Carl Short, Dallas, is the drilling contractor, with C T. King, production foreman for Amerada in charge. The contract depth is 5500 feet and they estimate this depth will be reached in 35 days using a Wilson Giant Rotary Rig, and a Lee C. Moore Derrick. J. F. Paul is the Tool Pusher.

Lease hounds have been in and around Coryell county for a number of months, and some nice blocks of land have been leased covering nearly every section of the county.




