Oil Well Spudded In Near Ireland: Amerada Pet. Corp.

First oil activity in Coryell County, one of five counties in Texas with no known oil was furthered Wednesday night about 12 o'clock, when the Amerada Petroleum Corporation, with L. H. Williams, driller doing the work, spudded in a well on the N. F. Tate farm about a mile east of Ireland in Coryell County.

Carl Short, Dallas, is the drilling contractor, with C. T. King, production foreman for Amerada in charge. The contract depth is 5500 feet and they estimate this depth will be reached in 35 days using a Wilson Giant Rotary Rig, and a Lee C. Moore Derrick. J. F. Paul is the Tool Pusher.

Lease hounds have been in and around Coryell county for a number of months, and some nice blocks of land have been leased covering nearly every section of the county.

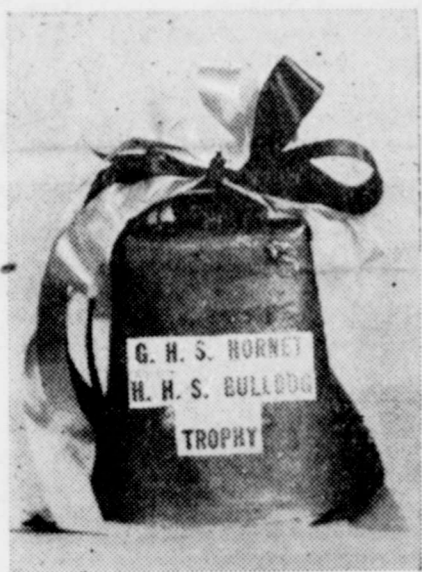

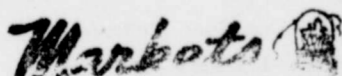
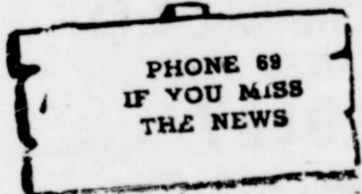


Here's one of the prizes the 1949 Gatesville High School Hornets start working on tonight when they meet the Killeen Kangaroos.

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HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION.

The Supervisors of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District held their regular board meeting at the Gatesville office last Wednesday, August 31. Those present were: Sam Powell, vice-chairman, Elmo Newson, secretary and Mack Riley, Member. The Board approved the following conservation farm plans: H. H. Wilhelm, Travis Latham, Wiley Seward, A. W. Jones, Herman Foust, H. H. Williams, Jack Morse, Mrs. Morey Baringer, E. G. Beerwinkle and Thomas A. Hodge.

The following applications of assistance were discussed and approved: Wiley Seward, Mrs. E. S. Watson, John D. Murray, H. W. Sadler, Joe White and Floyd D. Allen.

The Board agreed to purchase a barnyard fertilizer spreader to be used by district cooperators. This spreader should be available for use sometime in October or November.

G. M. Adamson, a cooperator of the district has completed approximately 3 miles of ridge type terrace. These terraces spill onto permanent grass and were built with a whirlwind terracer by Mr. Adamson.

Perry Buckelew, a cooperator of the Evans group has been using one of his range pastures a year as suggested by Soil Conservation Service Technicians. He says that he intends to continue to rest this pasture until at least December 1st. In this pasture Mr. Buckelew planted 50 acres of native bluestem mixture with its tractor planter last March and this has turned out to be one of the best grass plantings in the district this year.

Anyone interested in range development should see Mr. Buckelew and have him show them over this pasture. It will be well worth their time.

Technicians of the Soil Conservation Serviceman terrace lines on following district cooperator farms last week: Mrs. Geo. Schoenwolf, 4 mile terraces and 1750 linear feet diversion terrace; Conrad Upton, 1.7 mile terrace and 1100 feet of diversion terrace; C. E. Alvis, 1.8 mile terrace and 400 feet of diversion terrace; Virgil Jones, 1600 feet diversion terrace; Howard Franks, 1 mile of terrace and 500 feet of diversion terrace; Willie Crenthers, 3 mile terrace. These terraces will be constructed with heavy equipment in the near future.

The Hamilton-Coryell District Board of Supervisors will sponsor a grass judging contest later in the fall. All vocational agriculture teachers of the district plan to train a grass judging team and enter them in the contest. All agricultural agencies and workers have offered their assistance in making this one of the year's biggest events.

Announcement of the rules of the contest will be released by the Board at a later date.

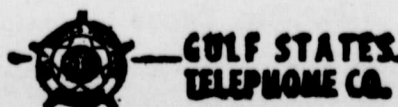

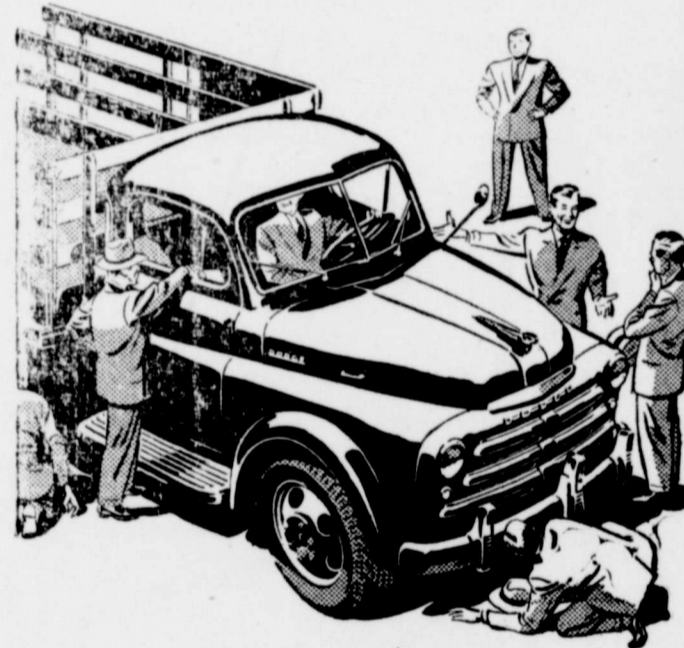

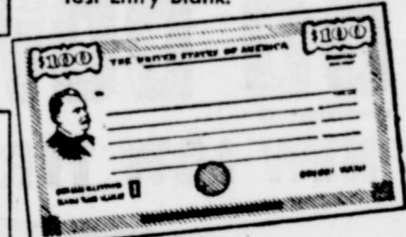

GARMISCH PARTENKIRCH-EN, Germany, Sept. 8. (AP) Richard Strauss, 85, one of the world's greatest contemporary composers died today. His genius ran the gamut from simple songs and chamber music to symphonic poems, symphonies and operas.

Govt. Cotton Estimate Is 14,943,000 Bales.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Sept. 8. (AP)—The Agriculture Department today forecast this year's cotton crop at 14,943,000 bales which is up 138,000 from a month ago.

It compares with 14,868,000 bales produced last year and would be far above market demands. If the forecast is borne out, the government probably will move to impose rigid controls on next year's crop attempting to prevent price depressing surpluses.

Texas' production was estimated at 5,000,000 bales from 10,296,000 acres averaging 233 pounds per acre.

Three of Nation's RR's Threatened With Strike

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 8. (AP)—Three of the nation's railroads threatened with a strike today making possible the idling of more than 130,000 rail and steel workers.

Some 30,000 workers are set to quit their jobs on the Missouri Pacific at 2 p. m. tomorrow. The dispute is over 282 grievances on the books three years. Railroad Brotherhood officials have called strikes also on two interplant connections serving scores of plants, mainly in the steel industry. One is set for Saturday and the second for Tuesday.

Funds To Cope With 40,000 Polio Cases Sought

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 8. (AP) With the United States suffering the severest polio epidemic in history, an emergency drive opened today for funds to cope with the expected 40,000 cases.

The infantile paralysis foundation is asking \$14,500,000 in a week-long campaign. The foundation has spent \$5,622,164 in polio aid this year, and its funds are expected to be exhausted in eleven days.

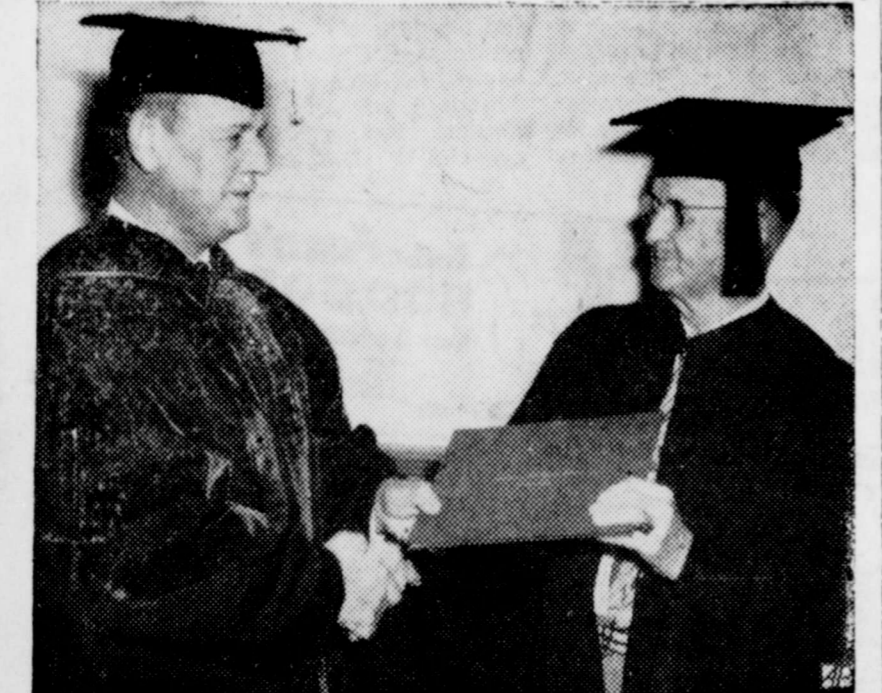
