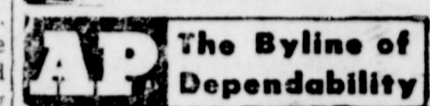
PROPOSED COST OF SCHOOL REDUCED APPROXIMATELY \$450,000.00

June 25 is the date set by the Gatesville Independent School District to vote on the proposed bond issue which has been shaved to \$485,000.00.

Voting will be at the high school gym, the usual election hours, and Edward Taylor will be the head man, Byrd King, Judge Mrs. Miller Stinnett and Oliver Tatum, clerks.

After considerable traveling, the Board authorities have found the proposed building can possibly be constructed for \$8.00 per square foot, instead of the \$10.50 originally figured, and this is the reason for the "shaving" of the proposed funds.

Inside, is a full explanation by the school board, which gives the situation as it is now.

Maj. Dave H. Culberson Is Reinterred Thursday Afternoon at 4 O'clock

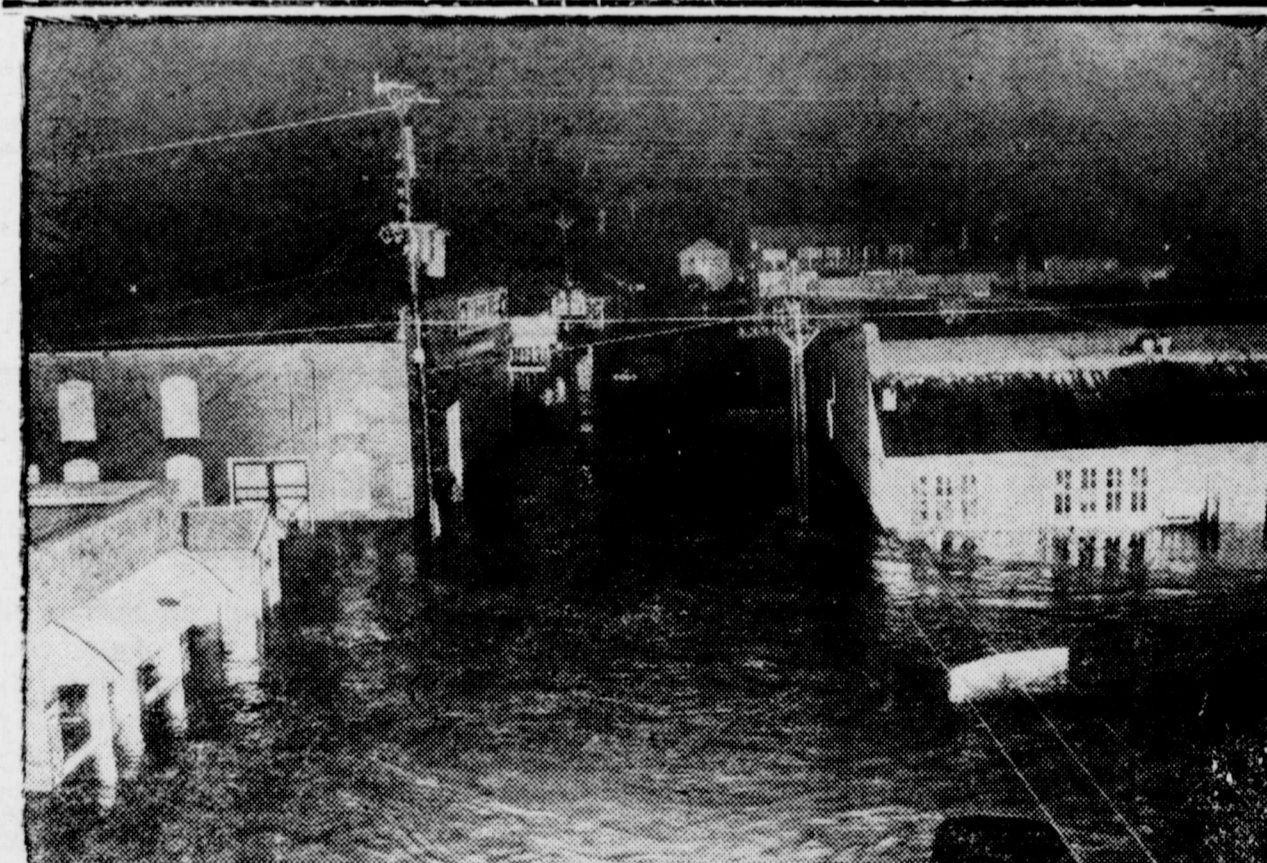
Major Dave H. Culberson, Jr., who was killed in France during World War II, was reinterred in the Masonic cemetery at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

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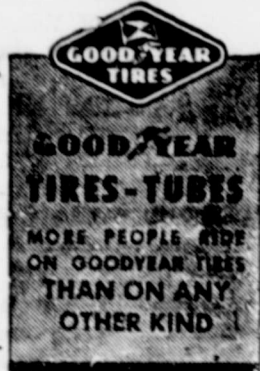
Gov. Beauford Jester Opens Gainesville Circus In Waco

The citizens of the Gatesville Independent School District have the
responsibility to furnish 1200 boys and girls educational advantages
they so-rightfully deserve. It is our responsibility to assume our
obligations to youth who are the future citizens of our country.

WHY A SCHOOL BUILDING

1. 600 of our young boys and girls are without a decent place to at-
tend school. Over 200 are housed next to the city cess pool. The
odor is bad. The ventilation and lighting are very, very poor.

Over 100 are housed in rooms that were originally built for bus sheds
Lighting is poor and the ventilation improper.

Over 100 are going to school in one of our local churches. They have
to walk to the Junior High building each day for lunch. They do not
have adequate playgrounds. They are off center for proper supervision

One group is housed in the scout house. Another group is in a home
economics room. They will have to be moved somewhere to make
way for the home economics classes.

Another group is housed in an old rural school building that has been
moved in. This old building is not, in any sense, for educational pur-
poses.

2. VERY IMPORTANT NOTICE

**The Gatesville Schools are on probation by the State Department of
Education pending our solving this situation. Unless we remedy the
school buildings, our affiliation could be lost. This will effect the en-
tire school program.**

COST

Under the new state school laws just passed a 75c maintenance tax
is necessary. Bonds must be above the 75c. This new proposed build-
ing with repairs to the old ones will take a 50c bond. Total tax rate
for all purposes \$1.25.

The total tax rate will be spread over an area of approximately 170
square miles.

For some time the school officials have met often. They have travel-
ed to many places looking at school buildings and comparing costs.
Architects and others have been called in for conferences. Every thing
possible has been done to work out an economical program. The com-
plete plant has run down, and the new building will cover approxi-
mately 57,000 square feet.

The average cost of new construction over the state runs from \$9.00
per square foot to \$10.50. It is hoped that the proposed building can
be constructed for \$8.00 per square foot. Take the 57,000 square feet
multiply by the \$8.00 and it will run around \$456,000.00. In addi-
tion to this cost we must add equipment, architect and engineering
costs. Much needed repairs are needed on the other buildings. If any
thing is left out of the new building we have an incomplete plant.
The proposed issue is \$485,000.00.

It is the desire to construct a building that will be strong and last for
many years. An elaborate, expensive building has not been planned,
but one of a permanent nature. The proposed building will be con-
structed of tile, concrete, brick and steel.

The problem is not a problem for any one individual or a group of
individuals. It is a problem for every far-sighted citizen in this area.

As soon as possible the board plans to appoint an equalization board,
but this is going to take time. The all important thing right now is
to get the building under way. Any delay now will prolong the pro-
gram and hurt our school program. It is all important that we protect
the children under our care. It will take approximately 12 months to
construct this building, and time is a very important item now.

Gatesville should be a real school center. The building is for our boys
and girls who are the future citizens of our country. This program is
long over due. The problem is now in the hands of the public. We
cannot afford to jepordize the education and perhaps the health of
hundreds of our boys and girls.

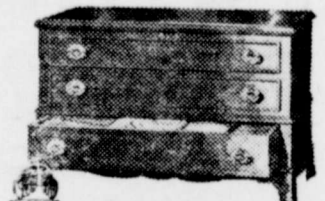

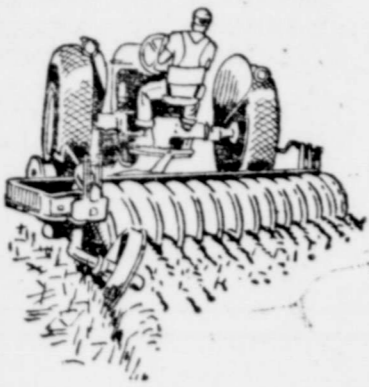
