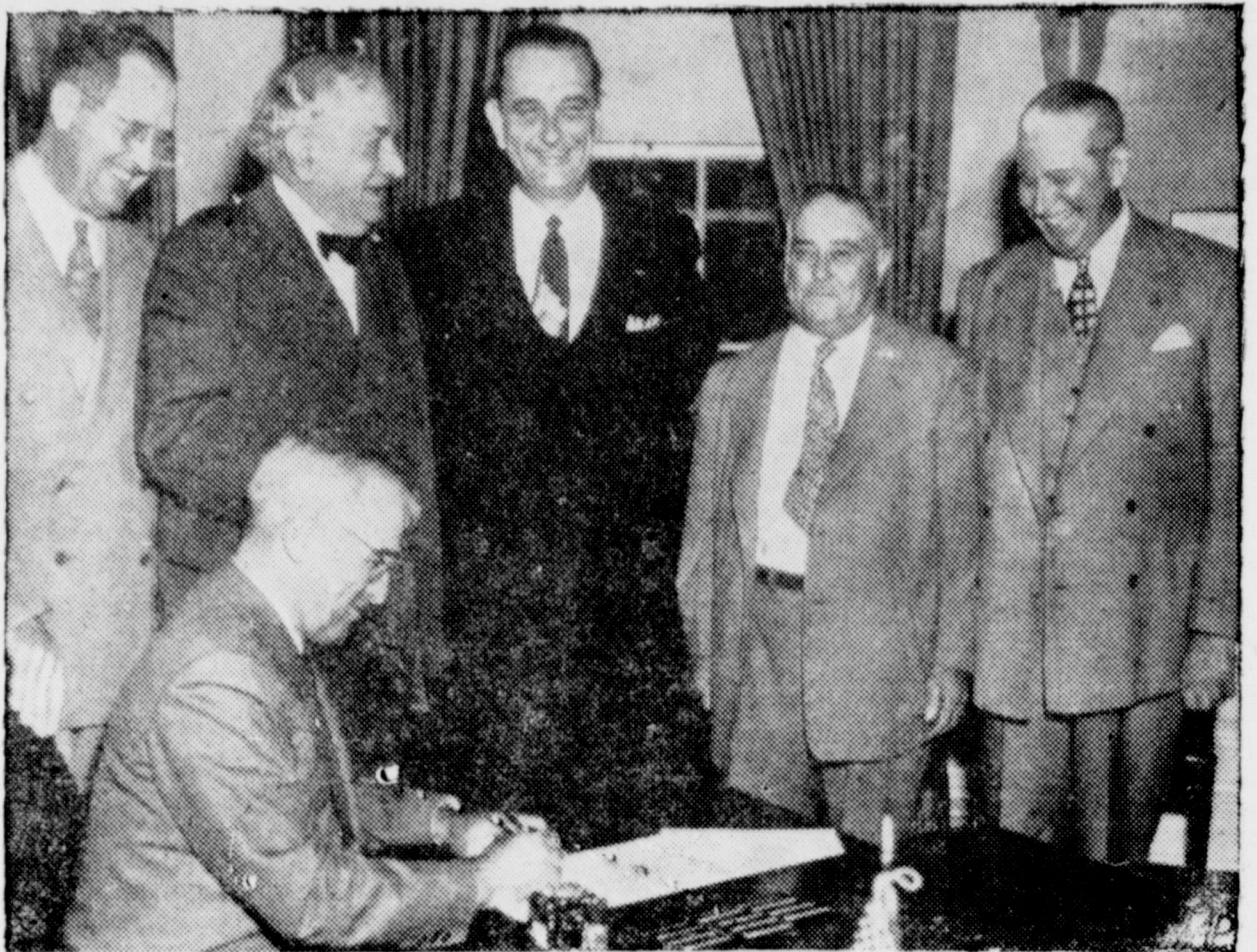

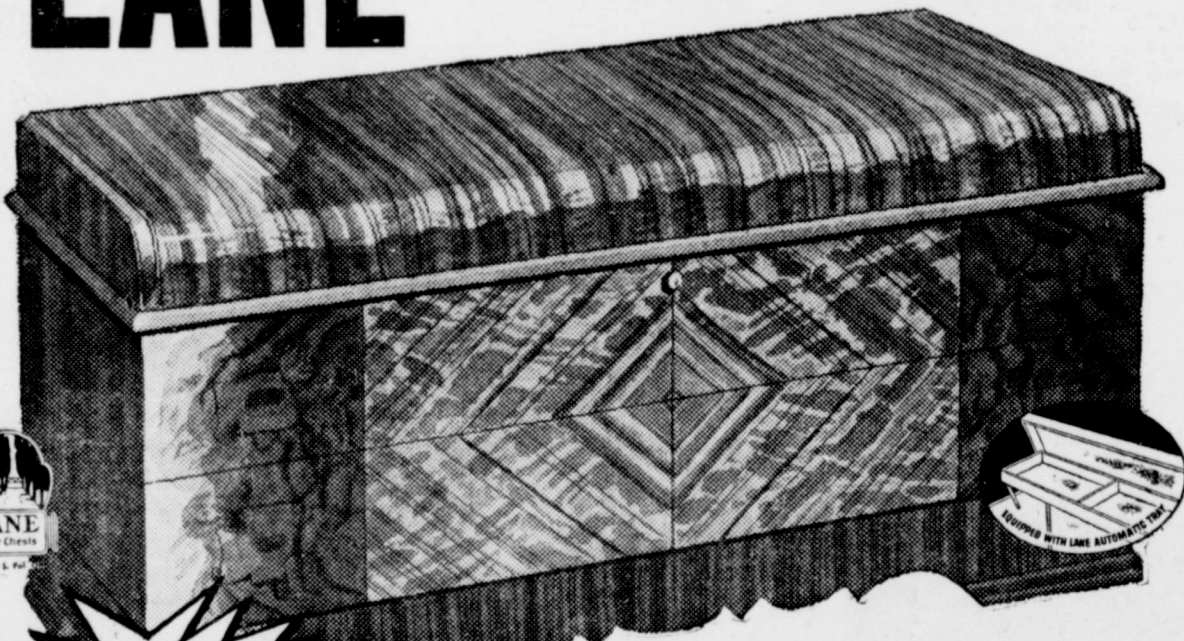
