GAME JUST TOO SHORT TO PUT ON WIN SIDE: HORNETS COMIN' FAST!

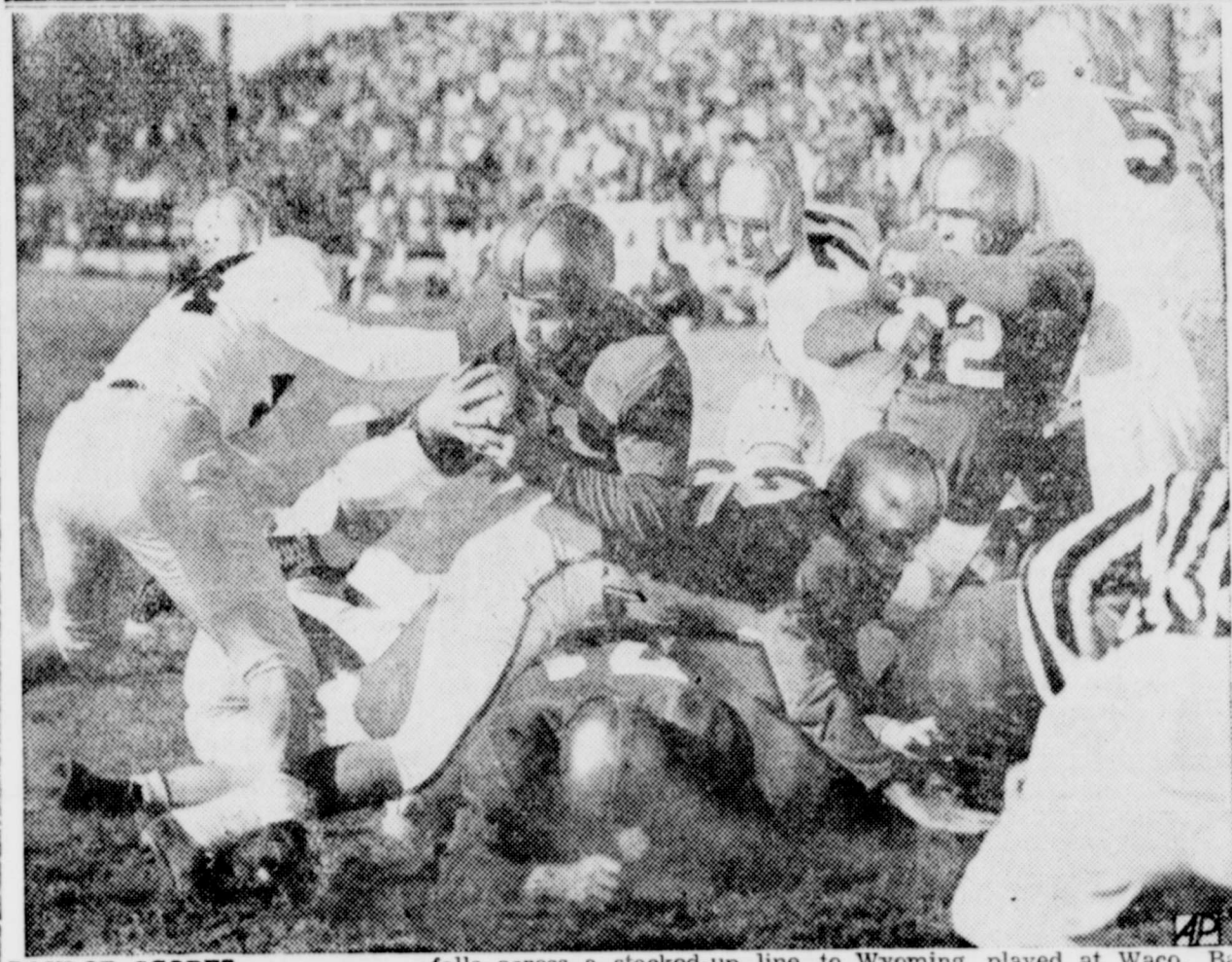
The annual Armistice Day clash between the Gatesville Hornets and the Hamilton Bulldogs was too short.

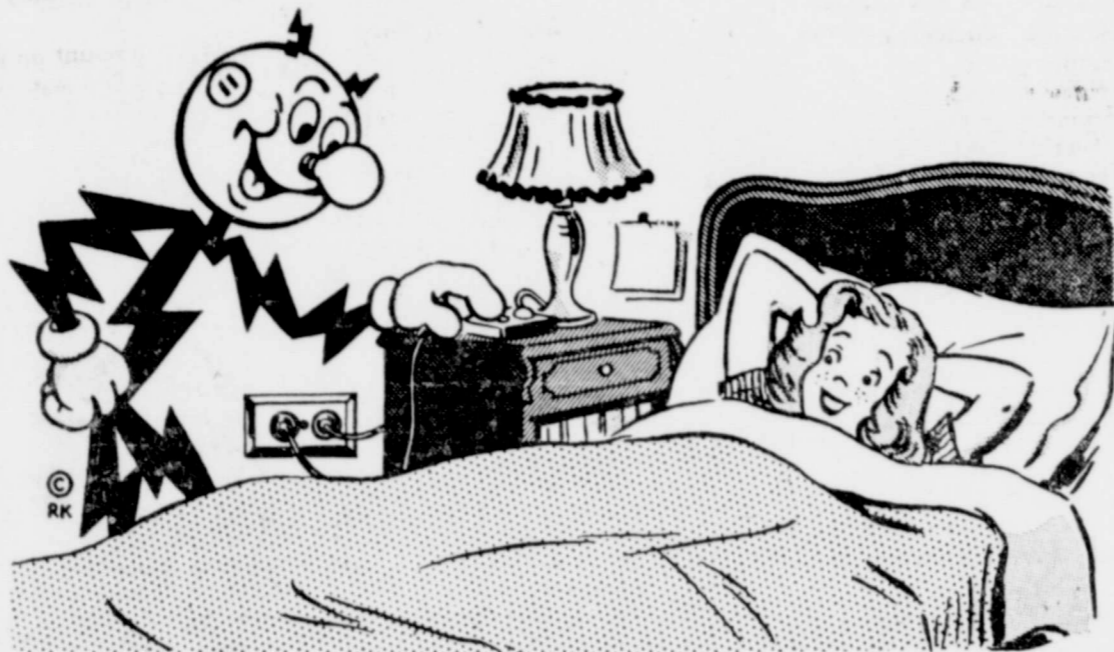

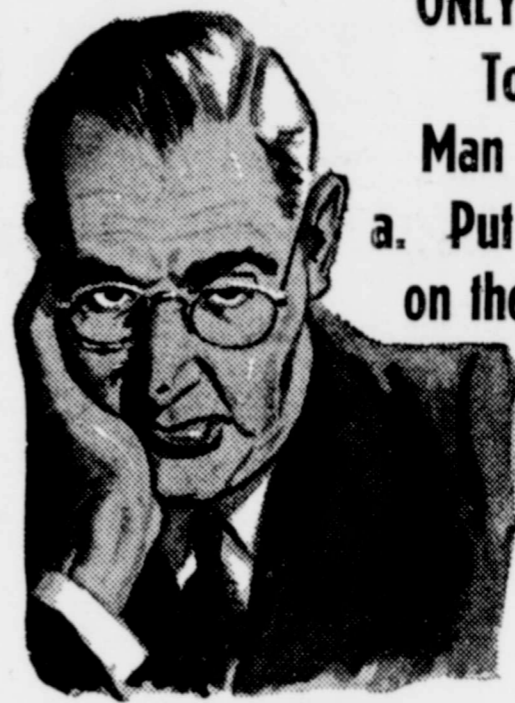

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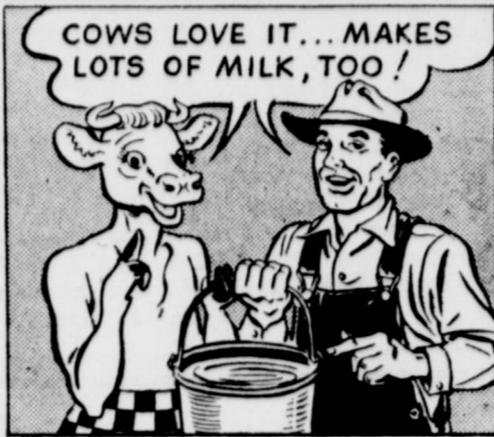

The PMA office received a few thousand dollars (\$8,000) for terracing. Don't get excited, it has already been allotted for that practice—wells and tanks. It is hoped that the money allotted for tanks was not wasted as has been on many tanks which do not hold water.

This office has had too many calls for terraces. Farmers who expect to rush in every time there is a new allotment for terracing and get a survey immediately had better start planning ahead. The agent's annual plan of work calls for twenty terracing demonstrations in 1950. These will be whole farm terracing programs. Plans for the entire farm layout will be made and terracing completed as allotments are obtained.

Any farmer interested in signing up with the Agent for these demonstrations should apply as soon as possible. The first twenty farmers applying for service will be listed provided they are scattered over the county well enough to serve as demonstrations for

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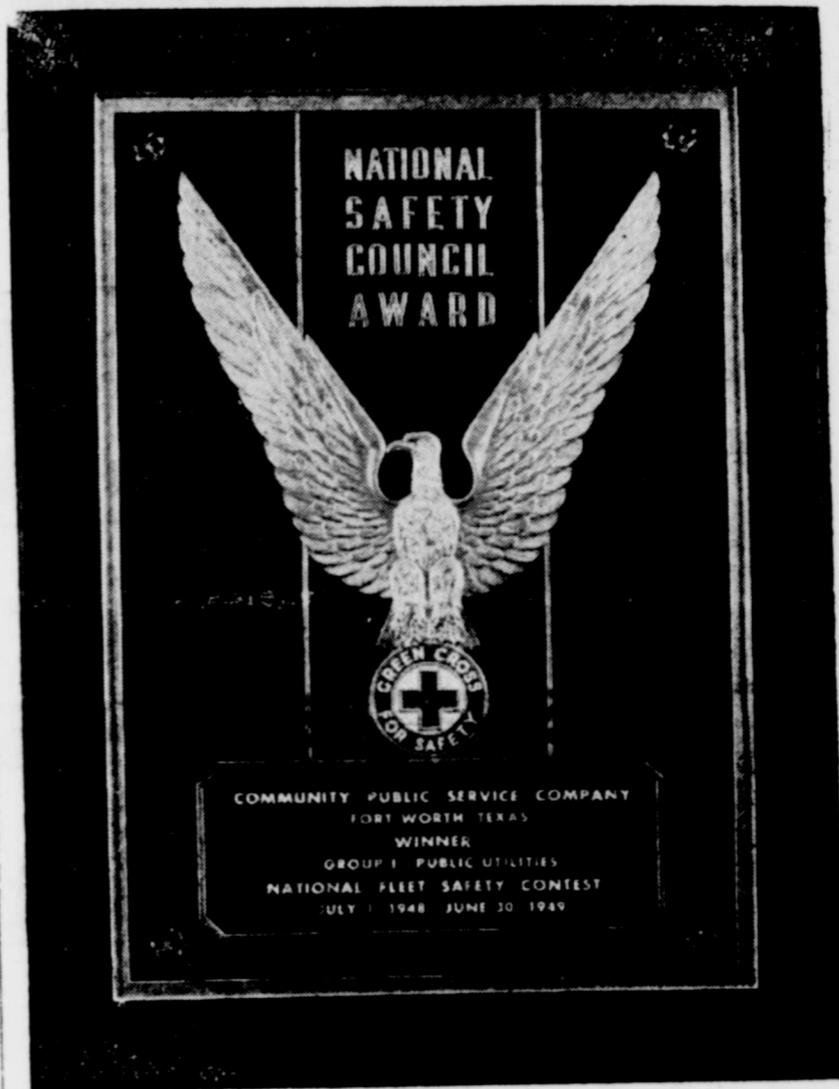

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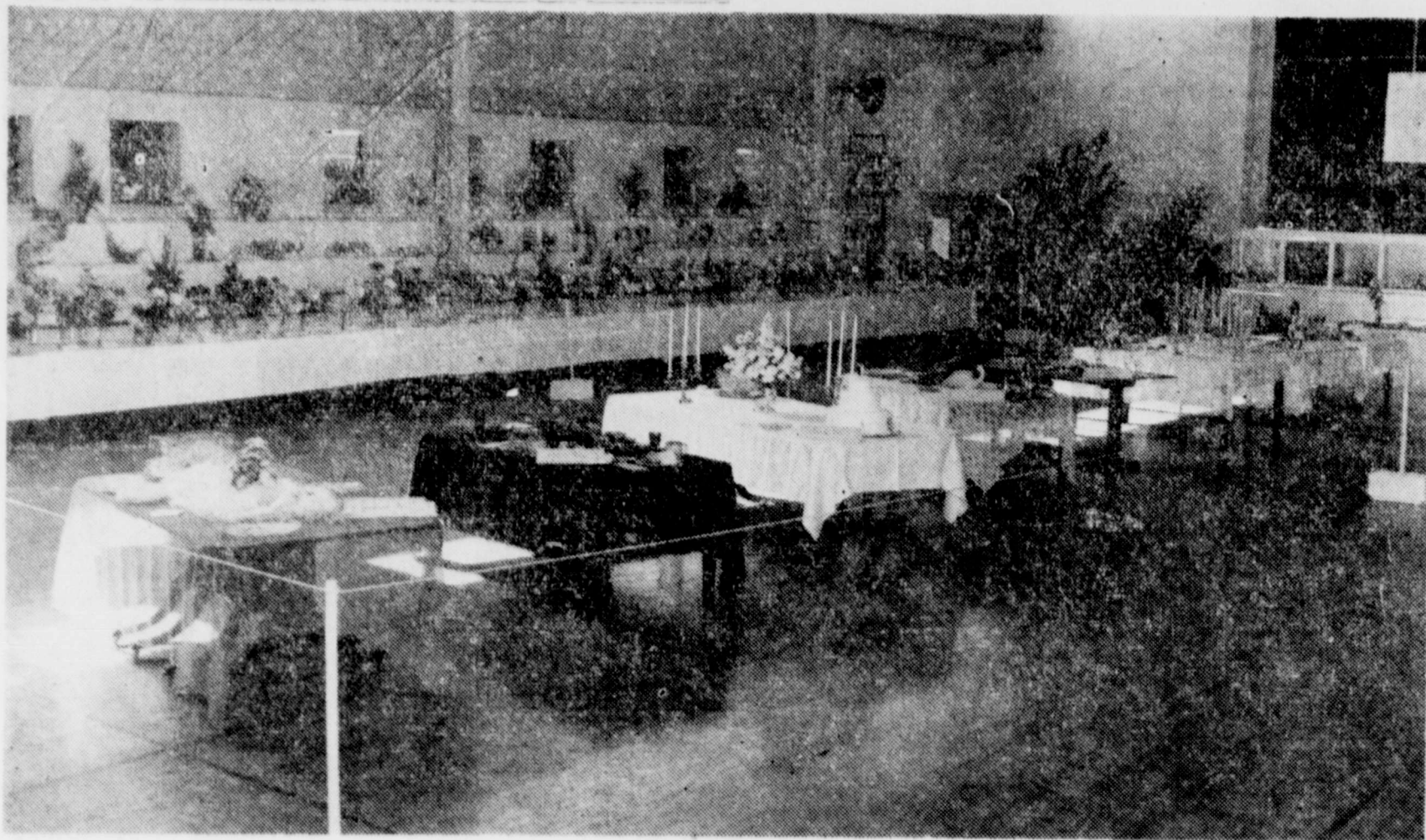

### The Texas Poll The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 12.—Texas congressmen who are now at home feeling the public pulse will find general support for the "cold war" against Communism in Europe. At the same time, the congressmen may be interested to learn that about four out of every ten adults believe it is just as important, if not more important, to fight the spread of Communism in China.

A statewide survey by The Texas Poll shows:

1. A majority of adults is keeping up with conditions in China.  
2. Most of those who have some information about the situation think the United States should help China solve their problems.

3. Among those who haven't heard or read anything about China recently, the weight of opinion favors a hands-off policy.

4. About three out of every ten thing it is equally important to fight Communism in Europe and Asia. One out of every ten would emphasize the "cold war" in Asia, while three out of every ten would stress it in Europe.

Congress recently voted several billions of dollars for Europe, deciding at the same time to withhold direct aid to the Chinese until our diplomatic experts create a new policy toward China. Our old policy of helping Chiang Kai-shek and his cohorts against the Communists was discontinued several months ago.

Interviewers for the Texas Poll put these questions to a representative cross section of adults:

1. "Have you heard or read anything about conditions in China recently?"

In September, 1948, when a comparable cross section of adults was asked, "Do you think the U. S. should leave Europe alone to solve its own problems?" 71 per cent favored European aid, 21 per cent voted against, and 8 per cent had no opinion.

The latest survey indicates people who have at least completed high school are generally more concerned about the plight of China. In the lower educational levels people aren't as interested because they are relatively uninformed. More than half of those who did not complete high school say they haven't heard or read anything about China recently. By way of comparison, two out of every three of those who completed high school have recent information about China.

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
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
