**1,100 CIO Drivers Go Back On Job In Houston**

HOUSTON, Nov. 3. (AP)—Some 1,100 CIO bus drivers and mechanics accepted a company proposal at 12:10 p. m., after halting public transportation by striking at midnight.

The strikers accepted a 13 cents hourly increase by a vote of 722 to 47.

The union had sought a 30 cent boost on its \$117 hourly wage. The company had previously offered a 10 cent raise.

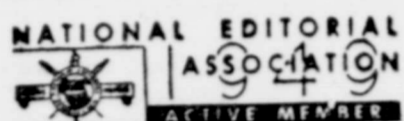

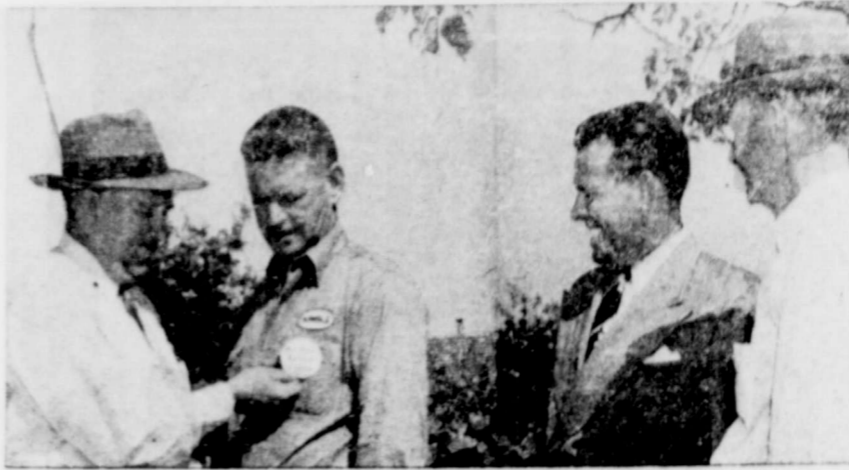

THE CHAPEL YOUTH BUILT

Ten year old November 1, the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods at Texas State College for Women has been the scene of 691 weddings, a number of baptisms, and weekly interdenominational worship services. Built primarily as a place of individual prayer and meditation, the Chapel is con-

structed of native limestone. Art work, including the stained glass windows, was done by more than 500 TSCW students. From its Celtic cross to its multi-colored stained glass windows, the Chapel is not only of the twentieth century but of Texas landscape. It was the first true stone masonry building of any moment to be built in Texas since 1870.

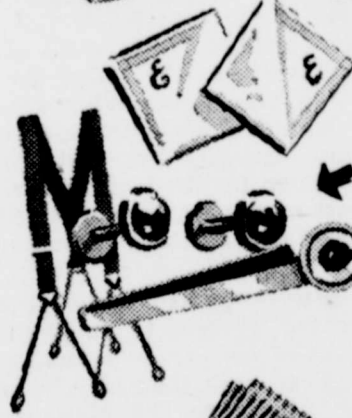

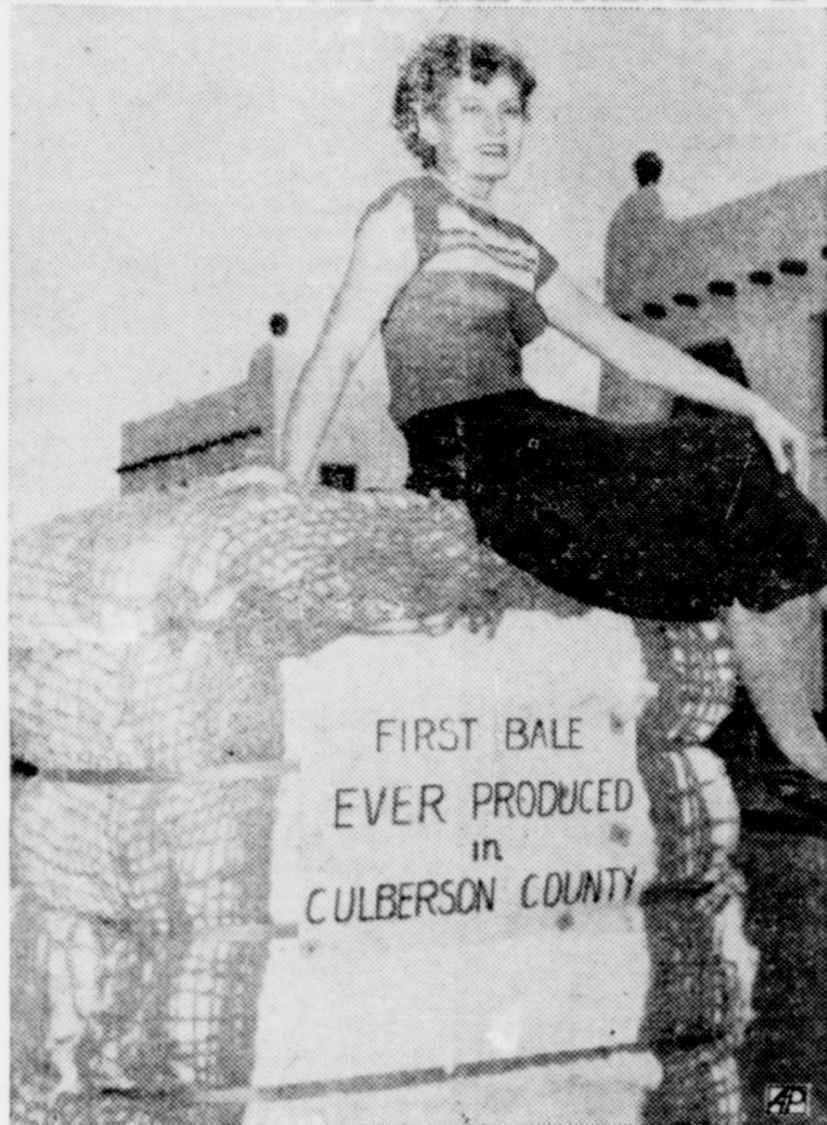

THERE JUST OUGHT TO BE some relief for Coryell County on this crop allotment proposition. Every time I look at a Coryell County map, my eyes rivet automatically to the tremendous amount of frozen cropland in Camp Hood. Then I look at that part of the Bluebonnet Farm in Coryell County, and that isn't all. Oh no! I understand Miller Springs Dam will back water over a large area. Now, if you don't think this is a lot of acreage, just get a county map and look it over.

While all these things are worth while, Gatesville, depends upon that farm income to get by. Reduction in allotments and marketing quotas means reduction in farm income.

The Chamber has encouraged dairying as a supplemental income in the county. We are also interested in more production per acre and better grade farm products.

I don't know—maybe this whole setup is wrong. Edward G. Norse, who recently resigned as Economic Adviser to the President, says, "I am uneasy when I see farmers demanding stimulative prices whilst government accumulates gigantic surplus holdings, pays subsidies out of Federal deficits, and imposes production allotments and marketing quotas." It seems as though we could feed a hungry world with food instead of dollars. Our farmers are protected by tariffs on Australian wool, Argentine beef, and cotton from Brazil, but have virtually no competition on the world market for most of our major crops. How will the government dispose of this huge surplus?

Well, right or wrong, it's not for me to say. I do wish Coryell County could obtain an overall percentage increase in allotments because of this tremendous loss of cropland.

## Red Cross Hospital Workers Help Speed Patient Recovery

The job of rebuilding sick bodies and minds of servicemen in military hospitals and restoring them to useful life is carried forward by a team—doctors, nurses, and Red Cross workers. The Red Cross worker may be a medical or psychiatric social worker, a recreation specialist, or a combination of them assisted by a Gray Lady.

Military physicians and nurses find that restoring the health of a sick man requires much more than medicine and food. The will to live and the will to do things must be revived before medical treatment can get in its beneficial work. That's where the Red Cross enters the picture.

A young soldier, only 23, was injured in an accident at a munitions proving ground. Half of his face and neck were blown away. Painracked and frightened, he had little taste for ordinary hospital recreation. He loved music, though, so the recreation worker brought to his bedside a radio phonograph and then, by mere chance, found she could satisfy a greater longing. The boy revealed that he wanted to write to his young wife those tender, personal things that he hesitated to dictate.

Under federal statute and regulations of the Army, the Navy, and the Air Force, the American Red Cross furnishes volunteer aid to the sick and wounded of the armed forces and acts in matter of voluntary relief and as a medium of communication between the people of the United States and their armed forces.

A recording machine was brought to his bedside, and he found the words to tell his longings to his distant wife. It wasn't easy because his injury had damaged his vocal chords and articulation was difficult. But after patient practice with the hospital worker, he finally poured out his heart to the record and sent it off to his wife.

To the arthritic, the tubercular, the rheumatic heart sufferer, doomed to long periods of bed care, the recreational services provided by Red Cross ease their burden of restlessness and discouragement. Nearby chapters in cooperation with other local agencies bring into the hospitals young people from the nearby communities, women who serve as hostesses for parties, young people who dance and play games, all reminding the sick soldier that he is not forgotten by those he served.
