If farms did not have wheat planted in 1947, 1948, or 1949, farmers will have to apply in writing to the local ACA office for a "New Grower" allotment, if they plan to plant wheat in 1950.

This application is necessary regardless of the size of the wheat allotment that might have been on the farm in any previous allotment years.

The request must be filed with the ACA office not later than August 1.

There is a staff of 27, the Trades and Industries division has 4 classes with 97 enrolled; a new body and fender class has started. There are two classes in cabinet making with 48 men enrolled; radio has 21 and distributive education, 3 classes, one of these at Evant, a total of 63 men.

There are 10 agriculture classes with 205 men enrolled, and these are at Gatesville (2), Flat, The Grove, Ames, Turnersville, Arnett, Pearl, Evant and Copperas Cove. The overall is 448 men.

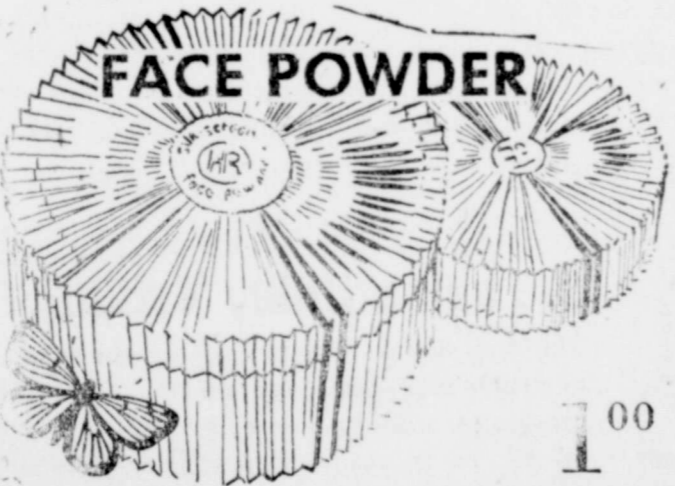

E. G. Beerwinkle, a cooperator of the district completed approximately 1 mile of large channel type terraces last week. These terraces were built with heavy equipment under the jurisdiction of Wes Scott. The Soil Conservation Service ran the lines and supervised the construction.

Dr. E. E. Lowrey, whose farm is across the river of Gatesville, has had approximately one mile of channel terrace completed. These terraces were constructed with heavy equipment belonging to Wes Scott. The terraces spill on pasture land.

Thomas Schultz, a cooperator of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District has completed a large waterway on his farm. This waterway will be vegetated to KR bluestem and buffalograss. As soon as this waterway is established to permanent grass, Mr. Schultz will use it to take care of his terrace water. Mr. Schultz plans to fence the waterway after his terraces are constructed and will graze in order to maintain it properly. The waterway was constructed with heavy equipment belonging to the county and under the supervision of Commissioner Cleo Carroll.

Paul Hinson, a cooperator of the Ames group, had the technicians of the Service lay out approximately 4 miles of terrace lines last week. When constructed this will complete Paul's terrace system. These terraces are to be built in the near future with heavy equipment.

A. B. Wilkinson, I F Elam Jr., E W Jones and A C Schloeman, cooperators of the district, had terrace lines laid out on their farms last week. These terraces will be constructed as soon as equipment can get to them.

#### Turkeys

County Agent Graham has looked over three flocks of turkeys within the last week. Two of the flocks were being developed under similar conditions except the one of 25 poult was too crowded. 25 out of that many poult at the start is an excellent record. The second flock of 59 out of 60 poult start also grades excellent for poult raised. A brooding house of adequate capacity with controlled heat and ventilation helped to insure the good health of the birds. A sun porch for exercise and a source of vitamin D meant continued good health for poult as they developed. A third step is giving these turkeys access to shade under trees. Watering and feed troughs placed under the trees mean eating in comfort with rapid gains in weight. These turkeys were started April 15 and were weighing 9½ pounds July 15th. They have consumed \$55 worth of commercial feed and will consume more, however, weight and price at selling time will justify this method of turkey development. A third flock shows a loss of two thirds the starting number. Running loose on ground where chickens have run caused infestation with worms. A heavy loss before the cause was known will mean no profit on this flock of turkeys. A bit of advise at this point is to worm with proper size capsules, birds showing any signs of trouble.

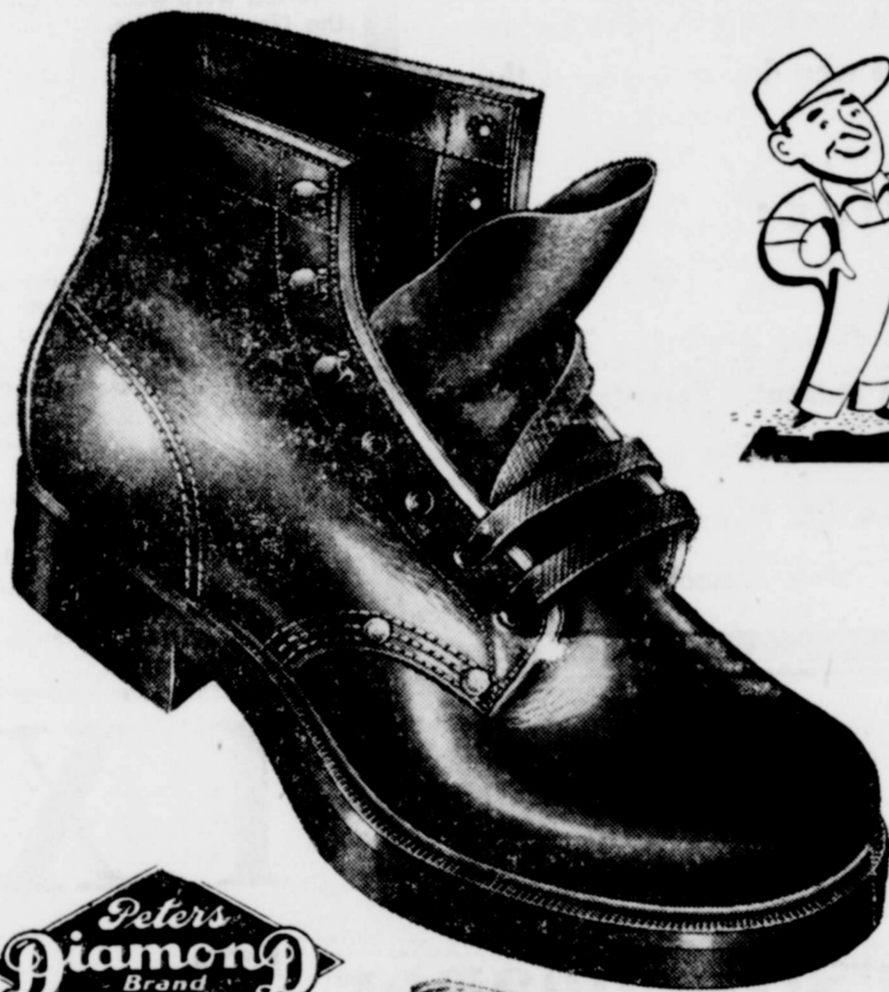
