Civil Rights Put Off Til January

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3. (AP)—Democratic Congressional leaders and President Truman agreed today that Congress should put off consideration of the Civil Rights measure until January. Senator Lucas of Illinois, Democrat Floor Leader, said: "It seems doubtful that a prolonged discussion of any Civil Rights Bill at this session would be helpful."

400 Miles Texas Coast, Hurricaned

CORPUS CHRISTI, Oct. 3. (AP)—Four hundred miles of Texas Coast battered down today awaiting the hurricane moving slowly in from the Gulf.

Latest advisory put the hurricane center about 125 miles south east of Brownsville, moving about 12 miles an hour. It was expected to hit between Corpus Christi and Galveston late today with winds around 100 miles an hour.

Winds and squalls struck the coast this morning and tides were high.

Some military planes were being flown from the danger area. All Corpus Christi schools were closed and store fronts boarded up. The Texas disaster council was alerted and the Red Cross personnel assigned to the area.

17 In USAF Buss Killed By Train

ONTARIO, California, Oct. 2. (AP)—A racing passenger train ripped into a U. S. Air Force bus at a crossing last night, killing 17 of 22 bus occupants. Eleven dead were military or civilian personnel from March Air Base. Others were girl friends and a chaperone. The group had been on an outing. The five survivors were uninjured.

Plans For Farm Bureau Enrollment October 20-27

Plans are developing for Coryell County Farm Bureau's participation in State-wide Membership Enrollment Week, October 20-27, Frank Blanchard, president, said today. Approximately 60 workers will volunteer their services during enrollment week to contact friends and neighbors inviting them to join Farm Bureau.

Membership week will be officially launched by State Farm Bureau president J. Walter Hammond on October 20 at 8:30 p. m. when he addresses Texas farmers over the Lone Star Chain Network. Other agricultural leaders of prominence will be heard on the program.

On October 21, the Farm Bureau leadership expects to have 10,000 workers throughout the state soliciting Farm Bureau memberships, Mr. Blanchard said. The state goal is 70,000, Coryell County's goal is 500.

"Other groups have prospered through organization, Mr. Blanchard said. The past few years farmers have seen what organization can do for them, even when membership has been low. Texas farmers are learning from experience that it is good business to be organized. Who knows what 1950 will hold for farmers". He declared, "But they know Farm Bureau will be on guard to protect their interests."

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The Texas Poll

The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion
By **JOE BELDEN**,

AUSTIN, Texas, October 1.—Texans have an opportunity next month to get rid of the poll tax, but they don't seem very eager to do it.

A statewide survey by The Texas Poll indicates that most qualified voters want to keep the poll tax as a requirement for voting. Repeal of the tax is one of ten proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 8. In recent months many of the state's political leaders have thrown their support to repeal in an effort to avoid federal legislation on this issue. Repeated surveys during the past two years have shown, however, that the weight of public opinion has consistently favored the tax.

A campaign by repeal advocates this month may stir the scale in favor of the amendment. But de-

senders of the tax now have a slight edge, as seen in results of a statewide survey completed last month.

Interviewers asked a cross section of adults this question:

"In your opinion, should Texas do away with or continue to have a poll tax as a requirement for voting?"

Qualified Voters:
Keep it..... 55%
Repeal it..... 40%
No opinion..... 5%

All Adults:
Keep it..... 49%
Repeal it..... 42%
No opinion..... 9%

In two previous statewide surveys, December 1947 and May 1949, division of opinion was virtually the same. Fifty-one per cent of the cross section of adults voted to keep the poll tax, 42 per cent to do away with it, and the remaining 7 per cent expressed no opinion.

While nearly everyone expressed an opinion on the poll tax when asked about it, this does not necessarily mean that most voters are fully informed about the question. In mid-summer, after the Legislature had agreed to submit poll tax repeal as a proposed constitutional amendment, only six per cent of a cross section of qualified voters were aware of the fact

FORD GIVES IN: WORKERS TO GET FORD-PAID PENSIONS

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 29. (AP)—An agreement on a new contract providing a company-financed pension today averted a threatened strike of 115,000 Ford production workers. The new contract calls for payment of \$100 monthly, including social security, to Ford workers over 65.

The Ford agreement increased pressure on steel negotiations for a settlement as bargaining teams gathered in Pittsburgh for new contract talks before a Friday

midnight strike deadline in the steel industry.

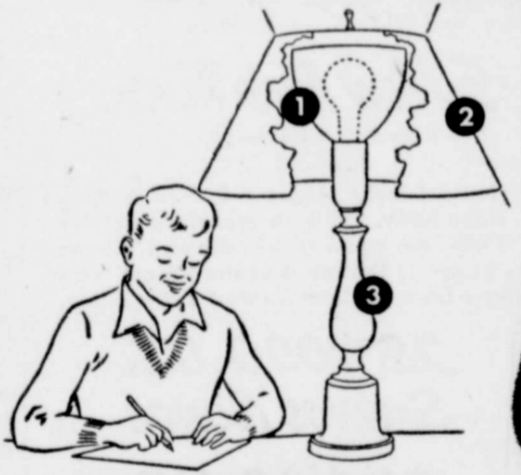

TEEN TALK:

In many, many schools throughout the land there are refugee students. Some of them have never seen a basketball game, never have chewed bubble gum and know very little English.

What every boy and girl should ask is: "What am I doing to make this newcomer feel at home?" They should not ostracize their foreign class mates because they do not react to ideas in the American manner.

Annette Kohn, 15-years old, of Kansas City, Mo. who came to this country three years ago after roaming Europe, offers this advice:

"Make them try to forget what they have been through by getting their minds on other things. It is hard to make them forget, because no one who hasn't seen it knows how terrible a concentration camp can be. But after they have been here for a while, it will not be so difficult for them to talk about their experiences."

At first, Annette said, it was difficult for her to tell of the things she had seen, even though her new friends were interested. Now, however, she doesn't mind.

When Annette arrived here in 1946 she didn't know a word of English, although she spoke German, Dutch and some French. Now however, her English is perfect. She had attended eleven schools prior to her entry in Paseo High School, Kansas City, Mo. where she now is a freshman.

One thing that has impressed Annette is the prospect of so many girl friends. She says:

"In Europe a girl usually has one or two close friends. But here everyone is friendly and you all do things together." She loves her new life and it is difficult for her to decide what she likes best about it though it is "just about everything. The people, the food, the clothes, the movies..."

She loves school fun and thinks that in Europe students are more serious whereas here "there are the dances, football games, plays and other things."

They stayed in New York about two weeks and it was on a subway train that Annette saw her first bubble gum. She says:

"A little boy was chewing it, and it looked so funny we just laughed until people must have thought we were crazy. But I chew it all the time now."

The family went to Kansas City because they had friends there. Annette plans to finish school and then take about two years of college before she goes into either nurses training or a school of commercial art.

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Mart Takes 39 to 0 Win Over Hornets At Mart Friday Night

Mart's hustling little Panthers flashed a superb passing attack which showed but slight respect for Gatesville's huge line here Friday night as they notched a 39-0 District 19-A victory.

If—as many Central Texas football men have predicted—Friday night's battle was for the district cellar, Lloyd Mitchell's Hornets can settle down in that unfamiliar region after years of titles and near titles.

They were put in that unhappy position by quarterback Ace Becker's aeriels to end Spud Spurlin and fullback James Haflin and by some mighty fancy running by back Doyle Berry.

Complete 10 Passes

Mart completed 10 of 17 passes—three of them good for touchdowns. Most of them were tossed by Becker but substitute quarterback Jimmy Mallow, who threw one of the touchdown strikes, also had a good night in the air.

The Panther receivers, especially Spurlin and Heflin, were nothing less than sensational as time after time they went high with hosts of Gatesville defenders to snag passes which seemed doomed to go incomplete.

Mart monopolized the ball most of the night as they pushed for 14 first downs to 6 for the Hornets, who never seemed to get anything clicking well for long. Standouts among the Mart defenders were Bubba Kasmiroski at tackle, Spurlin at end and Wayne Thomas at guard.

Running Good, Too

The Panthers were able to mix a sparkling running game with

their passing as Berry, who weighs in at only 145 pounds, showed his fleet feet to Gatesville's huge, but largely immobile line.

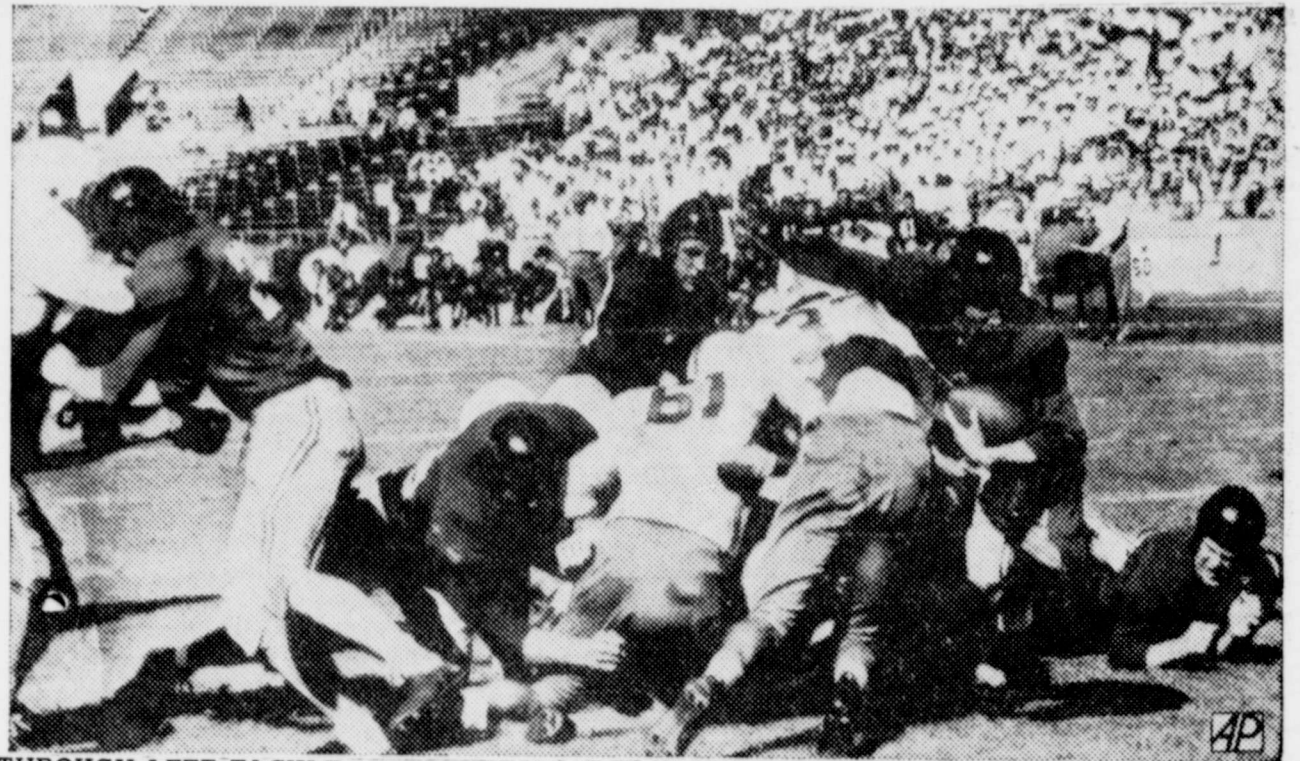
Unable to consistently dent the tough 200-pound-plus middle of the Hornet forward wall, Berry—and at times, Heflin, who moves exceptionally well for his gangling 185 pounds—went around ends or outside the massive tackles for long gains.

After a five-yard penalty, Heflin drove to the Gatesville 44 for another first down and Berry almost got another at the 35 on the next play. Becker sneaked for new life on the 30. Berry was stopped for no gain at center, but Becker passed to Spurlin for a first down on the 19. On third down, Becker threw again. this time to end Bobby

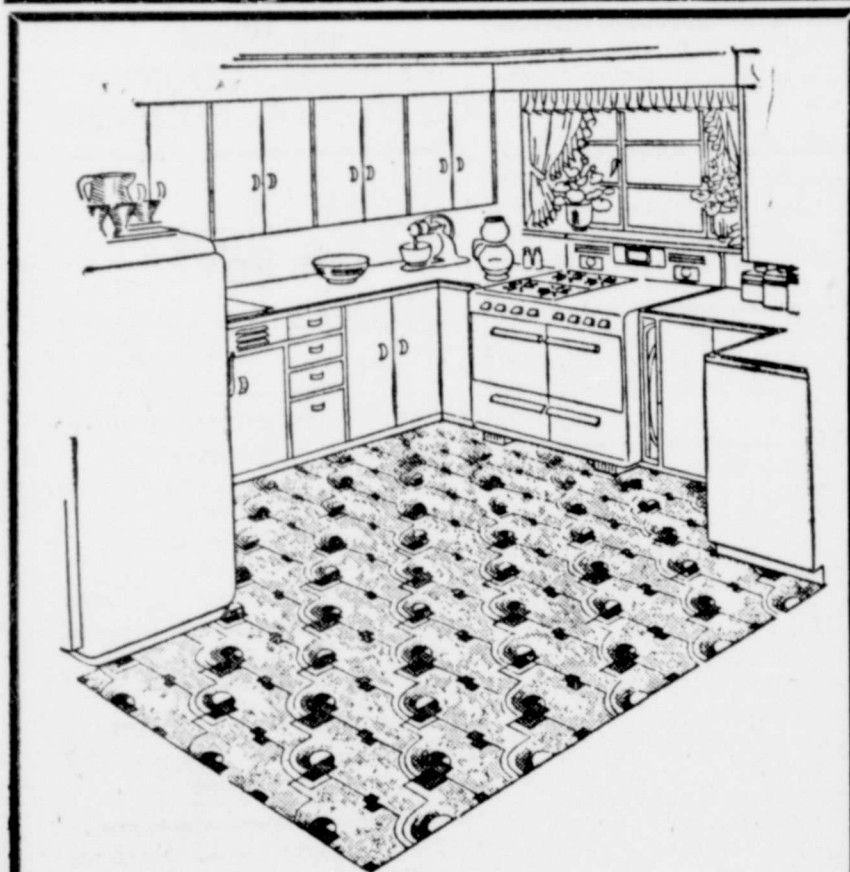

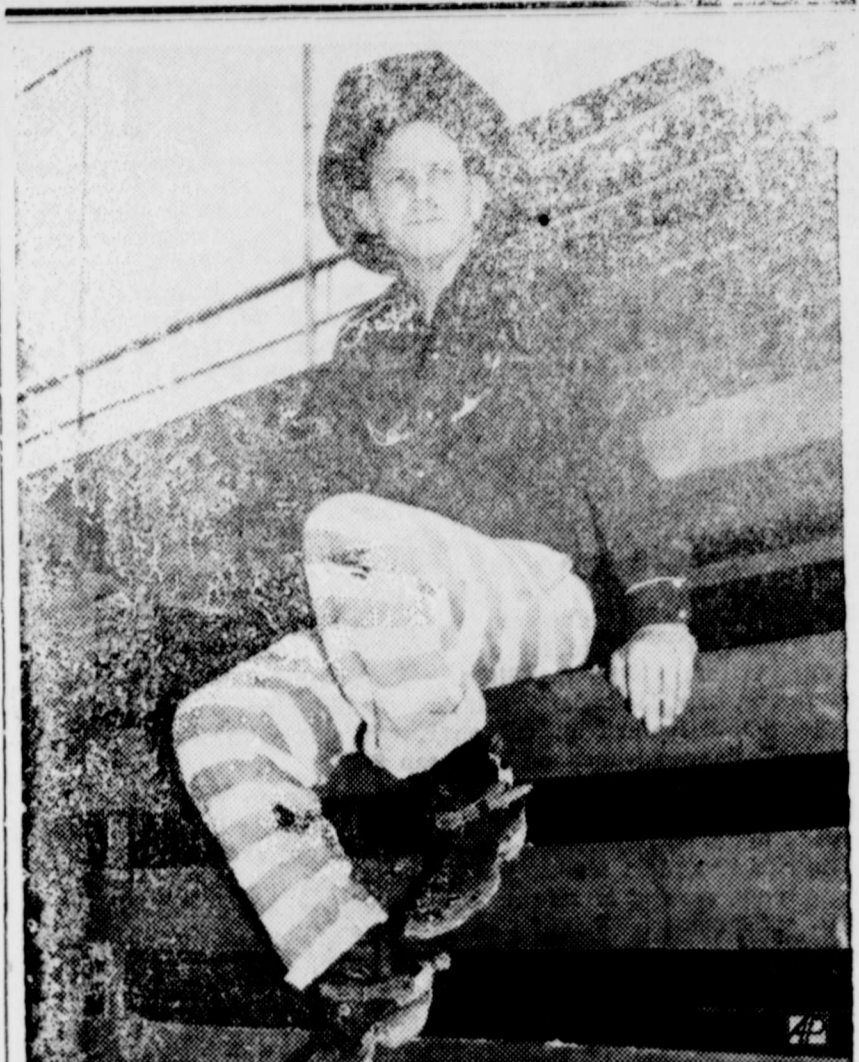
