Gov. Beauford H. Jester Found Dead In Houston: Lt. Governor Allan Shivers Takes Governorship

HOUSTON, July 11, 1949. (AP)—Governor Beauford H. Jester was found dead in a Pullman berth here at 7:30 a. m. today by a Negro porter, Charlie Jimerson.

Justice Tom Maes said Jester died of heart attack. He left Austin last night for Galveston for a physical check up and rest. He had been suffering lately with heart trouble. Last week he suffered Ptomaine poisoning but apparently had recovered.

Maes said the Governor apparently had been dead four or five hours when found.

Funeral plans were incomplete but it was believed he would be buried at Corsicana, for generations, the family home.

Jester, 56, was serving his second term and previously had been Railroad Commissioner. He was a Methodist leader, attorney and World War I officer.

His successor will be Lieutenant Governor Allan Shivers, 41, who was enroute to Austin today from his Woodville Texas, farm. He is a former State Senator and became Lieutenant Governor in 1947.

Truman Cancels Call For 4 Billion Tax

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 11. (AP)—President Truman today cancelled his call for a four billion dollar tax increase and bowed to a necessity for temporary deficit financing.

In the mid-year economic report to Congress he also wiped out a previous request for price, wage and other business controls. Instead, he proposed 11 new laws designed to build up jobs and production and boost consumer income and buying power and loosen Federal lending.

Giles Says Procedure For Acquiring Land Under Vet Program To Be Kept Simple

(Editor's Note: This is the concluding article of a series of three by Bascom Giles explaining the newly created Veterans' Land Board Program.)

In keeping with the terms of the legislation creating the Texas Veterans' Land Board, its administration and operating policies will be kept as simple as the problems of this huge program will permit.

The fact that approximately 13,000 veterans have already contacted this office for information on the working details of the plan indicates the commendable desire of veterans to own a farm or ranch home under the idea originally conceived by the author five years ago.

Paper work involving application to participate has been cut to the minimum. Each successive step has been shorn of all encumbering delays.

For example, proof of the applicant's eligibility can be established by submitting a certified copy of his honorable discharge plus substantiation that the applicant was a resident of Texas at the time he entered military service and is still a legal resident at the time of application for land program benefits. For those taking advantage of the 90 day priority offered those who have a service-connected disability sustained in combat, certification of such must accompany the application.

Each veteran will be limited to one purchase not exceeding \$7,500 cost to the Board. He will be required to pay not less than five per cent down and execute an on-or-before note for 40 years at three per cent interest for the balance.

Should a purchaser desire to acquire a tract of land costing NOT more than \$10,000 he will be re-

quired to pay the difference between \$7,500 and the purchase price plus the five per cent down payment on the \$7,500 loan.

He shall have served not less than 90 days on active duty in some branch of the armed service between September 16, 1940 and December 31, 1946, unless discharged sooner for service-connected disabilities. A certified copy of the applicant's honorable discharge will be required to be filed with application. In addition, a veteran who leases his land for oil or gas must apply one-half of all bonus and rentals to the retirement of his debt.

The veterans will NOT be required to live upon the property but he will NOT be permitted to dispose of it for a period of three years.

Payments of principle on note with interest will be made on a semi-annual basis. Each veteran will receive a contract of sale from the state and upon final payment he or she will be granted absolute title.

Failure to make payments when due, permits the Board to revoke the contract of purchase and to forfeit the land which can then be offered for resale to other veterans.

A veteran may reinstate his land which has been forfeited, up to the announced date of resale by payment of a penalty and placing account in good standing.

The Board in its first meeting named Alvis Vandygriff as executive secretary.

Vandygriff, an attorney, who hails from Ennis, Texas, has been serving as Chief Clerk of the General Land Office. He is a veteran of World War II having served as a Major in the Army Air Force. He was selected by the Board to direct the administrative machinery of the new program on the basis of his long experience in the Land Office where the offices and records of the program will be maintained.

service through the Rural Electrification Administration was attacked here today as an 'unwise and totally unnecessary waste of public funds' by Clyde S. Bailey, Executive Vice President of the United States Independent Telephone Association.

"With a \$5-billion deficit for the current fiscal year staring us in the face," said Bailey, "and an even higher deficit in prospect for the coming fiscal year, Congress ought to be trying to discover ways and means to economize, instead of authorizing new methods for draining the public Treasury."

"The most indefensible part of this proposal to make REA finance farm telephone service, added Bailey, "is that the telephone industry is quite capable of taking care of the situation, and is in fact doing that very thing right now without a penny expense to the Federal government or the taxpayer." He pointed out that over a million rural telephones have been added since the end of World War II and that service is now available to 85 per cent of the occupied farm area of the nation.

"It is perfectly clear to me," said Bailey, "that this latest spendend proposal does not spring from a spontaneous demand for some new form of farm relief, but is primarily inspired by Federal bureaucrats trying to think up new excuses for staying on the public payroll." He said that with

the job of rural electrification nearing completion, 'there is no excuse for the Federal Government to try to promote local socialistic ventures into the telephone business.'

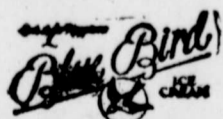

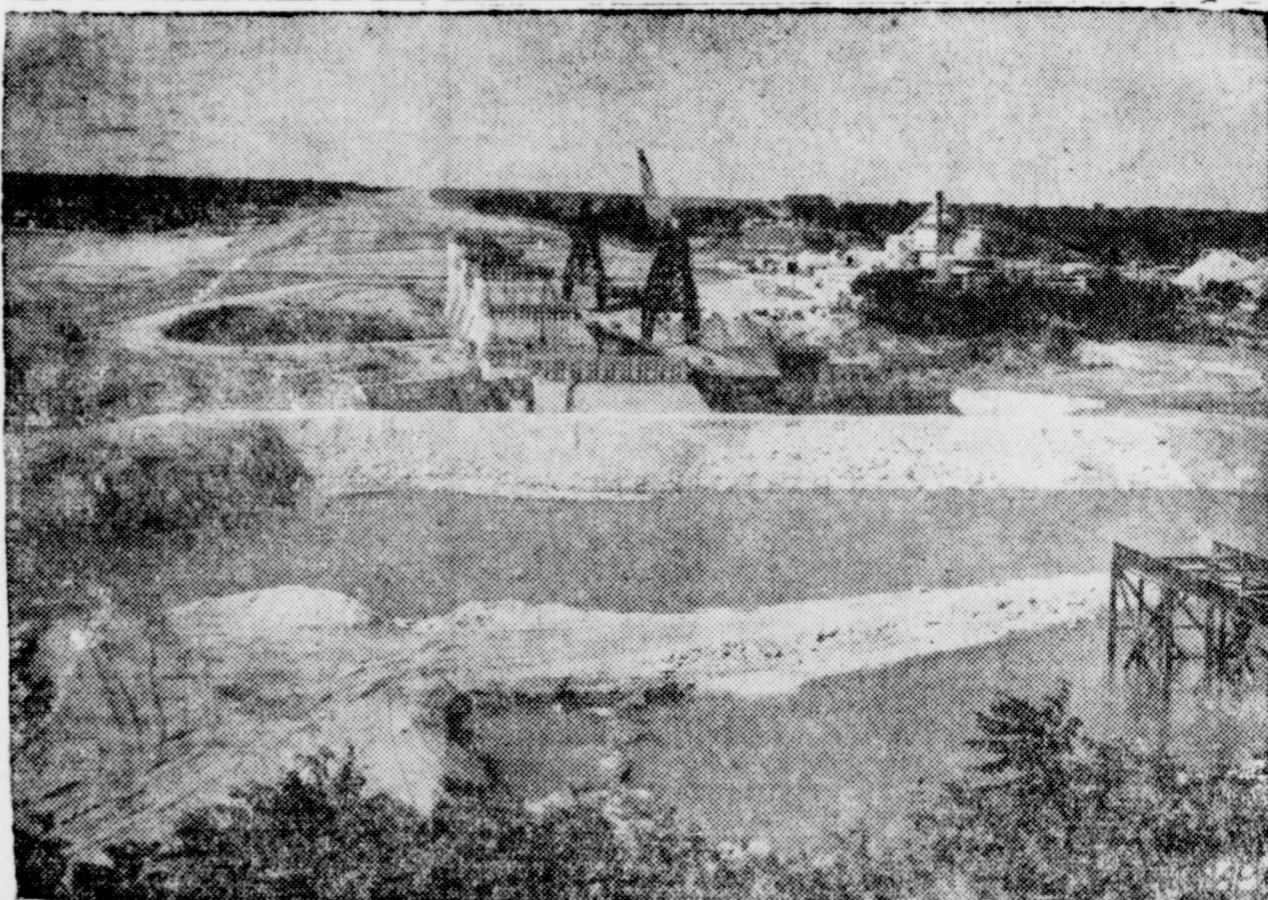

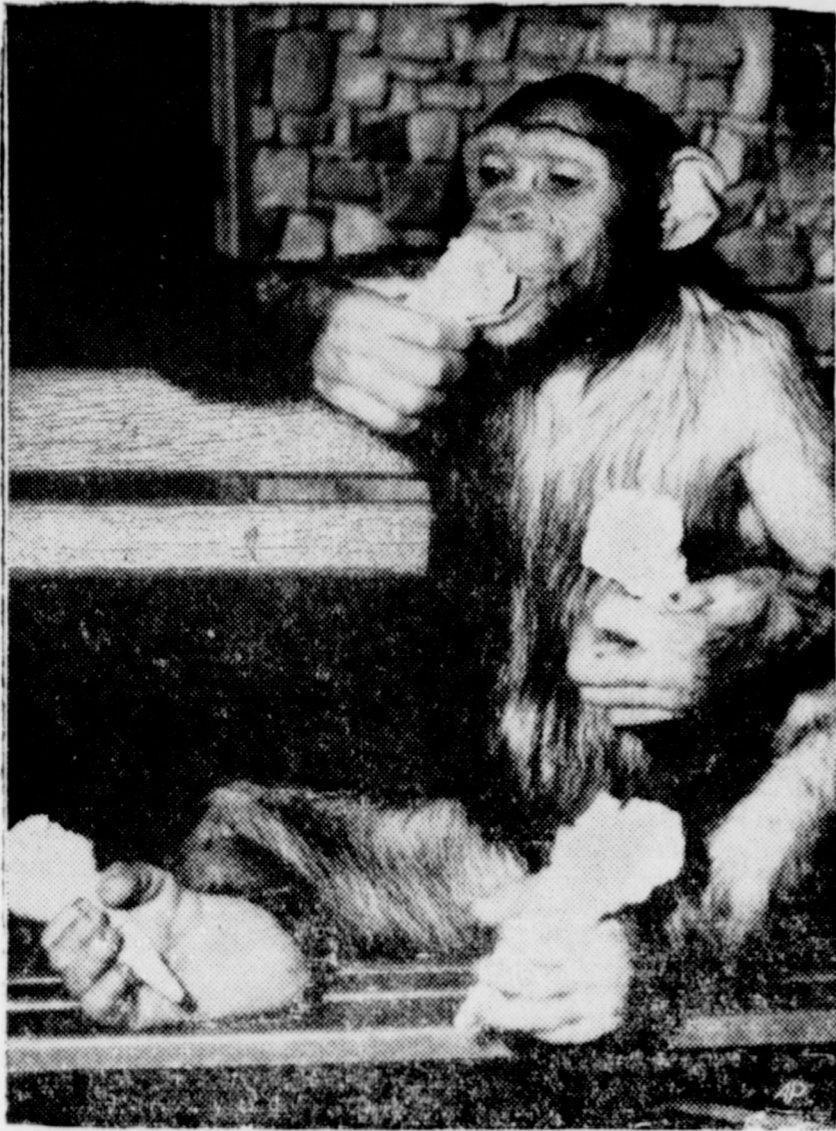


**WHITNEY DAM NOW ABOUT

AUSTIN, Texas, July 9.—Most Texans would put their stamp of approval on a tax-financed advertising program to attract new industries into the state.

A statewide survey by The Texas Poll shows that nearly everybody is sold on the benefits that come from industry. And about six out of every ten adults would be willing to empower the Legislature to spend tax money to bring new industries into Texas.

Thirty nine states now spend varying amounts of tax money on advertising and publicity to attract industries, tourists, and permanent residents. Some of them publish their own magazines. Others buy advertising in national magazines and newspapers, sponsor radio programs and movies, and engage in a wide range of publicity.

In Texas, the spending of state money for such purposes is forbidden by the constitution. Some cities, however, have started advertising programs of their own. Most of these are financed by donations from business men who want to see their cities grow.

The question of amending the constitution to authorize a state-coordinated advertising program has often been discussed, but no serious efforts have been made in that direction during the recent years.

The public, nevertheless, favors a state-financed advertising campaign. This is indicated by the answers of a cross section of the adult population to the following questions:

"In the long run, do you think people around here would be better off, or worse off, if more industries and factories were located in this part of Texas?"

Better off.....92%
Worse off..... 3
No difference..... 1
No opinion..... 4

"Some people want the Legislature to be able to spend tax money on an advertising campaign to bring new industries into Texas. Do you think this a good idea, or not?"

Good idea.....59%
Not such good idea.....28
No opinion.....13

Persons who don't welcome new industries to their communities think they would bring congested living, slums, union leaders and strikes. A lawyer in Meador summed up his views as follows: "Financially, we might be better off, yes; but socially and morally, no." A Houston teacher expressed the same fear, but in different words: "More industry would create more congestion, disease, pestilence, and violence."

Two of the most highly industrialized states—New York and Pennsylvania—provide their tax-financed publicity divisions with the most amount of money to spend. Each spends \$400,000 or more per year.

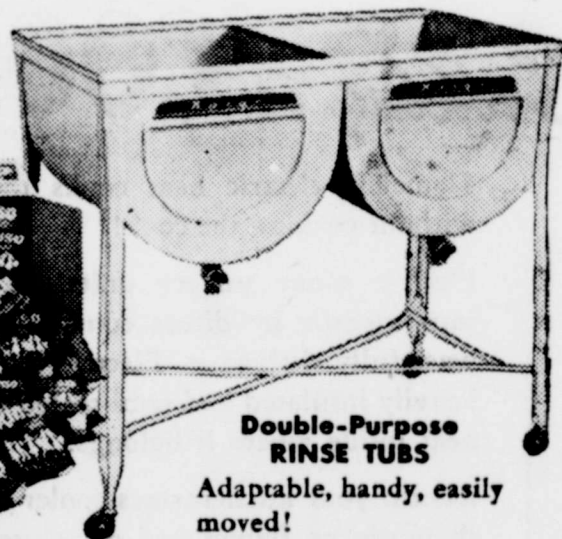

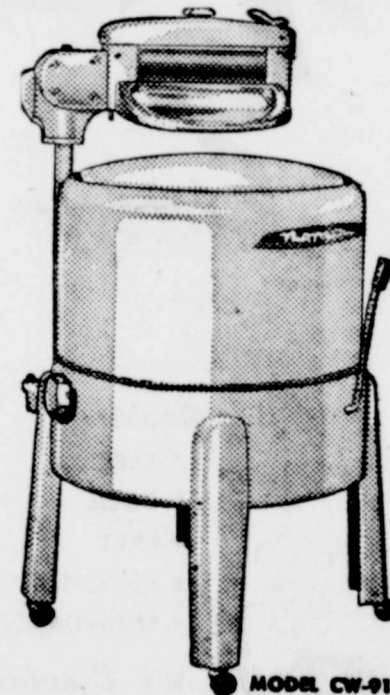
