

## Absentee Voting On Amendments Gets One Vote Opening Day

It was absentee voting Tuesday of this week on the ten constitutional amendments which are to be voted on November 8. Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Stockburger of Austin cast their ballots absentee.

The amendments, are briefly:

1. Civil service for counties if the people vote for it in the county.
2. Change in pay and sessions of Legislators, and Legislature.
3. To provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts.
4. Eliminating poll tax, and substituting registration.
5. Creation and operation of city-county health units; and authorizing cities and counties to vote a tax to support it.
6. Statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees.
7. District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending.
8. Creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.
9. Trials without jury in lunacy cases.
10. Qualifying women as grand and petit jurors.

Also: there's a 11th Congressional District candidate for State Board of Education, and he is Leslie Huff of Waco. There are lines for write-ins on the ballot for this office, also.

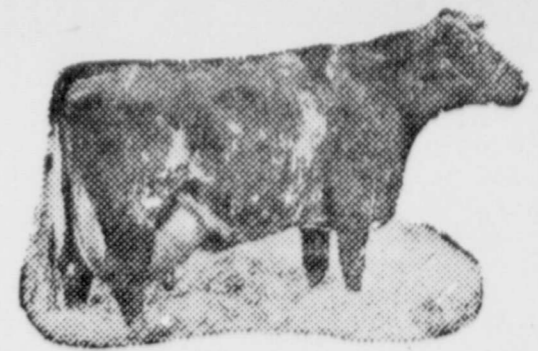

## Ammo Explosion At Hood Kills GI; Five Injured

Pvt. Lovell Green, Camp Hood soldier from Shreveport, La., was killed, and a second soldier was seriously injured and four others injured slightly when a case of ammunition exploded at a supply point at Camp Hood Wednesday.

Seriously injured was Pvt. Kenneth Elston. One of his legs was badly shattered by the explosion, and pieces of shrapnel were removed from his body in an operation. Physicians described his

condition as "serious but not critical" following the operation.

The accident occurred as a 9-man detail of the 508th Armored Field Artillery Service Battery was loading 105-MM artillery shells from a bunker into a truck.

The truck caught fire after the explosion, but one of the soldiers drove it from the danger zone. His identity was not learned.

Two corporals, Jhon Smithers and Richard Prelow were near the soldier who was killed, but neither were injured.

Capt. Everett Knickerbocker, post ammunition officer, said no ammunition would be issued until an investigation was made. Lt. Col. Alvin B. Duke was investigating the accident.

### Supervisor Elected

By holding two elections—the first with three present and the second with 12 present—Coryell County farmers, that is the 12 farmers present, named them a Soil Conservation Supervisor. Roland V. Wright of White Hall community was elected for a term of five years. He and Virgil Lockhart of Pidoke with three supervisors from Hamilton County make up a five man board of supervisors who tend to the affairs of the Hamilton Coryell Soil Conservation District. The work of the Board of Supervisors includes the handling of all money made by the district or appropriated by the state government for soil conservation. Since the last legislature appropriated \$5,000,000 for the state for this work it is expected that \$30,000 or \$40,000 will be made available for use in the district. This money might be used to furnish farmers with manure spreaders and machinery to spread commercial fertilizer. The district has been trying to get farmers in a neighborhood organized in a unit so that each unit might cooperate in promoting soil conservation work. The field for progress in this phase of the work is wide open.

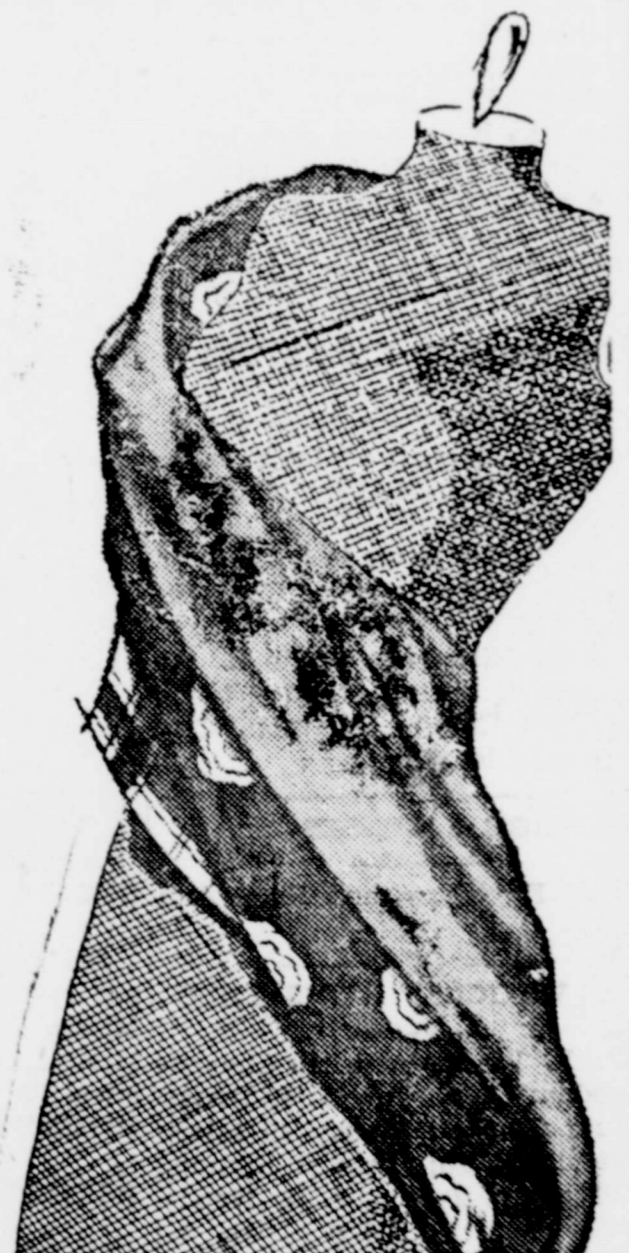

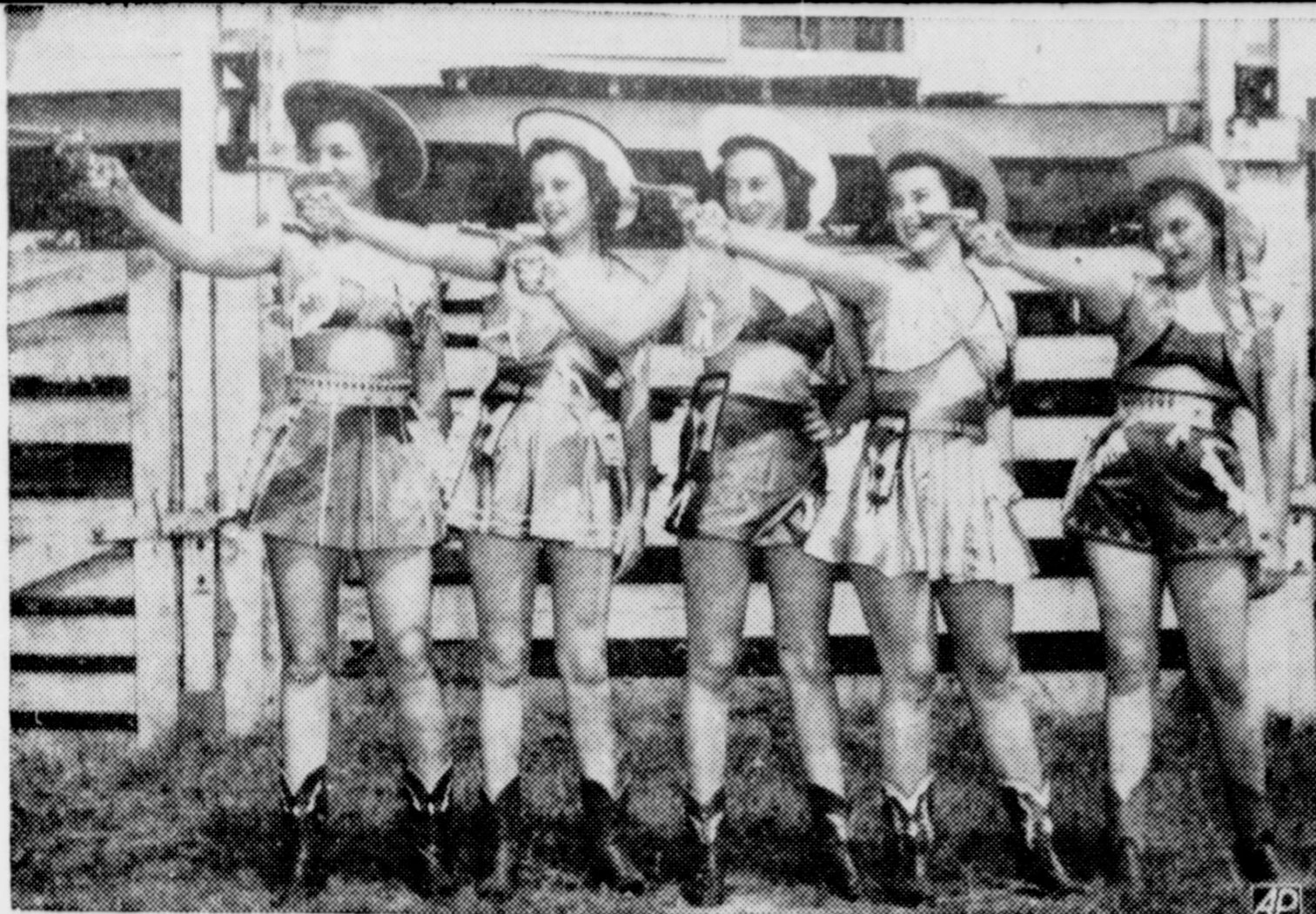

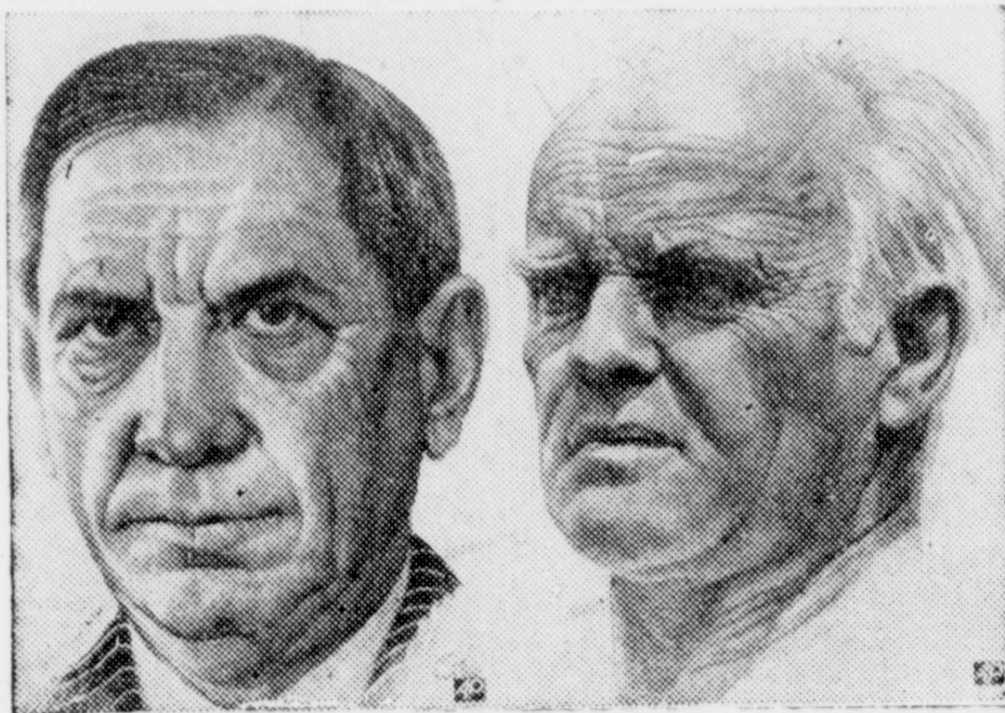

**New Style Bible Pictures Written  
By Texas Newspaperman, Starting Today**



HOUSTON HARTE

GUY ROWE

Since his youth, Houston Harte, the newspaper publisher, has been an avid Bible reader. Four years ago he cast about for means of sharing his enthusiasm with others. But as an experienced newsman he knew that the public is attracted by fine illustrations and easy-to-read type. And although the Bible is still the world's best sell-

er, it often uses the fight for readers' time against books more attractively edited and printed.

Harte soon began a book project to do something about this. The result was published by the Oxford University Press—an inch thick, 213-page book, "In Our Image," to which the word genius already is being applied.

Mr. Harte's idea was to take the finest and most dramatic portions of the Bible and make them as attractive visually as the best of modern literature—"to make so fine a book", says Kent Cooper, executive editor of The Associated Press, in a foreword, "that even the casual Christian may turn to it with excitement."

After a committee of clergymen selected 26 Old Testament stories to make up the text of the book, Mr. Harte, publisher of the San Angelo, Texas, Evening Standard and Standard-Times, and several other Texas newspapers, went to work. He eliminated material not necessary for the main thread of the story, but without changing any words of the original King James text.

Meanwhile, Guy Rowe, the portraitist, who had done numerous striking portraits as a cover artist for Time Magazine, created the illustrations. For three and a half years he worked on the 32 illustrations using real people as models. Critics say he has succeeded in telling the traditional Bible story with a new depth of meaning.

Says Mr. Harte: "Today these Old Testament portraits and narratives are going out to a world surfeited by books—books highly illustrated, books beautiful in typography—but I believe in better dress than ever before. Accordingly, they can meet on equal grounds the product of our modern age. If this be true, we cannot help but win the battle for attention in the work-a-day world and by the fireside."

The conservative Oxford Press, which has been publishing books for 500 years, calls "In Our Im-

age" a "modern masterpiece." And the effect of the book on the public may be forecast by its effect on the artist himself.

When Guy Rowe began illustrating the book he was, by his own confession, merely a Christian in name. As his work progressed, he says, he literally "caught fire". Now, he says, he is a real Christian with a mission: he plans to concentrate on religious art the rest of his life.

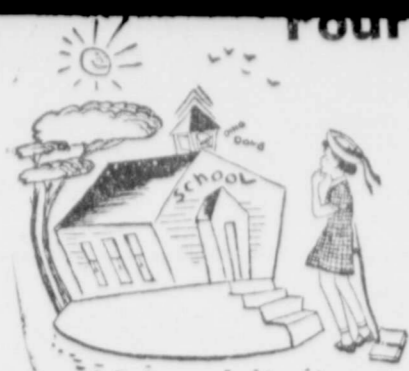

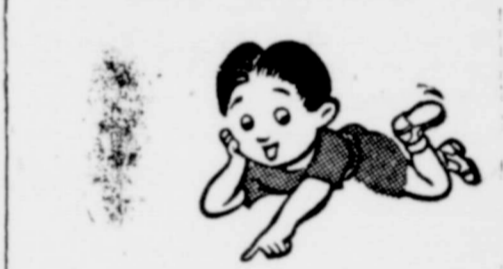
