C. T. King Says Dry Hole At Tate Ranch Test

The Thursday morning report on the oil well at Ireland's Tate Ranch is a dry hole, as announced by C. T. King, district production foreman for the Amerado Petroleum Corporation, which was making the test.

At last report preparations were under way to plug the hole, and that would probably be done soon.

Drilling stopped at a depth of 4878 feet, and King said it was not necessary to go on to the contract depth of 5500 feet because "we've already gone through the Ellenberger, and that was the object of the test."

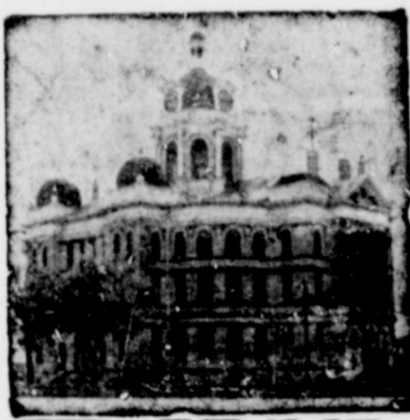

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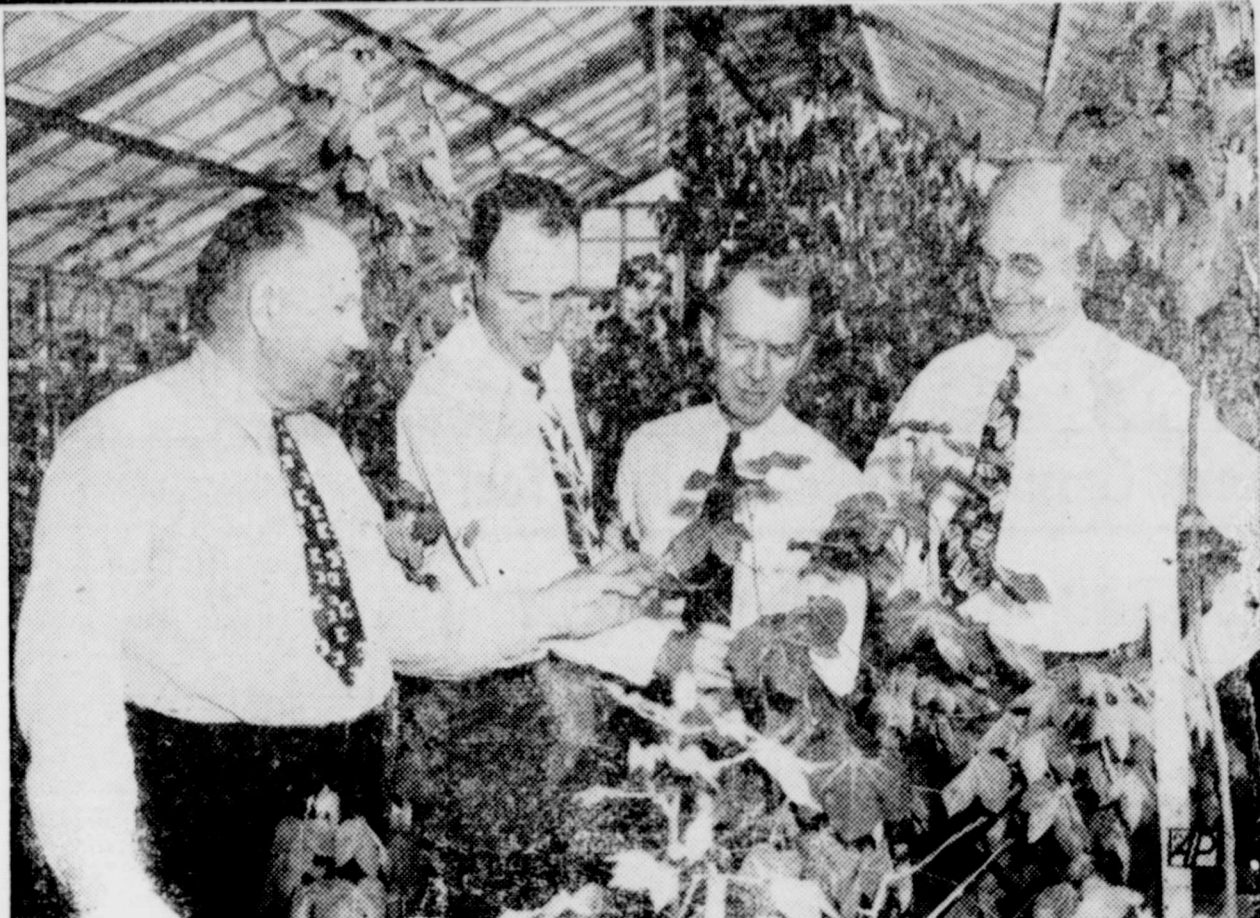

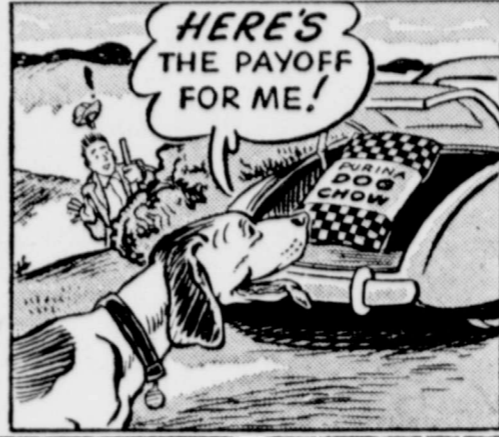

We Americans are accustomed to growth and change. We have seen our nation go forward. We moved ahead not because we conquered other lands or won territory. It goes into brick and mortar. It is turned into locomotives and drag lines. It pays for the research that discovers new drugs and new plastics. It strings power lines to homes and factories. It buys lathes and dump trucks. It is back of pay checks that men must have, even before sales bring in the expected income. You see, if we want an adventurous industry, we must have venture capital, to do all these things and more.

Business Is Thirsty

Now, the big trouble is this. We have throttled down our supply of venture money. There are some who maintain that this source for new industrial activity has dried up. At least this is true: both young enterprises and established firms are thirsting for the capital which even today's normal growth requires of them. They are also hungry for the go-ahead signal, to build new plants and to improve old ones. This requires much venture capital.

Consider the oil industry. Traditionally, the oil and gas business has been financed by private risk money. Yet, men in the industry say that 12 to 15 billion dollars more will be needed in the next ten years. Dollars for plant equipment and labor go less than half as far as they did 20 years ago, while risk capital has shrunk 75 per cent in that period. This industry is typical of many others that are hungry for capital!

Shortage Hits Us

Shortage of this venture money hits us hard at every point! Without it new products that might go far in enriching mankind are sidetracked in favor of the sure money-makers. New businesses, that must live almost entirely on risk capital, are handicapped. Without sufficient capital, production everywhere is curtailed, and this affects our jobs and our national well-being. No venture means a weak industrial machine that openly invites foreign aggression. Naturally, if no venture money is found for expansion, government always wants to step in and do it for us. We must remember that money for venture will be scarce and fearful until we cut down government expenses and revise taxes downward. It is your responsibility and mine to help keep our industry strong, adventurous, and free.

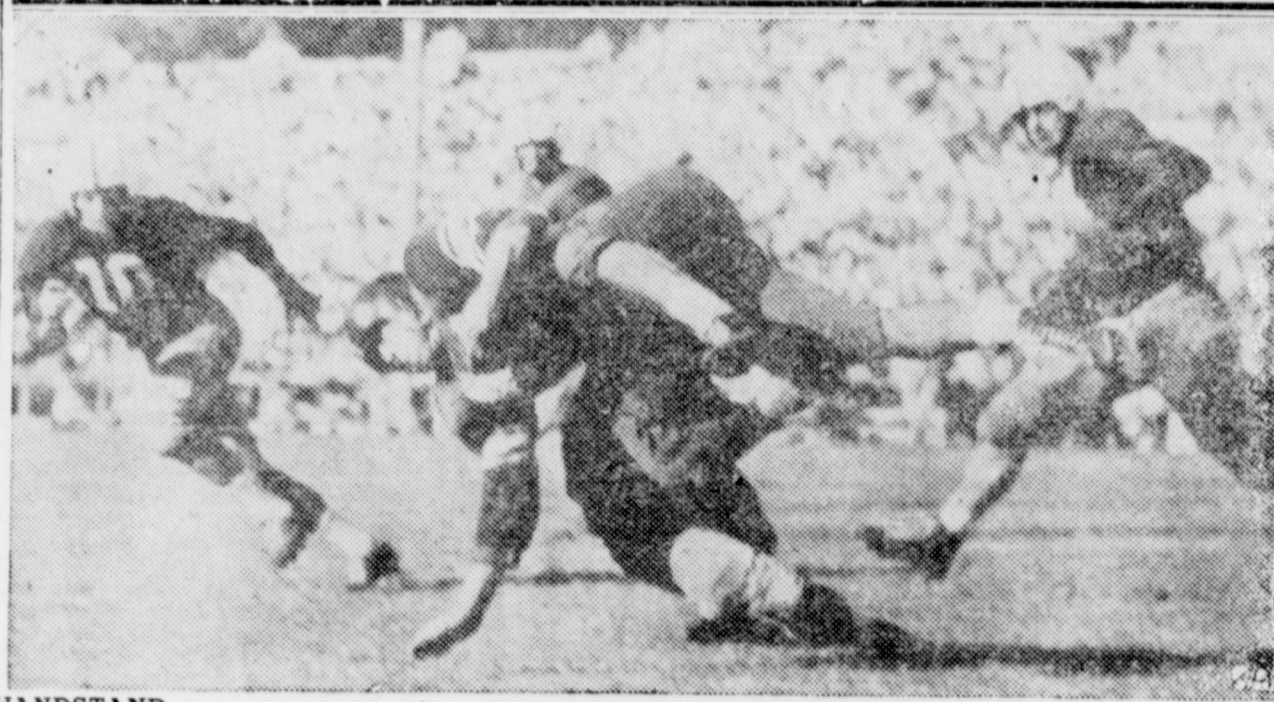

Here are some exercises suggested by Miss Delafield. You can do them at your desk:

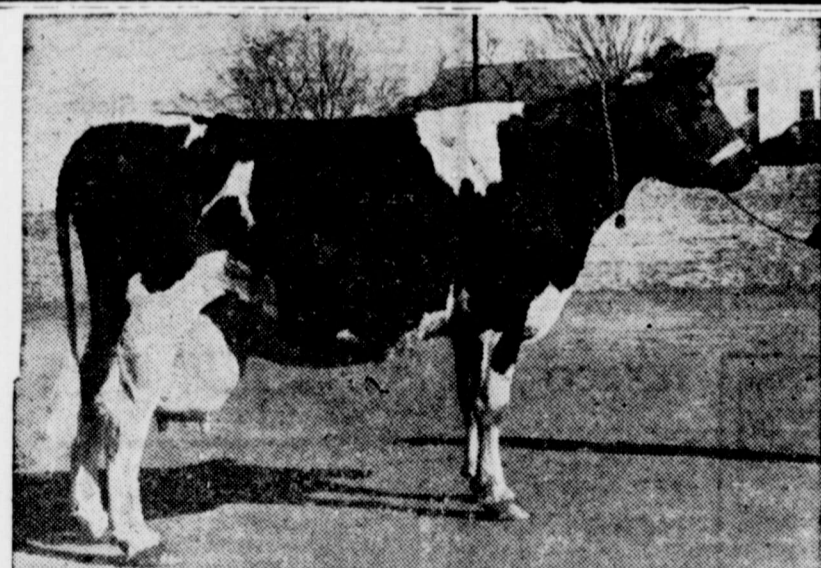
Necks can be lovelier if you will push up neck at spot where your tonsils are (or were) towards the ceiling, all the while holding chin. Push right tonsil up toward ceiling, then left. This exercise sounds a little startling at first, but you'll find that if you do it just that way, and as often as possible, it will give your neck a new lift.

A waistline desk exercise suggested by Miss Delafield is this: Become conscious of your ribs near backbone. Lift left ribs up away from left hip, then right away from right hip, then left, right, left, right and hold. If you can hold this lift during the rest of the class period, you can't help but make school a charm session.

Girls who sit with legs crossed are asking in later years for hollow thighs, says Miss Delafield. Says she:

"When young girls sit with legs crossed, they compress tissues and ruin legs for bathing suits. This congested tissue results in bunchedy baggy thighs and knees when older."

Actually, now that girls are wearing heels on their shoes, they will notice their ankles look much prettier. Flat shoes throw more weight on the inside of the foot and make the ankle look thicker, Miss Delafield says. Ankles look much prettier in a medium moderate heel, (not a spiked of course.)
