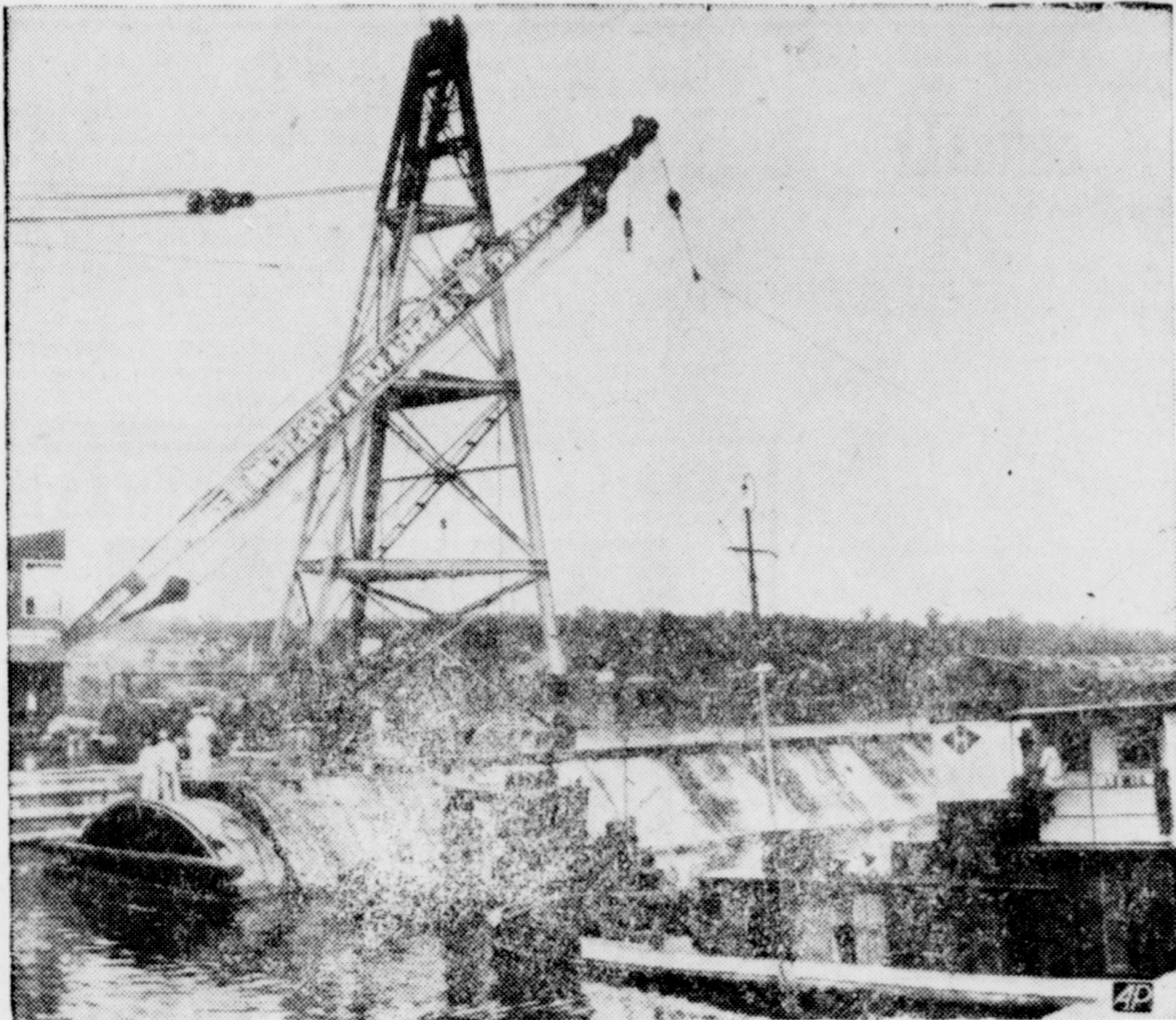

**You and Your Share**

If ever this nation needed an economy-minded Congress, it is now. The cost of government has shot up all out of sight. Current high costs of government represent more than just dollar inflation. What we have had, without clearly realizing it, is a boom in government. This boom has flourished until there is danger of collapse from the very size of the superstructure itself. Our ship of state is indeed top-heavy.

Lumping all government together—federal, state, local—tax collections for the 1948 fiscal year came to 26 per cent of the national income. Perhaps you can see it better if we should divide up that \$55.2 billion of tax collections to find what was your part. It amounts to \$377 for each man, woman, and child in the nation. You didn't pay that much? Brother, your share was tucked away in the price of everything you spent your money for!

**Government Unlimited?**

You can see how much taxes have grown, if you compare the above figures with those for 1940. Then tax collections were \$14.4 billion, or 18.9 per cent of national income. The amount for each person in 1940 was only \$109. In eight years, therefore, we have more than tripled our taxes. A lot of it results from the war. We're spending a lot in Europe, certainly. But let us not use that as an excuse for lack of vigilance about the rest of it.

We are inclined to justify boom government and resulting high taxes in a number of strange ways. In depression times, we call for more and more spending. That means taxes, but we put them off until later. Then in time of plenty, we think up more things that government can do "better" for us, feeling sure that we can afford it. At the same time, we ignore wartime debt and forget that we ever did any "deficit" spending! Must we dedicate ourselves to unlimited government?

**Voters Are Taxpayers**

Knowing that "power to tax is power to destroy," the founding fathers placed tax power upon Congress. This power was not meant to be abused. Citizens then were aware that government was meant to serve them, not they to serve the government. That is the viewpoint of taxpayers.

But times have changed. Nowadays American voters (though they be taxpayers to the tune of billions) look upon themselves first as receivers of government benefits, last as payers of tax. Our federal government is now making payments direct to 15,830,899 persons. Some of these are necessary. But too many of us, far too many for the good of the nation, have a personal interest in seeing government expenditures continue. Will any of these 16 million bite the hand that feeds them?

You see, this is the way we ourselves can undermine the cornerstone of freedom. Almost without knowing it, we have created a huge central government, then given it power to perpetuate itself. If big government can minimize the dangers of entrenched bureaucracy, keep public waste and extravagance out of sight, and go on taxing—then this thing will continue regardless of the party in power. When big government sells people on the idea of lavish handouts which they themselves pay for by high taxes, you can call this bribing people with their own money!

**Frederick A. Pomaranke**

Frederick August Pomaranke, was born September 1, 1880, in Germany, of William and Mathilda Roloff Pomaranke. At an early age he was baptized into the Lutheran faith. He came with his parents to McGregor at the age of 12, and after one year moved to Crawford where he spent his entire life on the farm. On May 26, 1895 he was confirmed in St. John's Lutheran Church by Rev. Riedel.

November 14, 1907 he was united in Holy Wedlock with Miss Emelie Weiss by Rev. K. Ermisch. The couple spent their entire married life, excluding a few months, near Prairie Chapel, they moved to Crawford in November, 1943.

Mr. Pomaranke became ill in January, 1949, and grew gradually worse until he became entirely bedridden and passed away September 12, 1949.

He is survived by his grief-stricken widow, four children: Alfred of McGregor, Hermine Gellmeyer of Crawford, Julie Mueller of Houston, Ervin, Crawford, and 10 grandchildren and 3 sisters.

Mr. Pomaranke was a lifelong member of the Lutheran Church and attended when conditions permitted.

Funeral services were held at the home in Crawford, Tuesday afternoon, September 13, 1949, and interment was in St. John's Lutheran Cemetery at Coryell City. Rev. Louis Kramer of Coryell City and Rev. R. H. Wensel of Crawford officiating. May he rest in peace.

GATESVILLE NEEDS. . . to obtain F. H. A. Rental Units. I sincerely believe that we could ac-

comodate 100 more soldiers and their families if we had these units. At the present time, we have at least 50 soldiers and their families living in Gatesville, and the Chamber of Commerce has had around 40 requests from military personnel in the last two months for some form of housing in Gatesville. On top of that, we have approximately 50 civilian workers who report to South Camp Hood each day. These are my estimates. By next week, I'll be able to quote exact figures on our camp personnel.

I believe that we have at least 100 people who draw their salaries from Camp Hood. That's quite a payroll. To illustrate what I mean I give you. . . .

Act I—Scene I: (This actually happened):

Local Merchant to Chamber Manager: "We are facing a seller's market, consequently, there is a need for better salesmanship. Why, only yesterday, through persistent selling, I sold a regular army man \$16.00 worth of merchandise."

Chamber Manager:— "Yes, I know. It took us 45 minutes to find him a place to live."

There is an advantage to being the back door to an army camp. Recently we located Sgts. Kraft and Hughes places to live in Gatesville. Both Sergeants liked the hometown atmosphere of Gatesville. Their wives will want to take part in church activities, their children will go to school here. Gatesville is a town people want to rear their children in. Of course, we have been lucky in obtaining desirable Army personnel, but most young married men in the Army nowadays are desirable.

Suppose we obtained a factory with 100 employees. Everyone would be happy about it. If we could obtain 100 more soldiers and their families, it would be the same thing only: there would be no lay-offs, no strikes, and no labor trouble. Gatesville NEEDS more housing facilities.

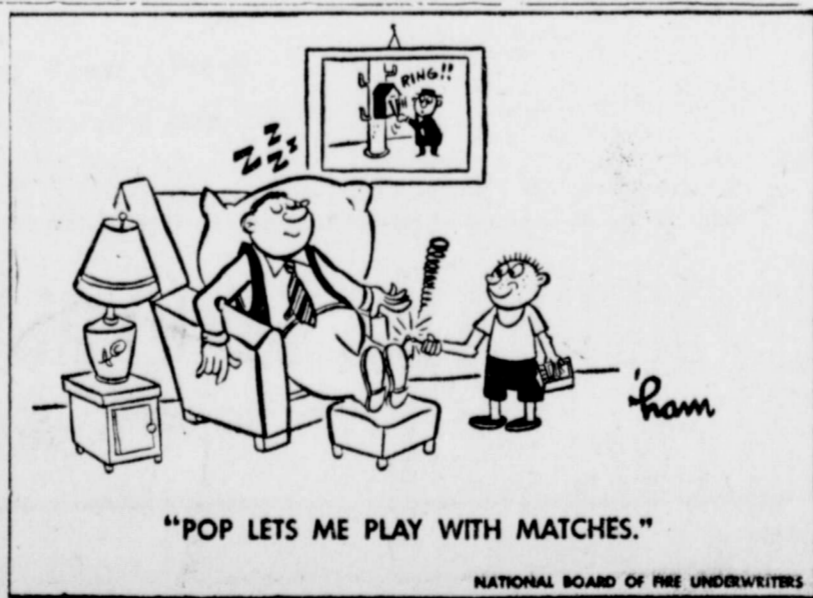
