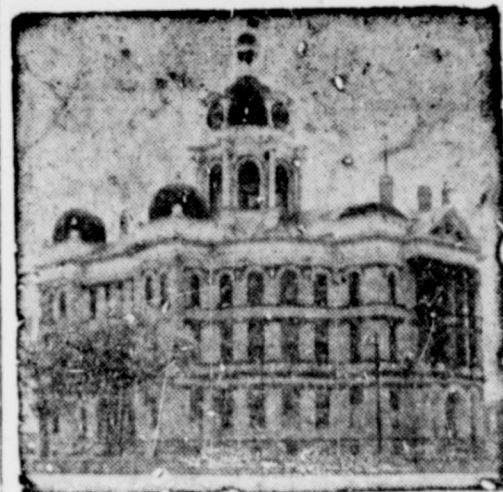

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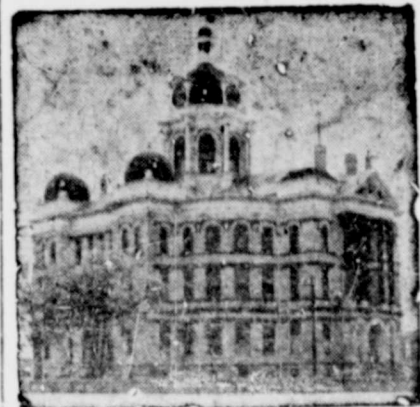


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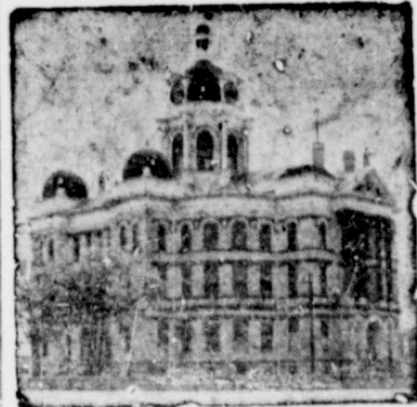

Three out of every four who conscious of a current water shortage realize that steps are being taken to build up their community's supply. They point out new dams are under construction, new wells are being dug, storage tanks and reservoirs are being enlarged, larger water mains are being laid, and more pumps are being installed.

It is these water-conscious Texans who may provide the backbone of support for a systematic statewide program for which conservation leaders are aiming.

### Lutherans Preparing For Sunday School Institute October 30-31 at McGregor

A zone institute for Sunday School teachers will be held in Zion Lutheran Church of McGregor on October 30-31st according to the announcement of Rev. Louis Kramer, Coryell City. There will be three sessions, each consisting of two fifty-minute periods, for two groups of teachers. Mrs. Marie Shupe of Columbus, Ohio, and Rev. W. A. Flachmeier of Austin, will serve as instructors.

Mrs. Shupe has been with the board of Parish Education of the American Lutheran Church as staff assistant for the Home and Nursery Department since 1941. She received her training in Ohio and Capital Universities and has sixteen years of teaching experience to her credit. She cannot recall the time when she was not active in some phase of Sunday School work and has recently edited several manuals for teachers and parents of small children. She claims that an even half-dozen grandchildren, all under seven years of age, are her best laboratory. She will teach the course, "Guiding and Teaching the Nursery Child."

The Rev. Mr. Flachmeier was called into the work of Christian education after many years in the active ministry and over three years as army chaplain. He obtained his training in Texas Lutheran College, the University of Texas, and Wartburg Theological Seminary. He is now Director of Parish Education of the Texas District of the American Lutheran Church. The course he will teach here is entitled, "Promoting Bible Study for Adolescents and Adults." It is intended for everyone who is interested in building a program of Christian education for confirmed members. The Institute being held now is one of a series conducted through-

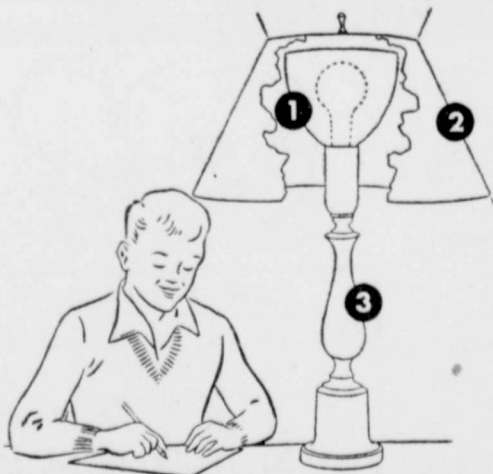

The dining table, from which cake and punch were served, was laid in white lace cloth over white satin, centered with a large cake.

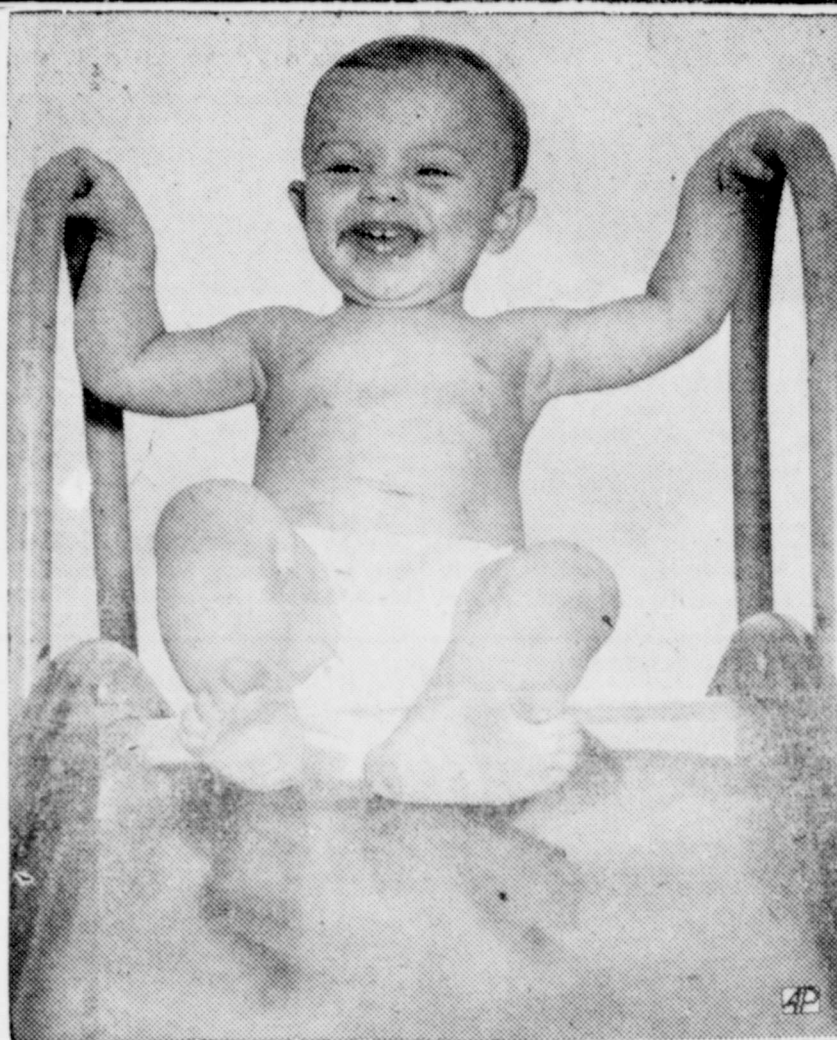

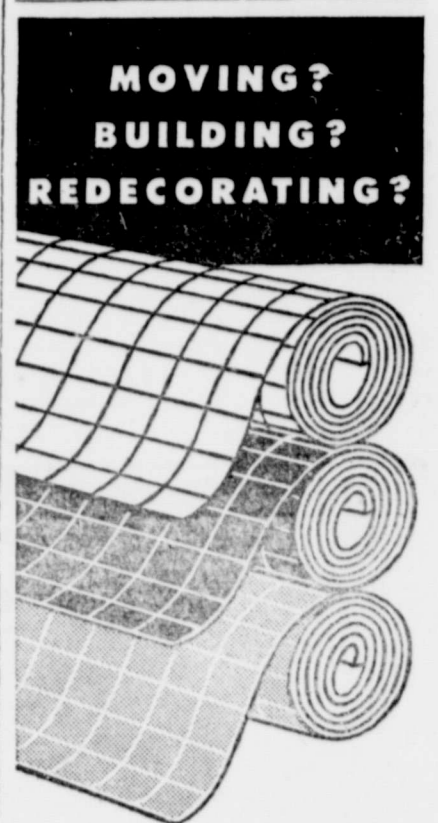

**Would America Collapse?**

Some wag once said that if we should suddenly do away with all advertising in the United States, our civilization would immediately collapse. This statement contains more truth than is at first apparent. There are those who refuse to see the importance of advertising in the economic life of the nation. Moreover, there are those who have singled out this phase of trade and industry for strong criticism.

Civilization today would collapse if it were not bolstered up by American advertising. Today the rest of the world depends upon American production. Yet, too few people recognize that this nation's great productive capacity could not have been built up without advertising. Again, there are too few people who correctly see advertising as the bulwark of American economic freedom. Advertising is the golden key that has unlocked the door to plenty for us all.

**Greatest Users**

Our world-renowned standards of living were achieved because we found out how to produce in volume: bathtubs, cars, radios, clothing, food. We learned how to make wise use of the human resources of work and brain-power. We learned to harness water-power, steam, oil, gas, and all the others. We created machinery to do most of our hard work. We learned the value of tools. In brief, we have made our factories hum.

But is that all? By no means. The Socialist schemers have failed to evaluate their old slogan, "production for use," in the light of America's vast economy. Not only did we learn to produce, we have learned to use. Americans are the world's greatest producers, and also the world's greatest users.

**Better Prices, Quality**

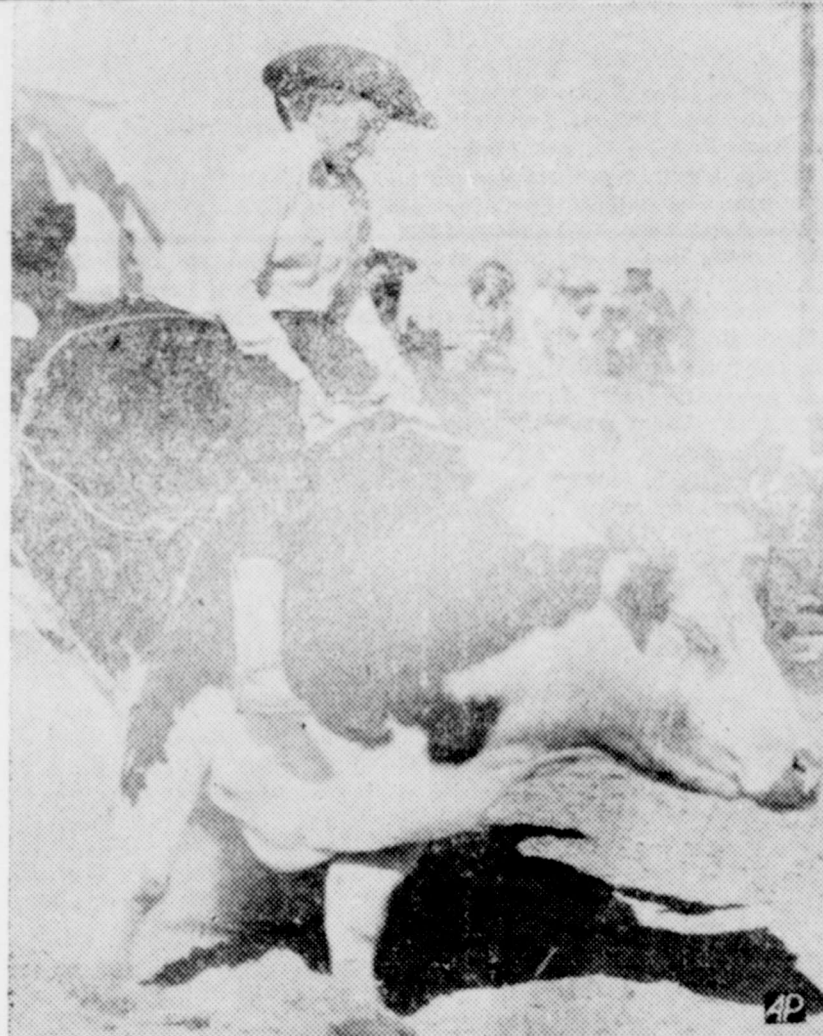
There's more to it than just production. Ask any manufacturer, and he'll tell you that the heart of his outfit is his sales force. The fellows who sell and distribute goods represent the other half of our great mass production system. Your high production is fine, but it would do no good unless the goods are placed in the hands of consumers. Continued high output lowers the price. Get the picture?

Selling and distribution simply could not do the job without advertising. Advertising not only sells goods, it always helps measurably to lower prices and to increase quality. When electric refrigerators were first sold only a few thousand were made, and it took \$800 or more to buy one. But during fifteen years of advertising millions were sold, the price came down to a fourth of the original price, and the quality was improved greatly.

**Wake Up to Facts**

Socialists and Communists have had some success in attacking this part of American economic life. A few years ago a survey of 5,000 consumers found that 72 per cent of those interviewed believed advertising increased costs to the consumer. Among high school teachers, this figure reached 82 per cent. Another survey, answered by 3,174 students in 33 colleges, revealed that 12 per cent considered advertising an economic waste.

It is high time we woke up to the economic facts-of-life! Good and wise advertising is a vital part of free competitive enterprise. Naturally, advertising would be unnecessary in a dictatorship. The dictator could simply tell the people what to eat, wear, and enjoy. He would also tell them what they could not have. Under a system that permits no advertising, we would have two choices: a lower standard of living or a dictatorship.

# West Trojans Out-mud Hornets Winning 7-0 Friday Night

**HORNETS IMPROVED CLUB BUT LACKED PUNCH TO TIE OR WIN GAME**

Gatesville High School Hornets missed an excellent opportunity Friday evening to break into the win column, when they met a highly regarded West Trojan eleven in the mire and muck at Holmes Stadium, dropping the contest 7-0.

First downs were 5 to 7, in Trojans' favor, which indicates something, and for the Trojans, Snookhous, Urbis and Black were outstanding. For the Hornets, it was Anderson, Meeks, Cook, Hitt, and G. Jones man undered admirably. Gatesville's line, as a whole, worked considerably better, and West's star end, Urbis, did most of the inside damage.

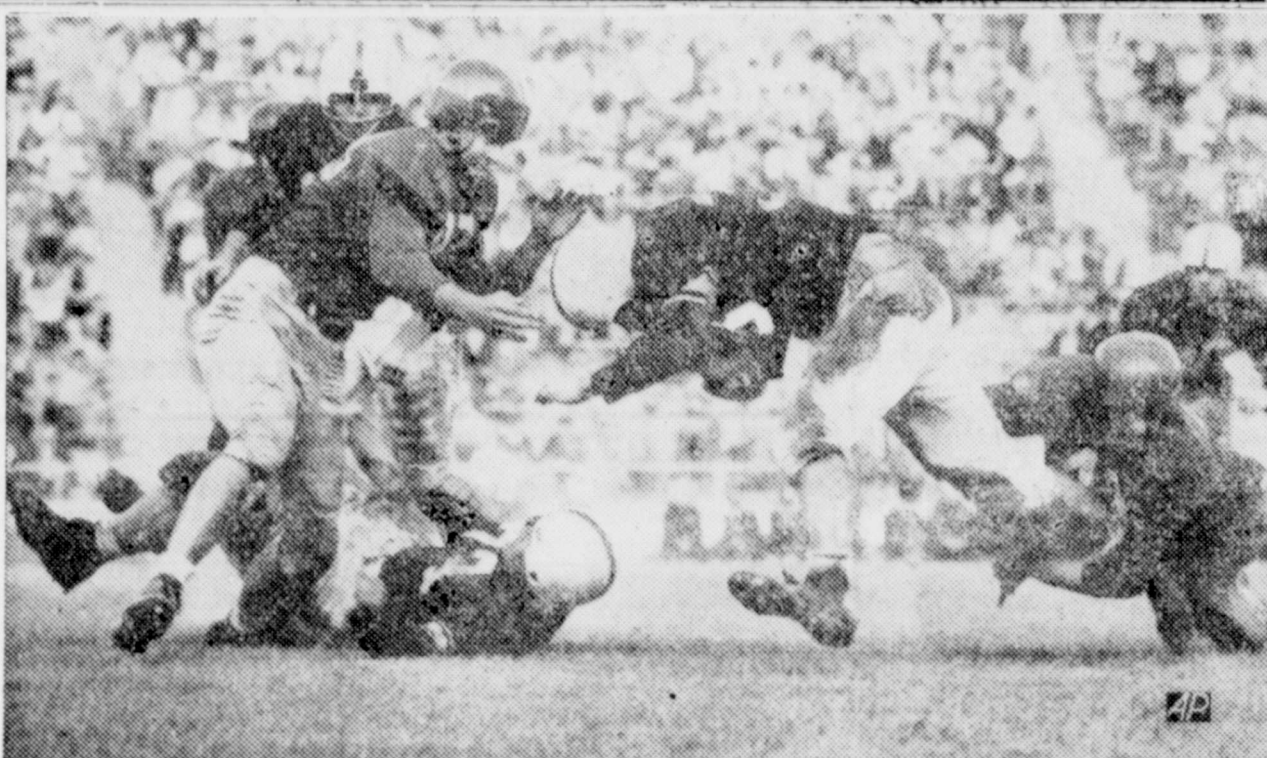
Jones drops, can't punt, Snookhous stops. Jones kicks to Archer on 42, Anderson and Hitt get.

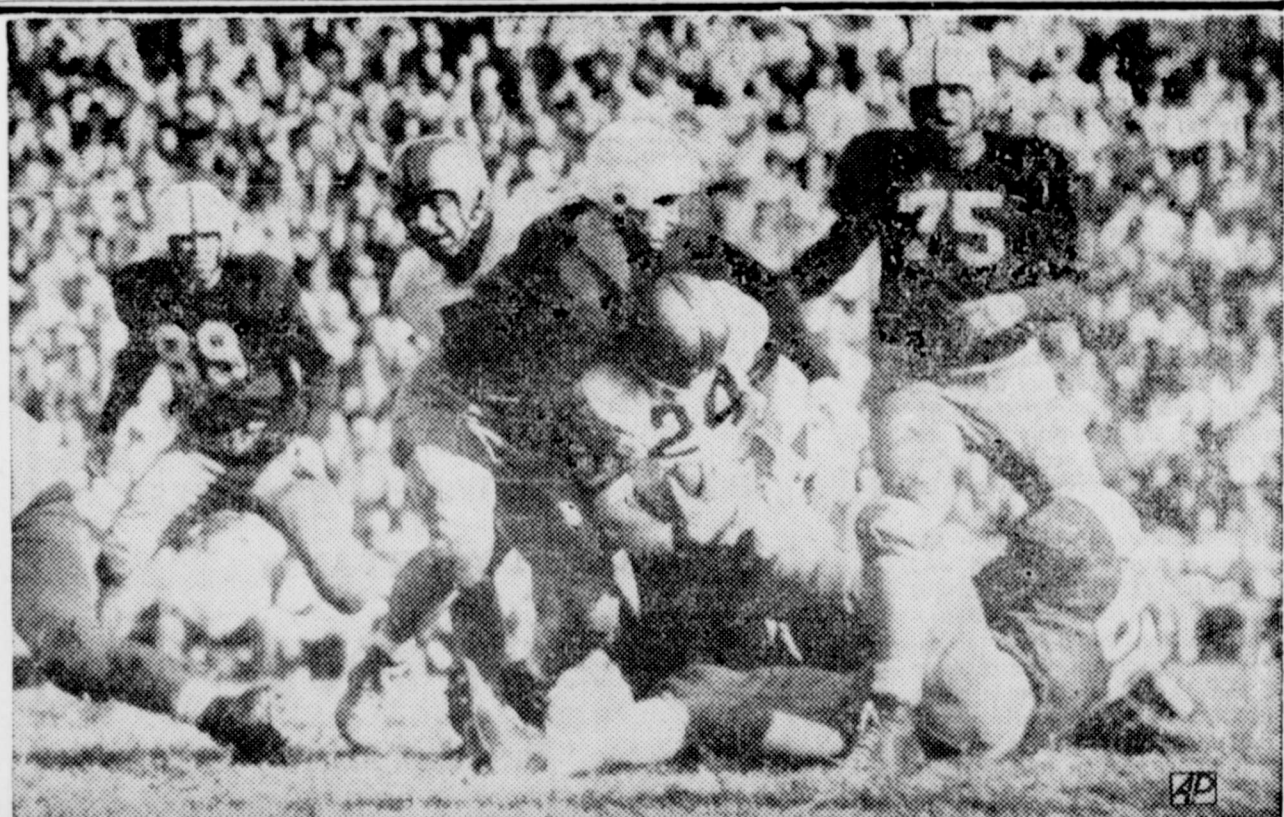
